

The 1931 Supplement

In accordance with my policy of adding each year the best introductions from this and other countries, I am offering varieties that have not been previously sold or widely distributed. I have endeavored to give an accurate, yet practical description of these varieties with tentative garden and exhibition ratings as I have observed them since their introduction. This evaluation, subject to modification as they demonstrate their good qualities or faults if any, is my comparative estimation of their worth. I have been requested many times to recommend the best varieties in the different color groups for exhibition and garden purposes. Obviously the garden and exhibition rating indicates my selections automatically. I should emphasize that price or novelty have not influenced me in the least in making the ratings. I have given special consideration to the growing habits and hardiness of the different varieties. Color has been an important consideration as have also the factors of height, branching, size, form, poise, effectiveness, freedom of bloom, substance and distinctive qualities. This and much other information of value is given in the last edition of "New, Rare and Good Old Irises," an Iris Lover's Guide and descriptive catalogue.

I have more than 100 new varieties under observation that will be added to this list as soon as they have satisfied me that they are worthy of distribution and availability of stock permits. If you are interested in a variety which does not appear in the price list, write me about it. I probably can supply you or tell you where the variety may be secured to best advantage.

Something for the Future

For many years I have been collecting and breeding irises as a hobby. I have had a wonderful time doing it. Thousands of crosses have been made. Most of the resulting crosses have not been decided improvements on existing varieties. Many of the crosses, however, have resulted in some very fine flowers of wonderful form and a substance lasting long in bloom over a long period—on plants that are vigorous, well-branched and free-flowering with distinct and most delightful color combinations. Among them are some gems in the Pumila group. During all these years I have introduced only a few varieties, largely because most of them have not approached my standard. On the other hand, some of them are so good that I have registered the names with the American Iris Society, expecting to observe them further and if they continue to measure up so well in comparison with varieties already on the market, I expect to introduce the best of them to the iris loving public at moderate prices as soon as availability of stock permits. I feel sure some of the following varieties will be awaited with unusual interest:

Your Opportunity

I am offering many varieties of irises at unusual prices. It is a rare opportunity for commercial growers and collectors to secure many varieties that are new, scarce and seldom offered for sale.

Quantity Prices

Due to a carefully planned system of growing the plants, the purchaser receives the benefit, as this economy is reflected in the price. Especially is this true when 5 or more plants of a variety can be used. Garden Clubs or other groups are urged to take advantage of the saving as indicated in the following price schedule.

The quantity price of any variety is ascertained by reference to the retail price and then from the table obtaining the price in lots of 5 and 25 or more. The figure after the name of a variety indicates the number of plants that may be ordered at the quantity price given in columns one and two. For example, 1 after "Aliquippa 1" which is priced at \$2.50, indicates that as many as 10 plants may be purchased at \$2.25 each as shown in column 1 for a \$2.50 variety; 2 after "Allure 2" which is priced at \$7.50, indicates that as many as 25 plants may be purchased at \$5.60 each, as shown in column 2 for a \$7.50 variety; 3 after "Ambassadeur 3" indicates that this variety is available in lots of 50 or more at the 25 rate and may be purchased at 25 cents each as shown in column 2 for a 35 cent variety. Varieties not numbered are available in lots of less than 10.

Order Early

All plants are offered subject to being in stock and not sold upon receipt of order. I have a good stock of most varieties but of a few the supply is limited. Prices are net for one plant and terms are cash, unless otherwise arranged. Orders will be filled in the order received. Retail orders take precedence over wholesale. Write names plainly and give shipping directions carefully. Keep a copy of your order. Shipments will be made during July, August and September, unless otherwise requested. Since the prices are so low, do not ask me to fill an order for less than \$2.00. All orders will be carefully packed without extra charge. Retail orders amounting to \$2.00 or more will be delivered free, either by express or parcel post.

Cash Discounts

Cash discounts allowed on retail orders received and paid for before July 1st, amounting to less than \$50.00, 2 per cent; \$50.00 or over, 5 per cent; \$100.00 or over, 10 per cent. Other benefits of equal value you will receive from placing your order at once are:

Extra Quality—from first selection of plants. Better Service—by avoiding rush period. Prevents Errors—through personal supervision. No disappointments—due to sold out varieties. Save money—by taking advantage of discounts.

Special prices will be quoted on 1,000 or more of one variety, and large orders of mixed varieties. Prices of named but unlabeled varieties for land-scape purposes, \$5.00 per 100 while they last. Wholesale price list will be sent to dealers only.

Guarantee

Roots sent out will be average size or larger for the variety represented. They are grown under my personal supervision. I personally fill all orders. Practically all varieties have been received direct from the originator, insuring true stock. The greatest possible care is then exercised to keep all varieties accurately labeled and true to name. Certificate of nursery inspection will accompany each shipment. All plants are guaranteed to reach you in good condition. If not entirely satisfactory upon receipt, I will cheerfully refund the purchase price, provided plants are returned at once. If for any other reason they are not satisfactory, you can depend upon me to adjust same. Remember the deal is not closed until all reliable customers are satisfied. Planting instructions accompany each shipment.

Among other things will be the name of originator and date of introduction, principal awards, height, season of bloom from very early to very late, both garden and exhibition rating, how to select, plant and care for irises, and other information not otherwise readily available. - ANNE MARIE CAYEUX (Cayeux 1924. C.M., S.N.H.F. 1929) E.92, G.89, M. S. 36". A soft mauvette self with a pale violet-blue flush at center of fall; bright orange beard; sweetly scented. A large flower of excellent form and good substance, produced in profusion over a long period, on tall well-branched stalks. Wonderfully smooth in texture and charming in appearance.
- BLUE VELVET (Loomis 1929) E.92, G.87, M. S. 42". A velvety dark blue-violet self; rich orange beard. On the order of Van Cleve and Purple Glory. A flower of large size, wonderful form and substance, on tall, well-branched stalks. One of the richest dark colored varieties.
- CASSANDRE CAYEUX (Cayeux 1928. C.M., S.N.H.F. 1929) E.89, G.85, M. S. 44". S. bright lilac; F. pansy-purple, edged lilac; rich yellow beard. An enormous flower of good form and wonderful substance, on tall, strong, well-branched stalks.
- CHURCHMOUSE (Sass, H.P. 1929) E.87, G.82, M. S. 38". A dark Hay's brown self; light orange beard. A medium sized flower of good form and substance that attracts attention because of its unusual color.
- CLARIDAD (Mohr 1926) E.85, G.87, E. to M. S. 36". A clear lavender-blue self; rich yellow beard. A flower above medium size, of good form and substance that is effective because of the clear distinct color.
- CLAUDE AUREAU (Cayeux 1929. C.M. and Special Prize S.N.H.F. 1928) E.92, G.90, M. S. 34". S. golden yellow, with an undertone of very pale green deepening at base; F. bright Bordeaux, edged and veined old gold; deep orange beard. On the order of Henri Riviere and Cameliard except for the brightness of the falls. A remarkable flower for its size, form and habits of growth.
- Col. Lindberg (Arbuckle 1930) E.85, G.84, M. S. 42". S. Bradley's violet; F. rich pansy violet, shaded lighter at edge; bright yellow beard. An attractive flower of medium size, good form and habits.
- COOLEY SURPRISE (Cooley 1928) E.88, G.86, M. S. 42". A pale aniline lilac, almost a self, the falls being only a shade darker; reddish orange beard. A flower above medium size of wonderful form, on tall, well-branched stalks.
- DAUNTLESS (Connell 1929. Dykes Memorial Medal 1929) E.90, G.88, M. S. 38". S. rich velvety pansy-purple with a Hessian-brown undertone; F. same shade, edged lighter; bright orange beard. A rich red effect in mass.
- DAY DREAM (Sturtevant 1925) E.90, G.88, M. S. 40". A pink bicolor-blend with an undertone of old gold; deep yellow beard. A very large flower of good form and substance that is unusual in color, on tall branched stalks. A flower that is attractive and beautiful.

- DEBUTANTE (Cleveland 1926) E.80, G.85, E. to M. S. 22". A very light pink self; bright orange beard. A flower of medium size which resembles Lona in garden effect. A low-growing variety, effective for the front border.
- DEPUTE NOMBLOT (Cayeux 1930. C.M., S.N.H.F. and Dykes Memorial Medal 1930) E.95, G.90, M. S. 52". S. mallow purple, shaded old gold; F. pansy-purple, shaded lighter at edge; deep orange beard. A flower resembling Bruno in form, of good substance, presenting a distinct rose-purple effect, on tall, magnificently branched stalks. One of the largest and best of its class.
- DISTINCTION (Cayeux 1925) E.85, G.87, M. S. 34". S. very light rose, shaded light yellow at base; F. velvety clear rose; bright orange beard. A charming color and a flower of good form and substance, on stout branched stalks.
- DON JUAN CAYEUX (Cayeux 1928. C.M., and Special Prize for one of the best new irises S.N.H.F. 1928) E.93, G.90, M. S. 40". S. mallow pink, shaded old gold; F. flaring, rich pansy-violet shaded lighter at edge; bright orange beard; sweetly scented. A vigorous, well-branched variety producing a very large flower, of wonderful form, color, and substance which is outstanding as a specimen plant. Very highly recommended.
- DON QUIXOTE (Mohr-Mitchell 1927) E.87, G.90, M. S. 40". S. old gold, shaded lavender-violet; F. Hyssop violet, shaded deep yellow veined brown at base; bright orange beard. On the order of Rameldo and Le Grand Ferre but with more yellow. A large, vigorous, very free flowering variety that soon makes a bright spot in the border.
- DR. CHAS. H. MAYO (Fryer 1923) E.90, G.88, E. to M. S. 40". S. light purplish-lilac; F. phlox-purple; light orange beard; very sweetly scented. The very large pink-toned flowers are in a class with Thais, Mrs. Marion Cran and Frieda Mohr in form and color. A vigorous, well-branched variety, of good form and substance that always attracts attention because of its fine color. Very free-flowering over a long period.
- DOROTHY DEITZ (Williamson 1929) E.88, G.86, M. S. 38". S. light chickery blue; F. pansy-violet, edged lighter; bright yellow beard. A large flower of good form and substance on tall branched stalks.
- DUQUESNE (Hall 1923) E.82, G.86, M. S. to L. 40". S. manganese violet; F. velvety, rich pomegranate-purple; bright orange beard. A flower of fine form and substance which always attracts attention.
- Edith Cavel (Denis 1921) E.85, G.82, M. S. 40". A clear white, flushed golden at throat; of medium size, good form and substance, on tall branched stalks; bright yellow beard. Does best when planted in a sunny location and well-drained soil.
- Elizabeth Egelberg (Egelberg 1930. H.M., A.I.S. 1929) E.85, G.87, M. S. 42". S. almost white, with a glow of light lavender; F. satiny white, with an undertone of lavender-violet; orange beard. The effect in the garden is a satiny white with a pink glow not unlike Mother of Pearl and Asphodel. A large flower of heavy substance on tall, low-branched stalks.
- ELSINORE (Hall 1925) E.90, G.87, M. S. 36". Primrose yellow, both standards and falls flushed and edged light violet-purple; rich yellow beard. A flower of good form and substance with an unusual color appeal.

- EMBER (Sturtevant 1924) E.85, G.87, M. S. 40". A rich violet-purple, almost a self, the falls being only a shade darker; bright orange beard. Redder in effect than Rajput and Mme. Cheri which it resembles. A vigorous, free-flowering variety, on strong, branched stalks that always attracts attention.
- ENCHANTMENT (Cayeux 1927) E.90, G.87, M. S. 48". S. dull lilac, shaded old gold; F. rich violet--purple, shaded maroon; bright orange beard. A large flower of good form and substance on strong branched stalks.
- ENDYMION (Sturtevant 1925) E.80, G.85, M. S. 36". A light golden yellow self, shaded deep lilac; rich orange beard. A flower of medium size that is distinct in color.
- ESTEREL (Eldmann 1928) E.90, G.88, M. S. 36". A deep rose pink self, shaded deep yellow at base, giving the effect of a golden halo surrounding the prominent bright orange beard. A vigorous, free-flowering variety that is artistic and beautiful.
- EUPHONY (Sass, H.P. 1929) E.84, G.87, M. S. 36". S. mustard yellow, tipped chamois; F. same shade, overlaid vinaceous, flushed rose at the haft; bright orange beard; a tawny combination, which is unusual and attractive. A vigorous, free-flowing, beautifully ruffled flower, on strong branched stalks.
- Evening Glow (Tuthill 1927) E.87, G.85, M. S. 32". A light lavender-blue self; prominent bright orange beard. A flower of fine form and substance that resembles Asphodel in affect although not so large or tall.
- EVOLUTION (Cayeux 1929. C.M., S.N.H.F. and Special Prize for one of the three best new irises 1929) E.90, G.88, M. S. 36". S. light madder-brown; F. flaring, madder-brown, shaded mauve at midrib and base; bright orange beard. Deeper in color than Mme. Durrand and Fra Angelico which it resembles although not so large or tall as the former. The flower is unusual in color, of good form and substance, on well-branched stalks.
- FARANDOLE (Cayeux 1928. C.M., S.N.H.F. 1928) E.90, G.87, M. S. to L. 40". S. bright lilac; F. deep rose-purple, edged lighter; bright orange beard. The enormous flowers of good form and fair substance are produced on tall well-branched stalks. A pleasing color combination.
- FRANCHEVILLE (Cayeux 1927. C.M., S.N.H.F. 1928) E.90, G.89, M. S. 52". S. light madder-brown, shaded lilac; F. pansy-purple, shaded lilac at edge; prominent bright orange beard. A large flower of fine form and substance, on tall, well-branched stalks. Very striking in appearance.
- Frivolite (Cayeux 1929) E.90, G.88, M. S. 38". A deep rose-pink, almost a self, the falls being veined dahlia-purple and shaded yellow at base; bright orange beard. A pleasing color, resembling Marquisette, but of a deeper tone.
- GAY HUSSAR (Williamson 1929) E.87, G.90, M. S 28". S. lemon chrome; F. flaring, velvety, deep oxblood red, lighter at edge; bright yellow beard. A vigorous, free-flowering variety. While the flower is not large nor stalk tall, yet it is one of the gayest of the variegata group, being very effective in mass.

- Gobelin Red (Danenhouer 1927) E.87, G.85, M. S. 32". S. mineral red; F. velvet, dark Victoria lake; bright orange beard A medium sized flower on short branched stalks. The color effect is similar to Peau Rouge, being darker and of somewhat better form.
- GWENDOLYN (Bodley 1921, H.M. A.I.S. 1921 E.87, G.87, M.S. 36". An attractive pink toned blend; rich orange beard; delicately scented. It is vigorous and free flowering over a long period. A variety which has not had the distribution which it deserves. While the flower is not large yet it is of such good form, substance and color that it is sure to be appreciated. An artistic and beautiful flower.
- HELIOS CAYEUX (Cayeux 1928. C.M., S.N.H.F. and Special Prize for one of the three best irises 1928) E.90, G.94, M. S. 42". A light yellow self of large size and wonderful form; occasional Bordeaux mark at base of fall; prominent bright orange beard. One of the best yellows, being tall, vigorous and very free-flowering over a long period. A slightly ruffled flower of wonderful substance. Very highly recommended.
- High Tide (Barber 1930) M. S. 38". S. lavender-blue; F. a shade darker, edged yellow at base; bright yellow beard. A large flower of good form, not unlike Asia in attractiveness.
- ISHTAR (Sturtevant 1925) E.87, G.82, E. to M. S. 40". A lavender-buff blend; bright orange beard. It resembles Sindjkha but is brighter, with more yellow. A vigorous, free-flowering variety of wonderful form, good substance and the largest size.
- J. J. Dean (Dean 1922) E.75, G.82, M. S. 38". S. bright blue-violet; F. rich, deep purple; orange beard, contrasting beautifully with the light throat which is veined brown.
- Kalif (Sturtevant 1924) E.82, G.87, L. 38". S. pale violet; F. deep analinelilac; orange beard. A large and beautiful flower. Very effective in the border.
- Kansas (Timmerman 1926) E.85, G.87, M. S. 48". S. Chinese violet, shaded lilac; F. light purple, shaded violet; orange beard. A very large flower on tall branched stalks. A ruffled pink-toned flower almost a self, which is very attractive.
- Katherine McFarland (Spitzer 1928. H.M., A.I.S. 1928) E.85, G.87, M. S. 32". S. mulberry purple; F. rich, deep purple; bright orange beard. A very dark purple, almost a self, somewhat on the order of Mme. Henri Cayeux, being a shade lighter.
- KEDRON (Wallace 1929) E.84, G.88, M. S. 40". A soft blue-violet; F. rich bluish-violet; shading violet-carmine at base; bright orange beard. A very large flower of good form and substance, lasting long in bloom, on tall branched stalks. A splendid profuse bloomer.
- KING MIDAS (Mead 1928) E.90, G.87, M. S. 38". S. old gold, shaded garnet-brown; F. velvety garnet-brown, edged old gold; haft deep yellow. A rich and stately flower of fine form on tall branched stalks.
- Klamath (Kleinsorge 1929) E.88, G.87, M. S. 42". S. Hyssop violet; F. prune-purple; rich yellow beard. A large bold flower of good form and substance on tall branched stalks.

- LADY LILLIAN (Burchfield 1925) E.85, G.90, M. S. 36". A light phlox-purple self; bright orange beard. A flower of good form and color and very free flowering over a long period. An excellent landscape variety which approaches the high standard of Dr. Chas. H. Mayo, Mrs. Marion Cran and Numa Rumestan.
- Lamia (Sturtevant 1927) E.85, G.87, M. S. 46". A light rose-pink blend; lighter with more pink and less yellow than Mme. Cheri, which it resembles; rich orange beard. A flower above medium size, of good form and substance, vigorous and free-flowering, on tall branched stalks.
- M. Brum (Denis 1921) E.87, G.85, M. S. 38". S. lavender-blue, heavily shaded old gold; F. light purple, with an undertone of maroon; rich orange beard. A large flower on the order of Mme. Durrand and Le Grand Ferre, but with more purple and less yellow. Vigorous when well established but increases slowly.
- Melchoir (Wallace 1927) E.87, G.88, M. S. 42". S. deep violet, shaded old gold; F. velvety amaranth-purple; bright orange beard. A very large flower of good form and habits, resembling, but with more red than Germaine Perthuis.
- Milky Way (Sturtevant 1922) E.84, G.87, M. S. 36". A clear white of medium size; penciled light lavender at haft; pale lemon yellow beard. A good land-scape variety.
- MIRASOL (Mohr-Mitchell 1929) E.88, G.90, M. S. 36". Clear crome yellow self; bright orange beard. A flower of fine form, above medium size, very free flowering, of good substance lasting long in bloom, on low and well-branched stalks. A distinct clear toned yellow.
- MONTEREY (Mohr-Mitchell 1929) E.90, G.88, M. S. 44". A soft bluish-violet, shaded Bordeaux; F. velvety, dark dahlia-purple, edged lighter; bright orange beard. A large, bright colored flower on tall short-branched stalks.
- MOON MAGIC (Shull 1931) E.88, G.85, M. S. to L. 36". S. napthalene yellow, shaded amber yellow at base; F. creamy white, shaded greenish yellow at margin and mid-rib, deepening at base; prominent light yellow beard. The effect in the border is an unusual creamy white. A large flower of good form and a heavy smooth texture, on strong low-branched stalks.
- Mopsa (Hort 1924) E.85, G.86, M. S. 40". S. violet-purple; F. velvety dahlia-purple; bright yellow beard. A large, bright colored flower, of good form, on strong branched stalks.
- MURILLO VILMORIN (Vilmorin 1928. C.M., S.N.H.F. 1928) E.85, G.87, M. S. 34". S. phlox-purple; F. velvety, rich, pansy-violet; prominent bright yellow beard. A very large flower of good form and substance which is attractive and showy.
- MY MARYLAND (Sheets 1930. H.M., A.I.S. 1930) E.94, G.96, M. S. to L. 52". S. petunia-violet, flushed rose, shaded ochraceous buff at base; F. deep, velvety amaranth-purple, overlaid garnet-brown, shaded ochraceous buff at base; sweetly scented. The crest, style and stigma are the same golden yellow as the base of the standard and fall, producing a wonderful halo of gold which surrounds the prominent bright orange beard. Sir Michael only approaches it in the richness of the throat. A Glowing Embers X Cardinal

- seedling, resembling the former in color but of a redder tone, and more richly colored, with the form and all the brightness and charm of the latter. A vigorous grower producing enormous flowers of fine form and substance on tall, very strong, magnificently branched stalks. The flowers are produced in profusion over a long period, there being from eleven to twenty-one blooms per stalk. The color carries unusually well on the landscape, being unsurpassed in this respect.
- Nene (Cayeux 1928) E.90, G.85, M. S. 42". S. soft clear-lilac; F. old rose, shaded vinaceous, lighter at edge; throat creamy white shaded Bordeaux; bright orange beard. A larger, better shaped Magnifica with more substance in the standards, on taller, more widely branched stalks. An unusually large flower of fair habits.
- NEWTONIA (Donahue 1929) E.90, G.87, M. S. 46". A salmon-pink blend, with a violet-purple undertone; rich yellow beard. On the order of Ember, with more violet and less yellow. A large flower of good form and substance, on tall branched stalks.
- NUMA RUMESTAN (Cayeux 1928) E.87, G.90, L. 36". S. light vinaceouslilac; F. amaranth-purple; rich orange beard. A flower above medium size, of fine form and substance, on tall well-branched stalks, producing a bright red effect in mass.
- ODENVOGEL (G. & K. 1927) E.84, G.88, M. S. to L. 36". S. light lemon yellow; F. purple-violet, edged deep purple; light yellow beard. A distinct and unusual variegata of large size, good form and habits.
- Old Gold (Sass, H.P. 1929) E.82, G.85, M. S. 30". S. primuline yellow; F. ochraceous buff, madder-brown marks at haft; beard yellow, tipped orange-brown. A medium sized flower of good substance, on short branched stalks.
- Oregon Beauty (Kleinsorge 1930) M. S. 38". S. aconite-violet; F. velvety, coting purple, lighter at edge and at mid-rib; prominent bright yellow beard. A very large, attractive flower, on strong, branched stalks.
- Oregon Giant (Kleinsorge 1930) M. S. 42". S. bright violet-purple; F. flaring, very velvety, black-purple; prominent bright orange beard. A very large flower on tall, branched stalks. Unusually rich and velvety.
- PLUIE D'OR (Cayeux 1928. Dykes Memorial Medal for the best new iris 1928) E.94, G.92, M. S. 40". A deep chrome to cadimum yellow self; rich orange beard. Close to Coronation in color but a flower of decidedly better form. A remarkably free flowering variety of the largest size and finest form and substance, on tall, rather slender, although strong, well-branched stalks. I consider this one of the very best yellows and a depth of color not found in any other variety.
- PONGEE (Bretschneider 1930) M. S., 40". A deep colonial buff self; bright yellow beard. A medium sized flower of heavy substance with a rich velvety appearance. A vigorous variety produced on tall branched stalks.
- QUIVERA (Sass, J. 1928) E.85, G.82, E. to M. S., 36". A buff and pink plicata blend. A most fascinating flower of large size, good form and substance on tall, well-branched stalks. While it has been observed only one season, yet it is so attractive that I am including it believing that it will rate much higher under more favorable conditions. It is in a color class

- with Lona, Jubilee and King Karl, but is of different form, with more yellow, and is an improvement in other respects.
- RAMESES (Sass, H. P. 1928) E.92, G.88, M. S., 38". S. light russet vinaceons, lighter at mid-rib; F. tourmaline pink; prominent apricot beard. A remarkable blend on the order of Midgard but with more yellow in the standards and pink in the falls. It is also of better form, on taller, well-branched stalks.
- ROMANCE (Murrel 1928. Silver Medal, R.H.S., 1928) E.87, G.85, M. S. 32". S. violet-blue, suffused russet-brown; F. flaring, velvety, pansy-violet; rich orange beard; fragrant. The effect is a velvety rosy-bronze. Very vigorous and free flowering, on stout, well-branched stalks. A beautiful flower.
- ROSE-MARIE (Cayeux 1928) E.90, G.87, M. S., 36". S. light violet, suffused lighter; F. flaring, violet-purple, shaded lighter at edge; rich yellow beard. A beautifully frilled flower, of fine form and substance, on stout branched stalks. A charming variety.
- ROSE OF CUBA (Sass, J. 1930) E.88, G.87, M. S., 36". An Amparo purple self, with a characteristic darker purple blotch on the fall at the haft. A very large flower of good form and finish, on strong branched stalks.
- SACRAMENTO (Mohr-Mitchell 1929) E.90, G.87, M. S., 42". S. white, edged aster-purple; F. white, reticulated aster-purple; prominent orange beard. A very large plicata on the order of San Francisco, which it resembles, although with more color. A vigorous variety on tall, well-branched stalks.
- SAN DIEGO (Mohr-Mitchell 1929) E.90, G.90, M. S. 42". A deep purple self, remarkable for its size, form and rich velvety finish. It is close to Souv. de Mme. Gaudichau in color but superior in other respects.
- SENLAC (Bliss 1929) E.87, G.93, M. S., 42". A bright, clear aster purple self. A vigorous, very large, free-flowering variety, produced on tall, strong, well-branched stalks. Brilliant on the landscape.
- SHIWASSEE (Burchfield 1929) E.90, G.87, M. S. to L. S. light violet-purple, shaded old gold at base; F. velvety, dark purple, flushed vinaceous; prominent rich yellow beard. A violet-purple bicolor, which for size, color, form and substance approaches the high standard of Petrucchio, being only a shade darker. On the order also of Melchoir with more yellow and less red. A very velvety dark colored variety which for me has increased slowly.
- SKITCHEWAWG (Chase 1928) E.85, G.87, M. S. to L., 32". S. light violet, flushed golden yellow; F. violet-purple, flushed golden yellow; rich orange beard. On the order of Isoline but is larger, darker and a more richly colored variety, of better form and habits.
- SONOMA (Mohr-Mitchell 1929) E.84, G.87, L., 42". A baryta yellow self of medium size. A very vigorous and free-flowering clear yellow on the order of Yellow Moon, on tall, short-branched stalks.
- TITUS (Perry 1921) E.84, G.87, E., 34". A bright pink-toned pallida of Aphrodite color. A large, vigorous, free-flowering variety of good form, substance and color.
- TUSCANY GOLD (Williamson 1929) E.86, G.87, M. S., 32". A clear wax yellow, shaded violet-purple at edge; F. same shade, deeper at edge; bright

- yellow beard. A distinct reddish-gold effect. A flower of fine form and finish, on well-branched stalks.
- VELOUTE (Vilmarin 1924. C.M., S.N.H.F., 1924) E.82, G.87, L., 30". S. violet-blue; F. velvety, very dark, pansy-violet. An exceedingly rich and velvety flower of medium size, on the order of Swazi in color, but of different form. Very vigorous and free-flowering.
- WACONDA (Sass, H. P. 1928) E.92, G.90, M. S., 38". S. deep fuchsia red; F. rich, velvety, violet-carmine; deep orange beard; scented. A very large, vigorous and free-flowering variety, of fine form and finish, on tall, branched stalks. One of the best of the color.
- WAMBLISKA (Sass, J. 1930) E.95, G.92., M. S., 42". A very large white, with an undertone of the lightest blue at the base of the standards; rich orange beard. A flower of fine form and finish, very vigorous and free-flowering, on strong, branched stalks. A most remarkable introduction which has been universally admired.
- WARRIOR (Sturtevant 1922) E.80, G.82, M. S., 42". M. S. violet-purple; F. deep, violet-purple, shaded old gold; bright orange beard. A large flower of good form and substance, on tall, branched stalks.
- YVES LASSAILLY (Cayeux 1928. C.M., S.N.H.F., and Special Prize for one of the three best new irises 1928) E.87, G.88, M. S., 48". S. clear white; F. clear white, with flush of very light blue at center; light yellow beard. A very large flower of fine form which is most unusual and attractive. A vigorous, free-flowering variety on strong, well-branched stalks.
- ZAHAROON (Dykes 1927) E.93, G.87, M. S., 38". A rich vinaceous-lilac self; bright golden beard. On the order of Rameses, but of a lighter tone. Resembles Marquisette, but a lighter pink-toned blend. A flower of unusual form and finish and in a color class by itself.

Intermediate Irises

- GLOAMING (Murrell 1929) E.82, G.90, E., 28". S. violet, shaded old gold; F. velvety Bordeaux, haft shaded old gold; rich orange beard. A very rich and velvety flower with the brilliancy of Bruno and the habits of Crimson King. Most effective in mass.
- GOLDEN HARVEST (Sass, J. 1929) E.82, G.84, E., 30". S. olive yellow, lavender-blue undertone at haft; F. citron yellow, with an undertone of old gold, venation lighter; prominent orange beard. A medium sized flower of good form and finish.
- RAGUSA (Sass, H. P. 1929) E.82, G.88, E., 28". S. pansy-purple; F. very dark raisin-purple. One of the best dark purple blends, producing a dark red effect in mass.

Dwarf Irises

ARAMIS (Millet 1920) E.80, G.84, E., 5". S. clear straw yellow; F. deeper shade, clear yellow; bright yellow beard. A desirable clear yellow of good habits.

- LE PACTOLE (Millet 1906) E.86, G.85, E., 6". S. ruffled, clear, bright wax yellow; F. light aniline yellow; bright orange beard. A charmingly ruffled flower of good form and habits.
- MARSOUIN (Vilmorin 1924) E.87, G.85, E., 10". S. light violet-blue; F. deeper shade, violet-purple; bright orange beard. A rich violet-bicolor of distinction.
- NEGUS (Millet 1914) E.82, G.86, E., 10". S. dark violet-purple; F. velvety, very dark purple, haft lighter; golden yellow beard. While it is taller than most dwarf varieties, yet it is one of the most free-flowering and desirable.
- NIOBE (Caparne 1901) E.82, G.86, E., 6". S. violet-purple; F. rich, velvety dahlia purple; bright orange beard. A very free-flowering and excellent dwarf.
- SOCRATES (Bonnewitz 1920) E.85, G.87, E., 6". S. clear bright violet; F. deep claret red. A most distinct and striking dwarf that is outstanding in every respect.

Siberian Irises

- BLUE WINGS (Cleveland 1929) 48" M. S. A beautiful clear light blue. A very large flower, petals wide and spreading, producing a bright and distinct effect in the border.
- LLEWELLYN (Cleveland 1929) 54" M. S. to L. One of the largest and most distinct of the soft light blues. All habits good. One of the tallest and most desirable and outstanding varieties.
- SILVER TIP (Cleveland 1929) 38" M. S. A light blue with silvery white stigmas; petals wide and spreading. Distinct and unusual.
- WHITE DOVE (Cleveland 1927) 42" M. S. A clear white, with large, drooping petals. A large flower with the form and good qualities of Emperor, from which it is a seedling.

Miscellaneous Irises

- SAGAMORE (Berry 1928) 36" M. S. A rich violet-purple hybrid of Fulva which is larger, taller, and more brilliant than this excellent variety.
- TECTORUM ALBA (Sprenger 1901) 8" E. The well known white form of the Chinese beardless roof iris, which is very similar to the blue form except for color, which is an ivory white, with a golden crest. This is a rare and beautiful variety which has proven much more reliable than most selections which I have grown.


