- (1) Americanization activities are carried on by 2 departments, including 3 divisions of one of these departments.
- (2) Directors or otherwise entitled officials in charge of divisions in administrative depts. should be appointed without limitation as to their tenures in office by the Assoc. Commis. in charge of Bureau in which the Division is located, confirmed by the Commissioner in charge of dept & approved by gov. & Council.

The Adj. general's Dept. contains a Bureau of Military Intelligence, which served a useful purpose during the war but is now engaged in so-called "Americanization" work which duplicates work of this character done by the Dept. of Ed. The latter dept. being the logical agency for handling such work, the Commission recommends that the activities of the Bureau of Military Intelligence be abolished except as to purely military affairs.

The Commission, ∴ recommends that the Div. of Im & A. in charge of this work be continued only until economic conditions have been restored to a reasonable degree of stability or until other agencies can assume its function."

but for all honest religious effort. The practical results are showing in new plans for Indian and negro welfare, for the blind, and especially for immigrants.

Tomorrow at Ellis Island, in New York Harbor, religious services for detained immigrants will be held for the first time. From nine to ten o'clock there is to be a Catholic service; from ten to eleven, a Protestant one, and from eleven to twelve, a Jewish service. A complete change of policy and an almost complete change of personnel have been made, under direction of a new social welfare order. Space on the island heretofore used for Government purposes has been prepared for use of those detained, and there are being admitted moving pictures and other forms of recreation, kindergartens for children, and vocational tasks for men and women who are of necessity idle. A committee is devising these tasks and beginning to provide materials with which articles may be made, the articles to become the property of the makers.

about the same people. As showing the fairness of the Government in all of these matters, the January meeting of religious leaders just held gave out the names of a committee which the Government named last June to study Ellis Island conditions. The committee still is at work, and covers Protestant, Catholic and Jew interests. It is composed of F. C. Croxton, the well-known social worker of Ohio; Mrs. Nathaniel Thayer of the Massachusetts Department of Education; Miss Julia C. Lathrop, former chief of the United States Children's Bureau, Chicago; W. W. Sibroy, inspector of immigration service, Pittsburgh; Dr. Charles P. O'Neill, director of the Catholic School for Social Service, Washington; and Miss Loula M. Lasket, New York. At Ellis Island a pipe organ has just been installed, and the religious work there, which will start tomorrow, is directed by well-known religious officials of New York.

Mr. Chmielinski waived immunity before taking the stand and was not represented by counsel.

Among other witnesses were Vice-President James A. Farrell and a Polish interpreter from the state department of immigration, who came to translate some documents. Treasurer William S. McNary was in attendance, but was not reached. The investigation will continue today, and a finding may be expected by Monday.

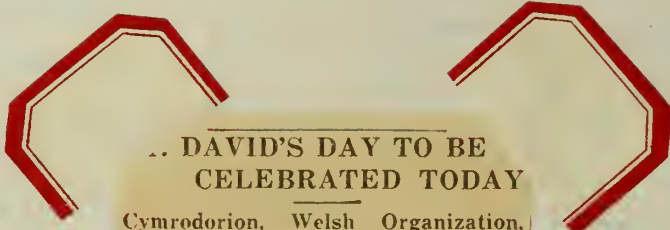

MAY BE DEPORTED**

**Mary Brown, Fails to Pass
Literacy Test**

Failing to pass the literacy test given immigrants, Miss Mary Brown, 15-year-old Irish heroine who arrived on the Leyland liner Winifredian, has been barred from entry into the country and may be deported.

The little girl, who holds a certificate from the Royal Humane Society of London for saving two women from drowning, is heartbroken. She came here from Galway, to make her home with her aunt in South Boston.

The aunt has appealed to prominent Bostonians, and an effort will be made to have the girl admitted. Mary, a blonde with red cheeks, is an expert swimmer, and has won matches in contests in Ireland. Last June, she risked her own life at Fairhill to save two young women who were being swept out by heavy undertow. She brought with her the certificate telling of her heroism.

Immigration Commissioner Johnson of the Boston station has recommended that Mary B. Brown, holder of the Royal Humane Society's certificate for bravery, be admitted to the country for a period of six months so that she may be educated and pass the literacy test. The girl arrived on the Leyland liner Winifredian from Liverpool, Tuesday, and would have been excluded because of inability to read and write to satisfaction of the immigration officials. Mary is a native of Galway and will go to an aunt in South Boston. Last June she saved two women from drowning at Fairhill swimming to their aid.



SCHOOL SESSION**

A special session of the Naturalization school to prepare men for the September session of the superior court will open Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock in the Oliver school. The class will meet on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday. Anybody wishing to join may do so at any time.

Through an agreement with the bureau of naturalization of the U. S. department of labor, the naturalization examiners will examine candidates for citizenship in the school. The successful ones will receive a diploma and will not be required to take the educational examination.

Practically all of this number after their examination were awarded diplomas for having successfully completed the work laid down in the course of study. The State is really a Lend a Hand Society which reaches out to help those who come as strangers to our shores. The State has three distinct divisions doing Americanization work: Through Libraries for the foreign born; through the Division of University Extension; through the Division of Immigration and Americanization, which is the friend of the immigrant.

The business in this last mentioned Division is to see that the immigrant is not exploited. He and the American born are brought together in sympathy. During the past year 18,000 people have been given help of all kinds, from the making out of naturalization papers and affidavits, to the follow-up work in their homes. While this latter work is not so picturesque as meeting the people at the docks, it is the most important work done, for the fact that the immigrants have in the State a friend to go to with troubles, or even trifles, gives them a sense of protection. The difficulty with languages is often overcome with the useful language of eyes and mouth. Girls travelling alone are first helped, next the mothers accompanied by young children, and then the aged men and women, but really no one gets away without some help. Men are engaged to exchange money and to teach the people. A better system of feeding has been established through the Y. M. C. A., thus preventing vendors from making former exorbitant charges, such as fifty cents for an orange. Taxi drivers have been brought under one head, so that no such excessive charge can be made again as that made by one driver—\$10 to take a man and wife from Commonwealth Pier to North Station. The immigrants can now feel that they get a square deal from America.

Much is done by the State to avoid admission of people with loathsome or infectious diseases. If any are found on medical examination to be infected they must wait in what is called the "pen" until deported, and even there they are befriended. When admitted, they often have to be helped with money, with plans about their baggage,

and to the trains, that they may not be exploited. The speaker paid a tribute to the State officials at the docks, stating that they do their duty well and faithfully, and with much human feeling. Many pathetic and amusing stories were graphically told to illustrate the splendid work the State is doing through able and sympathetic workers.

ANNUAL MEETING

The thirty-first Annual Meeting of the Lend a Hand Society was held on Saturday, May 20, 1922, in the South Congregational Church, Boston (Dr. Hale's church), through the courtesy of the Standing Committee of the church, Rev. Christopher R. Eliot, President of the Society, presiding.

Twenty-eight Clubs represented by about sixty delegates, and individual members of the Society, attended the business meeting, while about two hundred attended the public meeting. The boys and girls present added to the pleasure in both meetings.

Two addresses followed, one by Mrs. Herbert J. Gurney, Field Secretary of the Massachusetts Division on Immigration and Americanization, her subject being "The Work of Massachusetts with Immigrants;" the other by Rev. INFLUX JULY 1**

**Officials Ready for New
Immigration Year**

NEW YORK, June 27 (United News).
 —A rush of immigrants is expected at Ellis Island Saturday, when percentage quotas for the new year begin under terms of the immigration restriction law.

Passenger ships, laden with immigrants, are racing toward this country, seeking to precede each other into quarantine on the stroke of midnight, June 30.

The law provides that only three per cent of the number of nationals of any country in the U. S. can be admitted in a year, and not more than 20 per cent of this number in any month.

Those who arrive first are admitted up to the quota limit. Others must return home.

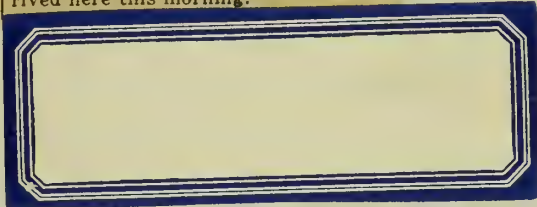
**WINTHROP HAS A

STATE WILL TAKE OVER LOCAL OFFICE

Americanization Work Done by Unitarians to Be Continued

NO OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

One Is Expected By Middle of Next Week, However

It was unofficially learned this morning that the state has decided to take over the Lawrence Americanization office on Jackson street, an office which has been conducted for the past two years by the New England Unitarian Laymen's league, with Charles Lowell in charge.

Officials at the state house when asked concerning the matter, stated that a definite announcement may be looked for about the middle of next week. Members of the local committee who interviewed state officials regarding the change—H. L. Sherman, B. L. McDonald and Attorney Irving W. Sargent—have not been notified of the decision, but Mr. Sherman stated this noon that he understands it to be a fact.

The fact that the state will take over the office means that the fine work which the local office has been doing will be continued.

Nationality of Wives

It seems that to the considerable list of unintelligible legislation enacted by Congress we may have to add the recent act designed to take the place of the old law concerning the nationality or citizenship of women who marry, or have married, foreigners. What the laws and regulations relating to prohibition mean, or should mean, or were intended to mean, no authority appears to be able to state with certainty and finality. The actual meaning of an important section of the quota immigration law is different from that which the lawmakers intended, and while the labor department understands it in one way some of our consuls abroad interpret it in quite another way. And the American consulate in London is puzzled by the new legislation regarding marriage and citizenship.

Dozens of distracted women, it is said, are applying daily at the consulate for passport visas, only to be told that the law has taken their nationality from them, and given nothing to put in place of it. Must we believe that this was the purpose of Congress? Is the consular interpretation correct? What the new law declares is that an American woman who marries a foreigner does not thereby become a national or citizen of her husband's country, but retains her American nationality or citizenship. And, correspondingly, the foreign woman who marries an American is not thereby naturalized as an American citizen, but remains a national of her native country. These are far more than legal amendments. They are annulments of old laws, maintained till now by the United States, and still maintained by other nations.

The urgent question of the moment is not whether the changes are right or wrong, desirable or undesirable, but whether they apply only to marriages contracted subsequent to the passing of the act, or to previous marriages also. Our consul-general in London regards the law as retroactive, annulling the British citizenship of American-born women whose husbands are British, and also the American citizenship of foreign-born women whose husbands are American. Under his jurisdiction

of the law, he apparently holds that, as the wife's native citizenship ceased to exist when she married, and the citizenship she acquired by marriage has now been taken from her, she is not a citizen of anywhere, but is a woman without a country.

The same view is evidently taken by Mrs. Maud Howe Elliott, daughter of Julia Ward Howe and wife of John Elliott, the British artist. Seeing that the law deprives her of the acquired British nationality, and does not restore her original American nationality, this American-born woman has applied for American naturalization. That is one way out of the disagreeable predicament. The situation might provoke mirth in opera-bouffe, but it is a serious inroad on the unity of many families, as well as a cause of inconvenience and vexation to families that travel. Now that it begins to be seen in operation, what does Congress think of its work?

FUGITIVE HELD IN NEW YORK

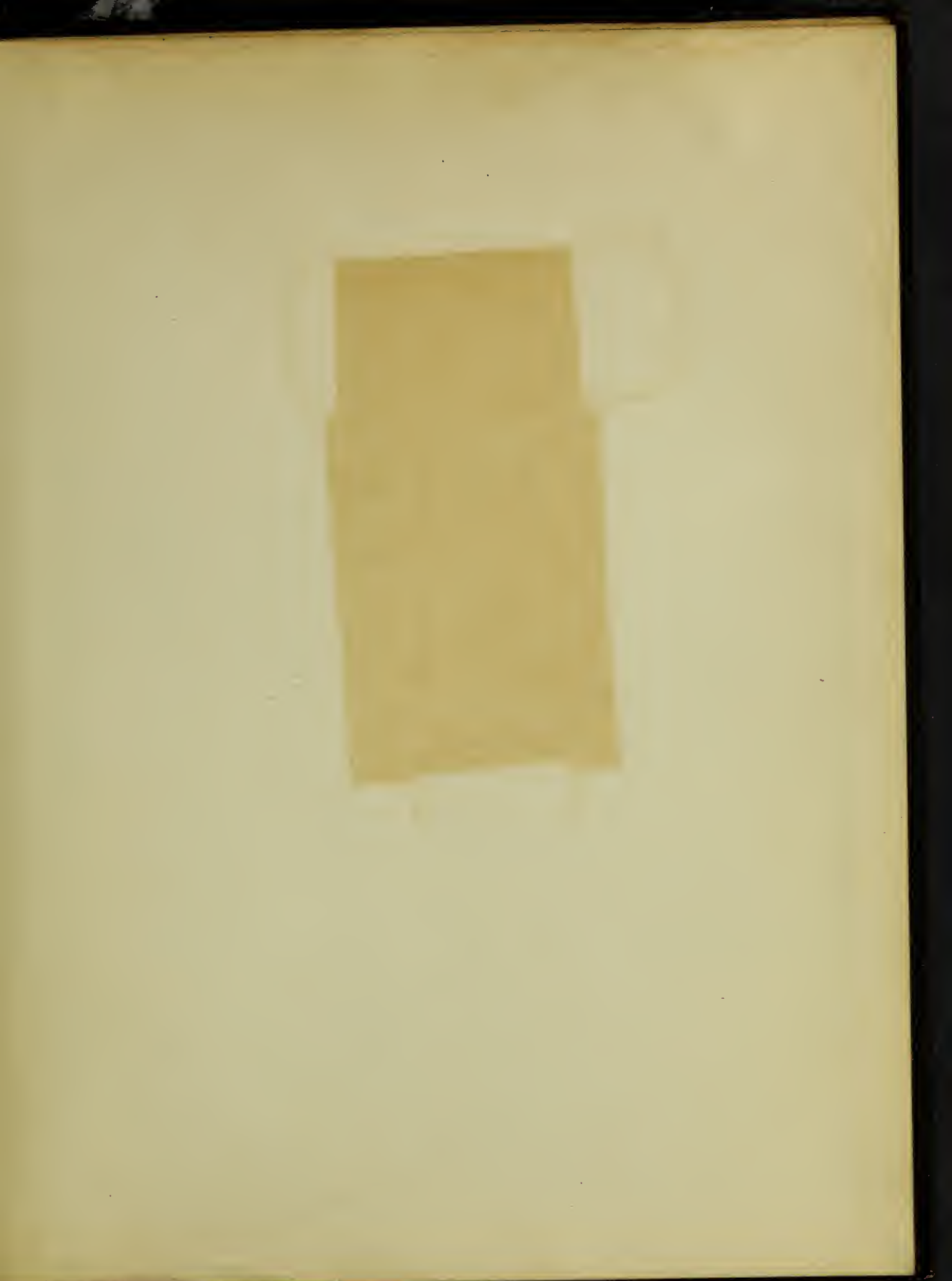
Knighly Caught Through Pinkerton Force

Demand Notes are payable on presentation, without grace, and bear legal interest after a demand has been made, if not so written. An endorser on a demand note is holden only for a limited time, variable in different States.

A **Negotiable Note** must be made payable either to bearer, or be properly endorsed by the person to whose order it is made. If the endorser wishes to avoid responsibility, he can endorse "without recourse."

A **Joint Note** is one signed by two or more persons, who are each liable for the whole amount.

In most States, **NOTES FALLING DUE SUNDAY**, or on a legal holiday, must be paid the day following.

Notes dated Sunday are void.

Altering a Note in any manner, by the holder, makes it void.

Notes given by minors are void.

The maker of a Note that is lost or stolen is not released from payment if the amount and consideration can be proven.

Notes obtained by fraud, or given by intoxicated persons, cannot be collected.

An Endorser has a right of action against all whose names were previously on a note endorsed by him.
