I suppose we shall have the announcement of the same from Maria to night for he has kept us pretty well posted up. He & Sarah & Prudence are coming on to see Emma off. The Lord send that she may go safely & I doubt not she will I believe the fall will be the latter part of July. Emma is going to see them before they do leave & after she is gone we shall send for them here.
