HIGH SCHOOL DOINGS.

The graduating exercises of the High School which occurred Thursday night were a fitting close to the school year in the quiet dignity with which they were carried out.

Shortly after eight o'clock, members of the school board, the faculty and other prominent citizens filed upon the platform, followed by the graduates who occupied a modest background.

The program opened with a piano solo by Miss Avenel Brandenburg, whose selection was one of exceptional difficulty and brilliancy.

The prayer by Dr. Windsor was followed by a song by Miss Edna Briggs, who sang a popular air which greatly pleased the audience.

Prof. Smith briefly introduced Dr. McClish who spoke for an hour or more, absorbing the entire attention of his audience as he talked of the sources of education and its value, of how we are indebted to all men and all ages for our present state of civilization. Dr. McClish has an inimitable style of his own, simple enough to interest a child and profound enough to instruct the learned, and his discourse was one of his best.

At the close of the address Miss Charlotte Davis gave a very sweet vocal solo, after which Dr. M. J. Gates, president of the Board of Trustees presented diplomas to the graduates, with a few remarks befitting the occasion.

A vocal quartette by Misses Florence and Zena Kennedy, Lena Swope and Edna Briggs was sung with charming effect, and the program closed with the benediction by the Rev. J. F. Jenness.

Professor and Mrs. Smith gave a cordial greeting to the hundreds who were present after the exercises were ended.

The assembly hall of the High School was literally packed on Tuesday night, the occasion of the class exercises of the graduates of 1904.

The first number on the program was a piano solo by Prof. Powers, which merited the enthusiastic applause given it.

Miss Maud Farley's class history was a witty production with considerable literary merit.

Miss Charlotte Davis sang "Stolen Wings" (Wileby) and "The Slumber Boat" (Gaynor) in her usual charming manner, responding to an encore.

The class poem by Miss Della Kennison was in serious vein, well written and well read, entitled "Auf Weidersein."

Miss Frances Fablinger's class prophecy was a remarkable clever story in Irish dialect, showing both wit and originality.

The three act farce, "The Ulster" was rather an ambitious work, with a multiplicity of performers, and a complicated plot. The parts were all well taken and showed careful rehearsing, and the situations were laughable. The characters were represented by Vaughn Lloyd, Miss Nina Davison, Milton Francis, Miss Mabel Ross, Clarence Martinia, Miss Lena Swope, George Schuyler and Miss Mildred Keesling in the principal roles, with Misses Della Kennison, Maud Farley, Lelia Oliver, Messers Abbott, Merle Lloyd, Calvin Bohnett and George Richter in lesser characters.

Two social events of importance to high school pupils were the Kappa Alpha Chi reception Thursday night and the Junior Alumni reception Friday night. The former took place at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Campbell, and was in every sense a brilliant affair made enjoyable by music and dancing, and by the delicious refreshments. The second was also a pleasant function, though more formal.

It took place at I. O. O. F. Hall and the amusement of the evening was conversation. Refreshments were served early and the company dispersed promptly at ten o'clock—a happy precedent for future occasions.

Sunday evening a service for high school graduates was held at the Congregational church. A talk full of earnest counsel was given by the Rev. George Atkinson. Music for the evening was furnished by the choir under the able leadership of Mrs. Janes. Vocal solos were sung by Miss Fanny Janes and Mrs. M. E. Luther, and two anthems were given by the choir.

Register for the Primary.

August 9th the primaries will be held for the election of members of the county convention. Registration will close forty days before the primaries, that is, July 1. Barely a week remains, therefore, for our citizens to register.

Bear in mind that all who did not register for the city election of last month must register in order to vote at the primary.

The city registration is pretty well up, but in the county outside is very backward.

The first duty of a citizen is to vote at the primaries. That is where the real work of securing good government is done.

A good primary at which all citizens work and vote, will assure a good convention, and a good convention guarantees a good ticket.

The only way to put up the right men for office is through the primary.

The coming election is of the utmost importance. The people will vote for three assemblymen, one senator, three supervisors and two superior judges, besides one supreme justice, one congressman and the presidential electors.

Therefore, it is of the greatest moment that all voters who have not registered should get their names on the register within the next few days. There are just seven days in which to do it and one of them is Sunday.

Register to-day. If impossible to-day do it to-morrow. Something may happen to prevent next week.

Let no man neglect this duty who wants to have anything to say about how this county shall be governed and represented.—San Jose Mercury.
