PREFACE TO VOL. II.

THE present volume completes the Catalogue of Printed Books contained in the Library of the MASSACHUSETTS HISTORICAL SOCIETY, on the 1st of January, 1859, together with such additions as could be made in the course of the printing.

The whole number of bound volumes in the Library of the Society, at the present time, is 14,048: comprising 8,621 volumes of Printed Books and 427 of Manuscripts in the general Library, and 5,000 volumes in the Dowse Library. The unbound Manuscripts have not been enumerated. The number of Pamphlets unbound is upwards of 15,000.

A complete Index-Catalogue of the valuable Manuscripts in the possession of the Society is already in preparation, and will be published hereafter, together with a description of the Maps and Charts in the Library, and a list of the Portraits and other articles comprised in the Cabinet.

Among the Manuscripts belonging to the Society are the following Collections:—

1. THE TRUMBULL PAPERS. Contained in twenty-three folio volumes, illustrating our Colonial and Revolutionary history, collected and preserved by Gov. Jonathan Trumbull, of Connecticut; containing his Correspondence with Washington, Schuyler, Gates, Greene, Hancock, Putnam, De la

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Luzerne, and Rochambeau; with a large number of papers connected with the early history of New England, and a volume of Military Returns, &c.

2. THE BELKNAP PAPERS. Consisting of manuscripts relating to American history, collected by the late Rev. Dr. Belknap, and extending from the year 1637 to the close of the last century; including letters from Dr. Watts to Dr. Colman, and from Drs. Andrew and John Eliot to Dr. Belknap; papers referring to the history of New Hampshire; the Correspondence of Ebenezer Hazard; documents relative to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel among the Indians and others in North America; together with many miscellaneous letters and other papers; contained in eight volumes folio. In addition to the above, this collection embraces interleaved almanacs, diaries, and other memoranda.

3. THE HUTCHINSON PAPERS. Relating to the Colonial and Provincial History of Massachusetts; collected by Gov. Hutchinson; comprised in three volumes, and dating from 1628 to 1771.

4. THE HEATH PAPERS; being the Correspondence and other papers of the late Gen. William Heath; among which are letters of Washington, Lafayette, Greene, Lincoln, Hamilton, Geo. Clinton, Knox, Stark, and Burgoyne; with musterrolls and other documents connected with the war of the Revolution; included in twenty-eight volumes.

5. THE PRINCE PAPERS. Collected by Rev. Thomas Prince, illustrative of the history of New England, from 1686 to 1720. Contained in two volumes.

6. THE COLMAN PAPERS. Consisting of the Correspondence of Rev. Benjamin Colman, D.D., from 1708 to 1747; including letters from Thomas Hollis, sen., and Rev. Drs. Watts, Neal, Jonathan Edwards, and others. Two volumes folio.

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7. THE HOLLIS CORRESPONDENCE; embracing letters from Drs. Jonathan Mayhew and Andrew Eliot, and President Edward Holyoke; with other papers and memoranda by Thomas Hollis, jun. In one volume.

8. THE OTIS PAPERS. Letters and papers of John, Joseph, James, and Samuel A. Otis, from 1701 to 1800. Contained in three volumes.

9. THE PEPPERRELL PAPERS, in three volumes; one of which relates exclusively to the siege of Louisburgh.

10. THE LETTER-BOOKS OF GOV. JONATHAN BELCHER; containing his correspondence from 1731 to 1754. In eight volumes.

11. GEN. JOHN WINSLOW'S JOURNAL and Correspondence; including Papers relating to the removal of the French from Acadia, and the Expedition to Crown Point, in 1755 and '56. In five volumes.

12. THE MEMOIRS of the late Rev. John Peirce, D.D., in eighteen volumes, from May, 1803, to August, 1849.

In addition to these several Collections, there are many other volumes, containing miscellaneous letters and papers, covering the whole period of the history of our country; together with a large number of monographs, some of which are exceedingly valuable.

Among the latter may be mentioned the original manuscript of the History of New England, by Gov. John Winthrop; with a copy of the same, made by Gov. Trumbull, of Connecticut. Two copies (one being the rough draught, in the handwriting of the author; the other a corrected copy, with his interlineations) of Hubbard's New-England History. Richard Mather's Plea for the Churches in New England. Several volumes of the Diaries of Rev. Drs. Increase and Cotton

Mather. The original manuscript of the last-named author's "Belief and Practice in those Thorny Difficulties which have distracted us" (witchcraft); and "Another Brand pluck'd out of the Burning;" that of the "Curiosa Americana;" the "Ratio Disciplinæ;" and also of his "Biblia Americana," in six volumes, folio. A Letter from Rev. Isaac Watts, D.D., to Cotton Mather, including autograph copies of his version of several of the Psalms. The Autograph of Washington's Address to the Officers of the Army, at Newburgh, March 15, 1783. The original manuscript of Lechford's Plain Dealing. Bradford's Account of New England, in Verse. Jeremy Dummer's Journal, kept in London, 1709-11. An official copy of the laws established by James, Duke of York, for the government of his territories in America. The Autobiography of Rev. John Barnard; and a version of the Psalms, by the same author. Cotton's Indian Vocabulary. "Esau and Jacob's Mystical Harmony," by Roger Williams. John Cotton's Doctrine of the Church. Edmund Quincy's Essay on Hemp Husbandry. Manuscript Notes by the Winthrop Family, in almanacs, between 1599 and 1666. Diaries of David Hall and Marshall. The Tithes-Book of Ecton, in Northamptonshire, comprising notices of the Franklin Family. Chalmers' Political Annals of the United Colonies, 1780. The Diary of Sir Charles Frankland, containing a notice of the Earthquake at Lisbon in 1755.

The foregoing brief account of the principal Manuscripts belonging to the Society is designed to give only a general view of this valuable department of the Library.

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
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
