SIERRA MADRE HAS RED CROSS SPIRIT

Speaking of the parade at the Carnival of Roses in Pasadena on New Year's Day, the Pasadena Post says: Sierra Madre was represented by a beautiful float in red and green, typifying "The Red Cross Spirit of America." There was only one figure on the float, a statuesque woman draped in white, with the Red Cross on her brow and the American flag held by one hand. The folds of the flag were draped artistically behind her, making a very striking background for her heroic pose.

On each side of the float beneath the figure blazed a large red cross with pampas plumes used effectively to represent the rays of light radiating from it. The body of the float was covered with clusters of the mountain holly berries outlined with the oak leaves.

In the front a pergola effect was used to cover the driver's seat and quantities of beautiful holly clusters with vines were twined about it. Miss Helen Sadlier represented the "Spirit" most acceptably, her type of beauty being well chosen to carry out the conception. The float was designed and constructed under the direction of Earl Topping, and the holly was peculiarly appropriate to the city on the mountain slopes.

The two families will divide their time between Long Beach and Sierra Madre with preference for the foothill city.

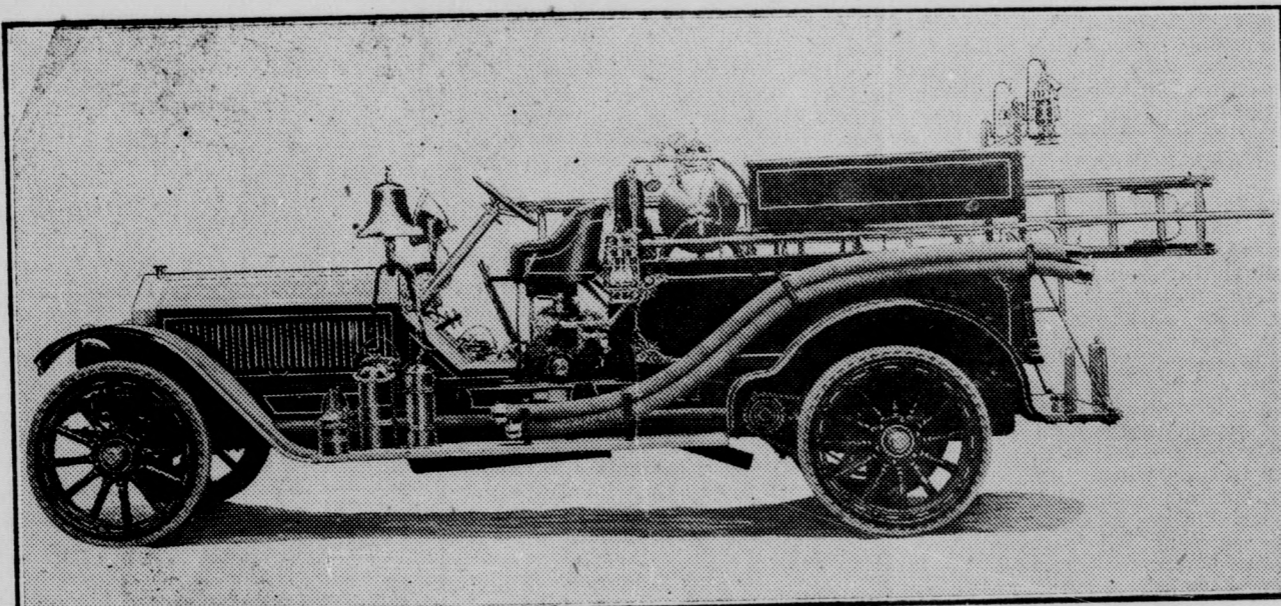
Mr. Adams in the transaction becomes owner of a fine residence at Long Beach.

The Spirit of Sierra Madre Chamber of Commerce Assumes Responsibility for Fire Apparatus

Bonds To Be Voted On By Citizens

At the trustees meeting last night, the regular order of business was suspended as soon as the meeting was called to order, that the representatives of the Chamber of Commerce might present a plan for the purchase of fire apparatus.

The committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce ten days ago consisting of Earl Topping, L. C. Brooks and City Marshal Udell, has worked untiringly to formulate a practical plan to provide the city with immediate fire protection. The proposition they had to offer was the following:

After careful investigation of the merits of different types of apparatus and consultation with Chief Scott of the Los Angeles fire department, they were unhesitatingly of the opinion that the American LaFrance engine was the one for this city. One of these engines was available for immediate delivery and could be purchased on a five payment lease. \$2600 down and four annual payments of \$2600.

Two days ago the committee learned that there were no city funds that could be used for this first payment so they started a public subscription and came to the meeting last night with the necessary \$2600 guaranteed by popular subscription, and the as-

urance that many of the subscribers were willing to double their subscriptions if necessary. They asked the trustees to take action to finance the remaining four payments and the purchase of additional hose, etc, and the housing and care of the machine with the assistance of the volunteer fire department, which has been organized.

Thomas Baird, the Los Angeles representative of the American-LaFrance was present, and in response to questions from the board, gave a detailed and very clear description of this apparatus and its working. Mr. Topping also spoke, explaining why the committee had decided upon this type.

The apparatus under consideration has a guaranteed capacity of 750 gallons of water per minute and a reserve of 250 more, throwing three streams at ordinary speed and four in emergency. The smaller type, costing \$10,750, has a guaranteed delivery of 350 gallons with 150 in reserve, so with the expenditure of \$13,000, or an increase of 25%, in cost, an increase of 100% in efficiency is gained by buying the larger machine.

Chief Scott of Los Angeles advised the purchase of the larger machine if it were at all possible, saying we would only change to the larger later any way at a decidedly increased expense, and meanwhile might have a fire where the larger machine would be absolutely necessary. Mr. Topping also urged the great necessity of having a machine powerful enough to handle the situation if the fire started in Sierra Madre Canyon, where the houses are built along the sides of the canyon.

The only reason Sierra Madre has a chance to buy this machine is due to the courtesy of Redondo waiving their claim to it, as they have some fire protection and Sierra Madre has none. Redondo has put in an order for a duplicate machine and is willing to wait the ninety or one hundred days that must elapse before it can be delivered from the factory that we might be protected during that time. These machines are made only on order; they are not held in stock, and this machine should be delivered to Redondo on the order they had filed some time ago.

The trustees were in favor of the purchase of the machine but it was an absolute impossibility for the city to undertake it, so Mr. Topping, speaking for the Chamber of Commerce, said the latter organization would buy the machine, making the first payment and guaranteeing its care for the first year, trusting that the city would vote bonds to complete the purchase.

The crowd of Chamber of Commerce members and other citizens who crowded the city hall gave unmistakable proof that they were de-

termined on immediate possession of efficient fire fighting apparatus, saying in no uncertain words that if the citizens would put up for further payments if the city did not finance the purchase.

The board passed a resolution instructing the city engineer to make estimates as to the cost of purchasing proper apparatus and the amount of bonds necessary for same, thus taking the first necessary step toward carrying out the project from the city's standpoint.

The crowd present applauded and then adjourned to the office of Andrews & Hawks where an informal conference of Chamber of Commerce members was held and it was decided to hold a special meeting of the organization Monday night to approve of the committee's work and take the necessary legal steps to complete the purchase. There was no doubt in the mind of any one present that this project is to go through and every man was willing to do his share in making it a success.

The splendid work of the Chamber of Commerce committee and the attitude of the citizens present last night was another proof of the magnificent spirit of Sierra Madre and of the cooperation that is always shown in this town when a really worthwhile work is undertaken. It is often said that "money talks." From that standpoint alone Sierra Madre citizens spoke in no wavering tones last night—they certainly backed up their opinions with their dollars.

But there was something even more potent than money that made itself felt in that crowd. It was the spirit of doing and service for the common good without which no city can be great—and in the possession of that, Sierra Madre is great, never mind what the size of our population or how many square miles we cover. That spirit impressed itself on Mr. Baird, as shown by one of his remarks at the end of the evening:

"Of course, gentlemen, the American-LaFrance company doesn't go dropping \$13,000 machines around the country without some guarantee, but from what I have seen of this town and the spirit shown by the people, as you have given me your word that you will undertake this thing and make your first payment in thirty days, I will leave this machine right here with you and we will be here in the morning to break in the men who are to handle it. I have no hesitancy in trusting such people as you."

So, citizens of Sierra Madre, we have one of the finest fire fighting machines in Southern California right here as our own and our volunteer firemen are on the job this morning learning just how to handle it and what to do in all emergencies. It is up to every last one of you to do your part when the bonds come up

**DISTINCTIVE ENTRY
IN TOURNAMENT PARADE**

Typifying Sierra Madre's mountain location as well as the spirit of her citizenship, our float in the Pasadena Rose carnival parade last Saturday was a most creditable entry. That it did not bring home one of the prizes should not detract from the credit due the committee who prepared it in the face of many difficulties.

The float was entitled "The Spirit of America," descriptive of the part Sierra Madre has taken in Red Cross and all other activities of patriotic and humanitarian character. It consisted of a large platform, surmounted by a pergola in front and square pedestal at the rear. The walls and all around were covered with berry-laden holly, the bright berries affording a rich color to take the place of flowers. Pampas plumes relieved any stiffness of design and set off the deeper colors.

TOO MUCH LITTER

Miss Helen Sadler, standing in front of a draped American flag, represented "The Spirit of America."

Construction of the float was an all-night task, even after the materials were gathered. It was done under the supervision of Earl Topping, Mrs. J. H. Wright, W. W. Felgate, J. F. Sadler, with a large number of willing workers who assisted in sorting the holly and applying it to the float.

Objection is again raised by several citizens to the litter of newspapers which are scattered about the streets or stuffed under culverts at certain corners. The trouble occurs chiefly where certain evening papers are received for distribution, and the bundles of newspapers not properly disposed of. Street Superintendent Udell has had trouble with the papers plugging certain culverts so storm water could not flow freely, thus causing an overflow on private property or a scattering of gravel and debris on the pavement. Some systematic means of disposing of these waste papers without committing a nuisance should be found.

LOCAL MASON DIES

John E. Appleby, aged 76, passed away at the Pasadena hospital Sunday afternoon where he has been the last month. His end, though expected, was blessedly peaceful and painless.

Mr. Appleby was born in New Brunswick and as a young man in Canada joined the order of Masons, acting as organist for five years in the St. John lodge. At his death he was a Royal Arch Mason and associated with the Sierra Madre lodge.

While in Canada during the Fenian invasion he enlisted and fought with the "Queen's Own" regiment. Later he came to the United States and was naturalized in 1894 at Avon, Mass., where he made his home.

The last seven years of his life was spent in Sierra Madre. Those who knew him became attached to him for his kindly humor, unselfishness and interest in those about him.

He is survived by a widow and two daughters, Miss Mabel Appleby of New York and Miss Yerdia Appleby of this place.

The funeral services took place on Tuesday morning at the Allen T. Gay parlors, Dean Shaw in charge. Many Masons led by Past Master Evans in full regalia, attended in a body, later conducting the impressive Masonic last services at the San Gabriel cemetery.

**POSTOFFICE RECEIPTS
SET NEW RECORD**

Sierra Madre post office receipts for the year 1920 reached a new record and will boost the office one more notch in the post office classification.

Total postal receipts, derived from stamp sales and box rents, passed the \$7,000 mark. During the year 1919 the receipts passed the \$6,000 mark for the first time. The gain for the year 1920 was about 15 per cent over the previous year.

Money order business is not taken into consideration in the rating of post offices, although the total amount of money handled is many times that of the postal funds.

Post offices of the second and third classes are classified according to postal receipts in steps of \$1,000, there being several grades of each class.
