



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STRAWBERRIES

For garden culture, set strawberries 12 to 18 inches apart in the row, with rows 2 to 3 feet apart. For field culture, the same distance in the row but make the rows 4 to 5 feet apart. There are 43,560 square feet in an acre of land and you can find the number of plants that go on an acre, by dividing 43,560 by the multiplied distance between the plants. Thus an acre of strawberries set 5 x 1, contains 8,712 plants and an acre set 4 x 1, contains 10,890 plants. This method can be used to find the number of plants or trees of any kind that can be planted on an acre. The best time to set strawberries in the North is early spring, but transplanted plants can be set any time in the growing season and pot grown plants are best set in July, August and September. October and November are best months for setting plants in Florida, California and similar climates.

Varieties marked "P" are perfect in flower and do not require that others he planted near them. Varieties marked "Imp." are imperfect in flower and need to he planted near some perfect flowered kind that blossoms at the same time.

Although we have tried to make our descriptions plain, it is sometimes difficult for the heginner to make the proper selection and if you will write us, giving us a general idea of your wants, we will try to help you.

The following prices are for layer or common field dug plants, dug and shipped in spring of 1932 up to June 1st. After June 1st, transplanted plant prices will he charged for summer and fall shipments. After May 1st, we advise ordering only the transplanted plants. Potted plants are shipped in August and later.

Extra Early Varieties

Premier (P). The most popular strawberry in general cultivation today. Plants moderate growers. Berries very large, ohlong, pointed and stand shipment very well. Has a prominent hull which helps in shipping. Its hright at-tractive color and good keeping qualities, make it a favorite in market. It does not turn dark after standing over night, like some varieties. It prefers light sandy or gravelly soils, hut does fairly well on heavier lands, hut will not stand wet soggy conditions. 
Senator Dunlap (P). The most popular strawherry for the Northern part of the United States and Cara-less culture, heing very vigorous, healthy and productive under partial neglect. We have often remarked that all you have to do to get plenty of herries, is to set out the plants and hoe them once. They are quite capable of coping with weeds and grass under ordinary conditions. We have a patch that has heen set over 20 years; it gets absolutely no care and yet there is where we find our first herries every year, and they are of the finest flavor. Of course it pays to give the Senator Dunlap good culture, no variety responds more readily to good care. We have seen herries that you would almost take for Marshalls, they were so large and fine. The housewife floves them, as they are so easily hulled, the calyx standing off, not fitting down tight to the herry. The flavor is almost the hest. 

Berries very large, deep red on outside and lighter underneath. Very productive of mild flavored herries neither very sour nor very sweet, hut well liked by people who do not like acid in strawberries. Price, same as Premier.

Late Varieties

/The Best (P). We have been growing strawherries now for 48 years and in all this time, we have never run across a later strawberry that quite equalled the variety we call "Best" for our soil and location. It is with us as a late strawherry what the Jersey Giant is as an early variety. The only fault it has that we could mention, is that it is sometimes not very productive the first fruiting year, but it will make up for it the second and betwee reason and the second and second se fruiting year, but it will make up for it the second and later years every time. The plants are marvels of growth, healthy, hardy and very vigorous. The herries are very large, smooth and glossy, as if turned in a lathe, with blunt dimpled ends. It is a light red herry and does not turn dark hy standing. The flavor is good and the keeping and shipping qualities are unsurpassed. The plants are vigorous, rohust growers and while not an everbearing variety, seem to he so inclined to heavy fruiting, that they "Boil Over" and fruit a second time, it often being possible to gather a fine crop of them in late fall, like Mastodon and other everhearers, in Octoher and Novemher. The herries are very large, attractive, round in shape, serrated and do not fade or grow dark colored by standing. It has sold as high as \$1.00 per quart on the New York market. There seems to be several strains of this remarkable variety which largely accounts for the variance in results that different growers have with it. Ours is the Halliday strain. Price same as the Best.

Steven's Late Champion (P). This is one of the most remarkable strawberries of all time. It is irregular in shape, many of the berries being flat and coxcomhed, and has a very large and prominent calyx or hull; these

qualities making it weigh less to the crate than any other strawherry. This is why it is such a fine keeper and shipper; it heing possibly the best shipping strawberry we have. The plants are very vigorous, and good runners, and seem to do well on most any kind of soil, being the one variety that does not have to have very rich soil. A bed of this and Senator Dunlap taken good care of the first year, so the vines cover the gound, can be manipulated, with a very litle care, so that it can he kept in hearing condition almost indefinitely. Chesapeake (P). This is to late strawherries, what the Marshall is to early varieties, the Aristocrat among strawherries. The plants are strong, sturdy growers but must have the hest of care. The berries are very large, firm and of fine flavor, the seeds heing very prominent on the outside and aiding the herries to stand up won-derfully when shipped. I saw the returns of an Oswego

County grower who shipped 7 crates to New York, which were sold July 3rd, 1929, at 45 and 50 cents per quart, and which netted the grower over \$100,00 for the 7 crates. The stewards of those large New York hotels won't take any other strawherries if they can get Marshalls or Chesapeakes, and it is my advice to growers to experiment with these varieties and see if you can grow them. you can grow them. Price same as Early Jersey Giant. Glen Mary (P). Plants vigorous and healthy on dry leachy soils, hut soon get hadly diseased if set in wet places. This and Wm. Belt and Brandywine, seem to require similar conditions. Berries of Glen Mary are very large, with lighter colored tips, irregular, good shippers, hut of indifferent flavor. Decidedly the "quantity" strawherry and much in favor with many growers on that account. There are places where nothing but quantity counts, flavor doesn't appeal, and Glen Mary hits the mark. The Ridgway (P) Years ago, we used to grow this variety extensively for home use and market, hut it was crowded out by others of greater claims hut of less ability of fulfilment. I don't know as I ever knew of a variety being called for so persistently as the Ridgway was by my customers, after we ceased to catalogue it. We finally secured a stock of a neighbor and now we have growing a limited supply of plants for spring trade. The plants are clean healthy growers, the roots being whiter and more fleshy than other varieties, re-minding one of asparagus, they are so vigorous and healthy. The herries are medium to large in size and as regular in shape as if turned out from a lathe. It seems to he the one strawherry especially adapted for low wet soils, muck or clay, and on such soils it produces large crops of shining glossy herries that hring good prices in market. It is not a firm herry, but it has high quality and therefore is unsurpassed for home use and near market. On upland the berries are of good flavor, but do not attain large size. Plants limited. EVERBEARING STRAWBERR

This kind of strawberry is attaining greater popular-ity each succeeding year. If set in early spring, they bear their largest fall crop in August, September and October of the same year they are set. The next June, they bear a larger crop than ordinary varieties and if the plants are carefully hoed and fertilized after the spring crop, they will bear quite a satisfactory crop again in August and later on. We advise that a new field be set each year for best results.

each year for best results. Mastodon (P). This is the best known and most popular of all the everbearing strawberries. It has simply taken the country by storm. The plants are very large and enormously productive. The berries average good size. Some of them are very large. The crop of fruit in the fall is not only very large but the spring crop is enormous. The flavor of the fruit is good, but not of the highest quality. In spite of many faults there is good money in growing Mastodon for local trade and where it can be placed in the hands of the consumer, within a few hours after it is picked. Unlike the Mastodon, the plants are only medium in size and make a good average run of new plants during the season. There is no disease on the plants or the fruit of the Berri-Supreme. The berries are larger than the Mastodon, the average is larger and individual berries are larger. Strange to say, the berries very closely resemble the Mastodon in shape, color and general appearance. There are no inferior or disease berries, they are all marketable. The originator does not claim the Berri-Supreme as productive as the Mastodon, but he says it will produce more marketable fruit. The fruit is more protected by the leaves than are the Mastodon. The fruit does not spoil easily after picking, but keeps a good long time. The Berri-Supreme did fine for us the past season

The Berri-Supreme did fine for us the past season (1931). It bore a fine crop in June and about six weeks later began to produce the fall crop, which was magnificent.

The originator claims that— Berri-Supreme bears a larger berry than Mastodon. It bears more marketable berries than Mastodon. It bears a longer season than Mastodon. Has a better flavor than Mastodon. Has a better color than Mastodon. Has a better solor than Mastodon. Holds up better in shipments than Mastodon. It is easier picked than Mastodon. \$20.00. New Everbearing Strawberry, ALDRICH EVER-BEARING (P). We thought of a lot of different names to give this new strawberry, but we did not want to over-name it, so we decided to name it after the originator, Mr. Moses T. Aldrich of Connecticut. Mr. Aldrich was so sure he had a good thing and was so insistent that we come and see it, that we drove over 800 miles (the round trip) the fall of 1930, just to see this new everbearer in fruit. It did not disappoint us. We saw the new berry in fruit. Sept. 16th, right in its prime. There were 800 plants set in the spring of 1930 and everyone of them was loaded with blossoms, green and ripe fruit in all stages of maturity. We carefully measured the plot and there were just 36 square rods or 4 rods less than a quarter of an acre. From this little plot, Mr. Aldrich picked and sold over \$350.00 worth of fruit, which is at the rate of about \$1600.00 to the acre for the first fall crop. It is well known that the

spring or early summer crop runs larger than this and while it may not bring as much per quart, the extra number of quarts will make up for the difference in price. We asked Mr. Aldrich to give us a statement of the yield, etc., which is as follows:— L. J. FARMER

Dear Sir:

Dear Sir: Nov. 13, 1930 Received your letter and the pictures last night. I set out my strawberries the last part of April and we commenced picking berries July 19th and finished Oct. 18th. We had 900 quarts. We sold over half of them at 45c per quart and the most of the rest at 35c, a very few at 25c. They came to \$352.90. We didn't try to see how long we could keep the berries, but a friend did. My wife saw them after she had kept them 10 days and they were all right then. Yours truly, M. L. Aldrich.

Mr. Aldrich tells us that he purchased some plants of the Superb strawberry when we first introduced it at \$5 per dozen, in 1912. He grew the Superb for many years and he thinks the new berry is a seeding of the superb crossed with a late variety he was then growing. It certainly resembles the Superb in both plant and fruit. It reminds us of the Wait's Everbearing, which until the advent of this new variety, was the pretises strawberry we ever saw. 



GRAPES

The grape requires a sunny location, so it is preferable to plant on the south side of huildings, fences or trellises. A grape vine is as useful as any other vine in screening out unsightly objects. The earlier and hardier varieties will ripen in most any section. Grapes seem to thrive best in soil that is rich, mellow and well drained. Plant the vines 6 to 10 feet apart each way, preferably the latter distance.

distance. In pruning grape vines, one should bear in mind that the fruit is borne on new green wood that grew from huds on last year's wood. When the vines are set, they should he cut back to within two or three buds from the root. Every year in Novemher, or very early in the spring before the sap has started, they should be pruned freely. The object in pruning should be to get rid of as much old wood as possible without sacrificing too much of the new. In doing this, the old cane is kept cut back so that the new canes originate as near the ground as possible. The new canes that are left are then cut back at least one-third of their length. This allows plenty of space for the new shoots to form where the fruit is produced. Several systems of pruning have heen worked out for grapes and anyone who in-tends to make extensive plantings should procure a modern, up to date book on Grape Culture. Grape Culture.
