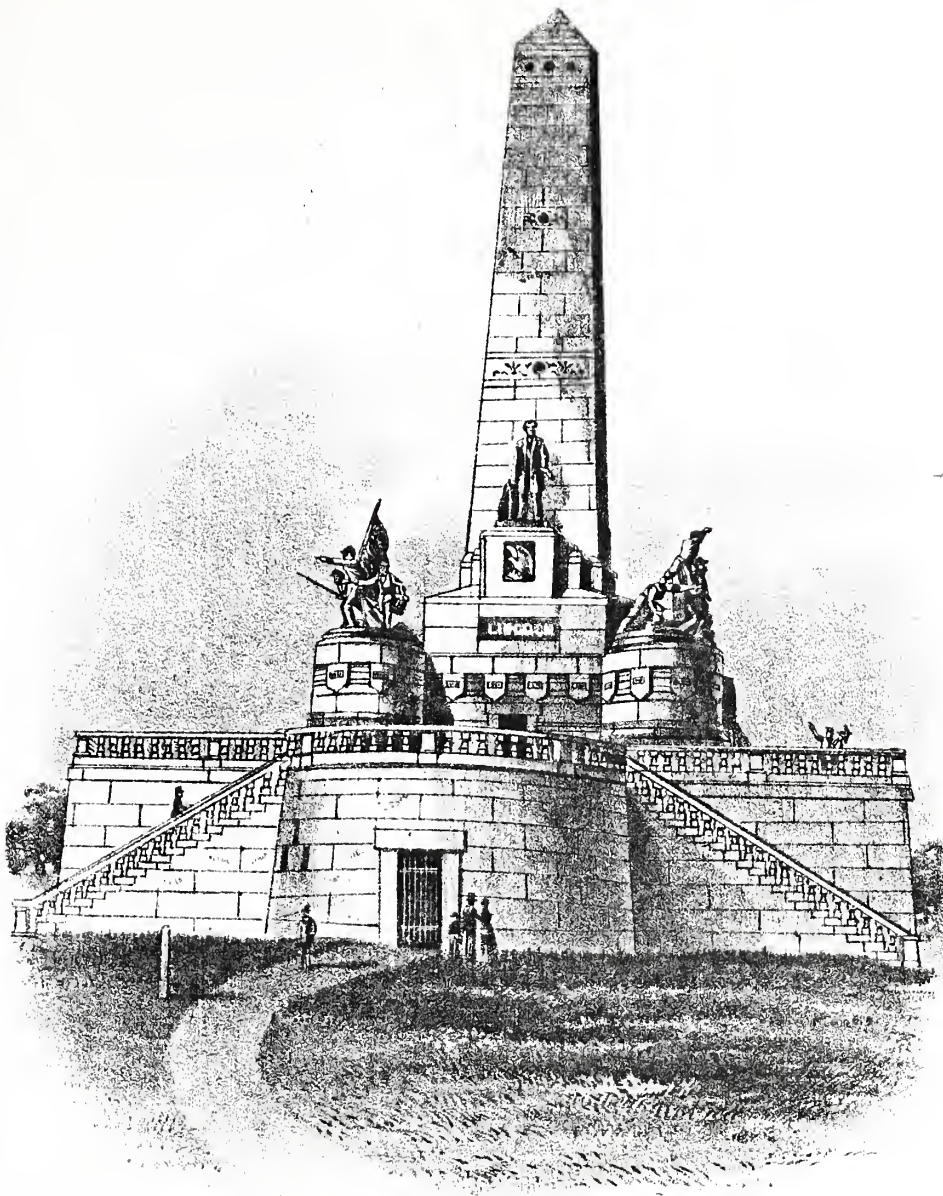

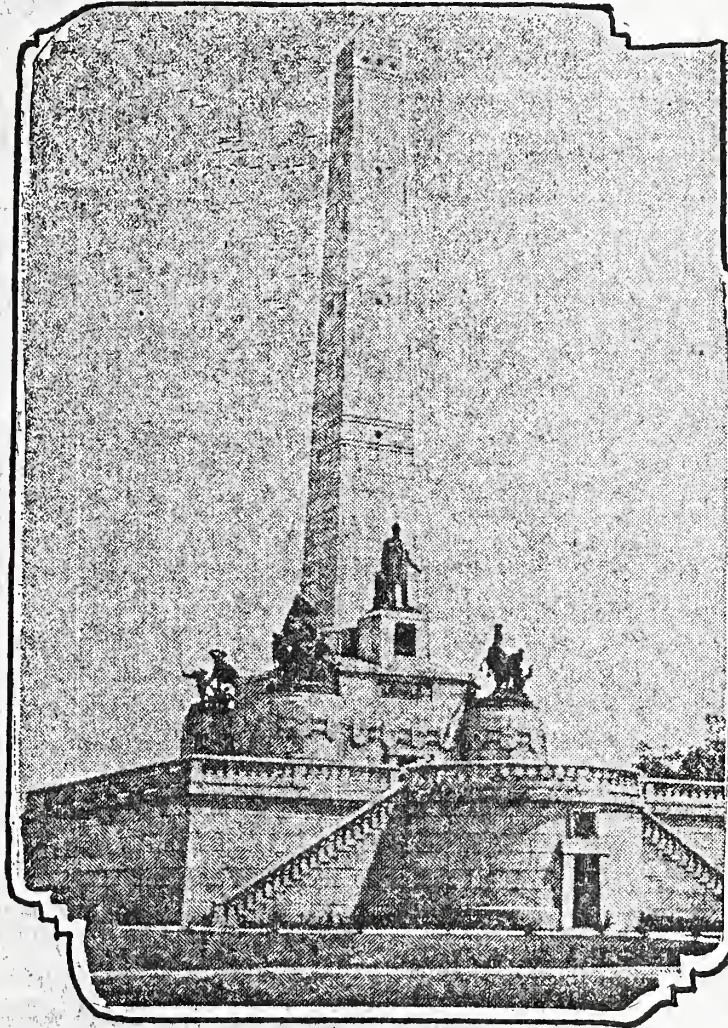


LINCOLN MONUMENT

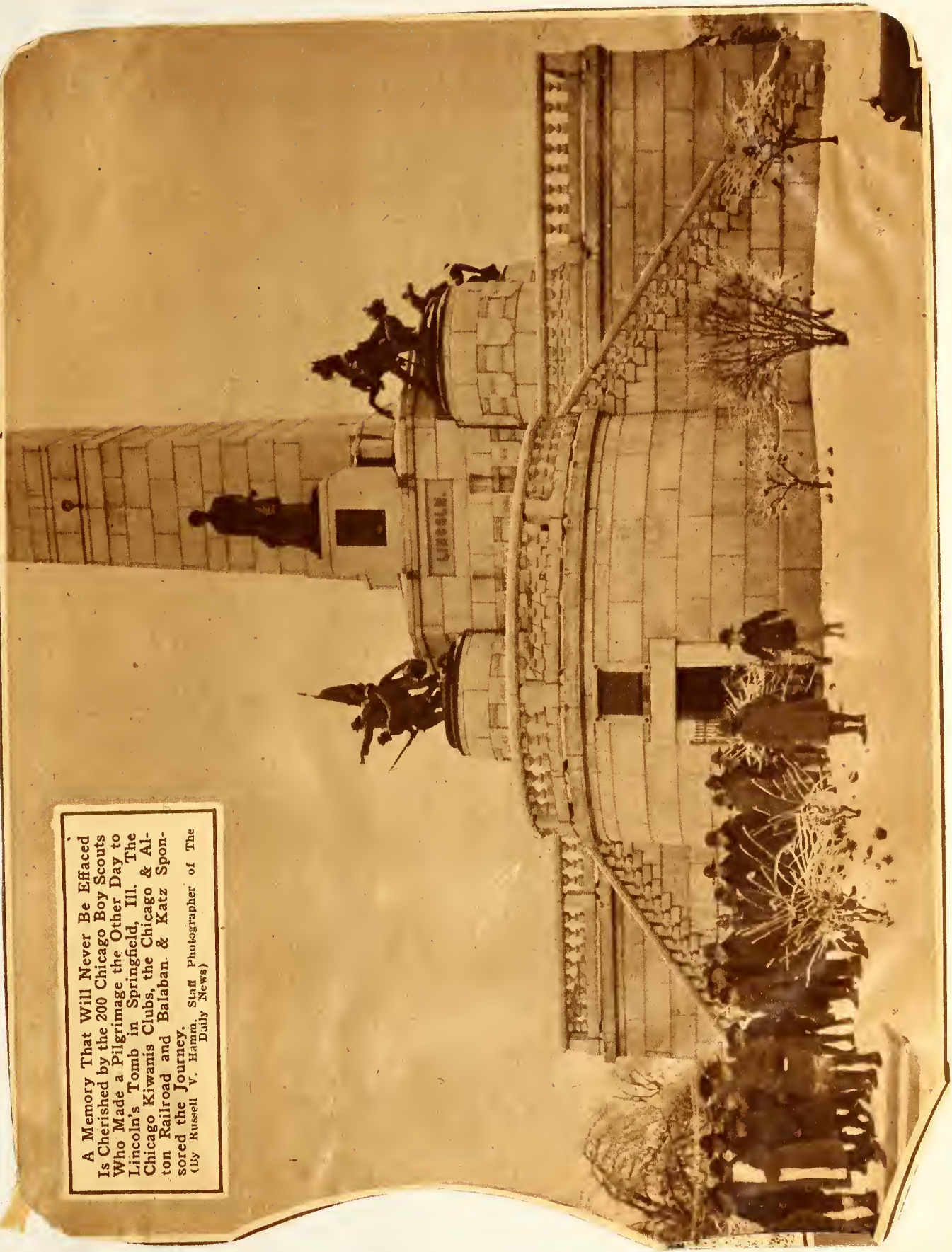

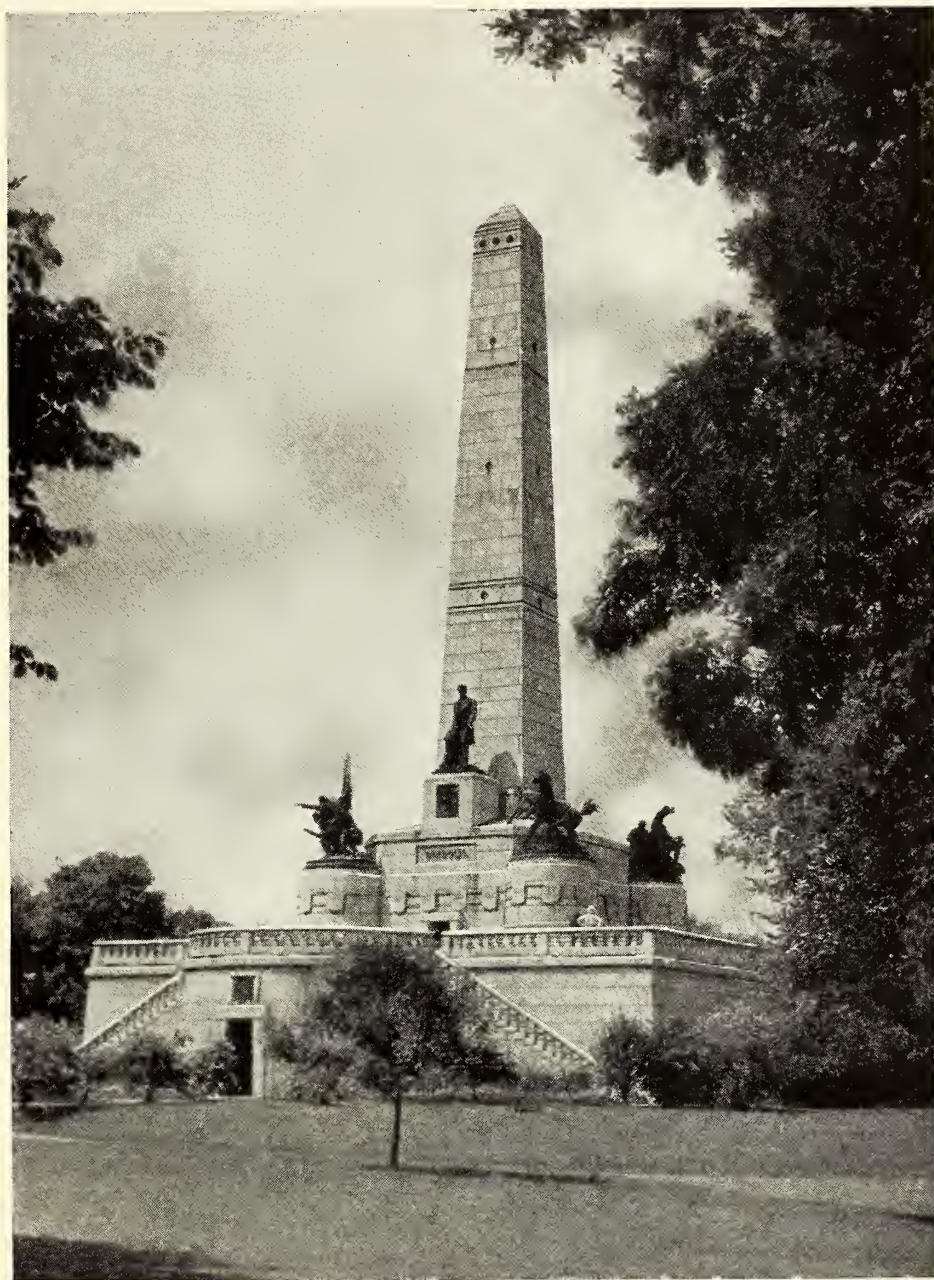

THE LINCOLN MONUMENT at Springfield, Illinois, designed by Larkin G. Mead, consists of a granite obelisk 121 feet above center of mausoleum which is $119\frac{1}{2}$ feet long and $72\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide and in which are six crypts for the burial of members of Lincoln's family, and a memorial hall, a museum of Lincolniana. Around foot of obelisk (besides an heroic statue of Lincoln) are four groups of figures in bronze, symbolizing army and navy of the United States. The monument was completed and dedicated in 1874 and rebuilt in 1899.

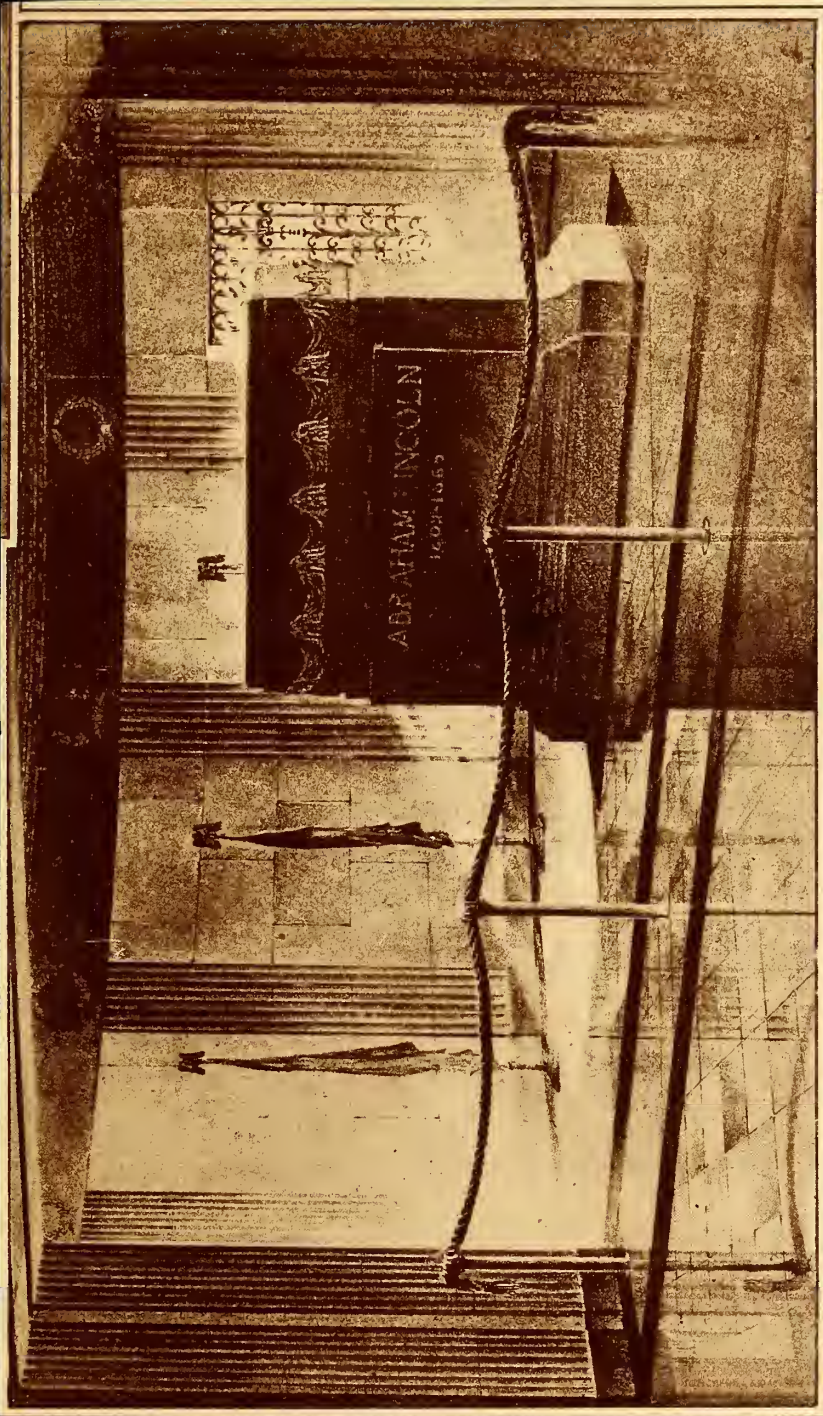

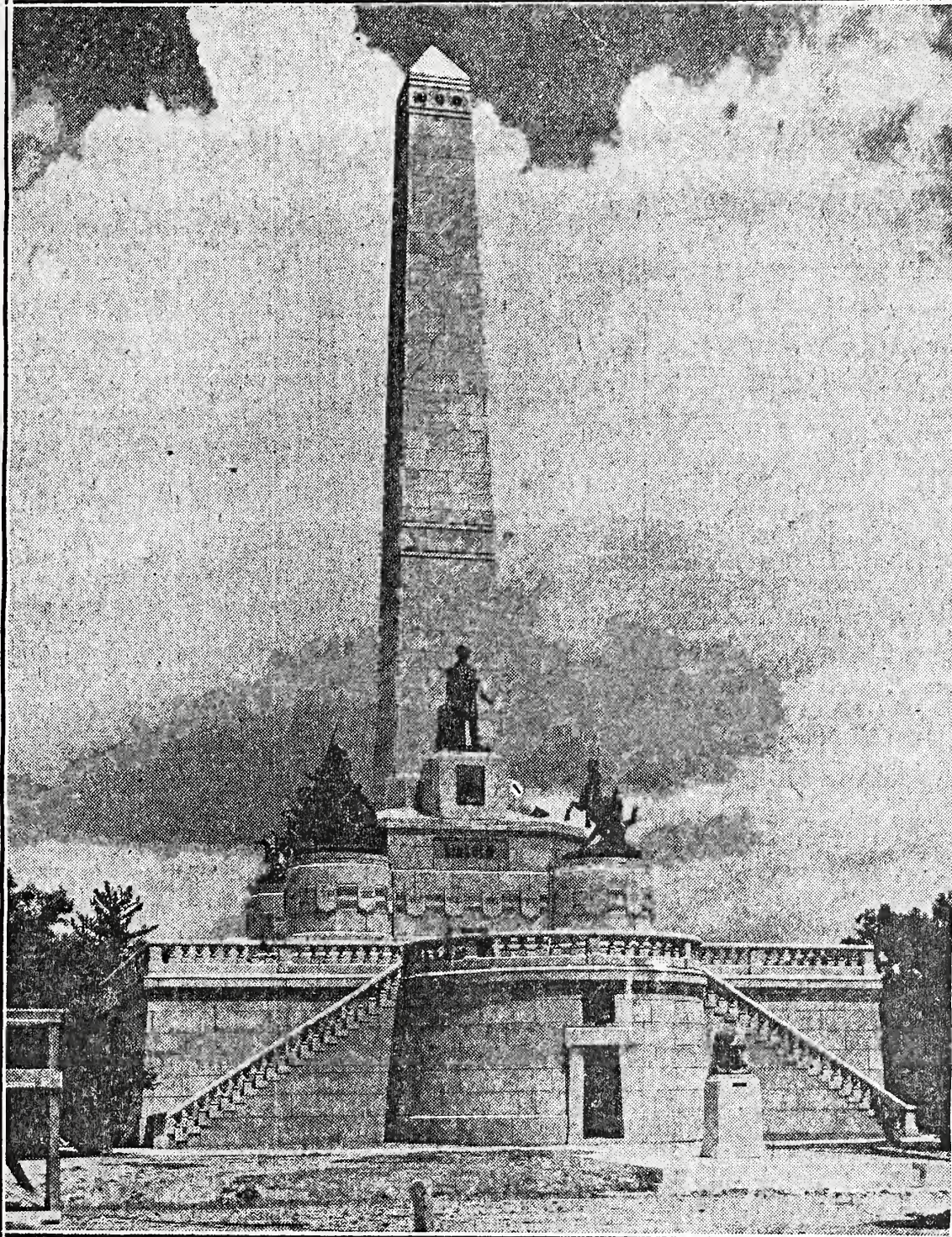

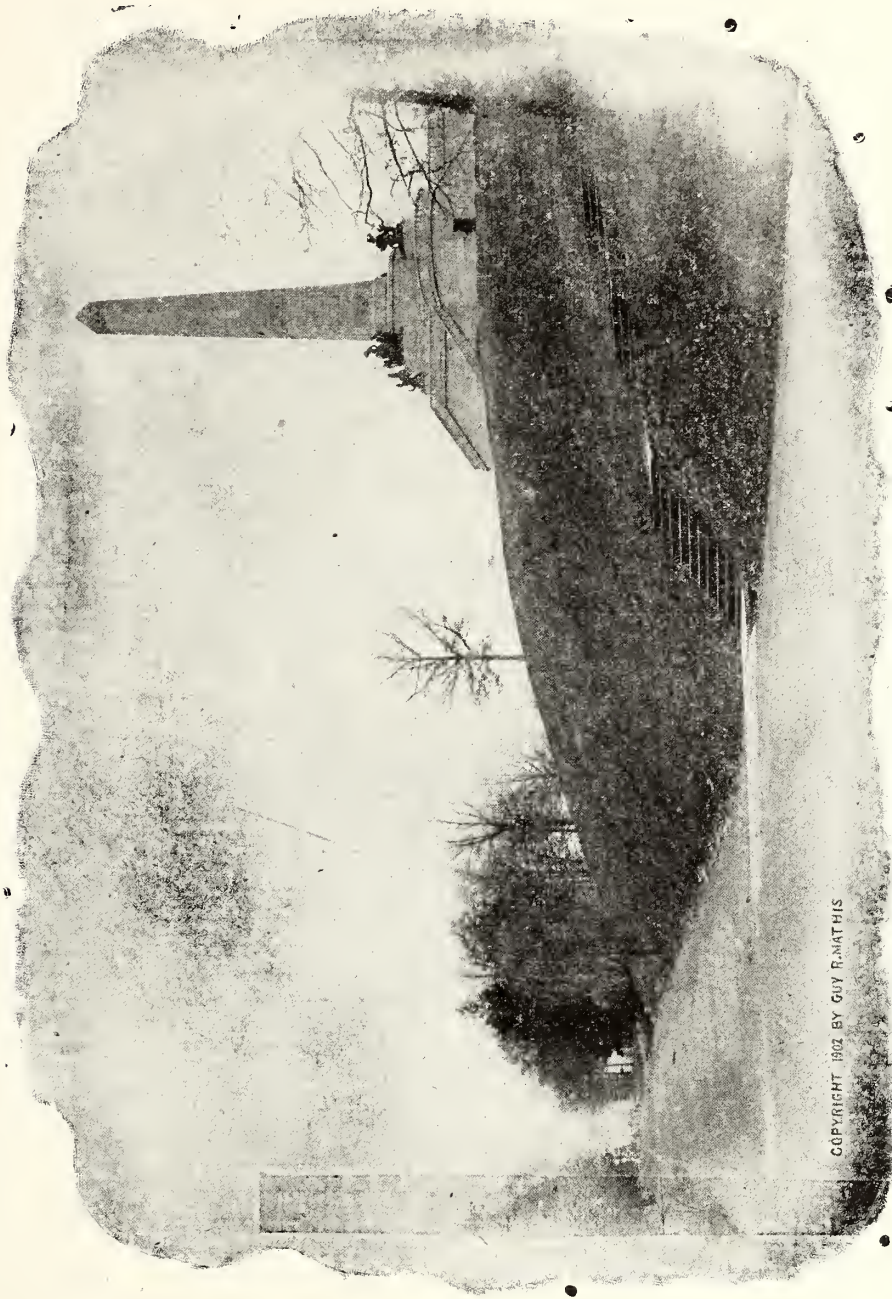

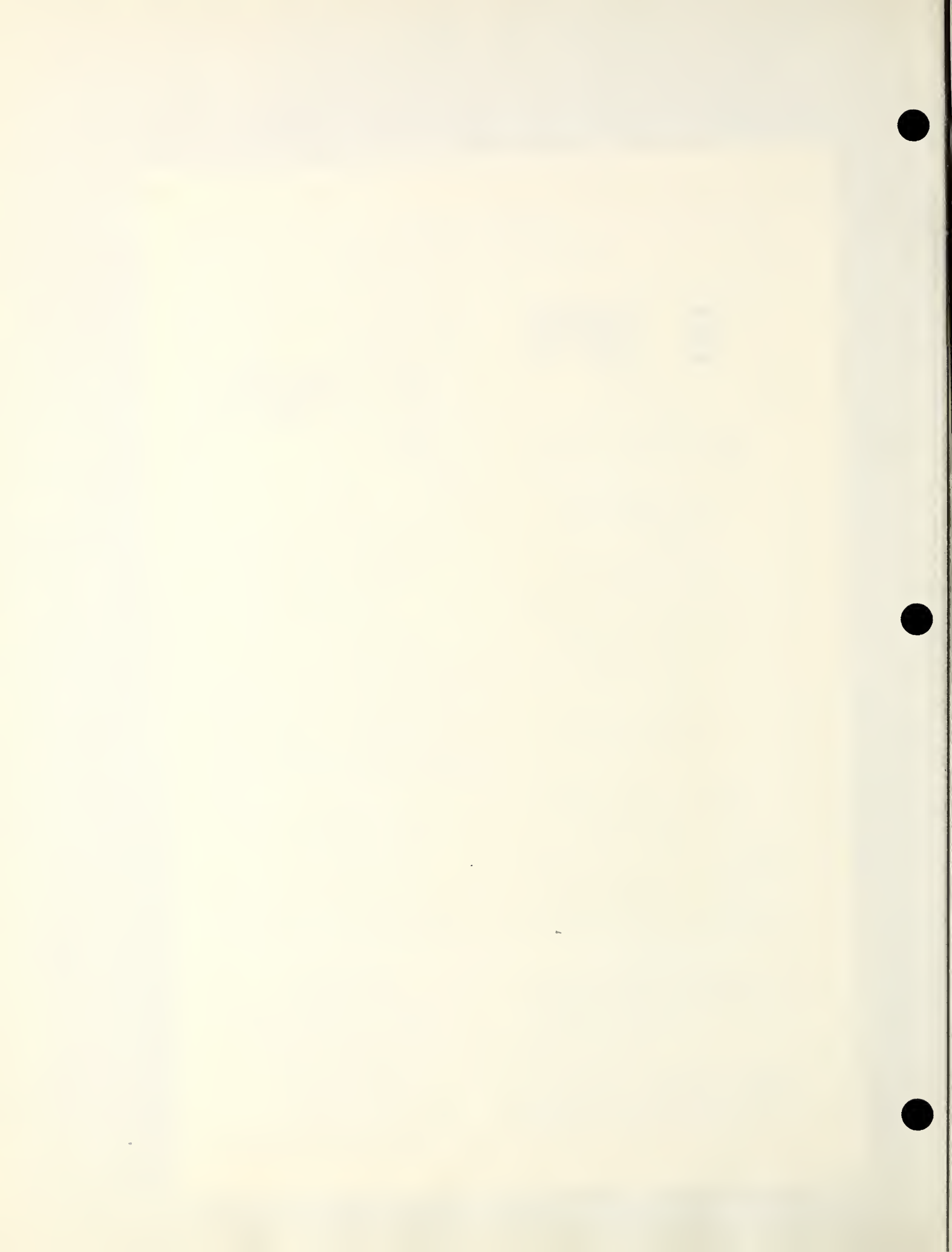


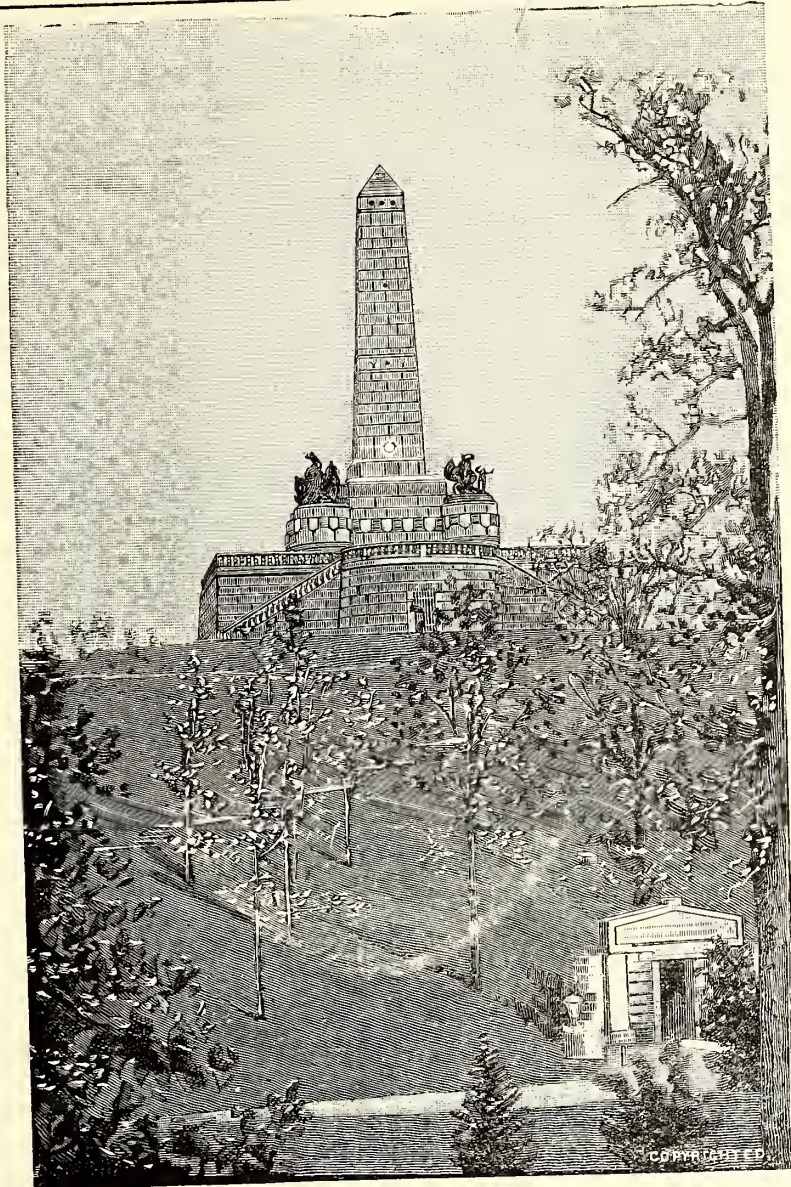

THE FIRST TOMB

There is considerable confusion among students of Lincoln over the three constructions of the tomb. The accompanying picture shows the structure as first built. It will be noted that the spire does not have the height to give it its present graceful appearance. The three spires may be distinguished as follows:

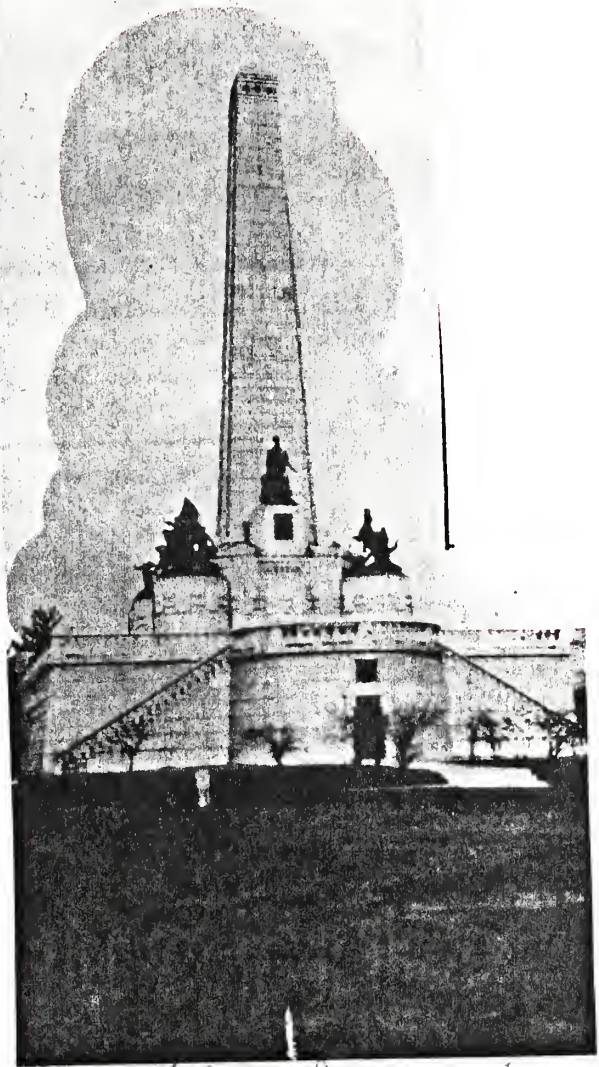
First—Two port holes or windows on each side.

Second—Three port holes or windows on each side.

Third (or present)—No port holes, as there is no stairway in the spire.

In each structure there are three holes in the top band.

The receiving vault of this picture is as it looked when Lincoln's body was placed within and there remained from May until December, 1865. Later it was made much wider.

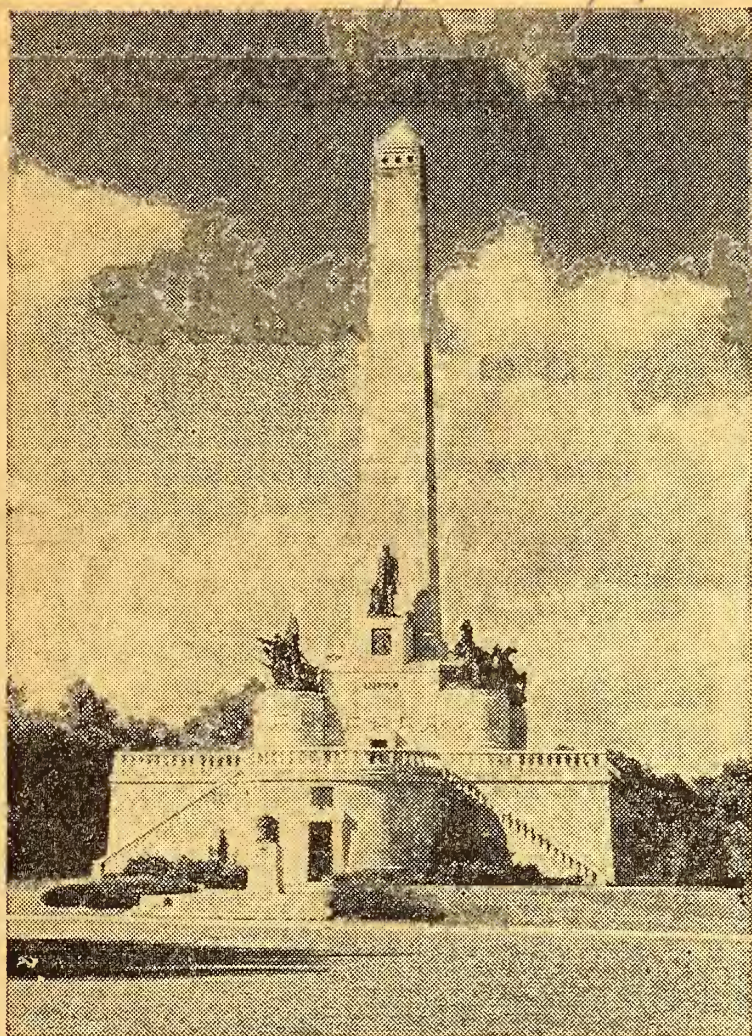

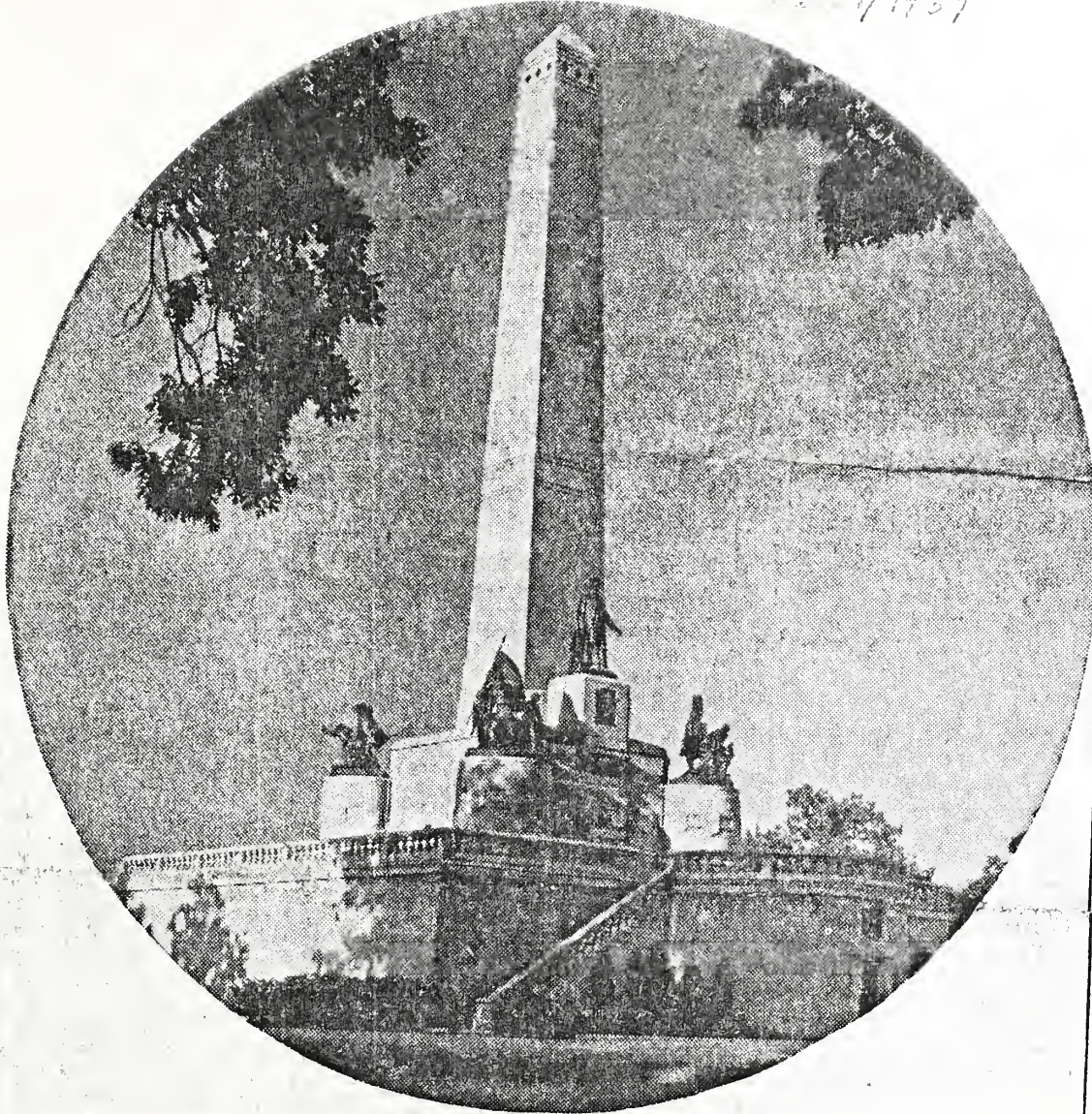

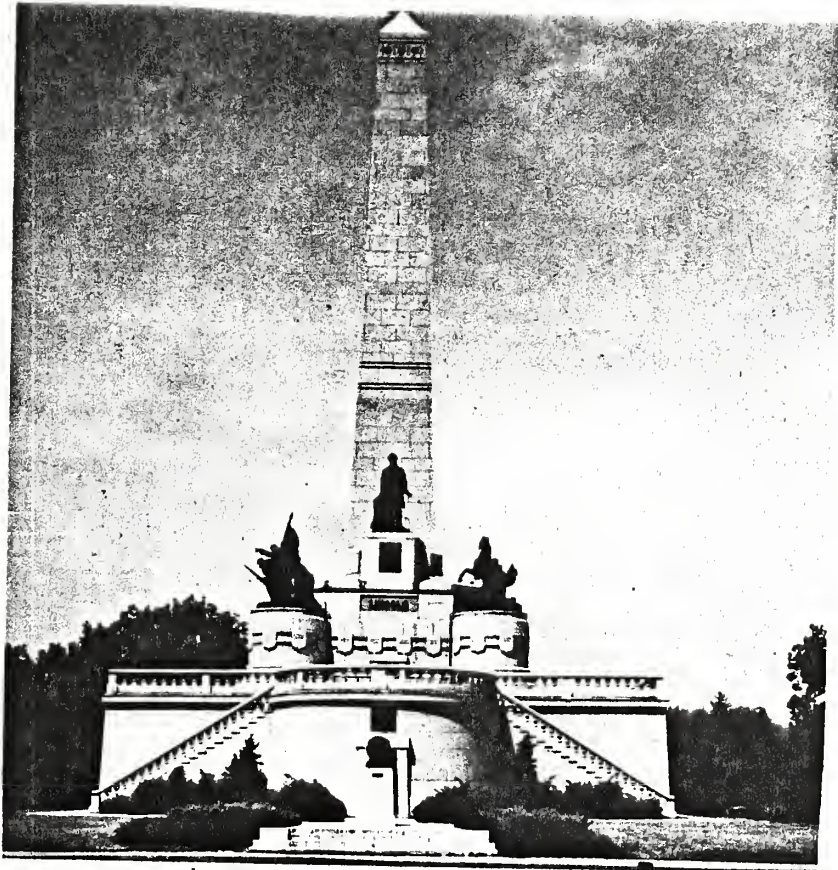
THE REQUIEM OF WINTER SNOWS, AT LINCOLN'S TOMB IN SPRINGFIELD

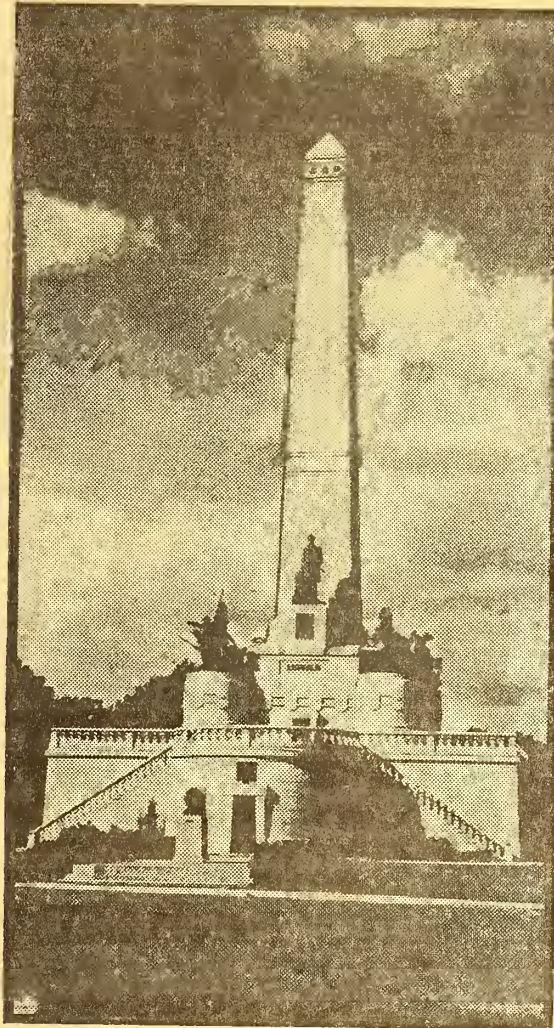

Left: The Edwards home, built in 1833, now houses the art treasures of the Springfield Art Association. Right: The Lincoln Monument and Tomb in Springfield.



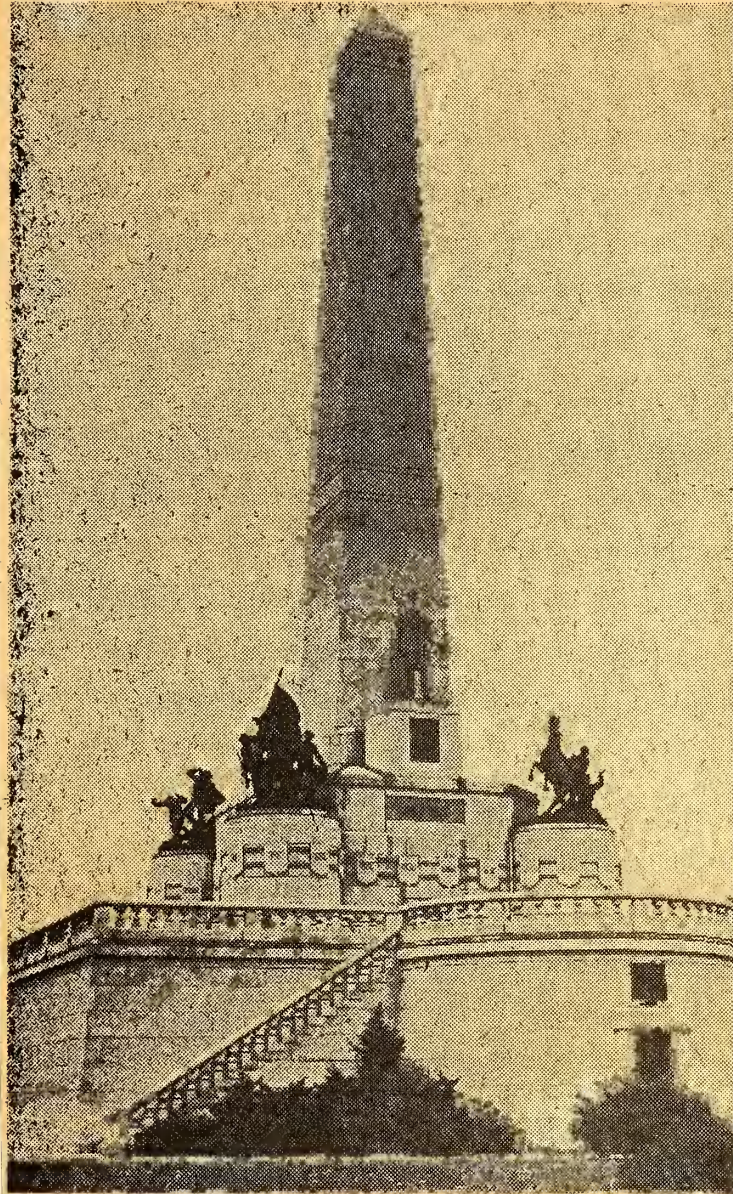

Resting Place of Martyred President



This Lincoln memorial at Springfield, Ill., was completed Oct. 15, 1874, at a cost of \$200,000. The base forms the tomb. Above it, the spire rises 100 feet. Bronze figures on the base include that of Lincoln, his family and others representing armed forces of the nation. Recently, a bronze head of Lincoln by Gutzon Borglum, the noted sculptor, was added to the memorial. The monument was remodeled in 1930 and, in 1931, was rededicated by President Herbert Hoover. 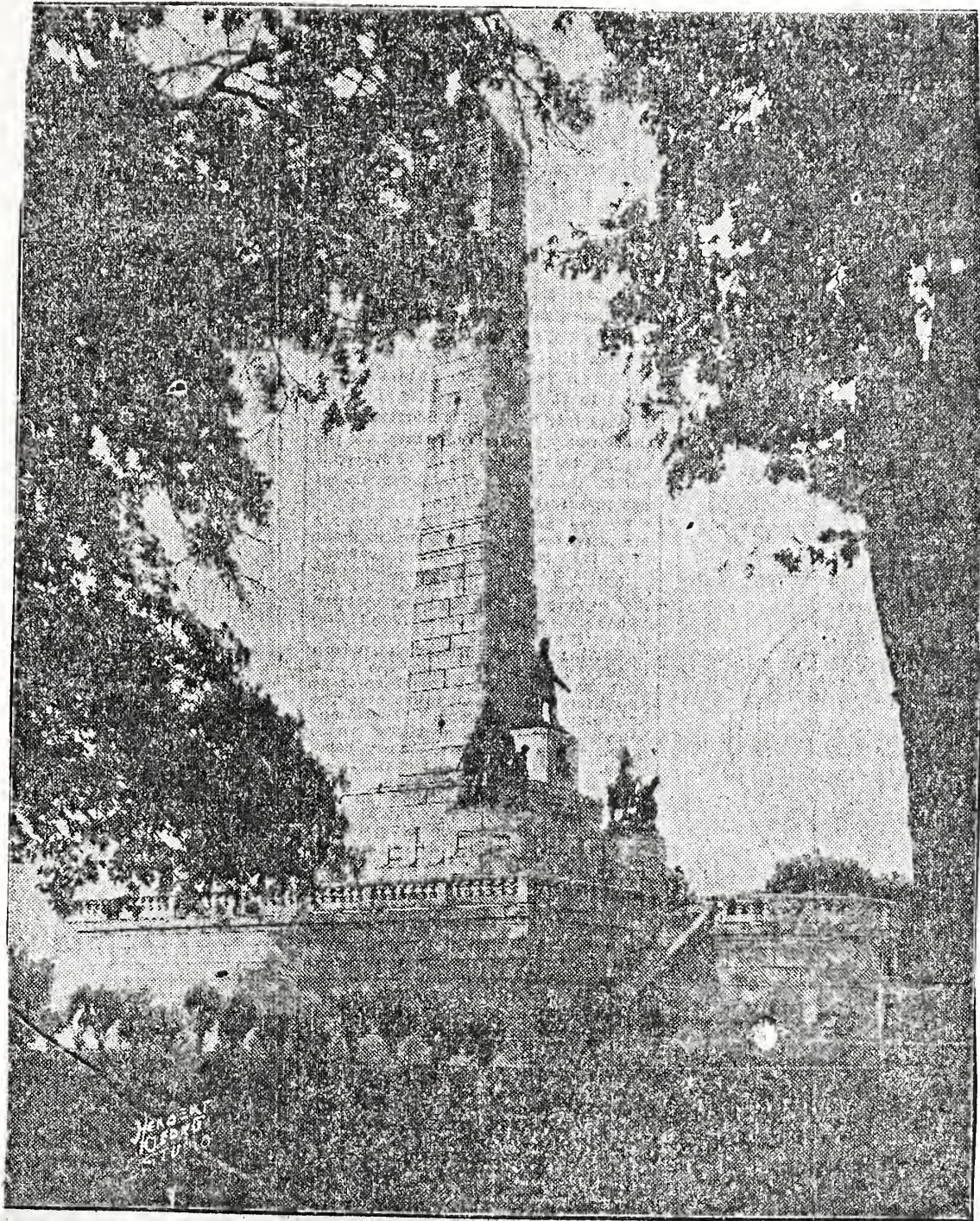
