



On the question of, raising the assessment to \$10,000 a mile, T. W. Paterson wanted to know if it was the intention to make this apply to railways for lumber companies. London, Dec. 4. The Associated Press learns that in order to prevent another Macedonian uprising in the spring, attended by unspeakable horrors and the danger of a war between Turkey and Bulgaria as a consequence, Russia and Austria have proposed that immediate steps be taken to put into operation a plan which, in its general outline resembles that now enforced in Crete. This proposal is the result of the acceptance by the Sultan three days ago of the Russo-Austrian note consecuing reforms in Macedonia, which was submitted to the Pope after the recent conference between Czar Nicholas and Emperor Francis Joseph.
