Keith L. Brooks Addresses Men's Class on 'Sects And Insects'

IS BIBLE STUDY

EPISTLE OF JOHN

"Sects and Insects" was the subject of a sermon preached yesterday by Keith L. Brooks to the Men's Bible Class. The meeting was held in the city hall. A summary of Mr. Brooks' talk follows: "In the fourth chapter of John's Epistle we find another of those contrasts for which he is famous. He has contrasted light and darkness, love and hate, the love of the Father and the love of the world, the true Christ and the antichrist, the children of God and the children of the devil, and now he contrasts truth and error. 'Hereby know we the spirit of truth and the spirit of error.' Into these two classes John divides all religious statements. There is usually a medium between all things, but there is no medium between the truth of God and the errors of satan. Religious teachings that are a mixture of truth and error are the very worst forms of poison. It has always been the devil's business to dress up error in the garb of truth and so lead many astray. "John begins this chapter by warning against the false prophets that are gone into the world. These are not necessarily men who are professed opponents of the gospel, but men who profess to accept christianity in a sense and then give it a wrong interpretation. Prophecy indicates that in the last days of this age there will be intensified apostasy as the result of false religious teachers. Near the end of the age, the prince of deceivers calls forth all his treacherous cunning to work upon even the very elect. John's Words Recalled

"Therefore John says: 'Believe not every spirit but try the spirits whether they are of God.' We are to bring religious statements to the one standard of truth. We are to receive nothing that does not conform to it, by whomsoever advanced, whatever the antiquity of the teaching, whatever the authority behind it. Whatever is out of harmony with or supersedes the New Testament teachings is untrustworthy.

"John proceeds to give us several tests by which we may know how to classify religious statements. 'Every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is not of God and is that spirit of antichrist." The true teacher must believe and confess the historic and permanent reality of the incarnation of the Son of God. In these days it is necessary to pin some teachers down as to what they mean. They may profess to believe in the divinity of Christ, yet be like one teacher who recently said that he would no more doubt the divinity of Christ than he would doubt his own. They may talk about the atonement, yet in the next breath speak of a soldier on the battlefield atoning for his soul as Christ died upon the

(Continued from Page 1) were already filled up, mostly with people from our own institutions. Terrible Sight

"The terrible thing all night. was the expectation that a massacre was already in progress and that by morning perhaps thousands would be killed. In the morning, however, there was no sign of there having been a massacre, but the sight of one or two hundred thousand people left homeless on the quay was a terrible one.

"My pen can't describe the agony of such experience. That night I slept on deck, the fire still burning as brightly as even and the quay still crowded with its thousands. I think it was a week before we got off that 300 which we gathered together on the quay the first day and could not move. It was a week of horrors, for no boats to speak of came to relieve the situation. Then, finally, the Turks gave permission for Greek ships to come in. An American destroyer convoyed them in.
