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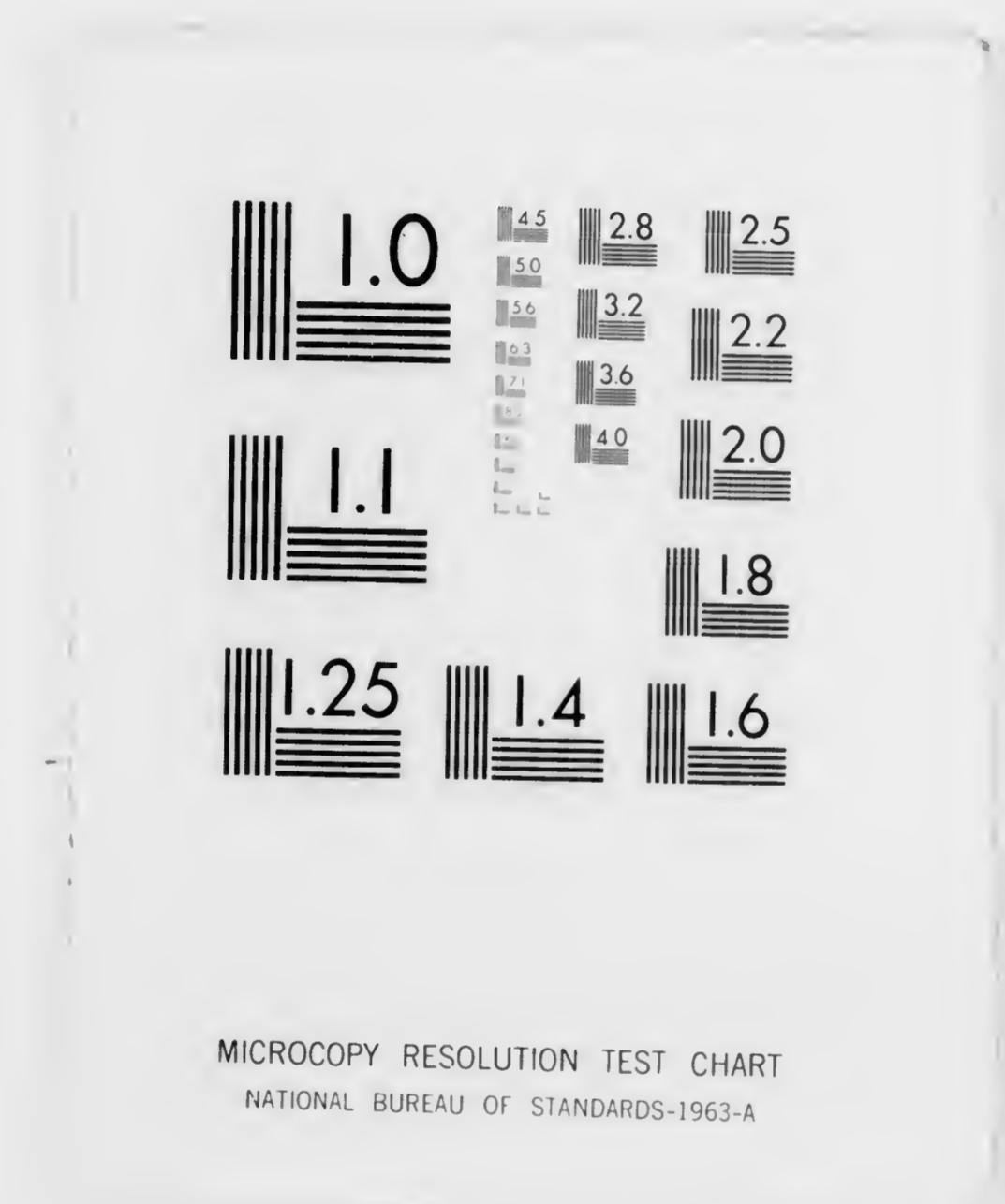

I will try and tell you about them all, and will begin with the

Dear Cousin, I believe you will hardly remember me after an absence of years, but becoming acquainted with your residence and situation by means of Mr Locke your Friend, (with whose Father I am boarding) I could <sup>not</sup> resist my inclination of giving you some account of the different changes that have taken place in the family since you left us. Uncle William & Aunt are still residing at Dorchester. He takes <sup>much</sup> as much pleasure as when you were with us in his boat, and has better health and changed, I think, less than any of the rest of the Family. Tho' nearly 70 years old, few would think <sup>him</sup> from his looks more than 50, and with a constitution unimpaired, I hope he will live to see you amongst us again for many a happy year to come. Uncle John is in a most pitiful <sup>plight</sup> in debt beyond what he will ever be able to pay, living at Dorchester on the Point with his youngest Girl, as all the rest are trying to get their own living in some way or other, while he depends on the Family, principally on Uncle W and his son for his support. There is no prospect that his situation will ever be bettered, and it seems almost cruel that his son W. should toil out several years with the disheartening prospect of having his wages stop to pay his father's debt. William is now employed on the Mississippi River in the Steamboat Navigation. Martha Rogers has married her old suitor G. Bartlett and has removed to Cincinnati, Ohio. Mary Ann has married a son of Mr Parker's Judge of the Supreme Court. The rest of the children are learning trades. In Mr Child's Family, Amariah is dead, the news was brought by a comrade of his who was sick at the same time with him in the hospital at Calcutta. He was completely a reformed man before his death. Oliver has been in North Carolina for a number of years, and as far as we can obtain information of his situation is doing well; He is at once Merchant, Magistrate and Post Master, a Slave holder, and erecting mills. He is at present single; He was on to the North during



the summer of 1826 and took his brother William to the south with him, but the climate did not agree with and in a short time, the Cholera morbus attacked <sup>him</sup> and he died lamented, and mourned for his virtues. Ann is still with Mr. Childs, and is engaged to a young store keeper, when they will be married is doubtful owing to circumstances, Aunt Gibson has probably written you. Eben Childs opened a Book Store in Portsmouth N. H. but has lately failed to secure his own creditors against loss from his endorsing notes to a considerable amount. He is now employed a clerk in a Boston Bank. Catharine has married Mr. Breed of the Lynn Hotel, as to the rest I am too little acquainted with them to give you an account of their situation. Lucy Gibson is married and a mother. She lives in Boston with her husband Mr. Pratt a Cabinet <sup>maker</sup>, a worthy and upright man. Aunt Gibson lives with her. James Gibson is married and sails as master of a fine brig in regular employ from Boston up the Straits. he has just returned. Aunt Cooper lives at Dorchester still. Since you left us David Cooper, of whose death we have heard a dozen times made his way to America, and sailed with J. Gibson, learned Navigation, and has made several voyages as first mate, and just before we received information from you, went to New York for the purpose of getting a voyage to the South Seas to find you if possible. We have not heard of him since. I believe I have given you all information I have concerning the family. You will ask what I have been about all this time. I have been thro' Cambridge College, at Andover in the first year of my studies. I shall (God willing) take orders in 2 years from this. 5 or 6 years have made an amazing alteration among us, you would hardly recognize in the Theological student, the boy who used to dread you at Dorchester. And I suppose, that after buffeting about in the South Seas for so long a time you have not escaped without feeling something of the wear and tear of life. But however changed in appearance, do not believe that absence

can alter affection. It is rather unkind in you to suppose that we have forgotten you, how could we know where to write you, if we had sent letters to Canton, you might have been a thousand miles off. Indeed we were perfectly ignorant of your views, prospect, and situation, till the arrival of Mr. Gale, but I will <sup>not</sup> chide at the distance of half the globe. Oliver is living at Rockfish. Duplin County, North Carolina, and if you have any communication with Mexico, you might correspond with him. Aunt and Uncle write with me in congratulations on your marriage. Remember us kindly to your wife, and tell her, she has Relations at the distance of a continent, who would do all in their power for her happiness. We hope still to see you among us.

Dear Sir I have to inform you that the bill drawn by Messrs Callender Heartwell & Co in favour of George Cunningham for three thousand five hundred dollars is returned protested, owing I presume, to the informality of the bill being drawn, in favour of another person than the endorser, "William Henry Cunningham"; hence, you will be aware, that, as the bill was given me, in payment for two thousand robes of tallow, which you have received, the debt is still due me. And, as you were the acting agent in the concern, you are of course accountable for the same. Therefore, I request you to advise me when, and where, you will pay the above mentioned bill, payment of which, I expect by the first possible opportunity in hides, tallow, or Cash.

I have furthermore to inform you, that the bill (18<sup>th</sup>) which I forwarded to my agents is not returned to me, as they expected that it should have left the coast before their letters could have reached me; but I have received the enclosed documents which

that George Cunningham shall answer  
upon you for the payment of the  
bill hereafter.

I have a lot of tallow on  
hand and should be glad <sup>to sell</sup> it to you if

I have not received a letter from you yet, I think it a little strange, that because I am always writing & answer by myself but I should be forgotten by my friends, but I fancy you will excuse your not replying "Memento Occubere". I want to hear how you come on with your horse & other concerns. I saw you by last mail in passing round I had given Capt Williams an account to little & I earnestly request you will let him know while he is at Monterey, I think I shall leave for the coast about before I have the next for you especially if Capt Williams does not bring down the sheet with him. I can only request you to write me on the next of the coast so I know what is going on & I find our American situation is getting better. Besides I wish you to pay the \$430 to Capt Williams as I am resolved not to pay the Innage duty again at any rate, I will see them damned first, I have had several quarrels with the Spaniards here, & rather than their lawless behavior should prevent serious consequences - this I wish you to keep to yourself - The French ship found her papers on the 16<sup>th</sup> last amidst a continual fire from the castle, without any apparent injury. I get along pretty well with my work, I should finish in Sept if they will only let me alone - Give my best respects to your family, & all acquaintances, & believe me to remain very truly your obed<sup>t</sup> servant

I have before me yours of the 6<sup>th</sup> March and it gives me great pleasure to hear of your good health. Your letter from Valparaiso I never received, what has become of it I don't know; either the Ship or the letter must have been lost. I was very glad to hear, that in your next letter you would tell me when I was to go back to California, as I have almost got tired of England. I have had no opportunity of seeing Mr W. Logan yet, but if he is in Liverpool when the Vacation comes, I shall certainly go and see him. Since I came to England I have been at three different Schools; the first was in Liverpool, in which I learned Ovid, Sallust, and Virgil, in Latin; in French, Grammar, Fables, and Telemachus; in the same School, I also learned, Boyce's letters on Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Mathematics, Geography, Histories of England, Greece, and Rome, Arithmetic, and some Algebra. The next School was in Shropshire, in which I learned, Sallust, Ovid, Nepos in Latin; in French the same as



at the last; and I continued learning the same things, except Algebra and Chemistry; in the same school I also learned Drawing, Dancing and Drilling; and in Music, the Clarinet and Flute. And now in this College, in which I am at present, I am learning Latin and French, and I expect very soon to go on with Mathematics, for, if they would teach them here I shall be obliged to go somewhere else, where they do.

Give my best respects to Teresa, tell her that I don't write to her, because, I have no time to spare, but that I hope to see her in as short a time, as I can possibly expect.

I am thinking that when I go back, I shall first go to Jamaica, then to Vera Cruz, Mexico, and San Blas or Acapulco, and then to Montrey; it will be much better than to go by the long, tedious, and dangerous way round Cape Horn; that is the way I think best, but perhaps Mr. Brotherton will think otherwise, however, I expect that will be the way I shall go back, at least, the most likely, and then, perhaps if my Father is in Mexico yet, I shall meet him there, and go with him to California, but if not I will manage to go by myself.

I have not as yet had the pleasure of seeing your Brother Nathaniel, but I have had several letters from him, and

I expect to see him before I leave England, for which I shall have to go to London where he at present resides. I should think your Brother and Sister could not do better than to go down with me, and live in California, as they cannot wish for a more pleasant Country, nor a more peaceful seat; you might write and tell them to do so; I will, when I see them, if I remember it, tell them of it. I suppose you remember Mr. Dennison, he has got married since I wrote to you last, he bought a very fine house at Low Hill in Liverpool. I have not heard from your Brother for a long time, perhaps he does not know where I am at present, I dare say he will find it out soon; I will write to Liverpool. Remember me to all at home, I shall write to you, tell my Father that I don't write to him, because I have hardly any time to spare, and to write a Spanish letter would take me a long time, but by the first opportunity I shall write to him and all the rest at home.





**P**OR el reglamento de Pasaportes de 1 de Mayo de 1828, se imponen á los Estrangeros que se introduzcan en la República, las obligaciones siguientes:

Después de las formalidades necesarias para el exámen de Pasaportes y licencia de desembarco ó introduccion, deben con esta presentarse antes de 24 horas á la autoridad civil del puerto ó frontera.

Antes de un mes después de su desembarco ó introduccion si piensan permanecer por algun tiempo en la República, deben solicitar una *carta de seguridad* por un año del Gobierno General por conducto de los Agentes de sus Naciones los que los tengan, ó por conducto del Gobernador del Estado por donde se introdujeron.

Sea cual fuere el Pasaporte que autorize á los Estrangeros para residir en la República; deben presentarlo á la autoridad civil del lugar donde hayan de permanecer mas de 8 dias, y cuando trasladen su radicacion á otro punto. Si faltan á esta obligacion, serán castigados con una multa de 20 pesos, ó con un arresto de 10 dias.

Serán expelidos por los Gobernadores de los Estados, Distrito, y Territorios, los Estrangeros que desembarquen y se introduzcan en la República contravieniendo á las prevenciones del reglamento de Pasaportes citado.

Tambien lo serán por las mismas autoridades los Estrangeros, que para su desembarco ó internacion hagan uso de documentos pertenecientes á otro, los que oculten ó equivoquen maliciosamente alguna de las noticias exigidas en el Art. 2, y los que falsifiquen ó suplanten los Pasaportes ó cartas de seguridad que les autorize para introducirse ó transitar en la República.

Igualmente lo serán por el Gobierno General, los declarados Vagos conforme al Art. 18, de la ley de 3 de Marzo de 1828.

Las cartas de seguridad deberán renovarse al concluir su término. El Estrangero puede pedir su renovacion al Gobierno Supremo, ó por conducto de sus Agentes ó por el de la autoridad civil del punto donde se hallen.

Para salir de la República pueden los Estrangeros acudir por el Pasaporte al Gobierno General, por medio de sus Agentes ó al particular del Estado en que se hallen.

**B**Y the regulation of Passports of the 1st of May, 1828, Aliens arriving at, or residing in, the Republic, are subjected to the following provisions:

After the usual formalities for the examination of Passports, and the granting of license for landing or introduction, they are bound to present themselves with this license within 24 hours, before the civil authority of the port or frontier.

Aliens within one month after their landing or introduction, (if they intend to remain for any time in the Republic,) are bound to solicit a *carta de seguridad* (letter of security) from the General Government, for one year, through the Agents of their respective Governments, (if there are any) or through the Governor of the State into which they have introduced themselves.

Whatever may be the Passport which allows Aliens to remain in the Republic, they must present it to the civil authority of the place wherever they intend remaining more than 8 days; and when they change their residence to any other place, in neglect of the performance of this duty, they are subject to the penalty of 20 dollars, or imprisonment for ten days.

Aliens shall be expelled by the Governors of the States, District and Territories, if they land or introduce themselves into the Republic, transgressing the provisions of the said regulation.

The same authorities shall likewise expel those Aliens who should present documents belonging to others, at the time of their landing or introduction, as well as those who should make any false declaration respecting the particulars recited in Art. 2d, and those who, in order to be allowed to introduce themselves into the Republic, or to remain in it, should present false Passports or letters of security, (*Cartas de Seguridad*.)

In the same manner shall be expelled by the General Government, those Aliens who may be considered vagrants under the law published on the 3d of March, 1828.

The *cartas de seguridad* (letters of security) must be renewed when the time for which they were granted shall have expired. Aliens may apply to have them renewed either through the Agents of their respective Governments, or by the civil authority of the place in which they are residing.

Aliens wishing to quit the territory of the Republic, may apply to the General Government for their Passports, through the channel of their respective Agents (if they have any) or otherwise apply for it to the Governor of the State in which they are residing.

Les étrangers qui après de leur débarquement ou de leur introduction voudront rester pour quelque tems dans la République, devront dans l'espace d'un mois se procurer une *carta de seguridad* (lettre de sûreté) pour un an du gouvernement général, par l'entremise des Agents de leur nations si toute fois il s'en trouve, ou par le moyen du Gouverneur de l'Etat par ou ils sont entrés.

Les autorités pourront également mettre hors du territoire de la République, les étrangers qui pour leur débarquement ou leur introduction presenteront des documents qui ne leur appartiennent pas, ainsi qu'à ceux qui feront malicieusement des fausses déclarations sur les questions qu'on doit leur faire d'après l'art. 2, ou qui falsifieront les passeports ou lettres de sûreté (*cartas de seguridad*) qui leur permettent de s'introduire dans la République.

Le Gouvernement Général agira de même envers les étrangers qui selon l'art. 18e. de la loi du 3 Mars 1828, seront qualifiés sans état ou sans occupation.

Herd I am still very sick and wearied with impatience for an answer from Sr. Fernando, not having heard a word since your departure, would you credit it, the Comandante after my being here about a fortnight makes a demand on me for the Tonnage money of the Ship amounting to about \$800. when he was the one who most advised my waiting to communicate with the Gen<sup>l</sup> and gave permission without saying any such thing was expected thereby leading me into a trap. Should there be any error we will rectify it hereafter this amt I shall either bring or send you for just chance. meantime I have to request if I do not see you again before I leave this that in case of the arrival here of a vessel from Boston consigned to me that you will communicate with the Capt<sup>n</sup> of her early enough to prevent their taking the advantage of him in respect to the Tonnage dues which they are striving to do with me, and to see that he gets the letter left here for him in the hands of my relation Sr Juan Rocha as soon as possible by attending to this you will confer a great obligation - in addition to which I have most earnestly to solicit of your goodness, to write me to the Islands by every vessel bound there the state of things here and whether any or what altercation takes place, and in return if I can execute any commission for you I shall do it with heartfelt pleasure. I have not

been on shore but once since you left, which was the day  
after and I know not when I shall again.

**E**l Excmo. Sr. presidente de los Estados-Unidos Mexicanos, se ha servido dirigirme el decreto siguiente.

„El presidente de los Estados-Unidos Mexicanos á los habitantes de la república, sabed: Que el congreso general ha decretado lo que sigue

1º „Saldrán de la república todos los españoles que residan en los estados ó territorios internos de Oriente y Occidente, territorios de la Alta y Baja California y Nuevo México, dentro de un mes despues de publicada esta ley, del estado ó territorio de su residencia, y dentro de tres de la república. Los residentes en los estados, territorios intermedios y distrito federal, dentro de un mes del estado, territorio, y distrito de su residencia, y de dos de la república, y los habitantes en los estados litorales al mar del Norte saldrán de la república dentro de un mes contado desde la publicacion de esta ley.

2º Se entienden por españoles los nacidos en los puntos dominados actualmente por el rey de España, y los hijos de españoles nacidos en alta mar. Se exceptuan solamente los nacidos en Cuba, Puerto-Rico y Filipinas.

3º Se exceptuan de lo prevenido en el artículo primero: 1º los impedidos físicamente mientras dure el impedimento. 2º los hijos de americanos.

4º Dentro de un mes contado desde la publicacion de esta ley, los comprendidos en el artículo anterior, presentarán por sí ó remitirán al gobierno por conducto inmediato de la secretaria de relaciones, los documentos que acrediten su excepcion.

5º Los españoles si no saliesen dentro del término prefijado en el artículo primero, serán castigados seis meses en una fortaleza, y despues embarcados, lo mismo los que vuelvan al territorio de la república mientras dure la guerra con España.

6º El gobierno dará cada mes parte al congreso sobre el cumplimiento de esta ley.

7º Los que á juicio del gobierno no puedan costear su viage y transporte se les costeará por cuenta de la hacienda pública de la federacion hasta el primer puerto de los Estados-Unidos del Norte, procediendo el gobierno con la mas estrecha economia.

8º En los mismos términos se costeará por la hacienda pública el viage y transporte de los religiosos á quienes no pueda costearse por falta de fondos la provincia ó convento á que pertenezcan.

9º El gobierno expedirá el correspondiente documento en que conste la excepcion á los españoles que hayan de permanecer en la república, quienes no podrán en lo sucesivo avecindarse en las costas, pudiendo el gobierno obligar á los que actualmente residan en ellas á que



se internen en el caso de que tema una invasion próxima de tropas enemigas.

10. Los españoles que obtengan pension, sueldos de la federacion ó beneficio eclesiástico, disfrutarán la parte que les corresponda segun derecho si se establecen en alguna de las repúblicas ó naciones amigas, con noticia de su existencia ó residencia por los cónsules de esta, y lo perderán si pasan á los puntos dominados por el rey de España.

11. Se deroga la ley de 20 de diciembre de 827 á escepcion del artículo 18 que prohibe la introduccion en la república, de los españoles y súbditos de su gobierno.—Francisco del Moral, presidente de la cámara de diputados.—José Farrera, vice-presidente del senado.—José Joaquin Bazo Ibañez, diputado secretario.—Antonio Maria de Esnaurizar, senador secretario.

Por tanto, mando se imprima, publique, circule y se le dé el debido cumplimiento. Y para que lo prevenido en el antecedente decreto tenga su mas puntual ejecucion, he dispuesto se observen las providencias que siguen.

1ª Los gobiernos de los estados cuidarán de que conforme al artículo 1º del anterior decreto, salgan respectivamente de ellos todos los españoles que no fueren exceptuados con arreglo á las disposiciones de los artículos 3º 4º y 9º de dicho decreto.

2ª Los mismos gobiernos señalarán á los individuos que conforme al artículo antecedente deben salir de su propio estado, el derrotero por donde han de conducirse, dando el correspondiente aviso á los gobiernos del tránsito y del puerto en que hayan de embarcarse, para que estén á la mira de la efectiva salida.

3ª Iguales avisos darán al supremo gobierno publicándolos por la imprenta, y sin perjuicio de ellos á la conclusion del término señalado en el artículo primero del citado decreto le pasarán una nota circunstanciada de todos los individuos que hayan salido de su territorio, y de sus clases, con expresion de quedar en él entera y esactamente cumplidas las disposiciones del mismo decreto.

4ª Los gobernadores del tránsito y del puerto para donde se verifique la salida, darán los avisos oportunos al gobierno del estado de donde hayan salido los individuos que deben caminar á embarcarse, y los comunicarán asimismo al supremo gobierno general.

5ª En todos los correos darán puntual y esacta noticia de cuanto se haya practicado y quede por practicar en ejecucion del anterior decreto, para que el supremo gobierno pueda cumplir con lo que se previene en el artículo 6º de el.

6ª Para cumplir con el artículo 7º los gobiernos de los estados, de acuerdo con los comisarios generales ó sub-comisarios, harán la calificacion correspondiente de la imposibilidad que tengan algunos individuos seculares de los que deban salir del territorio de cada estado para costear su viage y transporte.

7ª Del mismo modo calificarán la cantidad que con la mas estrecha economia deba ministrarles la hacienda pública de la federacion para hacer su viage hasta el puerto, segun las distancias y la clase y rango de cada individuo, disponiendo que con efecto se les ministre, no escediendo la asignacion que hicieren desde dos reales por legua hasta un peso.

8ª Entre estos dos extremos harán del mismo modo la asignacion

correspondiente á los empleados cuyo sueldo no llegue á mil quinientos pesos anuales.

9<sup>a</sup> De las calificaciones que hagan los gobiernos de cada estado en la forma esplicada sobre la imposibilidad de algunos individuos para costear su viage y transporte, darán aviso á los gobiernos de los estados á que correspondan los puertos por donde deben embarcarse, y á este supremo gobierno.

10<sup>a</sup> Los gobiernos á que correspondan los puertos, de acuerdo con los comisarios generales ó sub-comisarios, dispondrán que se costee el transporte de cada individuo de los que se ha hablado bajo las consideraciones y con la mas estrecha economia que previene el referido artículo 7<sup>o</sup>

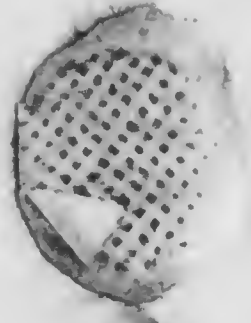



I have built a House at St. Diego to cure my Hides &c. the it went  
very much against the grain, for truly that Port is the very center of  
the W for strangers, as respects the Spanish Brandy I will reserve  
a large proportion for you and as much of the other articles as  
I can. 2 of my largest Waggon I have sold already and the  
47 Carts and 1 Horse Cart only are left, in all say 5 left. &  
a few Hand Carts and wheelbarrow. Goods go of faster than I had  
expected but I have pretty well supplied hereabout, now and expect  
to start in a few days, you will hold in mind that Tallow is not so  
much an object to me as Hides & Horns and impress the same on others,  
all the Tallow which I have bot here is at 14<sup>00</sup>.

I am sorry to hear Mrs Cooper has been unwell  
and sincerely wish her health may be reestablished in this. my own  
is a little better but I have still a very troublesome dry cough  
almost all the people down in these parts have had severe colds lately

engage I think by her tools he will find the Ship well found and able to bear the weather & carry sail -

I have nothing very particular to say therefore do not write now to Don Juan Rocha and my sister Helena but will thank you to say to them that all were well in S. Diego a few days since and Manuel is here with me and also in good health, he is ordered for Monterey to be there on the 1<sup>st</sup> June with the other Deputados, and I have orders from my mother in law to fetch it below down, when I come up to windward again, provided she will come and her husband let her give my kind love to them and say I hope soon to have the pleasure of seeing them again.

It is bad work those whalers laying in Monterey so long they spoil the business of all regular traders and is an injury to those who retail on shore: I were did she pay duties or tonnage duties:

I was just about paying the Parida of S. Fernando six hundred dollars in goods on 1<sup>st</sup> of 1842, when your letter came to hand but I have deferred it, as undoubtedly you have some reason for what you write. I have given no reason however for not paying it as Welsh is not here but at S. Diego.

They tacked a most-damnably amt of duties on me to the tune of 30,000 dollars nearly \$26,000 of which I have paid, the duties on the Cottons alone amounted to over \$17,000. will you try and get for me (without giving a reason for it) a copy of the afore of the Andersons & the Schooner Washingtons cargoes, this is underhand work

somewhere and I am anxious to find it out. they, afore American cottons according to the Oran cel at 1<sup>st</sup> 6<sup>th</sup> the vara adding an eight part, for every eight of a vara over one wide, the Comisary who does not do the same is liable to Gover for what is short. they come under the head of seizures of Texidos, dees & Algodons, of all sorts or kinds - I have sold to the Govt and the diff<sup>er</sup> Mission below to about \$13,000 worth of this article already, and I hope to God I may get rid of my whole cargo this year if ever I bring another to Californi. I'll give every one have to tell me of it. I am debarred by the Govt from even touching at S. Catalina to water and am now actually drinking troutroy water the devil had possess'd his no weather, wane has so many turns in 24 hours as he had.

If you can find me a first rate pair of Californian Stumps in Monterey, please buy them and keep them for me.

John, Dana & Chuen all left here for S. Barbara since day before yesterday, all well please remember me to all friends and believe me to be your friend & S. H. H. G. in a hurry -





persons to obtain permission to carry on the coasting trade it is indispensable that he be either a Mexican or a foreigner who can give proof that he is established in the country, or naturalized, having either a Mexican family or landed property. He must likewise give security to the amount of the value of the vessel that he will employ it in the above mentioned trade in the Ports of this Nation and that he will subject himself to the rules of ordinance; the Captain and two thirds of the crew must be natives of the country.

If the vessel be not of Mexican construction, but bought from a foreigner, the person interested must produce his title to the vessel, which must be given him by the owners, or by an agent who can produce legitimate authority for selling the same together with the original Register of the Nation to which it belongs and permission from the Consul of said nation; of which the Government must be informed.

These requisites being complied with, the Register (Patente) or license of navigation shall be given, and the Government must be informed of all ~~the~~ such as are granted under these circumstances.



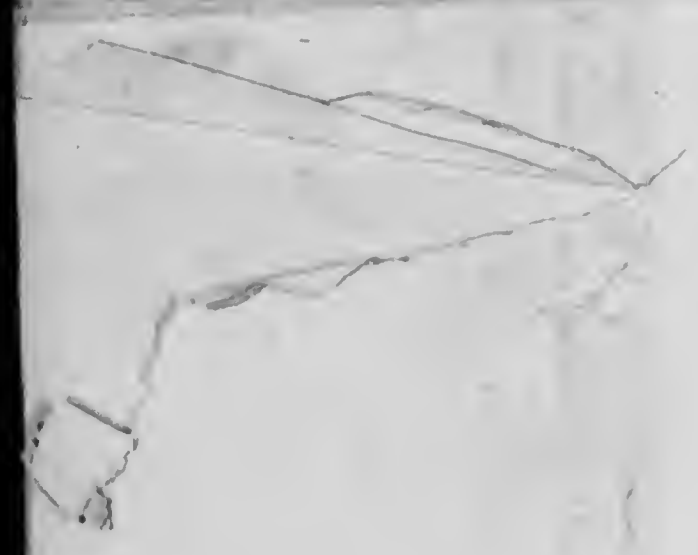



Yours of the 22. came to hand this day, and one part of it excited my particular attention that is with regard to the goods you purchased from me, if I recollect right the great part of your  $\$100$  is in Prunes an article which I could have sold them ten times over, you seem to be apprehensive that I shall crowd you for the payment. But my motive of writing to you was merely to give you the notice that I should be obliged to start in the Ship home earlier than at first contemplated, so that you might get as many Hides for me as possible within the time which would assist me greatly, another motive that the report would induce others who owe me to be in readiness as otherwise many are in the habit of giving to one what they owe to another.

It is impossible that Hartnell can afford to give more for Hides than I can, as for selling Goods I shall judge better here after for it is possible he has paid duties in Monterey according to his own liking. That having the Bulk of my Corp certain it will make little or no difference to me, I am glad however the Plant will be here in a short time to assist him in collecting Hides —

I am much obliged to you for your promise of getting me the wood I wrote for. But I



wish to make some addition, the quantity I now want is as follows including what I before have mentioned, viz 200 good Morrillos, 25 pieces which I wrote to you before for laying out on, and 6 Beams squared 8 by 10 inches not smaller and 8 varas long. the permit for the additional Morrillos I will bring up with me, the other will answer for all the rest. you can say to Bonifacio that if I pay him 12 reals each for the Morrillos he ought to take of the Bark so that they will dry faster and be the lighter. you will make him do it if possible.

I have just received Letters from home in which Mr P. mentions that they were only waiting the arrival of the Courier to hear particulars before they dispatched the Brig Texeque, some reports having reached of the Franklin business. consequently I now think it don't fall within the course at all.

I have also received another protested Bill of Hartwell's for \$1000, which was for money loaned by Pardo Ripoll. but I fear I shall get no justice until a new governor arrives there, this one is too imbecile to do any thing and he I fear is not honourable enough to pay.

Will you have the goodness just to say to Pardo Barria that the Pardes of St Juan Capt<sup>ns</sup> have done nothing in the business I laid before him when at Montevideo and I must again beg his attention to it.

I enclose you the Paper again according to your request. it is just as I thought the whole is a craft

mockery. I will just mention and article Black Silk Hosiery are offered at 9<sup>3</sup> per doz instead of 36<sup>3</sup> and not half the quantity that was sold in my opinion. I suppose the Danube may be carrying sail to the same purpose. I mention nothing of the Town Patterns which is just down at only 6!! but nearly every thing is in proportion.

Capt Locke has got up the Anchor which the Franklin left. and our brave Aul has demanded it. of course to prevent difficulties it must be given up. they say the new Gov will certainly be here this month I hope so, Luis cannot be much worse. I should think if you have now all the news here, please remember me to all friends -

I am endeavouring to make some arrangements for going home next season, and am determined to go unless something very important takes place to prevent it. — for this purpose I am endeavouring to draw my business down to a single point, I do not however intend to close (or rather I do not expect to be able to close) but let it go on under the direction of Mr Henry A. Peirce (younger brother of Mrs Peirce) if I can prevail on him to stop, other ways I shall sell out to highest bidder. — you mention the subject of trade and have been kind enough to point out the way and many articles that would do well on the coast. many of which articles I have on hand & other articles which I should be glad to send to you if I could consistently do it on account of the owners (they are consigned to me for sale here). and



According to your wishes, I told to Mr. Deppé, to keep a bale of yerba de Puebla, for you which he will deliver to you, and charge in your account.

I hope you are always well, and enjoy
