

E have the pleasure to hand you our Catalogue of Flowering Bulbs for the present season, which we trust may be acceptable, and hope to be favored with your kind orders. Prices will be found lower, generally, than last year. Our wholesale stock of Dutch Bulbs is of our own importation direct from the most celebrated growers of Flower Roots in Holland, and the varieties we offer have been selected from a great number we have ourselves grown and tested, therefore we can with the greater confidence recommend the whole we offer as comprising a superior collection.

No class of plants gives more general satisfaction than the hardy flowering bulbs. They are of the easiest culture in any good, light soil, commence to bloom early, some of them at the very earliest opening of springtime, when, after a long winter, flowers are doubly welcome; others continue to unfold their brilliant and fragrant flowers in succession throughout the spring months, and at a season when other showy garden flowers are comparatively scarce.

Nearly all the hardy bulbs may be cultivated successfully in pots, vases, boxes, etc., but Hyacinths, Narcissus, Jonquils, Crocus, and the Early Tulips are best adapted for winter blooming in the house, and are the general favorites for this purpose. Three or four Hyacinths or Narcissus may be planted in a six-inch flower pot, or a half dozen Early Tulips, or a variety of bulbs may be used, placing the tallest in the centre, and low-growing kinds, like the Crocus, on the edges.

Our Catalogue also contains a variety of Tender Bulbs for culture in-doors only, Freesia refracta, a charming new bulb, with beautiful fragrant white flowers, Ixias, Sparaxis, Oxalis, Lachenalias, Cyclamens, etc. Anomatheca and Triteleia, two hardy species, also bloom freely in pots.

Season for Planting. All hardy Spring Flowering Bulbs must be planted during the fall months, from the middle of September to the end of November, and even into December, if the ground remains open; and all who desire to have a display of these popular and showy flowers in their gardens and grounds in spring, must not forget to procure and plant the bulbs in the autumn.

Bulbs by Mail. We send Bulbs by mail, *post-paid*, to all parts of the United States, at the single or dozen prices quoted in the Catalogue, except for Hyacinths, Crown Imperials, Polyanthus Narcissus, and Lilies. These will also be sent by mail when ordered at the mail price specially noted under each.

EARLY WHITE ROMAN HYACINTHS.

The earliest of all the Hyacinths; each bulb produces three or four spikes of pure white flowers, very popular with florists for cutting. If planted early and gently forced they may be had in bloom at Christmas, or by successional plantings, through the winter months.

NARCISSUS.

ALL the species of Narcissus are remarkably showy spring-flowering bulbs, possessing a delightful fragrance, and suited to out- or in-door culture. They may be divided into three general classes, — the Polyanthus Narcissus, Jonquils, and Garden Narcissus.

POLYANTHUS NARCISSUS.

The Polyanthus Narcissus are very graceful and beautiful flowers. The blossoms are produced in clusters of a dozen or more, each on a single stem, like the Polyanthus. They are particularly desirable for house culture, blooming freely in pots, vases, etc., or in water, with the same treatment as Hyacinths. When grown in the garden, the soil should be light, well drained, and covered with leaves during winter. The Double Roman is very early, and excellent for forcing; may be had in bloom at Christmas, if started in October.

GARDEN NARCISSUS.

These are called Garden Narcissus on account of their general hardiness. They comprise many species, and different styles of growth, and include the favorite Double Golden Yellow Daffodil (*N. Van Sion*), and the Snow White Poet's Narcissus (*N. Poeticus*). Among the new varieties are the beautiful trumpet-flowered bicolor Horsfieldii and the Emperor and Empress. All the varieties are very fragrant and particularly valuable for planting in beds or mixed flower borders. These are varieties of the Narcissus. They have very fragrant yellow flowers, and are cultivated in glasses, pots, or the open ground. As the bulbs are small, four or five roots may be planted in a five-inch pot.

CROCUS.

The Crocus is a universal favorite, and is one of the very earliest of spring flowers, often displaying its bright and lovely blossoms early in March, and generally continues in bloom throughout the month of April. The colors are blue, violet, white, variegated, and golden yellow. They thrive in any good garden soil, and should be planted in October or November. Plant the bulbs two inches deep and two or three inches apart; are very hardy, and may remain undisturbed for many years, and will continue to increase and bloom every year. They are also well adapted for house culture in pots, vases, or boxes, using light, sandy soil.

SNOWDROPS.

The pretty Snowdrop is the first of all flowers to herald the approach of spring. They flourish well in any soil, and bloom best if not disturbed often. Like the Crocus, they should be planted in groups of ten to twenty, when they form masses of pure white blossoms. Being dwarf, they should, when planted in the garden, be set near the edges of walks, where they show to advantage. For lawns they are particularly valuable, and continue to bloom without any care for years in succession. They also flourish well in sand or moss, or in pots or baskets. LILIES.

THE Rose has been called the Queen of Flowers, but the Lily, since the introduction of the many splendid varieties from Japan and other localities, may fairly claim to be its rival. All the species are beautiful, while many are truly magnificent, and some posess a delicious fragrance. RANUNCULUS.

For beauty of form, richness, and variety in coloring, the flowers of the Ranunculus are unsurpassed, and were its cultivation in ordinary soils as easy as with most bulbs, it would become one of the greatest and most popular favorites A strong loam is specially required, which should be made rich with well-decomposed cattle manure, and turned over to the depth of eighteen inches. The roots should be planted about two inches deep, late in November, and before the ground freezes, cover with dry leaves, three or four inches in depth, and on these boards to protect from all wet and rainy weather. For house culture, in pots, use a similar soil as above described, and keep in a cold frame until well rooted.

ANEMONES.

Perhaps no floral display excels in richness and beauty a fine bed of Anemones in all their brilliant colors. They are hardier than the Ranunculus, but should have a similar covering over winter; the soil for them can hardly be too good or rich. Plant the roots three inches deep and six inches apart. They can be grown to perfection in pots, use two thirds turfy loam, and one third rotten cow manure, plant three or four roots in a six-inch pot, bury them over the rims in a cold frame, until the plants show their leaves, when they may be taken into the house and placed in a warm, sunny window.
