We quote this as an example of the administration of justice in the southern states-not only in Mississippi; but unfortunately in Louisiana. We might adduce many similar instances of the laws being evaded in this state-and murderers absolutely let loose on society, in consequence of an alleged informality in the indictment or pleas; but that the constitutional freedom of the press exists here in theory ra. ther than practice : so irascible are most of our citizens when apparently impugned.

Mild laws resolutely administered are ensuntial to the welfare of society; and when it is evident that generally speaking the criminal laws of this state—at least those applicable to whites-are lenient in the renactments, there is no necessity for elemency in their administration. It is right that the accused in all instances of crime should be considered innocent till proved guilty; but when lance the verdict of a jury is rendered, condemnation should follow conviction-particularly go, as a criminal is not to be twice tried for the sam offence. If any technical pleas on the ground of informality in the indictment can be sustained, they should be made before not after the trial. No plea of any kind-except in mitigation of punishment-should bestolerated after conviction in a criminal case.

And this affords another proof of the propriety of the rema ks hazarded in this journal last week, on the exil tendency of the judiciary system as at present organized: for the law recognizes no plea of informality; and the responsibility is arbitrary with judges, who actually set the laws at defiance. They violate them in their own persons; and consequently encourage others to do the same.

In instances like the fact cited, the people are necessarily ompelled to take the law into their own hands, and hence the frequent recurrence to Lynch's law. It may be laid down as a safe and certain guide of judgment, that whenever and wherever Lynch's law is exercised, there are no judges; or that indges are euloably negligent of their duties. It is true that judi es cannot condemn criminals, unless prosecuted to attornies are negligent but in imitation of the judges-whose perversity or obliquity is the basis of all the evils in the ad-

A reform of the judiciary is indignensable to correct those evils; and that reform should be radical. It should not only lities-for no legal formality is recognized; but it should be radical as to the organization of the judiciary system.
