

DR. WILSON'S LATE TOUR. -

AT the meeting of the Bombay Branch of the Royal Asiatic Society held on Thursday last, the Rev. Dr. Wilson gave a brief but very interesting account of his recent tour in Bengal and Central India. He described the mnseum of the Asiatic Society of Bengal as being exceedingly rich, especially in the natural history collection, and alluded to the labours in connexion therewith of Dr. Oldham, the President of the Society. The exertions of the Supreme and Bengal Governments were also adverted to in supplying the museum with whatever curious specimens in natural history that its officers would obtain in the rich and outlying provinces bordering on the empire. The learned doctor then turned to the philological section of the Asiatic Society and said, that though it was not so active as might be otherwise expected, yet its regular issue of the numbers of that very useful body of literature, the *Bibliotheca Indica*, was a sign of steady and continuous work. These numbers, our readers may remember, are issued in Sanscrit and Persian or Arabic, as the case may be, with English translations. The practice carried on at Umballa in March last with the new 7-pounder steel mountain guns was one of the most satisfactory sights witnessed for a very long time. The accuracy of fire of the steel gun and its power of range, when once fully known, will do more, we believe, to diminish the number of our petty wars on the frontier than any amount of diplomacy. The re-arming of our Mountain Batteries and the Heavy B with the continuance of Lord Lawrence's frontier policy, which our present Viceroy has so wisely adopted, have inaugurated an entirely new era. Frontier fighting to any great extent may now be fairly said to be a thing of the past. We are glad to learn, however, that the Inspector-General of Ordnance is calling for opinions on the shells and fuzes with which these new 7-pounder steel gun are sup-plied. Beautiful and perfect as is the weapon, its armament is not as efficient as it might be; its shells fail very frequently to burst ; and their destructive power is consequently much lessened. The difficulty lies in the question,-how to secure the ignition of the fuze, so that it may seldom or never miss? This difficulty has existed ever since rifled guns were invented, their windage being too small to allow a sufficiency of flame from the cartridge to escape round the shell to the fuze-head, so as to light with certainty the quickmatch round the neck of the fuze. Sir William Armstrong overcame this defect for guns of larger calibre when he invented his ' Etime Fuze ;" but it has been found that with these 7-pounder steel guns, the service charge of which is only 6 ounces (and they are frequently fired with a-3 ounce charge), the shock of the discharge is not great enough to set free the pin which penetrates the detonating composition. Other means are wanted also to ensure the lighting as the fuze, and the Inspector-General of Ordnance is now very properly calling for suggestions on the subject. We are in re ceipt of several letters offering the suggestions required. We have been favoured also with a copy of the report of the special committee on Mountain Battery equipment, which assembled in Abbottabad last year, as well as of the one which assembled in Calcutta the year before. For the last week he had not been at work. On Saturday the 5th inst., he came to me and said he had been turned out of the station and abused by Hutchinson, now in court ; and had been called a "dirty, filthy man, not fit to live at the station and dine with them." He also said that he would not go to work again. He was then somewhat excited but perfectly sober. He was in the habit of taking one or two bottles of beer daily, but no brandy. For the last week he had been at home. Yesterday we dined togethe at midday, and he then drank one bottle of beer. In the evening he drank another, and between 7 and 8 P.M. we went to bed. We were lying on a mat in our verandah, when the man above named, Hutchinson, came there. He occupies a room, the steps of which

lead on to our verandah. He came alongside of the mat and began to abuse the deceased. He called him a "dirty filthy b-", and added, " you are not fit to keep a woman." When he came down the steps, he had bottles in his hand. He dragged the deceased off the mat and struck him repeatedly. He then returned to his room and brought the hammer, now produced, with which he struck the deceased in the face. I raised an alarm, and several people came to help. I ran away som

He stated that, when he first went to Chittagong, he was disposed to think that Captain Lewin's views as to keeping the hill men as much away from the Bengalis as possible arose from an undue prejudice against the latter; but the more he saw of both races, the more he agreed with the Deputy Commissioner. The people called Bengalis in that part of the country are an extremely low, unscrupulous, and deceitful class of Mahomedans, far beneath the Hindoos of Bengal, and worse than any race he had ever met with, and he was of opinion that nothing should be done that would have the effect of bringing the hill people into closer contact with them, if it could be avoided. There were only two points in which they were more civilized than the hill men, and that was in plough cultivation and as artisans. He could not think of another point, habit, custom, feeling, or practice among the Bengalis, which they should not try and prevent getting a place in the hills, and some of which might get a place there if much encouragement were thrown out as regards intercourse with Bengalis. 

CORRESPONDENCE. BANDORA TRAIN.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE " BOMBAY GAZETTE." SIR .- You must be aware that, since the G. I. P. Railway abolished their Mahim branch, a united G. I. P. and B. B. and C. I. Railway train has been running between Bandora and Boree Bunder, the working of which has caused great dissatisfaction among the passengers. When 9 A.M. was fixed upon as the time for departure from Bandora by the Traffic Managers of both Companies, the Callian train was put down to leave at the usual time; but after the

down to leave at the usual time; but after the time-tables were issued, the G. I. P. Traffic Man-ager altered the Callian train to 15 minutes earlier; consequently the Bandora train and the Callian train meet at Dadur, and generally start thence together, whistling and disputing the right of way at the Parell junction, the points-man sometimes allowing one train to go first and sometimes the other. The Callian train stops at every station, so that when it goes first the Ban-dora train is made to stand between the different stations (very pleasant in this steaming weather !) stations (very pleasant in this steaming weather !) and reaches Boree Bunder 12 or 15 minutes later than the advertised time. This occurs at least five days in the week. When there is no obstruc-tion it gets in to Boree Bunder three to five mi-nutes before time. Now, Sir, I think it necessary nutes before time. Now, Sir, I think it necessary to call the attention of the G. I. P. authorities to the great disconfort and inconvenience caused to about four hundred passengers almost every morning. Mr. Conder has been appealed to in vain, and has yet to learn that railways were

made for passengers and not passengers for railways. The B. B. and C. I. are not in fault at mate for passengers and not passengers for railways. The B. B. and C. I. are not in fault at all, there being no hitch till we get to the junction. Will you believe, Sir, that the two trains are actually timed to be at the junction within two minutes of each other ? It is well known that the minutes of each other? It is well known that the station clocks will not keep time, and also that two or three minutes are lost in entering and leaving stations, which is made up on the way after-wards. So that the public can regard it as nothing but unseemly rivalry or jealousy be-tween the two Companies, though the Bandora train is professedly run on joint account. As I said before, the onus lies entirely with the G. I. P. Traffic Manager; and it shows great indifference to the convenience of the Bandora public that he should time the Callian train with such pre-cision as exactly to block up the way of the Bandora train, and after having done so, should persist in refusing to apply the obvious remedy to retard the Callian train only five minutes. King Cotton, they said, would have his way, and drive our manufacturers to raise the blockade. That such, Gotton, they said, would have his way, and drive our indeed, would be the result sooner or later the Federals themselves anticipated, and their ex-pressions of alarm and remonstrance became louder and more earnest by every successive mail. There was a time when the Americans would have made any bargain with us to avert this dreaded inter-vention, and at that same time, as they well know, we were pressed to intervene by an ally so powerful that if the combined weight of the two nations had been thrown into the scale against the North, the Southern half of the Union would never have been recovered. Yet we resisted these solicitations and we endured the loss of the greatest trade in the world rather than depart from that neutrality for which we are now prosecuted. Mr. Summer says we are chargeable for half the war —do those who approve his words forget that Mr. Jeterson Davis said the very same thing ? The Confede-ter President declared in the heat of the contest that but for the prodigious supplies which the Federals drew from this country, the war would not have lasted air months. Mr. Adams in his correspondence with Lord Russell made admissions to the same effect. All intelli-get Americans know, and all candid Americans would admit, that the conduct of our Government during their Civil War either was, or was intended to be, void of offence towards them. If the private opinions or sympthies of a pople are to be now made, for the first time in history, a subject of international litigation, the Americans should then ask themselves be half en a cause so founded ; but the wise course is to put such matters of othe question altogether, and confine the scope of diplomatic negotiations to us daffaris as are within the congnizance of public law.
