

TRUSTEES IN REGULAR WEEKLY SESSION

LISTEN TO COMMUNICATIONS AND PROTESTS—GAS RATE QUESTION IS BROUGHT UP FOR DISCUSSION AND CITY ATTORNEY INSTRUCTED TO COMMUNICATE WITH COMPANY

The board of trustees of the city of Glendale met August 31st, 1914, at the city hall to hold their regular meeting.

Those present were President O. A. Lane and Trustees Charles Grist, J. S. Thompson, A. W. Tower and Geo. E. Williams.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Stanley C. Lowry presented a protest against the proposed improvement of Myrtle street as per resolution No. 728, signed by owners of property on that street representing a frontage of 1350 feet. Written protest of a like nature by Era Krinbill was read. The time for filing such protest having expired on the 26th day of August, and it further appearing from the said protests communicated that those who objected to the improvement of said street represented a minority of the frontage, on motion of Trustee Tower the communication was received and placed on file and no action was taken on the same.

An application by Jackson C. Waite for a position as storekeeper or collector, endorsed by a number of Glendale citizens, was read. Referred to the superintendent of the lighting department.

An application by Fred G. Volkhart for a position as motorcycle officer was read and on motion received and placed on file.

City Attorney Evans submitted correspondence between himself and the Southern California Gas Company, and his written comments thereon concerning the question of gas rates. The case now being in the U. S. court of appeal, the city trustees in an endeavor to secure a lower gas rate for Glendale has submitted to the gas company a proposition of a contract according to which any amount paid by the Glendale people over and above the rate which may ultimately be fixed by the courts as the proper rate, be refunded. The gas company, however, in its counter proposition suggested that it agree to refund whatever sums might have been paid in excess of forty cents for natural gas and sixty-eight cents for artificial gas, if these rates should be sustained. In his opinion the city attorney expressed the view that such an offer on the part of the gas company resolved itself into the fact that if the rates of forty cents and sixty-eight cents were not sustained, the citizens of Glendale would get nothing by way of a refund. And inasmuch as we must assume that the gas company will defeat the rates quoted, and the city of Glendale cannot afford to go into litigation, he suggested that the city trustees proceed at once to fix the gas rate for the city of Glendale. On motion of Trustee Tower, the city attorney was instructed to answer the letter of the gas company to the effect that its proposition is not accepted and that meantime he in conjunction with the city manager get the necessary information enabling the city trustees to fix a proper gas rate.

A communication was read signed by J. E. Henderson and W. W. McElroy of the library building committee recommending that the bid of J. Niederer Company for the library furniture be accepted on condition that the committee select as much of the furniture as they think the funds will warrant. On motion of Trustee Thompson, the recommendation was accepted.

The city engineer presented a map of a subdivision of land at Verdugo road and Eighth street to be known as Tract 2176. It appearing that in order to obtain best results from the dedication of a strip of land by Geo. T. Winterburn and wife, as per deed dated August 26, 1914, for street purposes on the north line of said tract, it would be desirable to acquire an additional strip of about 30x130 feet on the east line, owned by Mr. Winterburn, who was present at the discussion of the subject and agreed to such additional dedication. The understanding arrived at was that Mr. Winterburn be assessed for the improvement of said street in the same proportion as all the other abutting property owners, and that he be credited in turn upon the assessment, with the value of the land so given, based upon the price he paid for it.

Mrs. G. Mills presented a written request for sanction by the board of her establishing an employment agency within the city of Glendale. She was advised that there was no such sanction necessary under present conditions, that she was free to enter such business, but that she would be subject to a license whenever a license ordinance such as is

in contemplation should be passed.

Mr. Burton of the Glendale and Montrose Railway Company appeared inquiring as to the present status of the surety bond given by E. D. Goode for the performance of his contract to build and operate said road some years ago, and on which bond the railroad company had since been paying the annual premiums. The city attorney stated that the bond was no longer required.

City Manager Watson presented an ordinance entitled "An ordinance of the city of Glendale requiring the removal of inflammable weeds from property in the city of Glendale, and prescribing a penalty for the violation thereof," which on motion was taken up for the first reading.

On motion this ordinance was declared read for the first time and was taken up for a second reading.

On motion this ordinance was declared read for the second time and was laid over till the next regular meeting.

Demands were referred to the finance committee.

Demands previously referred to the finance committee were reported favorably by said committee and warrants were ordered drawn.

The city manager presented a written report with reference to the request of the civic committee of the Tuesday Afternoon Club, asking that the city have suitable trees planted on Central avenue, Colorado boulevard, Verdugo road and First street.

On motion of Trustee Tower the report was referred to the committee of the whole.

The city attorney presented a contract to be entered into between the city of Glendale and A. W. Randolph for the disposal of garbage. On motion the president of the board was directed to sign the contract, together with the city manager, and to present it for signature to Mr. Randolph.

The city attorney presented an ordinance entitled "An ordinance of the city of Glendale amending section 1 of ordinance No. 237 entitled 'An ordinance providing for the issue of \$248,000 for the acquisition and the construction of certain revenue producing municipal improvement, etc.,' the effect of the amendment being to provide for the payment of said bonds and interest in gold coin instead of, as in ordinance No. 237, provided "in lawful money."

This ordinance was declared read for the second time and was laid over till the next regular meeting.

The city attorney suggested that the contract for the printing of the water bonds be let so that the bonds might be delivered by October 1st.

On motion of Trustee Tower the question of the printing of the bonds was referred to the manager of the lighting department.

The city attorney, upon his request, was granted a vacation from date till October 1st, so far as work at his office is concerned, his absence, however, not preventing him from being present at the regular meetings of the board.

The city engineer reported that the board of control has sanctioned his plans for the Verdugo canyon bridge, and that he would have a resolution of intention for this work ready at the next regular meeting if possible. He also stated that the work of improving Wabasso way and Opechee way was progressing satisfactorily.

With reference to the acquisition of a strip of land for street purposes on Glendale avenue the city engineer suggested that the city try to secure of the Thom holdings a strip thirty feet wide paralleling the right of way of the Salt Lake railroad, and that the city in consideration thereof drop its suit to quiet title to the twenty-foot strip as at first desired.

On motion of Trustee Grist the city engineer was instructed to draw up a deed in accordance and present it to the owners of the land for execution.

The city engineer recommended that the bid of Wm. Kluser and Son for cement work in front of the library building be accepted.

On motion an ordinance requiring certain data to be kept by persons engaged in the moving of household and kitchen furniture, and providing for the keeping of records thereof by the city marshal, was taken up for the third reading and on motion laid over till the next regular meeting.

On motion an ordinance prohibiting the keeping of cows in the city of Glendale within certain distances from any dwelling located therein, was taken up for a third reading and on motion was laid over till the next regular meeting for further investigation.

FROM MILWAUKEE

MOST UNDERPAID MAN IN THE WORLD LIVES IN STATE OF WISCONSIN

The most underpaid man in America, if not in the entire world, is a temporary resident in Milwaukee.

He is Thomas Henry Murphy, fifty-nine years old, alias Thomas McIntyre, alias "Snake" Murphy, alias twenty other names, and his record (considered one of the most remarkable of any criminal) is in every police station in the United States. Murphy, he says himself, is a "cheap crook."

He has served thirty-six years in penitentiaries in three states. This does not include sentences in houses of correction, county jails and calaboses for minor offenses, nor the time lying in jail while awaiting trial about five or six years.

"The wages of sin are small," whined the aged, bent man as he crouched on a seat in district court. "I have spent more than forty years of my life in prison, but the total value of all I have stolen will not reach \$100."

"I started when I was a kid," he explained, after some wheedling. "I was living with my mother in St. Louis. A negro washerwoman was drunk on the street and a cop stopped an express wagon to take her to jail. I picked up a stone and hit the cop back of the ear, laying him out. I was sentenced to the reformatory until I was twenty-one. In two years my mother got me out."

"After this I was in no serious trouble until I moved to Colorado. This time I stole about \$5 worth of stuff and got twelve years in the penitentiary. I had broken into a place and the charge was burglary. I was sentenced three times in Colorado, serving about eighteen years in jail."

"Then I went back to Missouri, but it was no use. I kept getting in bad there and in Kansas. As fast as I got out I would steal some small thing and get back in again. I have not had a free summer in twenty years. Every summer I have been locked up. That's why I came up to Wisconsin. I planned to have a great time working around the lake hotels and taking it easy. I had made up my mind to be honest."

Murphy was arrested in a saloon. He was drunk and was trying to sell a new pair of shoes for twenty-five cents. He said he bought the shoes, but could not name the place, so was sentenced to ninety days on a vagrancy charge. He had been in Milwaukee four hours. Murphy protested he had bought the shoes, and declared he was being sentenced because of his past record.

"If you really bought those shoes, Murphy," a man who heard the story told him, "I will help you. I will go to every shoe store within a mile of where you think you got them. It is found that you bought them I believe the judge will let you go."

Murphy scratched his head. "Maybe we had better let well enough alone," he said. "Maybe if you found the place I would be in more trouble than I am now."

"Why is it that you were never straight—never really tried?" Murphy was asked.

"Booze," he replied. "I never had sense enough to let it alone. It is hard enough for a man who has never been in prison to beat the booze game. A man with a record can never do it. As soon as I get out of jail I beat it for a saloon. I might as well walk right back to the police station. During the forty years I have been locked up I have thought of an epitaph that I would like to have placed upon the headstone of my grave if I am lucky enough to have one. Here it is:

"Here lies 'Snake' Murphy. He was in jail forty years. Cheap booze kept him there. They still sell it."

MAKE SOME ALLOWANCE

Let us not make a bad matter worse. Let us not believe readily the stories of fiendish cruelty which one side tells of another in this war. Such accusations are a part of the crime of war. They are a part of partisanship even in political struggles. They are raised to the zenith of power by a conflict that involves blood and death. These tales of outrage are as familiar to history as any other accompaniment of war.

In 1870 a French newspaper said of Bismark: "He is a brutal husband, is always vexing his lawful wife and making her bear the burden of his fiery, wanton, malicious and brutal nature. He forgets his high place and treats her as a Prussian peasant would; he belabors her with a whip, for we are told that this is by no means uncommon in Germany." Bismark laughed at the tale and sent it on to Germany to react in his favor.

On the German side the stories about French treachery, French cowardice, French violation of all the laws of war, were hardly less common.

In our own Civil war the South taught its people that the Yankees were devourers of children, monsters without pity in their breasts. And we on our side held up all Southerners as pitiless slaveholders cracking the whip over the trembling negro.

It is always so. War breaks down man's trust in his fellow man. It makes him ready and eager to believe all possible evil of his foes. But this country is beyond the range of that red mist which clouds the eyes of Europe.

Let us keep our own eyes clear. Let us not make a bad matter worse by crediting to the peoples of Europe, from whom we ourselves are sprung, barbarities that are utterly in conflict to the Christianity which we and they profess.—Chicago Post.

SCHOOLS OPEN

PRINCIPAL MAKES ANNOUNCEMENTS OF INTEREST TO ALL PARENTS

The Glendale grammar schools will open Tuesday, September 8. It is very important that every child should enter school on the first day and should thereafter be regular and punctual in his attendance.

The length of the term cannot be stated at this time with any certainty. It will be from eight and a half to ten months, depending upon the state of the district's finances. Beginning on September 8, if we should run the full term of school, we should close about June 20.

Kindergartens
No kindergartens will be opened at the present time. At a regular meeting held August 6, 1914, the board adopted the following resolutions:

Whereas, certain petitions asking for the establishment of kindergartens have been handed to this board; and

Whereas, all of the school rooms in the district are now in full use and there are no suitable rooms available in which to establish such kindergartens; and

Whereas, the erection of new buildings, which will provide ample room for all purposes, is about to be begun; now be it

Resolved, that no kindergartens will be established in the district until the board has suitable rooms available for the purpose.

Until the new buildings are ready for use, the districts will remain the same as last year. Special permits to attend school in a district other than that in which the pupil lives must be renewed.

All seventh and eighth grade pupils will attend the intermediate school on Third and Jackson streets.

Following are the school districts. All district lines are located at the center line of the street:

Broadway School
This district comprises all that portion of the Glendale city school district lying east and north of the following described line: Beginning at the intersection of Glendale avenue with the Tropic city limits and running north on Glendale avenue to Fifth street. Thence west on Fifth street to Jackson. Thence north on Jackson and the northerly extension thereof to the northern boundary of the Glendale city school district.

Sixth Street School
This district is bounded on the south by the Tropic city limits. Its other bounding lines are as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the Tropic city limits with the San Fernando road and running north on the San Fernando road to Sixth street; thence east on Sixth street to Central avenue; thence north on Central avenue to Third street; thence east on Third street to Jackson street; thence south on Jackson street to Fifth street; thence east on Fifth street to Glendale avenue; thence south on Glendale avenue to the Tropic city limits.

Columbus Avenue School
This district is bounded on the west by the San Fernando road. Its other bounding lines are as follows: Beginning at the intersection of Sixth street with the San Fernando road and running east on Sixth street to Central avenue; thence north on Central avenue to Third street; thence east on Third street to Jackson street; thence north on Jackson street to its intersection with the easterly prolongation of Burchett street; thence west on the easterly prolongation of Burchett street to Louise street; thence north on Louise street to Ethel street; thence west on the westerly prolongation of Ethel street to the Glendale city limits; thence west on the line of the Glendale city limits and the westerly prolongation thereof to the San Fernando road.

Central Avenue School
This district comprises all that portion of the Glendale city school district lying north and west of the Broadway and Columbus avenue districts as above outlined.

**RESOLUTION OF INTENTION
NO. 734**

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO IMPROVE BROADWAY FROM A LINE DRAWN 10 FEET EASTERLY FROM AND PARALLEL WITH THE WESTERLY LINE OF GLENDALE AVENUE TO THE WEST LINE OF EVERETT STREET AND ALSO A PORTION OF GLENDALE AVENUE IN SAID CITY.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale do resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. That the public interest and convenience require and it is the intention of the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale, State of California, to order the following street work to be done in said city, to-wit:

FIRST: That the roadway of Broadway from a line drawn 10 feet Easterly from and parallel with the Westerly line of Glendale Avenue to the West line of Everett Street, including all intersections of streets and alleys, excepting therefrom such portions of said street and intersections as are required by law to be kept in order or repair by any person or company having railroad tracks thereon, and also excepting therefrom the following described strip of land, to-wit: A strip of land of the uniform width of 21.72 feet and lying 10.86 feet North and South of, parallel and contiguous to the following described center line, viz: Beginning at the intersection of the Westerly line of Glendale Avenue with the center line of Broadway; thence Easterly along said center line of Broadway to the point of beginning of a curve concave Southerly and having a radius of 5729.61 feet, said point of beginning being situated 210.66 feet (measured on said curve) Westerly from the East line of Everett Street; thence Easterly along said curve to the West line of Everett Street, be graded and paved to the official line and grade, with hydraulic cement concrete base five inches in thickness, with a broken stone and asphaltic cement binder course one inch in thickness and with an asphalt wearing surface two inches in thickness, in accordance with plan Number 160, Profiles Numbers 383, 1003 and 1001, and cross sections Number 161, and in further accordance with Special Specifications for the paving with asphalt pavement of a portion of Broadway in the City of Glendale, adopted therefor by Resolution No. 733 on the 31st day of August, 1914.

SECOND: That a cement gutter four and one-half (4½) feet in width be constructed along each line of the roadway of Broadway from the Easterly line of Glendale Avenue to the West line of Everett Street, and that said gutter shall be constructed six and one-half (6½) feet in width across all alley intersections and that a cement gutter two (2) feet in width shall be constructed along the produced center lines of each alley on the North side of said Broadway from the Easterly line of Glendale Avenue to the West line of Everett Street, the center line of each of said gutters being on said produced center line of each alley. Said gutters to be constructed from the property line in each case, to a point distant two (2) feet back from the produced curb lines of Broadway. All gutters to be constructed in accordance with plan Number 160, Profiles Numbers 383, 1003 and 1001, and cross sections Number 161, and in further accordance with Specifications No. 18 for the construction of cement gutters in the City of Glendale.

THIRD: That a corrugated iron and concrete culvert of two and four compartments, including one two-compartment manhole and two one-compartment manholes, be constructed on the Easterly side of Glendale Avenue at the intersection of Broadway, together with intakes and laterals therefrom on the North and South curb lines of Broadway, at points thereon respectively 18.75 feet and 7.10 feet East from the East line of Glendale Avenue (excepting therefrom any of the above described culvert which may be included in the following described strip of land, to-wit: A strip of land of the uniform width of 21.72 feet and lying 10.86 feet North and South of, parallel and contiguous to the following described center line, viz: Beginning at the intersection of the Westerly line of Glendale Avenue with the center line of Broadway; thence Easterly along said center line of Broadway to the point of beginning of a curve concave Southerly and having a radius of 5729.61 feet, said point of beginning situated 210.66 feet (measured on said curve) Westerly from the East line of Everett Street; thence Easterly along said curve to the West line of Everett Street), between the points, on the lines and grades and with the appurtenances designated therefor on Plans Numbers 160, 162, 123 and 124, Profiles Numbers 383, 1001 and 1003, and cross sections Number 161, and in further accordance with Specifications Number 16 for the construction of culverts in the City of Glendale.

In referring to the curb lines of Broadway and all other intersecting streets, it is always intended that such curb lines shall be construed to mean the curb lines as now established and existing on the streets above referred to.

All distances given fixing the positions of the culverts above referred

to are center line distances of culverts.

SECTION 2. That the said contemplated work of improvement in the opinion of said Board of Trustees is of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and said Board of Trustees hereby declares that the district in the said City of Glendale benefited by said work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, is described as follows:

All that portion of the City of Glendale included within the following described exterior boundary line, to-wit: Beginning at a point on the West line of Everett Street midway between the South line of Third Street and the North line of Broadway; thence Westerly along a line drawn midway between the South line of said Third Street and the North line of said Broadway to the Easterly line of Howard Street; thence Southerly along said Easterly line of Howard Street to the North line of Broadway; thence Southwesterly in a direct line to a point on the South line of Broadway midway between the East line of Isabel Street and the Westerly line of Glendale Avenue; thence in a direct line to the most Southerly corner of Lot 26, Block 21, of the Town of Glendale, as per map recorded in Book 21, Page 96 of Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County, State of California, and the Southerly prolongation thereof to an intersection with a line drawn midway between the South line of Broadway and the North line of Fifth Street; thence Easterly along said line drawn midway between the South line of Broadway and the North line of Fifth Street to the West line of Everett Street; thence North along the West line of Everett Street to the point of beginning, excepting therefrom any portion of any public street or alley which may be included in the above described assessment district.

SECTION 3. First: The said Board of Trustees finds that the following described lots, pieces or parcels of land situated within the district to be assessed to pay the cost of said work, to-wit:

Lot 17, Block 11, of the Town of Glendale, as per map recorded in Book 21, Page 90 of Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County, California, the title of which is vested in the City of Glendale, are publicly owned and are devoted to a public use, to-wit: For Electric Light Purposes, and said Board of Trustees hereby declares and determines that said lots, pieces or parcels of land shall be included in the assessment to be made to cover the costs and expenses of said proposed work or improvement.

Second: The said Board of Trustees declares that that portion of the costs and expenses of said proposed work or improvement to be assessed against lots, pieces or parcels of land described in Subdivision 1st of Section 3 of this Resolution shall be payable by the said City of Glendale out of the General Fund.

SECTION 4. The City Engineer is directed to make a diagram of the property affected or benefited by the proposed work or improvement as described in the Resolution of Intention and to be assessed to pay the expenses thereof, such diagram shall show each separate lot, piece or parcel of land, the area in square feet of each of said lots, pieces or parcels of land, and the relative location of the same to the work proposed to be done, all within the limits of the assessment district.

SECTION 5. All plans, profiles and cross sections referred to in this Resolution are on file in the office of the City Engineer of said City. All Specifications referred to in this Resolution are on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City. Said Plans, Profiles, Cross Sections and Specifications are hereby referred to for a more particular description of said work and made a part hereof.

SECTION 6. The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale determines that serial bonds shall be issued to represent assessments of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) or over for the cost of said work or improvement; said serial bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9) years from and after the second day of January next succeeding the date of said bonds, and an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable by coupon on the second day of January every year after their date until the whole is paid; and the interest shall be payable semi-annually, by coupon, on the second day of January and July, respectively, of each year, at the rate of seven (7) per cent per annum on all sums unpaid, until the whole of said principal and interest are paid. Said bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California entitled "An Act to provide a system of street improvement bonds to represent certain assessments for the cost of street work and improvements within municipalities, and also for the payment of such bonds," approved February 27, 1893, and of all acts supplementary thereto and amendatory thereof.

SECTION 7. The Glendale Evening News, a daily newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in said City of Glendale, is hereby designated as the newspaper in which the Resolution of Intention and notice of the passage thereof shall be published in the manner and by the persons required by law.

SECTION 8. The Superintendent of Streets of said City of Glendale is hereby directed to post notices of the passage of this Resolution in the manner and in the form required by

law, and to cause a similar notice to be published by two insertions in said newspaper in the manner required by law.

SECTION 9. The City Clerk of said City of Glendale is hereby directed to post this Resolution of Intention conspicuously for two days on or near the Chamber Door of the Board of Trustees, and to cause the same to be published by two insertions in the manner required by law in said newspaper and also to mail to each property owner whose property is to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses of said improvement, a postal card containing notice of the passage of this Resolution, and calling attention to the fact that said property is to be assessed for said improvement.

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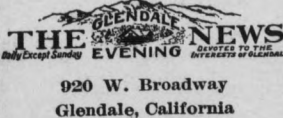
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
