THE OLDEST ROSE TREE IN THE WORLD.

While very old oaks, yews and chestin the pages of history, there is an hum ble member of the vegetable kingdom which has not found a place in English botanical records. We allude to an exceedingly ancient rose tree at Hildesheim, in Hanover, which is still flourishing with all the vigor of youth. This remarkable tree (or rather climber, for it is supported against the walls of the church) was in existence when Christanity itself was little more than a thousand years old, and if we may believe tradition, had even been blooming for well nigh three hundred summers. But we will give its history in the words of the well known botanist, Herr Leunis, himself a resident of Hildeshiem :-






