# Octogenarian Head of Leading Firm Is Called By Death

David Spencer Built Up Great Mercantile Establishment in Coast Cities; Was Prominent Methodist Layman; a Generous Philanthropist.

David Spencer, pioneer merchant of British Columbia, and for many years actively associated with philanthropical and public movements in this Province, passed away at his residence, Moss Street, at noon to-day.

Mr. Spencer had been failing for some time. Two years ago he recovered from a severe attack which prostrated him for some months, but more recently the family had come to realize that the end could not be much longer delayed. Most of the members of the family were at the bedside when he passed peacefully away at a

David Spencer was born at St. Atham, Glamorganshire, South Wales, on August 9, 1837, the son of a farmer whose family had occupied the same whose family had occupied the same members of it still farming in the same district, and it was, do doubt, due to his early life on the farm that he always afterwards took a keen einherest in agriculture. He was educated at the Grammar School in Cowbridge, and, at the age of fourteen, was apprenticed, for a term of five years, to a dry goods business there. When only twenty-two years old he was a local preacher at the Bridgend and Cowbridge circuit of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and all through his later life here he was closely identified with the development of Methodism in British Columbia, especially in Victoria.

Early in 1862 William Wilson, of W. & J. Wilson, sent home such glowing accounts of the fortunes awaiting those who ventured to come to B. C. that young David Spencer, together with William Wilson's brother, Joseph, decided to come out at once, Accordingly fley sailed from Liverpool to New York, thence to Asplinwall, across the Ishmus of Panamaby rail, and from there to San Francisco and Victoria. On their arrival here the great gold excitement of the Carlboo district had considerably subsided, and they decided to remain in Victoria instead of proceeding to the goldfields, as they had intended.

# Seven Men Perished When Steamer Went Down Near Halifax

Halifax. March 2 .- Seven lives are believed to have been lost when the crew of the Leyland liner Bohemian abandoned their ship as she was breaking up on the Sambro Ledge, near here, this morning. Several others were injured.

The ship, which was bound from Boston to Liverpool, ran aground in a blinding snowstorm while endeavoring to put into Halifax Harbor early yesterday morning. Sixty-four passengers were taken off in safety in the morning, but most of the 120 members of the crew remained on board all day.

Late last night a strong swell developed and the ship began to pound heavily on the rocks. At four o'clock this morning it was decided to abandon her. Three boats got away safely but the re-

## SAY WORSE SUGAR **FAMINE IS COMING**

March Supply to Be Only Half That of February, Refinery Tip Intimates

Victoria is yet to face the worst sugar famine, according to whole-salers to-day. The reason is a big new strike that has broken out in Cuba which will cut down all raw supplies from that source.

Official notification of the trouble has not been sent out, but wholesalers wer given the "tip" to-day that a famine more serious than ever was impending. They were informed that the allotment of sugar for March will be only one-half that of February which proved utterly unable to satisfy the demand.

Too Sanguine.

Wholesalers here during the last week have been working under the mpression that the worst of the sugar famine was over. But when the hdvance tip was given them to-lay, orders were issued to tighten up on distribution and to hold what little

time to come. The trade is only now within sight of catching up with the current demands. There has been no chance to accumulate supplies, which would serve to ward off any temporary shortage in the future.

Wants Sugar Hoarder's Names. ## British Committee Says Gasoline Price Too High

London, March 2.—Existing prices of gasoline are condemned as "grossly excessive" in a report submitted by a committee appointed to investigate prices. It says the concentration of control of the supply in hands of enormously powerful combines constitutes such a dangerous power if improperly used that it is imperative that Governments should give attention to it. Recommendation is made that oil prices be regulated by the League of Nations under international agreements.

The Standard Oil Company and the Shell Corporation are named in the report as the combines mainly concerned, and it is declared the existing price of £23 f.o.b. New York is much too high. It is said the committee was informed that the average price ought not to exceed £7 10s





At this stage Mr. Hanes confined his attention for a moment or two to Mr. Farris. The speaker said that when he had previously referred to Mr. Farris' remarks to him on the subject of pressing for information from the Opposition Leader he had not used the Attorney-General's precise remarks. These were, he continued, "For God's sake don't call Bowser, for he knows too much." Mr. Farris promptly rose and said he wished to give the lie direct to this statement. In further explanation, Mr. Farris continued and said; "The honorable member for North Vancouver stated that he was going to make certain charges. I wish to state that his statement is absolutely false. I never made any such statement. I was chairman of that committee, Mr. Bowser was called and I took an active part in seeing that he was called. 





Canada is deriving another bene-fit from the slump the sterling has taken in the New York money market. ## B. C. Lost 22,000,000 Pounds Sugar Through Strike Last Summer

Refineries Have Not Been Able Since to Make Up Loss Caused by Longshoremen Refusing to Handle Cargo; Legislative Investigating Committee Learns Prices are Likely to Go Even Higher.

Twenty-two million pounds of sugar was lost to British Columbia and residents of the three Western Provinces, the territory served by the B. C. Sugar Refinery of Vancouver, 

Sent to San Francisco.

They could have got more if they had wanted it, but there was no startling demand at that time.

## WITHDRAWS HIS **RESIGNATION AS HEALTH OFFICER**

Dr. Price Now Satisfied City Can Assume More Efficient Powers.

Dr. Arthur G. Price, City Health Officer, last night withdrew the resignation which he handed to the was not satisfied that he was getting

Dr. Price's reasons for the withirawal of his resignation are set forth in the following letter received by the City Council last night:

I beg leave to withdraw my resignation of the position of Medica ealth Officer

Health Officer.

"The present section of the Health Bylaw No. 344, dealing with the suppression of epidemics and the powers of the City Board of Health and Medical Health Officer is so ambiguous as to be unworkable," Dr. Price said. "This was, I believe, the opinion of Mr. Hannington, whom I consulted on the first appearance of the epidemic in 1918, and who advised petitioning the Provincial Government to act in the matter rather than attempting to use powers which the bylaw did not definitely state. The Municipal Act grants powers to the edity to frame its bylaws and grant powers to the Medical Health Officer for the prevention of infectious diseases. I would, therefore, recommend that the bylaw No. 344 be amended in the section relating to prevention of infectious diseases with a view to stating definitely actions which may be taken for the check or prevention of epidemic diseases."

## PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE VOTERS' LIST PLAN NOW IN FORCE

City Council Hears From Officials of More Advantageous System

Various changes in the present system under which citizens get their names placed upon the municipal oters' list are suggested in a report on the matter received by the City Council last night from the City Treasurer, City Assessor, Clerk of the Municipal Council and City Solicitor. In regard to assessed property owners the report observes: "If the assessed owner is the holder of the last agreement to purchase land or real property, or the last assignee, such assessed owner, before having his name entered on the Voters' List must file with the Clerk or Assessor of the Municipality, before the closing of the Voters' List, a statutory declaration proving that he, she or it is the holder of the last agreement to purchase land or real property, or is the last assignee thereof, by the terms of which such holder or assignee is liable to pay the taxes, and that there are no taxes delinquent for more than one year in respect of such land or real property. In order that any such person, through ignorance of having to make this declaration, should not lose his right to vote, we think a statement of this requirement should be placed on the annual tax bill (requirements for voting as property holder by agreement to purchase), and that any person having so registered in 1919, or any year thereafter, should have the right to vote each succeeding year if taxes are paid."

## **ESQUIMALT CUTS** TAX RATE BY MILI

17 Mills is Total Rate This Year; School Rate Shows Increase

The Esquimalt Council in a special neeting held last night considered and passed the estimates for the and passed the estimates for the year, and struck a rate of taxation to cover the outlay. A general rate of 11.25 mills has been struck, which is three mills lower than the previous period. The school-rate came to 5.75 mills, which is an increase of nearly two thirds over the preceding year.

The total rate will thus be seventeen mills which is one mill less than the general rate for 1919. The increase in the school rate has been foreseen all along, and at the preliminary sitting regarding the school estimates recently Reeve Lockley stated that he had covered every item with the chairman of the School Board and did not see where any single item could be eliminated. The estimates were passed in their entirety.

An additional \$,4000 was added to the estimates to cover unknown factors in connection with the rate of exchange. This was deemed advisable as the municipality is under the obligation of paying interest on bonds held in New York City.

The latter figure was added to make everything safe, but it is anticipated that the Council will be able to find some way of evading the adverse exchange rate. The general expenditure for the year will come to \$78,412.


