Order Made in Many Phases of Litigation and Petitions Granted--Cases are Set for Trial.

In Department Two Judge Prewett called the calendar. An information was filed against Chas. Vellen charging grand larceny and the case was set for arraignment on Thursday.

The trial of the action of Calder vs. Swan was reset for October 7th.

A degree was granted terminating the life estate of Mary C. Harwood in certain property.

The demurrer in the mine title case of Cramer vs. Cramer was argued and submitted.

Default was entered in the action of Anholm vs. Anholm a suit for divorce.

The action for divorce brought by Laura Ellen Heryford against Bennet Heryford was submitted to the court.

The trial of the action for divorce of Usher vs. Usher was set for September 25.

A commissioner's sale of real property in the action of Carol L. Lynch against Ida Dawson was confirmed.

The trial of the action of Larrabee vs. Cloverdale was reset for trial for October 27.

The trial of the action for divorce brought by A. R. Chenoweth against Mrs. Minnie Chenoweth was continued to Sept. 19.

The contempt proceedings in the action of Roberts vs. Johnson were continued to Sept. 21.

A demurrer in the action of Warren Bell and others against Noah Bell and others was argued by Judge S. K. Dougherty for the plaintiffs and R. M. Swain for the defendants.

The motion to amend pleadings in the action of Gugliemetti against Barry was also on the calendar.

CITY COUNCIL SPECIAL MEETING

TAX RATES FIXED FOR ENSUING YEAR.—GENERAL AND BUILDING FUND.

Special Meeting in Which Important Business Transacted Monday Evening.

In accordance with the statutes of the State of California, in such cases made and provided, the city trustees met in the city pavilion on Monday evening, Sept. 14, to fix the tax levy for the city of Sonoma for the ensuing year.

A resolution was introduced by Trustee Ciucci fixing the tax rate for the ensuing year at 70 cents for the \$100 of assessable property to be segregated as follows: Forty cents for City Hall Fund and thirty cents for the General Fund.

Trustee Breitenbach moved to amend the resolution by making the tax rate 60 cents instead of 70 cents, to be divided as follows:—Thirty-five cents for the City Hall Fund and 25 cents for the General Fund.

Upon a roll call, the vote stood as follows, on the original resolution fixing the rate at 70 cents.

Trustee Poppe—No.
Trustee Hotz—Yes.
Trustee Pinnelli—Yes.
Trustee Ciucci—Yes.
Trustee Breitenbach—No.

Trustees Poppe and Breitenbach explained their votes by saying that as there is now over \$1,800 in the treasury, they deemed the 70 cent rate unnecessary high. The other members differed with them, thinking that that rate would bring in money sufficient to make some contemplated improvements at the earliest possible date. All trustees are heartily in favor of the improvements, There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.
