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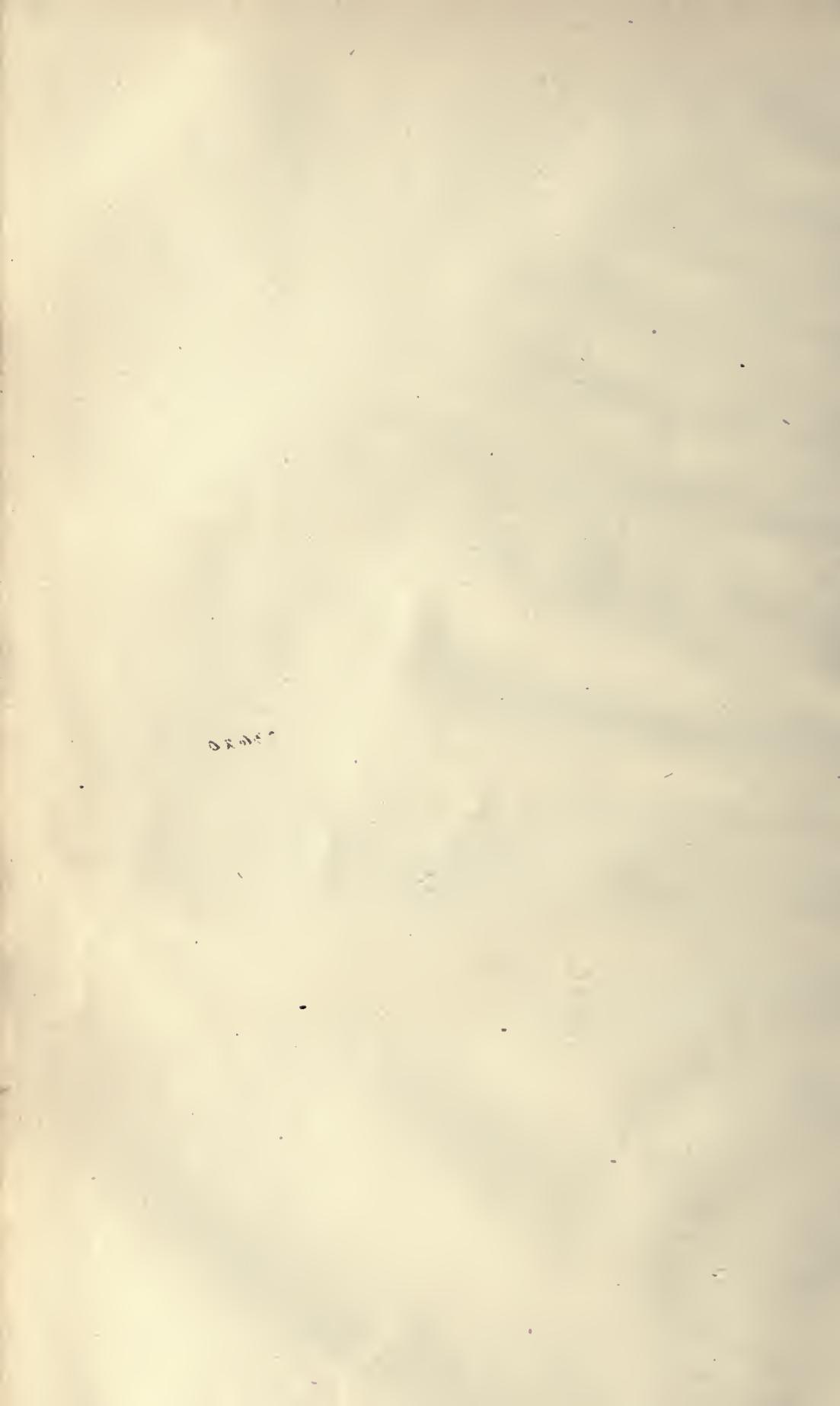

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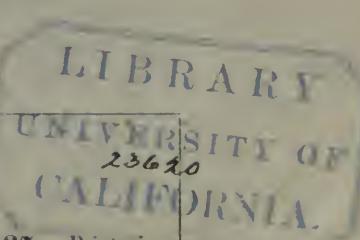

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II. To take books away from the building. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 16 years; all non-resident Clergymen and Teachers having regular occupation in the city; and all inhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools, or who belong to the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the names of two citizens, who may be consulted, if necessary. *The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall.*

III. Members of such other of the higher educational institutions in the city as the Trustees may have especially permitted are entitled to a full or a partial use of the Library.

The Prince Library.

The completed catalogue of this Library, now a part of our collection, is ready for delivery. It is a volume of the same form as the Bates Hall catalogues, and contains one hundred and seventy-five pages. The introduction gives a succinct history of the Library. The first part, embracing the titles of books printed in, or relating to, America, has been considerably corrected since its tentative issue in August, 1868, and we are indebted to several scholars versed in early New England books for assistance rendered. The second part shows mainly the ancient theological library of the Old South Church, all the works in which were printed abroad, and a large number of them in Latin. The third part is a synoptical summary of the manuscripts of the collection, and what these precious memorials contain is now for the first time made completely manifest, each document being numbered and described.

Books Recommended.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be immediately purchased; and the assurance is given, that, unless there is some special reason why it should not be ordered, it will be procured as soon as possible, and the applicant—in all cases where the book is absolutely bought upon his recommendation—will be notified of its reception. If *duplicates for the Lower Hall* are asked for, they will be ordered, provided our records show a circulation of the present copies to warrant such additions. In asking that a duplicate shall be purchased, the applicant will be particular to designate it as such. We do not duplicate copies in the Bates Hall.

Those availing themselves of this privilege will greatly contribute to avoid delay and disappointment, if, in their applications, they will give exact titles, as well as authorship, imprint, etc., and if they will, above all, *write legibly*.

Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes and catalogued. It is our intention in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These we shall put on the shelves in boxes, and substitute for the box the bound volume, when the needful numbers are procured. *We renew our solicitations for lots of pamphlets, which we will willingly send for, if informed that they are ready for us.* The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets we want, and the others will avail us in exchanges. We have some 30,000 (more or less) duplicate pamphlets, all arranged, and are ready to exchange them for others that we have not. With distant libraries, we have found the following method of exchange the most convenient: If they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their State, we will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

To Boston Authors.

We have begun the preparation of the second supplement of the Bates Hall catalogue, and it is extremely desirable that the new volume should contain all the productions of Boston writers—books or pamphlets—not enumerated in the two earlier volumes. We shall be glad to receive such, or to be told of the titles of any that we do not now possess.

Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print, photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates our local history or topography. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions. It is to be hoped our citizens will help us in our attempts to gather everything of this kind.

Special Students

Desiring to be informed when any book in their line of investigation is received in the Library can have word sent them, if they will communicate their name and address, and the subject of their inquiries, to the Superintendent.

The Interleaved Catalogue.

It is intended to substitute a card catalogue for the present interleaved catalogue of the Bates Hall, as it will thus be possible to present a perfect alphabetical arrangement, which with the increase of titles soon becomes difficult or impossible in the interleaved form. The copying or transferring of the titles is a work of considerable care and magnitude, but it will be pressed forward as rapidly as possible. Accessions will hereafter be entered on the cards and not in the present catalogue.

N. B.—The books whose titles are embraced in this List are, for the most part, either recent American and foreign publications, or they are works both old and rare; but, in some cases, for particular reasons, titles of books have been given which are included in neither of these categories. Certain classes of works have been uniformly omitted, such as continuations of periodicals, the earlier volumes of which are given in the printed Catalogues of the Library; also, booksellers' catalogues, duplicate copies of the same edition of a book, and the like.

Books on shelves numbered 2110 and upwards are in the Bates Hall; those on shelves below 2110 are in the Lower Hall.—A single dash indicates the omission of the preceding heading; a subsequent dash, the omission of a subordinate heading.—R. R. means Reading Room.—In the headings of titles, the German diphthongs ä, ü, are written ae, oe, ue. Initials inclosed within marks of parentheses stand for Christian names which are not usually retained by the persons to whom they properly belong; as, Bartsch, F. (J. A.) von.—8°, 12°, 10°, etc., designate the form of a book, or the actual or probable fold of the sheet as shown by the signatures, and do not always indicate the size or shape of the bound volume. The epithets "large," "small," or the like, are sometimes added for the sake of greater precision.

All books in this list, except the few which are starred, can be had without special application.

Our Art Department, and its Literature.

THE present Bulletin gives the public a partial knowledge of the extent and character of the collection of engravings recently added to the Library. Its strength lies in the Italian school; and its groupings are rather indicative of the taste of its late owner than suggestive of any systematic growth, its development having doubtless been controlled in some degree by his opportunities. As patron of the school of San Michele in Rome, he stood in intimate relations with two of its scholars, who gained eminence in the art of engraving, Merenlli and Calamatta, and he doubtless had their assistance in gathering, whence he could, specimens of their art, while they, furthermore, did not leave him without the earliest impressions of their numerous works. When the titles of that portion of the collection which is in frames, is given in a subsequent Bulletin, this fact will appear more prominently than in the present list. A distinctive feature of the collection is beyond doubt its portraits, which are mostly framed. A list of these is intended for the next Bulletin. Edelinck, Drevet, Nanteuil, and Schmidt are here strongly represented. In a still subsequent Bulletin, it is hoped to catalogue the rest of the collection, framed and unframed. The earlier Italian masters will not be found to be well represented. There are no Marc Antonios, except a few of his fac-similes of Dürer. Of the latter's wood-cuts there are between twenty and thirty, large and small. There is little or nothing of his contemporaries or immediate successors. The English school is but slightly represented; and etchings, beside a volume of Salvator Rosa's and a few of Rembrandt's, are not numerous. The modern French school from Audran to Lelli is well set forth.

An attempt has been made to supplement this collection very fully with general lexicons of art and monographs on particular artists, and the latest additions to our already good selection will be found in the main list of this Bulletin.

We have been aiming at making our Architectural department the best in the city, as it perhaps now is. In addition to text-books and descriptive works in general and in details, there are not a few special monographs on celebrated buildings, which have an historical as well as artistic interest.

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The Library Opens at 9 o'clock, A. M.,

Every secular day throughout the year, except the five legal holidays,—Washington's birth-day, Fast day, Independence day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas,—and such other days as the Trustees may direct.

The Reading Room for periodicals, provided with seats for one hundred readers, and having by far the best collection of American and foreign periodicals in the country, is closed at 10 o'clock, P. M.

The Lower Hall delivery of books ceases at 8 o'clock, P. M. This hall now contains 31,000 volumes. Books may be returned after 8.30 A. M., but the delivery does not begin till 9 o'clock. Persons leaving applications between those hours will find the books ready for delivery at a later hour.

The Bates Hall delivery of books for *home use*, as well as for use in the hall, ceases at 6 o'clock, P. M., from October to March, inclusive, and at 7 o'clock, P. M., from April to September, inclusive. This hall now contains 133,000 volumes.

Persons Admitted to use the Library.

I. *To use periodicals or books in the building.* Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and, if above 16, may make use of the books within the building, without previous registration.

II. *To take books away from the building.* All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 16 years; all non-resident Clergymen and Teachers having regular occupation in the city; all Inhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. *The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall.*

III. Members of such other of the higher educational institutions in the city as the Trustees may have especially permitted, are entitled to a full or a partial use of the Library.

Books Recommended.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be immediately purchased; and the assurance is given, that, unless there is some special reason why it should not be ordered, it will be procured as soon as possible, and the applicant—in all cases where the book is absolutely bought upon his recommendation—will be notified of its reception. If *duplicates for the Lower Hall* are asked for, they will be ordered, provided our records show a circulation of the present copies to warrant such additions. In asking that a duplicate shall be purchased, the applicant will be particular to designate it as such. We do not duplicate copies in the Bates Hall.

Those availing themselves of this privilege, will greatly contribute to avoid delay and disappointment, if, in their applications, they will give exact titles, as well as authorship, imprint, etc., and if they will, above all, *write legibly*.

Special Students,

Desiring to be informed when any book in their line of investigation is received in the Library, can have word sent them, if they will communicate their name and address, and the subject of their inquiries, to the Superintendent.

Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and catalogued. It is our intention in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These we shall put on the shelves in boxes, and substitute for the box the bound volume, when the needful numbers are procured. *We renew our solicitations for lots of pamphlets, which we will willingly send for, if informed that they are ready for us.* The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets we want, and the others will avail us in exchanges. We have some 30,000 (more or less) duplicate pamphlets, all arranged, and are ready to exchange them for others that we have not. With distant libraries, we have found the following method of exchange the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, we will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

To Boston Authors.

We have begun the preparation of the Second Supplement of the Bates Hall Catalogue, and it is extremely desirable that the new volume should contain all the productions of Boston writers—books or pamphlets—not enumerated in the two earlier volumes. We shall be glad to receive such, or to be told of the titles of any that we do not now possess.

Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print, photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates our local history or topography. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions. It is to be hoped our citizens will help us in our attempts to gather everything of this kind.

Lists of Books Newly Published,

And received between the successive issues of the Bulletin, will be kept, in the order of their accession, in a separate record for each Hall, open for public inspection. Books from London and Leipsic are received twice a month; from Florence, once a year. The war in Europe having interrupted all communication with Paris, no books or periodicals will be received as long as the siege of that city lasts; and invoices from Leipsic may possibly be intercepted. It is not improbable that the publication of some French journals may be suspended or discontinued.

Engraved Portraits.

Portfolios and scrap-books have been prepared for the preservation of engraved portraits, and any contributions of this kind will be gladly accepted. Particular attention will be paid to the gathering of likenesses of Bostonians.

The epithets "large," "small," and the like, are sometimes added for the sake of greater precision.

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Annual Report and Catalogues.

Since the issue of the last Bulletin, the Eighteenth Annual Report of the Trustees has been printed, with statistics of the increase and use of the Library, covering an interval of the nine months previous to the beginning of the newly-established Library year, May 1st. The figures given in it show the still-increasing importance of an institution which at this time possesses about 170,000 volumes.

A new Class List of the Lower Hall, embracing Poetry, the Drama, Rhetoric, Elocution, Collections (published as such), Periodicals, and the large number of books too miscellaneous to be otherwise classed, was published on the 1st of September.

A useful List of all the Periodicals Currently Received in the Library, and placed both in the Reading Room and on the shelves of the General Collection, has likewise been issued, comprising nearly 750 titles. It includes Reviews, Magazines, Journals, etc., and the issues—except mere reports—of learned societies and other bodies; but it does not, as a rule, include public documents, or almanacs, or books published serially, or the like. Appended to it is a list of the Books of Reference kept in the Reading Room, and at the Desk in the Bates Hall, including 150 titles, and about 400 volumes, not counting duplicates, of which there are many.

The Franco-Prussian War.

We are endeavoring through our foreign agencies to secure the best of the pamphlet discussions of this war, as well as the most important of the books. We have already formed a considerable collection of American, English, French, and German maps of the seat of war. We hope to be assisted by friends of the Library.

Indicator Finding List.

A manuscript List of the numbers represented on the Indicator and of the titles of the books corresponding to these numbers has been prepared as subsidiary to the Class List for Fiction, and will be found on the shelf in front of the Indicator.

As the pins of the Indicator always have the ends bearing *black figures*, on a *white ground* turned *outwards* when the books are on the shelf, this List will furnish the means of readily ascertaining what books are at any time in the alcoves represented by the Indicator. This information cannot easily be derived from the Class List, which is arranged alphabetically under authors and titles, and not numerically according to the order of the books on the shelves. Hence, to learn whether a given work of fiction is on the shelf, find its title and number in the Class List, and then consult the Indicator. But to learn the title of a book answering to any number on the Indicator, consult only the Indicator Finding List.

Public Card Catalogue for the Lower Hall.

A Card Catalogue, containing only the *titles* of works (not anonymous) which have been added to the Lower Hall since the issue of the various Finding Lists, has been placed at the Clerk's Desk in the Distributing Room. In the printed Bulletins, such works are entered only under the names of their authors. These printed entries have been cut out and inserted in alphabetical order in a book which is in the custody of the Clerk, and which can be consulted on application to him. This book, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Library since the publication of the several Finding Lists.

The Prince Library.

A volume containing two tracts—the titles of which are given below—has been returned to this collection. The book is in the original binding, bears Prince's autograph, and the plate of the "South Church Library." It was discovered among some old books received at the New Bedford Public Library, and these marks of ownership having been brought by the Librarian to the notice of the Trustees of that institution, they promptly directed its transfer to the Prince Library. It is to be hoped that the same courtesy and sense of right will cause the restoration by others of all books properly belonging to this Library, many of which must now be in private hands.

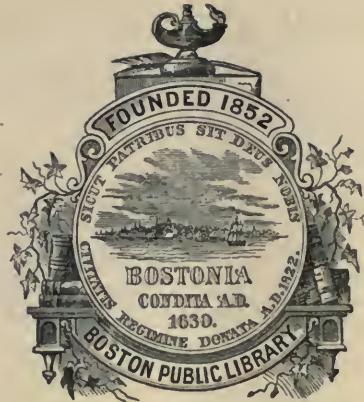

Increased Use of the Library.

The increase in the use made of the Bates Hall collection during the last five years has been very marked, as is shown by the following figures: Between May 1st and September 30th, there were 5733 issues in 1866; 7513 in 1867; 10,869 in 1868; 17,355 in 1869, and 20,348 in 1870. The increased use of the Reading Room for periodicals is shown for the month of September by 4833 readers in 1866; 5421 in 1867; 6681 in 1868; 9289 in 1869, and 14,889 in 1870. In the Lower Hall, during September in 1867 there were 6753 issues; for the same month, 1868, 11,274 issues; 1869, 13,110 issues, and 1870, 16,402 issues, and the large number of persons here indicated have been supplied during the month last past at an average detention of not over five minutes each.—*Saturday Evening Gazette, October 15th.*

The Bulletins are for Sale

In the Library, at two cents each. The List of Periodicals currently received is also for sale at five cents. The Supplementary Index to the books in the Bates Hall (issued in 1866) is for sale at \$2.00, and the Catalogue of the Prince Library at \$1.00. The main Index of the Bates Hall (issued in 1861) is out of print, but a limited number of copies of both the Index and Supplement circulate like other books. The Class or Finding Lists for English Prose Fiction, and for Poetry, the Drama, Collected Works, etc., are for sale, in the Lower Delivery Room, at ten cents each; the Finding List for Biography and Travels at five cents; and that for Works in Foreign Languages at two cents. The Finding Lists for the Sciences, Arts, and Professions, and for History and Politics are out of print; but new editions will be issued as soon as possible.

All departments are open every secular day except the five legal holidays,—February 22, Fast Day, July 4, Thanksgiving, and Christmas,—and such other days as the Trustees may direct.

South Boston Branch will be opened, in part, during the present month.

Extent of the Collections. The Bates Hall contains 143,000 volumes; the Lower Hall, 32,000 volumes; the East Boston Branch, 6,700 volumes; the South Boston Branch, 4,500 volumes,—a total (including 7,300 sale duplicates) of more than 193,000 volumes, besides 99,000 pamphlets.

The Central Reading Room has about 330 different periodicals; the East Boston Branch Reading Room has 37; the South Boston Branch has 25.

Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. *To use periodicals or books in the buildings.* Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and, if above 16, may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. *To take books away from the buildings.* All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 16 years; all non-resident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. *The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.*

III. *Non-residents.* Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests), may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

CATALOGUES.

Bulletins.

A fresh *list of accessions* is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library. Those for the Lower Hall and for the East Boston Branch show only the books added to those departments.

The *printed quarterly Bulletins* reached the end of the first volume with No. 19; and the present, No. 21, is the second number of the second volume. For sale (excepting No. 2, 3, 19, and 20, out of print,) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; and above 2110 are in the Bates Hall. Those with **E. B.** prefixed to the number are in the East Boston Branch.

Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do *not* contain such cross-references, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library have been inserted among the printed cards in their proper alphabetical places; and in due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this card catalogue.

V. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue, which is at present in manuscript.

Note. — A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT circulate like other books.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings is for sale at 5 cents.

Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the Tosti collection of engravings which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

Branches.

A Finding List of the books in the East Boston Branch Library has been printed separately, and is for sale at 20 cents. A Finding List for the South Boston Branch is in preparation.

Central Periodical Reading Room.

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room), issued in September, 1870, is for sale at five cents.

Note. — Copies of these various Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's Desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the East Boston Branch.

The Catalogue System.

The so-called Dictionary System, upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made, is thought to be more simple than any other.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the Dictionary System guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows:—

I. *The title.* If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work (if it is, the subject should be looked for rather than the title), search for it under the first word not an article or a preposition.

II. *The author.* Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a pseudonym, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. *The subject.* Find this under the *most specific head*, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the *horse*, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so, as, for instance, Coins and Numismatics, but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher. Indeed, a multiplication of cross-references is a fundamental idea of the Dictionary System. This necessitates, of course, the disadvantage of turning from one part of the catalogue to another, but there is, on the other hand, a great advantage in the certainty of getting a clew somewhere, — a thing often impossible in a classified catalogue, except to such as have made its system a study.

Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library in the examination of the Catalogues, to such an extent as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any individual reader; and it is enjoined upon all visitors not to occupy the attendants' time with conversation of any other kind.

THE TOSTI ENGRAVINGS.

The following list covers that portion of the collection of engravings made by the late Cardinal Tosti, of Rome, and given to this Library by Mr. Thomas G. Appleton, consisting of the framed prints in the Bates Hall and the officers' apartments adjoining, which are not portraits.

The entries are under the names of the engravers, with cross-references from the names of painters, or designers, and from the subjects of the engravings.

Bulletins numbers 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the Tosti collection of engravings which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints.

A list of the Portraits has been separately published. The framed prints, not being portraits, which are in the Lower Halls of the Library, are partly catalogued; and they may probably be given in the next Bulletin. There is, in addition, a small number of engravings, not framed, which will be catalogued and printed as soon as possible.

The Medical Alcoves.

The following report is from the pen of Joel Seaverns, M.D., of Roxbury, who has kindly made a very careful examination of the Medical Department of the Library.

The Department of Medicine in the Library is especially rich in the classical works of authors of former times. It contains the works of Galen, Celsus, Hippocrates, Paracelsus, Fabricius ad Aquapendente, Eustachius, Sennertus, Boerhaave, Willis, Cullen, John Brown, Vesalius, and other old authors, many being so rare and valuable, from their antiquity and their quaint style, that one cannot speak of them too enthusiastically.

It has also the productions of the great French masters, Amussat, Andral, Biéhat, Boyer, Bourgeny, Bretonneau, Broussais, Brown-Séquard, Cabanis, Chassaignac, Chassier, Chomel, Chopart, Civiale, Cruveilhier, Cullerier, Desault, Desgenettes, Dubois, Dupuytren, Fodér, Guérin, Joubert, Larrey, Lebert, Lisfranc, Malgaigne, Mandi, Marjolin, Nélaton, Paré, Pelletan, Pinel, Piorry, Portal, Richeraud, Ricord, Roux, Sédiillon, Trouseau, Velpeau, Vieq d'Azyr, and others, — a list embracing so much that is historical and brilliant in medicine, surgery, and literature; men famous on the battlefield or in the hospital, from the fifteenth to the nineteenth century. Besides these, mention should be made of a collection of Mémoires and Mélanges in fifty-three volumes, many by the most eminent men of the times, selected by Baron Dupuytren, some of which are dedicated in the handwriting of the authors to that "viro prae nobilissimo, per illustris, celeberrimo."

The great English anatomists and surgeons are represented by the works of the Bells, Brodie, Cheeselden, the Coopers, Curling, Erichsen, Gliesson, Guthrie, Harvey, Hodgson, Hey, the Hunters, Lawrence, Percival Pott, Solly, Skey, Syme, Travers, and Wistar.

Among German authorities are Billroth, Canstatt, Cohu, Eckhard, Frank, Gurit, Henle, Hirsch, Kölliker, Liliarzik, Müller, Niemeyer, Reichert, Rindfleisch, Rokitansky, Schwann, Spiess, Stricker, Traub, Valenta, Virchow, Vogel, Wagner, Weber, and Wunderlich.

A long list might be made of American authors, especially of the leading physicians of the Philadelphia, New York, and Boston schools; the publications of those of our own city being of course very numerous, and embracing nearly everything that has been published here.

The value of the collection is especially enhanced by its numerous volumes of plates, and atlases of illustrations, many of which are of great cost and beauty and of superb execution. Mascagni's "Anatomia Universa," with colored plates, is probably the finest and most valuable work of the kind in New England; there is also his "Iconographia vasorum lymphaticorum," Lebert's "Traité d'Anatomie pathologique," with one hundred and six engravings and colored plates; Albinus's splendid "Anatomical Tabes," Sandifort's "Museum Anatomicum," Cruveilhier's superb work. Bourgeny and Jacob's Atlas of Descriptive Anatomy, Braune's Atlas of Topographical Anatomy, Quain's Surgical Anatomy, Haller's works with Anatomical plates (said by John Bell to surpass all others in utility), Auvert's "Seiecta Praxis Medico-Chirurgical," Smellie's Midwifery, Malgaigne on Fractures, Swan on the Nerves, Hunter on the Gravid Uterus, the works of Bonamy, Broca, and Bean, Cullerier, Fan, Hyrtl, Masset, Moreau, Kleord, Ruysschius, and Soemmering, as well as the famous engravings of Sir Charles Bell and Scarpa.

One of the most useful portions of this collection to the general practitioner, as well as to writers, is that of medical journals and the current serial literature of the profession. Its bulk, even more than its cost, forbids private individuals from filling the shelves of their libraries with it, yet it is almost indispensably necessary to be able to refer to it.

There are here, from Great Britain, complete sets of the "Medico-Chirurgical Review," "Braithwaite's Retrospect," the Sydenham Society's publications, the "London Lancet," the "Edinburgh Medical and Surgical Journal," the "Dublin Quarterly Journal of Medical Science," the Transactions of the Obstetrical and Pathological Societies of London, Winslow's "Psychological Journal," the "Medical Times and Gazette" (from 1840), Guy's "Hospital Reports," (from 1836), St. George's complete, as well as those of St. Bartholomew's, St. Thomas's, and the London Ophthalmic Hospital.

From Italy there is the "Bullettino delle Scienze Mediche" (from 1829 to 1867). France is represented by the Mémoires de l'Academie de Médecine (from 1828), Bulletin of the same (from 1834), "Annales d'Hygiène Publique" (from 1853), "Recueil de Mémoires de Médecine, de Chirurgie, et de Pharmacie Militaires" complete, "Gazette Médicale" (from 1853 to 1858), "Lancette Française" (from 1853), Bourchardat's "Manuel de Matière Médicale" (from 1841), "Journal de Médecine et de Chirurgie pratiques" (from 1855), eleven volumes of Magendie's "Journal de Physiologie," and the "Bulletin de la Société Anatomique de Paris."

Of German journals, there are Schmidt's "Jahrbuch der Gesammten Medicin" (from 1858), Schlüter's "Archiv für Mikroskopische Anatomie" complete, "Jahresbericht von Physiologischen Wissenschaften," "Central-blatt für die Medicinischen Wissenschaften," Müller's "Archiv für Pathologische Anatomie und Physiologie" complete, "Journal für Kinderkrankheiten" (from 1843), twelve volumes of the "Archiv der Heilkunde," Frank's "Magazin für Arzneimittelkunde," the "Zeitschrift für Biologie," and Frerich's "Archiv für die gesammte Physiologie."

From the American press are complete files of the "American Journal of Medical Sciences," the "American Journal of Insanity" (from 1853), the "American Journal of Obstetrics," the "American Journal of Syphilis and Dermatology," the "Pharmaceutical Journal," the "Veterinary Journal" (from 1850), the "New York Medical Times" to its end, the "Medical Record," the "Boston Medical and Surgical Journal," and the Journal of the Gynaecological Society.

Of these journals, both foreign and native, mention has been made of the principal only, or such as are complete, or have been continued through a number of years, forming really but a small part of those which are now taken at the Library, and are being made up into volumes.

Of Dictionaries and Encyclopædias, there are many, some of the best being the following: the "Dictionnaire de Médecine," in thirty volumes, by Adelon, Beequare, etc., the "Dictionnaire de Médecine et de chirurgie pratiques," in fifteen volumes, by Andral, Begin, etc., the "Dictionnaire des Sciences Médicales," in sixty volumes, by Adelon, Alibert, etc., the "Encyclographic des Sciences Médicales," in twenty-two volumes, eleven volumes of the "Nouveau Dictionnaire de Médecine et de Chirurgie pratiques" by Bernutz, Boeckel, etc., Todl's "Cyclopædia of Anatomy and Physiology, Dunglison's "Cyclopædia of Practical Medicine," the "Encyclopædia Anatomique," of Soemmering, Weber, Bischoff, etc., in a French translation, Nysten's "Dictionnaire de Médecine, de Chirurgie, et de Pharmacie," Cooper's "Surgical Dictionary," Copland's and Hooper's Medical Dictionaries. Here also may not improperly be mentioned Beale's "Archives of Medicine," Reynold's "System of Medicine," Holmes's "System of Surgery," Virchow's "Handbuch der Speciellen Pathologie und Therapie," and the new "Handbuch der Allgemeinen und Speciellen Chirurgie," by Billroth and other surgeons.

Considering the collection by topics, of general literature, including addresses, and the philosophy, history, and progress of medicine, the amount is very large, and much of it very interesting and valuable; in medical biography,

beyond that of America (of which there is a great variety both in pamphlet and book-form), there is little except the "Éloges" of Dubois, Louis, Pariset, and Vicq d'Azyr. With works on the pathology and treatment of disease the Library is very fully supplied, both in the general works of the best authors, and in monographs on special diseases. The department of Obstetrics and Diseases of Children is also large, as is also that of Gynaecology, though the latter is not so full in recent works. General Anatomy and Surgery may perhaps be considered the best supplied branch of this department of the Library, containing the works of the most eminent European and American writers, many most beautifully illustrated, together with an excellent collection on Military Surgery. The literature of the Eye and Ear, especially that of the latter, is not so full, but embraces very many standard works. *Materia Medica* is represented by the various national Pharmacopœias, many works on Medical Botany with costly plates, and the writings of many of the best authors, and Toxicology, by a smaller number of works, which are, however, very valuable and complete. On Diseases of the Skin, most of the best authorities are present. On Cow-Pox and Vaccination, there are fewer, Ballard and Seaton being the only recent authors. The variety of works on State Medicine is not large, except as regards Hygiene, and the construction of hospitals, on which much has been collected; with regard to Lunacy, there is but little, especially concerning the vexed question of the "cottage system," on which Duval's "Gheel" stands alone. Only one of the reports of the Medical officer of the Privy Council of Great Britain, works everywhere referred to, appears in the medical alcoves, though all are present in a less accessible form among the Parliamentary Documents. In Pathological Anatomy, there is an excellent collection of the standard authors, but the constant advances in this study require constant additions. Many exceedingly valuable books on Physiology and Histology are upon the shelves, including some of those of the recent continental authors, but many others should be added. There are Ludwig's, Reichert's and Stricker's reports of the Institute at Leipzig, Breslau, and Vienna, but not those of Gscheidlin at Würzburg, Hoppe, Seyler at Tübingen, or Hensen at Kiel. A large number of Eclectic, Hydropathic, and Homeopathic works are also to be found on the shelves.

From this *résumé*, it will be seen that, as regards the actual wants of the practitioner in his studies for his daily practice, the supply in the Public Library is indeed abundant. Its deficiencies appear only to investigators of special topics, or to those who seek for all that has been written by the authors they are consulting. Of the principal medical authors there may be some who do not appear at all; but for the most part the want is not so much of a variety of writers as of a greater number of their works. Of the many works of Scarpa, but one, his "De Auditu et Olfactu" is here in the original; Billroth and Chaussier are represented by but two works each; Cheselden, Chepart, Cullerier, Dubois, Fodér, Liharzík, Pelletan, Rindfleisch, Schwann, Traube, and Wunderlich, each by one work only. Constant additions should also be made of recent foreign works, especially those from Germany, to make these alcoves as rich in all branches as they already are in some.

These deficiencies are, after all, only spoken of as detracting from what the Library might be, and it is to be hoped will in time become, but they do not lessen its claim to being, as it is, the best collection of medical works in New England, and a treasure-house to every physician who avails himself of its privileges, to advance his knowledge of his profession, or to pursue medical and scientific investigations.

Alterations of the Central Library Building.

The work on the alcoves on the westerly side of the Bates Hall being completed, public notice was given, March 8, of the reopening of the alcoves, the use of which, since September 13, had been very much restricted. On the 25th of March the work of removing and rearranging the books in the alcoves on the eastern side was begun, preparatory to the work of the contractors, which was begun March 27, by erecting a temporary staging for maintaining access to the front parts of the alcoves, during the progress of alterations. The compact arrangement of the books still left in those alcoves, together with the somewhat uncertain arrangement of those which have been removed, will more or less affect the circulation during the spring and summer. During the interval of more than a fortnight, while both sides of the Bates Hall were again thrown open to unimpeded use, the circulation of books rose unexpectedly to nearly the figures of last year's record for the corresponding period.

The Ticknor Library.

The Catalogue Department has catalogued over 16,000 volumes within the past six months, and the pressure has given little time for the work to be done on the Spanish collection bequeathed by Mr. Ticknor. A slip catalogue is about half completed, however, by which and by aid of the classifications into which the books are assort'd on the shelves, they can now be readily found. A card catalogue has been begun, and will be continued with as much speed as may be practicable. It is not thought desirable to insert the titles in these quarterly Bulletins.

Branch Libraries.

East Boston. This Branch has been in operation for more than a year, and a circulation during twelve months of about 75,000 volumes, indicates the measure of its success.

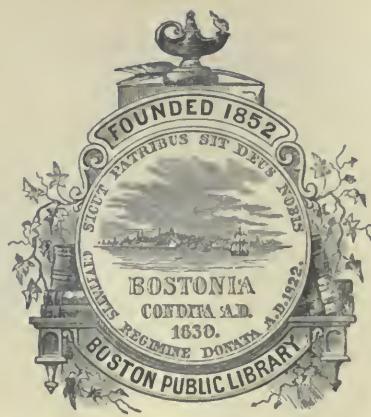
South Boston. It is hoped that, during May, this Branch will be in full operation, a collection of about 4,500 volumes having been formed.

Roxbury. Under an agreement with the city, the Trustees of the Fellowes Athenæum have begun the erection of a suitable building on Bartlett street; and it is hoped to have a collection of books of a popular kind ready to put into it upon its completion in the autumn or early winter. At that time the income of a fund of about \$30,000 for the purchase of the higher class of books will be available.

The use of the East Boston Branch has not diminished in any degree the pressure upon the Central Library; nor are the other Branches likely to have a different effect.

American Patents.

The Commissioner of Patents has designated this Library as one of those to receive the weekly volumes of Patent Specifications and drawings. The conditions imposed are, that the Library shall pay for the binding, and that it shall not allow the volumes to be taken from the building, except by order of the Courts. Each volume bears the official certification of the Commissioner. The original drawings are reproduced by photo-lithography. The time required for manufacture and binding is likely to cause the receipt of each volume to be delayed a few months after its date. The series was begun on the first of last July.



THE TOSTI ENGRAVINGS.

PORTRAITS.

THE following List covers that portion of the collection of engravings made by the late Cardinal Tosti, of Rome, and given to this Library by Mr. Thomas G. Appleton, which consists of portraits; and it includes 676 prints. Some of the portraits are contained in that part of the collection which is in bound volumes, of which the titles or contents were printed in Bulletin No. 13. They may be known by the abbreviation "pl." followed in each case by the number of the plate and the location of the volume. Those numbers which have not this abbreviation prefixed, as 397 (*see Aachen*), represent framed portraits.

The entries are under the names of the subjects of the engravings, with cross-references from the names of painters and engravers, and in certain cases from those of the designers or draughtsmen.

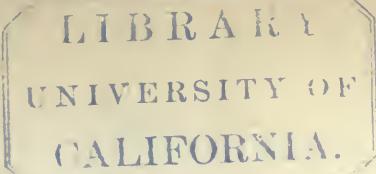

THE TOSTI ENGRAVINGS.

IN a note dated Rome, February 23d, 1869, addressed to the Trustees of the Library, Mr. Thomas G. Appleton wrote, "The late Cardinal Tosti was a great lover of art in Rome, and one of its most distinguished patrons. Under his fostering care, two distinguished engravers, Mereurj and Calamatta, rose to the head of their art in Paris. The effects of the Cardinal are now selling in Rome, and I have thought it desirable for our city, so poor in collections of engravings, that the Cardinal's collection should go to us. I have therefore bought and desire to present it to the Public Library of Boston, one of whose Trustees I was for some time, and in which I have always taken a lively interest. The number of the plates is about ten thousand, six hundred of which are framed. Among these are many of the most famous engravings, such as the '*Last Supper*,' *before the comma*, of Raphael Morghen, and many other of his famous works. Presentation copies of all the works of the two famous protégés of the Cardinal, are also among them. The rest of the collection is in handsomely bound books, well adapted to the use of the Library, and far better for storing and preservation than if in portfolios."

Mr. Appleton added, that "the gentleman who is one of the Cardinal's heirs and his representative, desires, as a testimony of his respect and regard for the Library, to present a bust — an antique one — valued at two hundred seudi."

The Trustees, on the 24th of March, passed the following resolutions : —

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Public Library have received with great gratification the announcement by their townsman, Thos. G. Appleton, Esq., of his proposed munificent gift to this institution, of the collection of engravings formed by the late Cardinal Tosti, thereby laying a foundation for instruction in art highly needed, and useful in any community, but specially in our own, where works of this character are beyond the reach of the large class worthy to be benefited by their study.

Resolved, That the special thanks of the Trustees be communicated to Mr. Appleton, by the President of this Board.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Trustees of the Public Library be presented to Signor Alessandro Ceccarini, for his generous gift to the institution, of an antique bust.

The prints were received at the Library in October following, when it was discovered, that, owing to bad packing, the glass of all the frames had been broken on the voyage. Mr. Appleton promptly added to his already large expenditure, by ordering new glass. The framed pictures were at once disposed in such a manner as the capacity of the building admitted ; and suitable cases

and drawers were provided for the volumes and portfolios, for a considerable part of the collection proved to be preserved in that way.

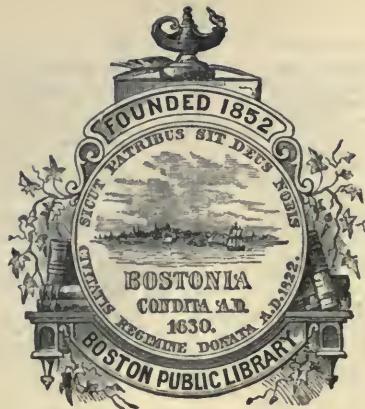
The previous owner of this collection, which, at the time of its purchase, was esteemed the finest in Rome, was the Cardinal (Antonio) Tosti, who died March 23, 1866, aged 90. He resided for a long time at Aventine. In 1834, he was made treasurer of the pontifical government, a post which he continued to hold for ten years, when he resigned it into the hands of Gregory xvi. He is regarded as founder of the industrial and artistic school in the Hospital of San Michele, of which institution he was director at the time of his death. He was buried in the church of St. Cecilia, Trastevere.

The cataloguing of the prints proceeded as fast as the other work of that department of the Library permitted, and in the *Library Bulletin* for April, 1870, a list of such as were in the 125 bound volumes of the collection was given, embracing in all almost 5,100 prints; and in the *Bulletin* for October the cross-references of the previous list were printed.

There were at that time still uncatalogued about 1,200 other prints, more than half of which were framed.

The present issue contains a list of all the portraits in the collection, whether in frames, in volumes, or loose, the larger part, however, being framed. The prints, not portraits, which are framed, number 282. These last, with such prints as are in portfolios, remain to be catalogued.

Regarding the entire collection, it may be said that its strength lies in the Italian school; and its groupings are rather indicative of the taste of its late owner than suggestive of any systematic growth, its development having doubtless been controlled in some degree by his opportunities. As patron of the school of San Michele, in Rome, he stood in intimate relations with two of its scholars, who gained eminence in the art of engraving,—Mercurj and Calamatta,—and he doubtless had their assistance in gathering, whence he could, specimens of their art, while they, furthermore, almost always furnished him with the earliest impressions of their numerous works. A distinctive feature of the collection is, beyond doubt, its portraits. Edelinck, Drevet, Nanteuil, and Schmidt, are here strongly represented. The earlier Italian masters will not be found to be well represented. There are no Marc Antonios, except a few of his fac-similes of Dürer. Of the latter's wood-cuts there are between twenty and thirty, large and small. There is little or nothing of his contemporaries or immediate successors. The English school is but slightly represented; and etchings, beside a volume of Salvator Rosa's and a few of Rembrandt's, are not numerous. The modern French school from Audran to Lelli is well set forth.



THE TOSTI ENGRAVINGS.

Supplementary List. May, 1873.

THE following list covers that portion of the collection of engravings made by the late Cardinal Tosti, of Rome, and given to this Library by Mr. Thomas G. Appleton, consisting of the framed prints (not portraits) in the rooms on the lower floor of the building, and also of those which are in portfolios.

Bulletins numbers 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the engravings which is in bound volumes; Bulletin number 21 includes the framed prints, which are not portraits, in the Bates Hall and the officers' apartments adjoining.

A list of the Portraits has been separately published.

It is hoped at some future day to publish a catalogue embodying all these titles in a single alphabetical list.

The entries are under the names of the engravers, with cross-references from the names of painters, or designers, and from the subjects of the engravings.

In the measurements given, the size of the entire plate from which the engraving has been printed is indicated. In some cases these results are only approximate, because the pictures have been trimmed or covered with a mat. The number first given shows the height of the plate.

The engravings which are in portfolios may be known by the abbreviation Ptf. followed in each case by the number of the plate. The numbers which have not this abbreviation represent the framed pictures.
