Mr. Robert Fenton, civil engineer, of Willimantic, Conn., died Jan. 1, aged 55.

Mr. Arthur Stanley Cochran, architect, of Philadelphia, Pa., died Jan. 1, aged 34.

Mr. Daniel Fehl, Superintendent of Highways of McKeesport, Pa., died Jan. 6, aged 67.

Mr. W. Dewees Wood, the well-known sheet-iron manufacturer, of Pittsburg, Pa., died Jan. 2, aged 72.

Mr. Draper Smith, President of the Plymouth Light, Heat & Power Co., and of the Plymouth Water Co., of Plymouth, Pa., died Jan. 5, aged 83.

Mr. George H. Frey, civil engineer, of New York city, died in the Presbyterian Hospital in that city, Jan. 3, aged 35. He was for many years engaged in the practice of his profession in South America and South Africa.

Col. Gustavus S. Innis, civil engineer and surveyor, of Columbus, O., died Jan. 2. He was born in Franklinton, O., Feb. 4, 1819, and received his education in the public schools and the Central High School. He became a surveyor, and at the outbreak of the Civil War enlisted in the Union Army, where he attained the rank of Colonel. He was a member of the Civil Engineers' Association of Columbus.

Mr. Joseph Pearson Gill, civil engineer, of New York city, died at his home, Jan. 9, aged 80. He was born near Trenton, N. J., and entered the U. S. Navy, serving through the Mexican War. At the close of the war he resigned from the navy and began the study of engineering in Philadelphia. Among important works built by him during his professional career were the railway from Trenton to Bevidere and the gas works at Lewiston, Me., Jersey City, N. J., and Petersburg, Va. He lived in Lewiston, Me., for 20 years and afterwards in Newark, N. J., until several years ago when he moved to New York.

Dr. Ezra Otis Kendall, Emeritus Professor of Mathematics and Astronomy and Honorary Dean of the Faculty, of the University of Pennsylvania, died in Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 5. He was born in Wilmington, Mass., May 15, 1816, and came to Philadelphia in 1835. After a course of instruction under his half-brother, the Mathematician, Sears C. Walker, he was appointed Professor of Theoretical Astronomy and Mathematics in the Central High School of that city and filled this position for 20 years. In 1855 he was appointed Professor of Mathematics and Astronomy in the University of Pennsylvania and held that chair until 1890, when he was made Professor Emeritus. He made a series of systematic observations for longitude for the U. S. Coast Survey and contributed largely to the U. S. Ephemeris and Nautical Almanac. He also edited several scientific works, and for 23 years was Secretary of the American Philosophical Society, having become a member of that society in 1842.

Mr. William H. Schultz, at one time Master Mechanic of the old Philadelphia, Germantown & Norristown R. R., died in Wilmington, Del., Jan. 3. He was born in Westphalia, Germany, Feb. 19, 1805, and learned the machinist's trade. In 1832 he came to this country and settled in Baltimore, Md. About two years later he became Master Mechanic of the Philadelphia, Germantown & Norristown R. R., having charge of the locomotive shops in Philadelphia. In 1839 he entered the employ of the Norris Locomotive Works, Philadelphia, and in 1840 was sent to Berlin to develop and operate a short railway from Potsdam

to Berlin for the king. A year later he received an offer from the Emperor of Russia to take charge of the only railway in the empire and remained there also a year. In 1852 he returned to Philadelphia and became Master Mechanic and General Superintendent of the Camden & Atlantic Ry., which position he held for many years. He was the inventor of a number of improvements in locomotive details.
