LORD ALVERSTONE IS INDIGNANT. ANOTHER REFERENCE TO RECENT CRITICISM. Secretary Root Says the Utmost Open-Mindedness Prevails—Explanation by Mr. Aylesworth.

London, Oct. 13.—The members, counsel and attaches of the Alaska boundary tribunal were entertained by the Lord Mayor of London, Sir Marcus Samuel, at a banquet at the Mansion House tonight. Attorney-General Finlay and Sir Edward Carson were absent, but most of the others associated with the case were present. It was a memorable occasion, attended by all the ancient customs, city liveries, gorgeously appointed footmen, etc. The Lord Mayor proposed the health of President Roosevelt, while the band played "The Star-Spangled Banner." Their Lordships proposed the toast of the Alaska boundary tribunal. He declared that the present method of the submission to a tribunal of a disagreeable dispute between two great nations would be a lasting lesson of peace to the world.

INCREASING ARMY. Thousands of Russia Troops Being Hired in Far East. St. Petersburg, Oct. 13.—Russia is now transporting 50,000 troops, nurses, physicians and hospital supplies to the Far East. The present strength of the Russian army there is reliably reported to be 285,000 men. Owners detailed for duty in the Orient have been forbidden to take their wives.

Regarding Manchuria the foreign office states that the question is at present closed. The existing situation there is the fault of the Chinese, Japanese and British. If China desires to reopen the negotiations and accept certain conditions the situation could still be changed, as Russia is not rooted to the soil and could leave if she liked.

Mysterious Movements. London, Oct. 13.—A dispatch from Moscow to the Times, dated October 10th, states that a large force of Russian troops under orders for the Far East are now on their way thither by rail from Karkoff. The Russian correspondents of the same paper send quotations from newspaper articles pointing to Russia's intention to remain in occupation of Manchuria, and add that it is reported from Vladivostok that as a result of famine in China, many thousands of Chinese have crossed into Manchuria, where their presence constitutes a danger to the Manchurian railway and that war necessities keep Russian troops in Southern Manchuria for an indefinite period.

Only the most sanguine persons believe that in the event of hostilities they could be kept within the limits which would free Great Britain from her obligation to support her Japanese ally. Even Baron Hayashi, who has heretofore ridiculed all rumors of war, is not so optimistic today. Indirectly he admits the possibility of war by expressing the hope that in the event of a crisis Japan will have the active sympathy of the ally, Great Britain.

While refusing to credit the reports of an ultimatum having been delivered, Baron Hayashi admitted that the diplomatic situation had changed since October 8th, and that complications might have arisen from the failure of the Japanese to fulfill their engagement to evacuate Manchuria on that day. He, however, had heard nothing from his government on the subject.

Chiefly the source of the latest alarming news, is several hundred miles from Manchu, so the reports of Japanese military movements there are likely to be a repetition of similar stories circulated last week, which later accounts minimized.

The children returned to the house when the brute stabbed the two-year-old step-daughter to death, and then tortured another by twisting and pinching the face.

FIFTEEN DROWNED. Faval, Awes, Oct. 13.—The American whaler Joseph Manta has wrecked on the Island of Pico, one of the Azores group, and all on board were lost. The Joseph Manta, hulled from Provincetown, Mass., and was of 1,116 tons and built in 1900 at Essex, Mass. She carried a crew of fifteen men.

In Regard to Withdrawal From Manchuria—Interesting Comment of the Oriental Press.

In the English press of the Orient, as represented by the exchanges received by R. M. S. Empress of Japan, there are papers which view the Russo-Japanese situation in an alarming aspect...

The Niroku, another native paper of Japan, is quoted as saying that the United States representative also has indicated to Prince Ching his unqualified disapproval of Russia's latest demands...

As to America's substitution of Anshung for Tatum-kou as an open port, the change is said to have been made at the suggestion of her naval officers, and Admiral Evans has been sent to survey the place, adds the Japan Daily Mail...

Another other proposal said to have been submitted by M. The Jiji Shimpo, a Japanese paper, says that M. Lessar is expressing himself vigorously to obtain China's acceptance of the newly formulated conditions, and that Prince Ching is using equal diligence to obtain a postponement of reply...

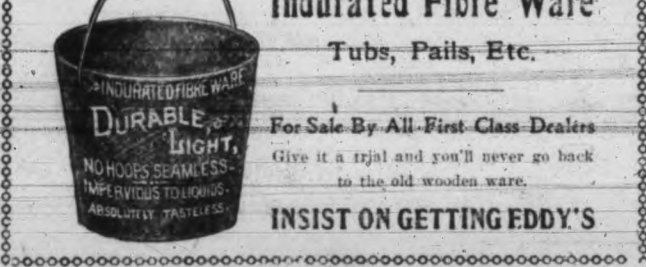

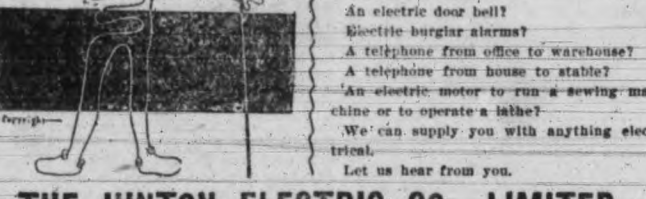
