MEMORANDUM FOR: IMPERIAL JAPANESE GOVERNMENT

THROUGH : Central Liaison Office, Tokyo

SUBJECT : Materials, Supplies, and Equipment Received and to be
Received from the Japanese Armed Forces.

1. In furtherance of paragraph VI, General Order No.1, this headquarters, dated 8 September 1945, it is desired that the Imperial Japanese Government take immediate steps to prepare to turn over on demand to the Commanding Generals, Sixth and Eighth United States Armies, XXIV Corps, and Commanders, Fifth and Seventh Fleets, all arms, ammunition, explosives, military equipment, stores, and supplies and other implements of war of all kinds and any equipment or other property belonging to, used by, or intended for use by the Japanese armed forces or any member thereof in connection with their operations. Japanese armed forces include all Japanese and Japanese controlled land, sea, and air forces and military and para-military organizations, formations, or units and their auxiliaries including Civilian Volunteer Corps wherever they may be located.

2. United States Occupation Forces Commanders have been directed to destroy all equipment which is essentially or exclusively for use in war and warlike exercises and which is not suitable for peacetime civilian uses. After operational requirements of Occupation Forces have been met, equipment and supplies of the Japanese armed forces which are not essentially for war or warlike exercises, including scrap from implements of war destroyed, are to be returned to the Japanese Government except that in Korea.

3. The Home Ministry of the Imperial Japanese Government is hereby designated as the official agency to receive and account for such supplies, materials and equipment of the Japanese armed forces as are being returned to your control.

4. In order to administer these transactions, it is desired that the Imperial Japanese Government take the following action:

a. Responsible Japanese Army and Navy Commanders will prepare inventories by location (generally corresponding to points at which the material is being assembled for turn over to the United States Occupation Forces) of all supplies, materials and equipment in their possession. These inventories will be made available upon call to United States Occupational Force Commanders.

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b. The Home Ministry of the Imperial Japanese Government will send representatives to the Commanding Generals, Sixth and Eighth United States Armies and Commander Fifth Fleet, for the purpose of receiving supplies, materials, and equipment being returned to the Japanese Government. Sufficient personnel will be provided to accept these items at the locations where turned over by the Japanese armed forces.

c. The Home Ministry of the Imperial Japanese Government will maintain records of all property so received and account for this property in such form that the disposition of all supplies, materials, and equipment may be traced to the ultimate consumer. These records will be made available on call to the Supreme Commander of the Allied Powers, the United States Occupational Force Commanders, or authorized representatives.

5. You are informed that the supplies, materials, and equipment returned to your Government are for the purpose of civilian relief, and for use towards restoration of Japanese civil economy to the extent that it can provide the essentials of food, clothing, and shelter for the Japanese civilian population. The use of these supplies, materials, and equipment for any purposes other than the above is expressly forbidden.

1. a. Operational Directive No. 17, Headquarters Eighth Army, 29 September 1945, together with Slants 1 through 18 inclusive, is hereby rescinded.

b. Directive contained in radio, this headquarters, cite EX-36479-GS, addressed to IX, XI, and XIV Corps only 31 October 1945 is hereby rescinded.

2. The following instructions cover the collection and disposition of enemy equipment of the Japanese armed forces.

3. Japanese armed forces are defined to be all Japanese land, sea, and air forces, military and para-military organizations, formations, or units, and their auxiliaries including Civilian Volunteer Corps, and Kempai Tai Police forces wherever they may be found. The definition does not include Japanese civilian police force.

4. Enemy equipment is defined as:

a. All arms, ammunition, explosives, military equipment, stores and supplies of a warlike nature and other implements of war of all kinds and any equipment or other property belonging to, used by, or intended for use by Japanese armed forces and Japanese controlled armed forces or any members thereof in connection with their operations, and any weapons in the hands of Japanese civilians including those collected by civil authorities, except:

- (1) Short swords and pistols now being carried by civil police in the performance of their duties.
- (2) Weapons issued to bona fide civilians for hunting purposes or for protection against beasts of prey, for which licenses have been issued by the civil police authorizing retention.
- (3) Swords considered to be temple swords, or museum pieces, retention of which is duly authorized as prescribed by accompanying certificate, which will be issued by commanding officers of major units after the proper value of the swords have been determined. (See Inclosure 4 for sample certificate.)

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- b. Naval combatant and auxiliary vessels and craft of all kinds, both surface and submarine, including those under repair, alteration or construction.
 - c. All aircraft, both military and civilian, aviation and anti-aircraft equipment and devices.
 - d. All military installations and establishments, including airfields, seaplane bases, naval bases, military or naval hospitals, clinics, dispensaries, medical supply dumps and depots, military research establishments, permanent and temporary land and coast fortifications, fortresses and other fortified areas, together with plans and drawings of all such fortifications, installations and establishments.
5. Corps, within their respective zones of responsibility, will establish such collecting points as are necessary for the efficient collecting, safeguarding and preservation of all items listed in paragraphs 7a, b, c and d, and Inclosure No. 2 herewith (except narcotics, for which instructions will be issued later).
6. The disposition of all technical items will be accomplished under close supervision of qualified personnel of the appropriate technical service concerned.
7. Enemy equipment which is essentially or exclusively for use in war or warlike exercises, and which is not suitable for peacetime civilian uses will be promptly destroyed or scrapped with the following exceptions:
- a. Enemy equipment covered by instructions contained in Inclosure No. 2 herewith:
 - b. Unique and new development items desired for examination, intelligence, or research.
 - c. Enemy equipment required by Corps commanders or Naval Force commanders for operational needs.
 - d. Enemy equipment not essentially or exclusively for use in war or warlike exercises and which is suitable for peacetime civilian uses. This category of equipment consists in general of food, clothing, tentage,

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commercial type explosives which are readily available, merchant shipping, trucks, or any type of vehicles or transportation equipment which can be used for civilian purposes, construction materials and machinery, drugs and medical supplies and equipment of any type, communications equipment useful for civilian purposes (including radio transmitters, receivers and radio tubes, not now installed, but stored in supply dumps and warehouses).

e. Enemy aircraft or air corps equipment on all airfields which have been repainted with American insignia, placed under guard for tagging, packing or crating for shipment to the United States by Technical Air Intelligence Units or for which Technical Air Intelligence Units have already furnished local commanders with lists thereof for preservation pending shipment.

f. Equipment mentioned in paragraph 7 d above may be drawn upon for the maintenance of the occupational forces, prisoners of war and displaced persons of the United Nations or for the relief of the local civilian population to the extent necessary to prevent or alleviate epidemics or serious disease and serious unrest or disorder which would endanger the occupying forces and the objectives of occupation.

8. Radio transmitters installed in non-operating radio stations will not be turned over to the Home Ministry. Operating stations will not be disturbed. Reports covering all operating and non-operating stations will be submitted through technical channels to this headquarters without delay, giving the following information:

- G-H - Add. by O7 28/9*
- a. Location by map coordinates, and with respect to landmarks.
 - b. Japanese military or civil agency responsible for operation and function.
 - c. Status (in operation, or inoperative).
 - d. Whether Japanese civilian operating personnel is available.
 - e. Other pertinent available data, such as kind and volume of traffic handled, frequencies, call signs, points of communications, and power source.

Disposition instructions will be issued at a later date.

9. As a general policy, enemy equipment will be destroyed or otherwise disposed of at the location at which turned over by the Japanese. In destroying enemy equipment, except ammunition and explosives, authority is granted to employ any practicable method of destruction which renders

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the equipment useless and beyond restoration by repair for its designed purpose. In destroying ammunition and explosives the provisions of ordnance safety regulations will be adhered to. Japanese technical experts will be provided by this headquarters to assist in the destruction of the materials, supplies and equipment. Inert projectiles, inert bombs and other inert ammunition components may be turned over in place to the Japanese Home Ministry as scrap. Destruction of these items is not required.

10. In an effort to keep items of intelligence interests from being destroyed before they have been examined by technical intelligence personnel, instruct all echelons to preserve:

a. All tanks that are marked Type 1 through Type 5, and tanks on self-propelled mounts mounting 75mm or larger caliber guns.

b. Equipment and facilities of Laboratories, research institutes and similar scientific and technological organizations owned or operated by Japanese Government or private enterprise.

c. Any item providing security, including facsimile or speech, any unusual non-Morse communication item, or any advanced or unusual type portable radio set. This headquarters will be notified of location of any of this equipment.

~~11. The Commanding Generals, IX, XI and XIV Corps are charged with the destruction or other disposition of enemy equipment within their respective areas or zones of responsibility, except that XI Corps will not be responsible for disposition of Japanese ammunition at Ikego Ammunition Depot. The Commanders of Fifth and Seventh U.S. Fleets are so charged in their respective areas or zones of responsibility. Japanese army equipment found in Navy areas and Japanese navy equipment found in Army areas will be placed at the disposal of the appropriate Army and Navy commander concerned by the unit commander locating such equipment. After requirements of the interested services have been satisfied, mutual arrangements will be made between the Army and Navy commanders concerned for the destruction or other disposition of the enemy equipment.~~

12. In making arrangements for locating and consummating the destruction and disposal of enemy equipment, Corps commanders will deal directly with the responsible Japanese commanders of their respective areas.

13. Corps commanders are responsible that categories of equipment enumerated below will, upon seizure or transfer from Japanese armed forces, be preserved and placed in protective storage awaiting disposition or shipment.

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a. Equipment required by the War Department and other agencies as set forth in Section 1 of Inclosure No. 2 herewith.

b. Equipment required by the Navy as set forth in Section 2 of Inclosure No. 2 herewith.

c. Equipment in categories a and b above which cannot be shipped due to its bulk or weight will be left in place and reported to this headquarters giving description, logistics and location. All tanks will be considered as coming under this category.

d. Military surveying and mapping equipment in category a above will be packed with shipping ticket attached to each box. Packing of delicate mechanical and optical items listed in Inclosure No. 2, indicated by double asterisk, will be supervised by an officer familiar with surveying equipment.

e. These instructions constitute authority for shipment of the above equipment, except as noted in sub-paragraph c above, to shipping points designated as follows:

f. The disposition of certain enemy equipment to military personnel as war trophies is authorized by War Department Circular 155, 1945 as amended by War Department Circular 267, 1945. Corps commanders will take cognizance of the above circulars when destroying all types of equipment designated therein and quantities in excess of those to provide reasonable distribution of war trophies to all military personnel of their commands will be shipped to designations listed in paragraph e above.

g. The Home Ministry has been designated as the official agency of the Imperial Japanese Government to receive supplies, materials and equipment which are to be returned to that Government. Memorandum, Office of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, file AG 402.5 (24 Sep 45) GD, subject: "Materials, Supplies, and Equipment Received and to be Received from the Japanese Armed Forces, "dated 24 September 1945, is attached as Inclosure No.1. All supplies, materials and equipment covered in paragraph 7d above, except narcotics, and scrap resulting from the destruction of enemy equipment not required by occupation troops for occupational purposes will be returned to the Home Ministry of the Imperial Government for use in civilian relief or in civilian economy. The Home Ministry will furnish a representative to Corps commanders to receive supplies, materials and equipment to be turned over to the Japanese. Details as to the time and places of the transfer of supplies and materials to the Home Ministry will be directly between Corps commanders and Home Ministry representatives.

14. The following special instructions pertain to aircraft, aeronautical equipment, and facilities:

a. All practicable measures will be taken to prevent the use of aircraft as a means of escape of individuals or for evacuation of property.

b. ~~All military and civil aircraft, and aircraft replacement parts, components and equipment including armament, bombs and missiles; will be destroyed. Such other captured air force items which the responsible Corps commander believes merits such examination may be secured and held for examination by Air Force technical personnel who will be furnished as arranged by this headquarters.~~

c. Control will be taken of all Japanese and Japanese controlled aircraft communications; signal warning and detection, radio direction and range-finding systems; and any other systems relating or accessory to the operation of aircraft. These systems and their equipment will be destroyed with the exception of that coming under the category of paragraph 7a above, and items which responsible Corps commanders should hold for examination or for use by the occupation forces. In view of the fact that several airfields contain Japanese aeronautical radio ground stations which are usable by Army airways communication system and which permanently figure in overall air navigational aid planning, local commanders will in all cases coordinate with Army airways communication system in making disposition of such equipment in order to continue in operation those stations vital to air navigation.

d. All weather stations, meteorological instruments, records, equipment and material will be preserved intact wherever found. A separate report of the foregoing, with locations, will be made to this headquarters at the time weekly material reports are submitted. This equipment will also be included in the weekly report of captured enemy material listed as a subsection of the signal section of the weekly report.

15. Instructions relative to seizure, handling, disposition, storage and reporting of all Japanese stores of narcotics are published separately.

16. All former United Nations naval craft, equipment and facilities found in Japanese possession will be seized and safeguarded pending further instructions. Report will be made to this headquarters of all craft so recovered stating location and condition together with the recommendation as to disposition.

17. Military installations such as posts, camps, cantonments, stations, depots, arsenals, bases, ports and similar installations, will be taken over by Corps commanders and preserved intact pending further instructions.

18. Material, equipment and supplies as outlined in paragraph 7d, which is turned over to the Home Ministry of the Imperial Japanese Government will be accounted for as follows:

a. The Commanding General of the Japanese First Army has been directed to cause inventory to be made of the materials, supplies and

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equipment on hand at each depot or other point of collection. When such inventories are received by this headquarters they will be made available to Corps commanders. Pending receipt of such inventories, direct communication is encouraged between unit commanders and local Japanese army commanders for the purpose of locating and facilitating the collection of captured material and equipment.

b. Corps commanders are authorized to accept Japanese inventories of materials which are to be turned over to the Imperial Japanese Government and the transfer to the Home Ministry may be by these inventories.

c. Corps commanders will cause to be inventoried by United States personnel that enemy equipment which is to be destroyed.

d. Scrap resulting from the destruction of enemy equipment will be transferred to the Home Ministry Representatives of the Imperial Japanese Government as tonnages of copper, aluminum and iron products or other materials.

e. Corps commanders will maintain complete records of all transactions pertaining to receipt and disposition of enemy equipment, including signed receipt from Home Ministry representatives covering material returned to the Japanese Government. These records will be retained until the completion of the program of destruction or other disposition of enemy equipment at which time this headquarters will issue instructions for the final disposition of these records.

19. New or unique material recommended for shipment to the United States for intelligence purposes will be reported to this headquarters giving nomenclature, description and shipping dimensions and weight.

20. Commanding General, USASCOM-C, has been charged with the responsibility of receiving all equipment which this headquarters directs to be shipped to respective depots together with the proper segregation, storage, packing, crating, marking and shipment as directed by this headquarters.

21. ~~Reports covering collection and disposition of seized or transferred equipment and supplies received from lower units will be consolidated and submitted promptly to this headquarters by Corps as follows:~~

~~a. Form as indicated in Inclosure No.3 will be used. Each service will submit a separate report. Meteorological equipment will be reported by the signal service as a section of its consolidated report. Narcotics will be reported as a section of the consolidated report of the~~

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medical service. Report will be submitted in duplicate weekly closing at 2400 hours Saturdays. Care will be used in the use of proper nomenclature, indication of unit of measure, and carrying forward cumulative balances.

b. Separate reports will be furnished as prescribed for weather stations and United Nations observational equipment.

c. Report called for in subparagraph a above will include estimated tonnage of copper, aluminum, iron and other scrap metal returned to the Japanese during the period covered by the report. Each type material will be listed separately. Estimated tonnages of these categories of scrap accrued through destruction up to the end of reported period will be included.

d. Ammunition being held for shipment to States will be reported in terms of rounds for each specific type. Ammunition destroyed or earmarked for destruction will be reported in terms of short tons (2000 lbs) in the following classifications:

- (1) Small arms ammunition
- (2) Artillery, fixed and semi-fixed; grenades and mortar ammunition
- (3) Pyrotechnics
- (4) Air Corps bombs
- (5) Rockets
- (6) Separate loading projectiles
- (7) Propelling charges
- (8) Bulk high-explosives
- (9) Fuzes and primers
- (10) Mines and Bangalore torpedoes
- (11) Depth charges and Naval torpedoes

SURRENDERED FOODSTUFFS RETURNED TO JAPANESE

1. Due to inaccuracies in reports of amounts of surrendered or captured Japanese foodstuffs returned to the Japanese Home Ministry, as reported by present and former units on their periodic reports, as called for by paragraph 21a, Operational Directive No. 28, dated 18 November 1945, it is necessary that a survey be made to determine accurately the amounts returned.

2. It is desired that commanders of all units now having custody of receipts from representatives of the Japanese Government have a search made of those receipts, recapitulating all transactions involving foodstuffs and report to this headquarters, showing the following information:

a. Food item, listed into major classifications such as rice, wheat, kooliang, other grains, salt, sugar, beans and bean products, fish and fish products, meat, etc. Under each classification, list all associated items; eg, rice, unbleached rice, unhulled rice, and any other description of rice will all be grouped under "rice". All other items of foodstuffs not belonging in above categories will be grouped under classification "miscellaneous" although still listed by individual name.

b. Individual signing the receipt, including name and official title or position, if any.

c. Location and date of release of food.

d. Amounts of foods are to be shown as prescribed by paragraph 3, Operational Directive No. 28/6, dated 1 January 1946; ie, "units of measure other than each or piece will be expressed in United States standard units of measure. Capacities of containers will be indicated. Tonnages will be expressed in terms of short tons (2000 pounds)."

3. The above report will be submitted to Commanding General, Eighth Army by 25 May 1946.

Applications will be initiated through the local prefectural government offices in areas concerned and submitted to commanding officers of local military government units. Applications will be forwarded to this headquarters for final approval through command channels with appropriate recommendations of intermediate commanders. If available one copy of maps and drawings of the installations will be inclosed with the applications.
- g. Action and reports prior to vacating installations will be as prescribed in Circular Number 40 this headquarters, dated 1 February 1946.
- h. Improvements made to real property by Occupation Forces and materials and equipment thereon may be removed from the property before return to the Japanese upon determination that such action is economically feasible and militarily necessary. In all cases the estimated value of such improvements remaining when the property is released from Occupation Forces control will be made a matter of record in accordance with Operational Directive No. 33, this headquarters, 26 March 1946 and four (4) copies of the attached receipt (OGA Form #1) for the installation will be forwarded to this headquarters.
- i. Transfers made in accordance with this policy will not prejudice ultimate disposition of titles and no agreements pertaining to determination of titles will be made.
- j. Property released to the Japanese under the provisions of this directive and subsequently required by the Occupation Forces must be procured as prescribed in Operational Directive 33 this headquarters, 26 March 1946. Paragraph 11, Operational Directive 28, this headquarters, 18 November 1945, as amended by paragraph 1a, Operational Directive 28/5, this headquarters, 22 December 1945, is further amended by adding the following:

"a. The Commander Naval Forces, Far East, has authorized the Second Demobilization Bureau to transfer to the Home Ministry all non-combatant ex-Navy small craft not now:

- (1) Employed by Allied Occupation forces,
- (2) Required for repatriation work,
- (3) Required in minesweeping work.

"b. Small craft are vessels less than one hundred (100) gross tons. Combatant small craft, including torpedo boats, torpedo launches and aircraft rescue boats, are specifically exempted from the above disposition.

"c. In order to account properly for the transfer of the authorized craft from the Second Demobilization Bureau to the Home Ministry, transfer will be effected through military government teams using the receipt form attached (Inclosure 1). Upon receipt of this form, properly executed and signed by an official of the Home Ministry, military government teams will release the Home Ministry copy to the local representative thereof and forward completed copies to the other agencies listed at the bottom of the form. This will complete the transfer.

"d. Other non-combatant small craft (formerly the property of the Japanese Army, Munitions Bureau or other government agency), which are released to the Home Ministry, will be accounted for by military government teams, using the same receipt form used for ex-Navy craft (Inclosure 1).

"e. Second Demobilization Bureau Teams are at present in the field seeking out and identifying ex-Navy small craft not yet in their

RELEASE OF FORMER MILITARY INSTALLATIONS

Operational Directive 28, this headquarters, 18 November 1945, as amended, is further amended as follows:

1. Paragraph 4d to read:

"4d. All military installations and establishments. Military installations and establishments are defined as posts, camps, stations, cantonments, depots, airfields, seaplane bases, ports, bases, arsenals, naval bases, military research establishments, military or naval hospitals, clinics, dispensaries, medical supply dumps and depots, permanent and temporary land and coast fortifications, fortresses and other fortified areas, together with plans and drawings of all such fortifications, installations and establishments."

2. Paragraph 17h by adding:

"The release of demilitarized targets other than former military installations does not require forwarding of OGA Form 1. Acknowledgment of such release by the Japanese Government will be filed in the records of the military government team in the prefecture where such property is located. Forwarding of OGA Form 1 does not require the making of corrections to yen evaluations added by the Ministry of Finance, Bureau of State Property. Forwarding indorsements will call to the attention of this headquarters instances where evaluation is obviously incorrect."

3. Paragraph 17 by adding:

"k. Determination of title to property which may have been leased, confiscated or otherwise obtained by the Japanese armed forces prior to the occupation is not a function of this command. Occupancy or use by the Japanese armed forces of any installation defined in paragraph 4d above,

at the time of surrender, is considered basis for retention or release as former military installations. The retention of enemy surrendered properties which are not former military installations as defined by paragraph 4d above, must be accomplished by procurement demand. Privately-owned industrial installations such as aircraft and munitions factories, while properly targets for demilitarization, will not be retained as former military installations.

- "l. Releases made prior to 1 February 1947 will not be voided solely on the basis of such releases having been made without accomplishment of OGA Form 1 as directed in subparagraph h above. All releases made by occupation force units prior to 1 February 1947, unless specifically contrary to published directives current at the time of release, are hereby validated. Further use by occupation forces of property so released will only be accomplished under authorized procurement procedures. These releases have been reported and evaluated by the Japanese Government in compliance with memorandum for the Japanese Government, subject: "Evaluation of Military Installations Returned to the Japanese Government", (SCAPIN 1464), 14 January 1947.
- "m. Report will be submitted to this headquarters by 1 February 1948, of all property being retained without procurement demand as enemy surrendered property which is not being used. The reasons why such property has not been released will be included in this report. Negative reports will be submitted."

1. Reference is made to CLO 9670 (PH), 18 December 1947, subject, "Transfer of Work Concerning Disposal of Commodities Returned by GHQ, SCAP to Japanese Government from Home Ministry to Construction Board in Connection with Dissolution of Home Ministry."

2. In view of the impending dissolution of the Home Ministry, the Construction Board (KENSETSU-IN) is designated as the successor agency of the Japanese Government to receive and account for supplies, materials, and equipment of the former Japanese armed forces that have been or will be returned to the control of the Japanese Government. The transfer of responsibility from the Home Ministry to the Construction Board will be accomplished without interruption.

3. All records which have been maintained by the Home Ministry in connection with the receipt and disposition of the supplies, materials, and equipment so returned will be transferred **intact** to the custody of the Construction Board which shall henceforth be charged with the responsibility for their maintenance.

4. All directives which have been issued by General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers treating with the return of surrendered supplies, materials, and equipment to the Japanese Government wherein the Home Ministry was referred to as the responsible agency thereof, shall now be construed to refer to the Construction Board with equal force and effect.

Effective 25 November 1945, the 720th Military Police Battalion and the 531st Military Police Battalion are relieved from assignment to XI Corps and revert to the direct control of the Commanding General, Eighth Army. These units will continue their present missions in TOKYO and YOKOHAMA, respectively.

2. Effective 25 November 1945, the Commanding General, XI Corps, is relieved of the responsibility for military police duties within the metropolitan areas of TOKYO and YOKOHAMA as specified in paragraph 3 below.

3. This headquarters will appoint provost marshals for the cities of TOKYO and YOKOHAMA. These provost marshals will operate under the direct control of the Commanding General, Eighth Army, and will be responsible for the following missions within their respective zones:

- a. Traffic control.
- b. Maintaining high standards of appearance and conduct of American troops.
- c. Arrest of violators and investigation of violations of existing regulations.
- d. Special missions as directed by this headquarters.

4. a. The Commanding General, XI Corps, will continue to maintain tactical responsibility within the TOKYO and YOKOHAMA areas, to include the suppression of riots and disorders if directed by this headquarters. In addition, the Commanding General, XI Corps, will continue to be responsible for the operation of war criminal stockades.

b. The Commanding General, USASCOM C, will continue to be responsible for police and guard duties of all installations under his control. In addition, the Commanding General, USASCOM C, will be responsible for the operation of the military stockades for American prisoners.

5. Close cooperation and coordination between all commanders of Eighth Army units in the TOKYO-YOKOHAMA area is desired to insure that a high standard of conduct and appearance of troops is maintained at all times.

1. This directive will govern the action of all US troops in the TOKYO-YOKOHAMA area (see Inclosure No. 1) in the event of riots, disorders or other disturbances which might endanger US troops or property. All Eighth Army units have prepared plans for action in case of such emergencies. However, in order to insure complete coordination all Eighth Army units in the TOKYO-YOKOHAMA area will revise, if necessary, their present plans to conform with this directive.

2. In case of an emergency, commanders will assume an active defense. Defensive posts will be selected but positions will not be prepared unless directed by this headquarters. Offensive action will be taken only if a hostile act has been committed against US troops or property which justifies offensive tactics or upon order of this headquarters. If an emergency arises the local commander will notify this headquarters by the most expeditious means giving complete details of incident and the action taken by US troops. US troops will not interfere with minor riots between Japanese but will direct the local Japanese civil police to quell the disturbances. All units will execute close surveillance over riots to insure protection of US lives and property. Tear gas or other irritants will not be used to control civilian or military disorders. These items will not be issued.

3. If there is an indication, or unexpected occurrence, of a general uprising or riot which would affect the entire area, this headquarters or the Commanding General, XI Corps, will notify all units of action to be taken by announcing either a WHITE or RED alert. Existing communication channels will be utilized. Civilian communication facilities will not be used unless all other types of military communications have failed.

4. a. A WHITE alert will be a warning that an emergency is impending. All passes will be cancelled; individuals on pass will return to their parent organizations immediately or report to the nearest US unit, whichever is fastest; ammunition and emergency rations will be issued to troops. Unit transportation will be held in readiness to transport troops if necessary.

b. A RED alert will indicate that an emergency has occurred or is imminent. A RED alert may or may not be preceded by a WHITE alert. Units will comply with WHITE alert instructions and, in addition, will dispatch troops to selected defensive posts.

5. Immediately upon the announcement of either a WHITE or RED alert, the Commanding General, XI Corps, will exercise tactical command of all Eighth Army units in the TOKYO-YOKOHAMA area. The following units will report strength and troops disposition to Commanding General, XI Corps:

Headquarters Company, Headquarters Detachment, and Special Troops, Eighth Army

6. The Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, and the Headquarters Commandant, United States Army Forces, Pacific, have prepared plans for their respective units and are capable of self-defense against minor demonstrations. If assistance is needed it will be furnished by the Commanding General, XI Corps, upon direct request from these units.

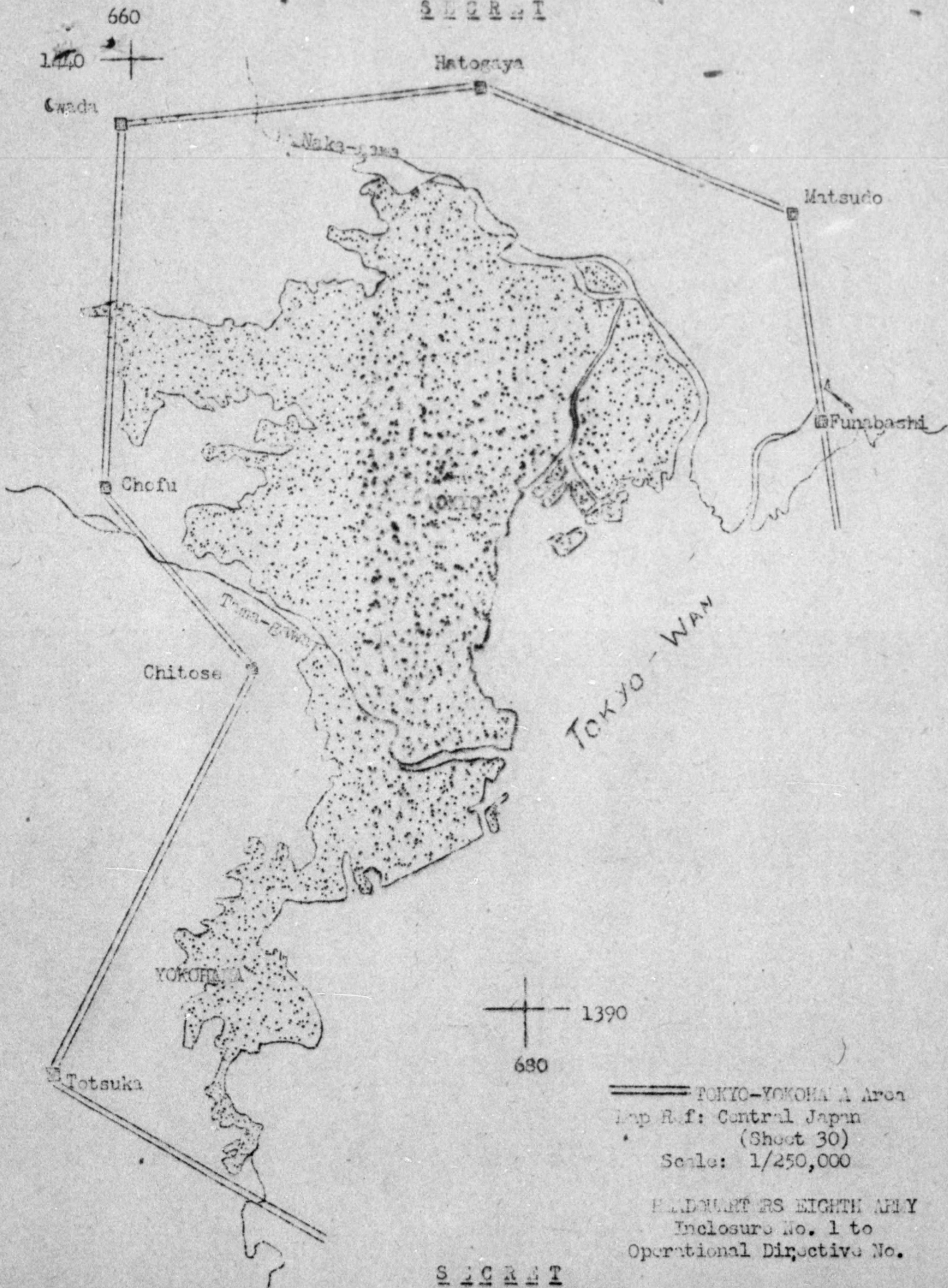

NARCOTICS

1. The following instructions cover the seizure, handling, disposition, storage, and reporting of Japanese stocks of narcotics as referred to in paragraph number 15, Operational Directive Number 25, 18 November 1945, this headquarters.

2. DEFINITIONS:

a. Military stocks of narcotics: All stocks of narcotics in crude, raw, semi-processed, or finished form belonging to, used by, or intended for use by Japanese armed forces and Japanese controlled armed forces or any members thereof in connection with their operations.

b. Civilian stocks of narcotics: All stocks of narcotics in crude, raw, semi-processed or finished form owned, possessed, stored or being manufactured by Japanese civilian interests.

c. Processed narcotics in normal trade channels: All narcotics which have been manufactured for medicinal administration and are at present in the possession of physicians, pharmacists, hospitals, and retail or wholesale establishments whose normal business function is the distribution of medicinal narcotics. This class of narcotics will not be seized or reported.

3. The commanding generals of corps within their respective areas will:

a. With regard to Japanese military stocks of narcotics:

- (1) Take into custody, adequately safeguard, and distinctly label "Japanese Military Narcotics".
- (2) Prepare inventory in triplicate on inventory form (inclosure 1) marking across face of inventory form "Japanese Military Narcotics". Distribution of inventory form will be in accordance with paragraph b(2) (c) below.

- (3) Report such inventories of narcotics as a separate section of the weekly report of captured enemy material as prescribed in paragraph 21a of Operation Directive Number 28 (18 Nov 1945) this headquarters.

b. With regard to Japanese civilian stocks of narcotics:

(1) Take into custody and inventory all stocks of:

- (a) Crude and raw opium.
- (b) Crude morphine.
- (c) Crude codein.
- (d) Crude cocaine or coca leaves.
- (e) Semi-processed narcotics.
- (f) Adulterated narcotics.
- (g) Smoking opium and/or opium prepared for smoking.
- (h) Heroin (all types) not now in regular commercial channels of distribution.

(2) Inventories will be prepared in quintuplicate on form "Report of Narcotics Taken into Custody" (Incl #1) and disposed of as follows:

- (a) One copy to the owner.
- (b) One copy to this headquarters.
- (c) Original and two copies to accompany stocks on transfer.

c. All stocks of narcotics will be shipped in accordance with instructions contained in paragraph 13a (Medical) Operational Directive Number 28, this headquarters, 18 November 1945.

d. Responsible commanders will take the necessary precautions to protect narcotics while in transit.

4. The Commanding General, USASCOM "C", will:

a. Receipt for and properly store and safeguard all stocks of Japanese narcotics delivered to the 29th Medical Depot, Yokohama.

b. Store separately all narcotic stocks received labeled "Japanese Military Narcotics" pending disposition instructions from this headquarters.

c. Immediately forward one copy of inventory on form (Incl #1) received with stocks, to SCAP (Attn: Public Health & Welfare Section).

d. Destroy all stocks of narcotice received (Preferably by burning) which are in the following categories.

- (1) Semi-processed narcotics not suitable for storage.
- (2) Adulterated narcotics.
- (3) Smoking opium or opium prepared for smoking.
- (4) Heroin.

e. Report the destruction of all such narcotic stocks on inventory form (Incl #1) and distribute:

- (1) One copy to SCAP (Attn: Public Health & Welfare Section).
- (2) One copy to this headquarters (Attn: Surgeon).

5. Attention is directed to the subject of heroin. A memorandum, AG 441.1 (2 Nov 1945) PH, copy attached (Incl #2), has been dispatched to the Imperial Japanese Government. All heroin transferred to United States Forces by the Imperial Japanese Government will be receipted for, transferred to 29th Medical Depot, Yokohama, disposed of and reported in accordance with paragraphs 3b and 4, above.

6. Target date for storage and/or destruction of narcotics, referred to in paragraph 3b(1) above, is 15 December 1945.

SUBJECT : Disposition of Heroin in Japan.

1. The following instructions are issued for the disposition of all heroin in Japan.

a. The possession, use, sale, purchase, gift, receipt, distribution or transportation of diacetylmorphine hydrochloride (heroin), and any salt, compound, preparation, or combination thereof is prohibited.

- (2) Date of removal and place from which removed.
- (3) Date and place of final delivery into custody of United States Forces.
- (4) Name and title of official transferring custody.
- (5) Name, Rank, and organization of Officer receiving custody of heroin.

2. Operational Directive No 32/1, this headquarters, 9 January 1946, subject as above, is amended as follows:

a. Paragraph 3c is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

MILITARY GOVERNMENT ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

1. This directive is formulated for the purpose of establishing uniformity of military government in the areas of Japan for which the Eighth Army is responsible and assuring its continuity during the progressive redeployment of United States forces in Japan.

2. Commanding generals of corps and USASCOM-C, will not delegate their responsibility for military government.

3. Specially trained military government teams consisting of military government companies and groups have been attached to corps and USASCOM-C, and will be utilized within their capacities along with such other military personnel as may be necessary for the administration of military government with the respective areas of responsibility of corps and USASCOM-C.

4. Each trained military government company of specialists is attached to corps and USASCOM-C, for the purpose of administering the functions of military government in one or more prefectures. Each trained military government group is attached to corps and USASCOM-C, for the purpose of administering the functions of military government on the corps or regional level. These companies and groups are furnished as integral teams and should be utilized as such unless unusual circumstances render it impracticable to do so.

5. Trained military government personnel will not be used for other than military government assignments without the special permission of this headquarters in each instance.

The attached memorandum of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to the Imperial Japanese Government, AG 400 (26 November 1945) PH, requires the submission of a detailed plan of distribution of reserves from Japanese Army-Navy food and clothing stocks for use as relief. Under the plan, responsibility will be placed on Prefectural Governors to supervise the program and to submit monthly reports to the Central Government.

2. Commanding Generals of Corps and USASCOM C, will inform this Headquarters by 30 December 1945 concerning:

a. Reserve inventories set aside in each prefecture in conformity with the above instructions to the Japanese Government.

b. Estimated numbers of unemployed persons, repatriated Japanese, or other dependent persons for whom relief supplies will be required during the period January - June 1946.

3. Pending further instructions from this Headquarters Commanding Generals of Corps and USASCOM C will require the local Japanese authorities to hold the reserve supplies (item 2a above) intact for future use. In the event of an emergency need prior to the inauguration of an approved distribution plan, Commanding Generals of Corps and USASCOM C are authorized to permit the use of limited amounts of these reserve supplies for free distribution to needy persons in conformity with the memorandum to the Japanese referred to above.

2. Receipt is acknowledged of your memorandum, file number 372, dated 26 October 1945, on the subject of materials, supplies and equipment to be turned over to the Imperial Japanese Government by the Allied Forces.
3. The Imperial Japanese Government will furnish this headquarters without delay a detailed inventory of all stocks of staple foodstuffs and clothing listed in paragraph 3 (1) and 3 (2) of memorandum number 372, showing their exact location within each prefecture.
4. Prior to the distribution of any of the listed foodstuffs and clothing, and before 15 December 1945, a distribution plan will be submitted by the Imperial Japanese Government to this headquarters for approval. This plan will make provision for:
 - a. Control of relief distribution to be exercised by a control agency operating through prefectural governments;
 - b. A social welfare agency in each prefecture staffed by personnel selected for their training and skill in the handling of welfare problems, and specifically not for their present or former military or naval status;
 - c. Eligibility for receipt of relief supplies based only upon individual need determined by family budgetary deficiency;
 - d. Prevention of the use of supplies in mass feeding or distribution schemes without specific authority from this headquarters;
 - e. Issuance of relief supplies without cost to the recipient;
 - f. The maintenance of a record for each family to whom supplies are issued containing necessary identifying data;

- (1) Amount of supplies by item on hand at beginning of each month,
- (2) Supplies added to stock during the month by source

- (4) Amount of each item on hand at end of the month,
- (5) Number of families, and persons (dependents) represented in these families, to whom supplies were issued during the month,

It may become necessary at certain times to release limited quantities of above mentioned items, from stocks of occupation forces, for emergency use in the treatment and control of diseases which might affect the health of occupation troops. In such event it will be the responsibility of the Imperial Japanese Government to distribute the supplies expeditiously and to exercise necessary supervision to insure use for the purpose for which released. Re-sale price will not exceed original cost, plus actual cost of distribution.

2. The Chief Health Officer of the area in which the supplies are released will advise the Occupation Force Commander as to the agency authorized to receive and receipt for the supplies and will exercise supervision over the distribution and use thereof. Records will be maintained by each agency or individual engaged in the distribution, showing for each item:

- a. Amount received.
- b. Date of receipt and source.
- c. Amount disposed of.
- d. Date of disposition and recipient.
- e. Cost and sale price.

SMALLPOX CONTROL BY JAPANESE PUBLIC HEALTH AGENCIES

1. The Imperial Japanese Government was directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers on 23 September 1945 (para 2c, AG 710 (22 Sep 45) MG, subject: Public Health Measures) to immediately inaugurate such measures as immunization, disinfection and control of any disease which would be likely to seriously affect civilian health.

2. Smallpox has been reported currently in Hokkaido, Kobe, and elsewhere in Japan.

3. The attention of the Japanese Ministry of Health and Social Affairs has been called to the current situation. Prefectural health officials will be advised by the Ministry of Health to inaugurate the following control measures:

a. Vaccinate all civilians embarking from Hakodate by ferry or otherwise to areas outside Hokkaido.

b. Immediate vaccination of all civilian contacts of cases and suspects of smallpox.

c. Rigid quarantine control of all cases, contacts and suspects of smallpox in accordance with Japanese law.

4. It is desired that Commanding Generals of Corps and USASCOM-C check the control programs of Japanese public health agencies in the areas of their military government responsibility and report to this headquarters any failure by the Japanese to carry out adequately the above control measures.

CONTROL OF TYPHUS FEVER IN JAPAN

1. The prevalence of epidemic louse-borne typhus fever in various regions of Japan requires the immediate inauguration of control measures by Japanese government health authorities among civilian groups in certain areas occupied by this command.

2. The Japanese Imperial Government has been directed by SCAP to institute the following control procedures, Reference: Letter GHQ, SCAP, file AG 710 (21 November 1945) PH to the Japanese Imperial Government, Subject: Prevention and control of Typhus Fever in Japan and Letter, GHQ, SCAP, file AG 710 (29 November 1945) PH, to the Japanese Imperial Government, same subject:

a. Intensive immunization program with typhus vaccine in coal mine and labor camps and such areas of cities and villages in the vicinity of troops where louse-borne typhus fever is present, as follows:

- (1) Yubari
- (2) Hakodate
- (3) Asahigawa
- (4) Kushiro
- (5) Otaru
- (6) Sapporo
- (7) Muroran
- (8) Obihiro

b. Routine month disinfestation with insecticide power, louse, of all occupants of the above mine and labor camps up to and through April 1946.

c. Routine disinfestation with insecticide power, louse, of all civilians crossing the Straits of Tsugaru from Hokkaido to Honshu.

d. Routine disinfestations of all Korean and Chinese repatriates embarked from Japanese ports to their homeland.

e. Appropriate control measures against typhus in other cities, villages and areas where typhus constitutes a threat to troops. (Appropriate procedures are defined in Circular letter No. 19, Office of the Surgeon, GHQ, AFPAC, dated 12 November 1945).

f. Disinfestation by use of insecticide, spray, DDT, residual effect at thirty (30) day intervals of the following:

- (1) All railway cars assigned for use of Allied Military Personnel.
- (2) All ferries operating between Aomori and Hakodate.
- (3) Such other public conveyances that may be assigned for use of Allied Military Personnel.

g. Japanese personnel and prefectural and local health organizations will be utilized to the fullest extent in the effectuation of the civilian program.

3. After each disinfestation outlined under 2 f, the conveyances described in 2 f. (1) and (2) will be plainly and uniformly marked to show date and place of treatment as directed by the Commanding General of USASCOMC. All conveyances described in 2 f (3), will be plainly and uniformly marked to show date and place of treatment as directed by commanding general of area in which located.

4. The issue of DDT powder and equipment including typhus vaccine to Japanese agencies through commands concerned is hereby authorized. The procedure for issue of such supplies will be in accordance with Operational Directive No. 37, this Headquarters dated 17 Dec 45.

5. The United States of America Typhus Commission, based at Field Headquarters in Tokyo, is prepared to send representatives to Hokkaido or elsewhere, upon request, for a limited period of time to assist with the initiation of the program. Requests for assistance by the commission will be made to this headquarters.

6. Commanding Generals of Corps and the Commanding General of USASCOMC will provide supervision necessary to carry out the above provisions in areas of their command.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND WELFARE PROCEDURE IN JAPAN

1. General Considerations

a. Object. The object of this directive is to insure that the health of our forces is not endangered by disease among civilians in the occupation areas.

b. Basic policy. The basic policy is to utilize the public health and welfare rules, regulations, and laws of the Japanese Government supplemented by the directives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and to make the Japanese public health and welfare personnel self-sufficient by the effective use of their own equipment and supplies.

c. Method of operation. All health and welfare programs will be predicated upon the assumption that Japanese medical and welfare personnel equipment and supplies are adequate to establish and maintain civilian health standards necessary to meet the minimum requirements of the occupying forces. Occupational personnel will be employed in a supervisory capacity only.

2. Duties of Occupation Force Commanders

a. Commanding general of corps and the Commanding General of USASCOM C will institute a general checking system and will supervise the execution of the directives issued by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers by Japanese agencies on the regional, prefectural and local levels. Any failure on the part of the Japanese agencies to carry out adequately all instructions will be reported immediately to this headquarters.

b. The following general instructions, relative to operational technique, are set forth for the information and guidance of all concerned.

(1) Operating technique.

(a) In conjunction with the deployment of occupational troops into any areas in Japan, occupation force commanders will require general inspection to be made to determine the health and welfare status of the civilian population and make reports to this headquarters at the earliest practicable date as to the general condition of health and welfare in the various areas concerned. As soon as practicable thereafter, a more detailed check of the area will be made to determine the status of compliance by

Opnl Dir No. 40, Hq Eighth Army, 22 Dec 45, Cont'd

local officials with the instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to the Imperial Japanese Government. Thereafter, continued inspections will be made at such times as is necessary to insure compliance with all instructions.

- (b) Commanding generals of corps and the Commanding General of USASCOM C may issue additional instructions, in line with directives of the Supreme Allied Commander to the Imperial Japanese Government as are necessary to insure compliance in detail on the regional, prefectural and local levels. In the exercise of authority by corps and USASCOM C commanders, a minimum of interference with existing Japanese health and welfare agencies is desirable, and the standards to be maintained will be those which are sufficient only to protect the welfare of the occupational forces. Such additional instructions as are necessary for commanding generals of corps and the Commanding General of USASCOM C to publish will be given generally to the highest authority in the area, with the requirement that that authority is responsible to its own superior agency. In cases of inadequate public health and welfare rules and laws of general application, appropriate reports will be made to this headquarters with recommendations for necessary corrective action.

(2) Other considerations.

(a) Program requirements.

1. A satisfactory public health service in Japan will include:
 - a. Adequate organization of all available civilian health and medical care resources at the national, prefectural and local levels.
 - b. Proper supervision (without interference with functioning of the agency) by commanding generals of corps and the Commanding General of USASCOM C within their areas of responsibility of Japanese civilian staffs and their application of sound technical policies and measures for health protection and medical care services.
2. A satisfactory public welfare program in Japan will include:
 - a. Adequate organization and integration of all available public and private welfare, social insurance and relief agencies at the national, prefectural and local levels.
