N ORDINANCE for fixing the time and place for holding meetings and establishing the procedure for calling special meetings of Board of Trustres

The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California,

do ordain as follows:
SEC. 1. The Board of Trustees
of the City of Carmel by the Sea, Monterey County, State of Cali fornia, shall hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7:80 p. m. of said

SEC. 2. Regular meetings may be adjourned to a date specified in the order of adjournment, and when so adjourned such adjourned meeting shall be a regular meeting for all purposes.

SEC. 3. Special meetings of said board may be held at any other time upon at least three hours notice by the President or the City Clerk, or by any three members of the Board; such notice to be in calling such meeting. Recital in the minutes of said Board of the fact of giving such notice, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting of said Fourd, shall be conclusive evidence that such notice was duly given and such meeting duly called and held.

SEC. 4. The place for all meet ings of said Board in the City of Carmel-by the Sen is hereby fixed at such place as may be indicated by a conspicuous sign reading: "City of Carmel by the Sea, Board of Trustees, Regular meeting date first Tuesday of each month." In event of change of meeting place or change of date of regular meeting, the above sign to be di-played for not less than one week at new place of meeting, or one week before change of date with new date inscribed thereou, also notice inserted in local paper of such changes.
