

Clinton nominates Owens to post with Joint Chiefs

President Bill Clinton has nominated Adm. William A. Owens to be the next vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

If the Senate approves the nomination, Owens will succeed Adm. David E. Jeremiah as the nation's second-ranking military officer. Jeremiah, who retires in February after 36 years of military service, has held the position since The Navy's Chief of Naval Operations, Adm. Frank B. Kelso has moved up to April 30 the date he intends to retire from the Navy instead of waiting for his previously announced July retirement date, it was reported by the Navy Office of Information in Washington D.C. this week.

Kelso, who has been continuously beleaguered by allegations sr unding the Tailhook scandal, 'he announcement Tuesday 'erring with the Secretary

of the Navy and the Secretary of Defense.

Both Secretary of Defense William J. Perry and Secretary of the Navy John H. Dalton released statements regarding Kelso's connection with Tailhook

"I have discussed with the Secretary of the Navy the ruling made last week on the Tailhook matter and reviewed the Department of Defense Inspector General's conclusions from his investigation," Perry announced. "Without calling into question the correctness of the ruling, I note that the DoD Inspector General found no credible evidence that Admiral Kelso had specific knowledge of the misconduct that occurred on the third floor of the Hilton Hotel; that there was no evidence that Admiral Kelso sought to thwart the Navy's internal investigation; and that Admiral Kelso was fully supportive of the DoD Inspector General's investigation.

"I know that Admiral Kelso did

not himself decide on the disposition of the various flag officer files developed by the inspector general. Rather, (then) Secretary (Les) Aspin decided to hold those files for review by civilian leadership, specifically, then incoming secretary of the Navy John Dalton.

"I regard Admiral Kelso as a man of the highest integrity and honor. Under his leadership, the Navy has entered the post- cold *Please see Kelso, page 3*

American Cancer Society honors Nichols, Thompson

During a recent awards ceremony in the Naval Medical Center quarterdeck Lt.Cmdr Tim Thompson and MS1 Darin Nichols both of the Health Promotion Office, were recognized for coordinating the Great American Smokeout campaigns from San Diego Navy bases to Camp Pendleton in Oceanside.

Presenting the Special Citations was Rose Marie Pierce, Military Program Coordinator for the American Cancer Society.

Nichols, a frequent contributing columnist for the Dry Dock, was chairman and Thompson assistant chairman for the Great American Smokeout held this past November. They arranged for 123 survival stations, many of which were located near clinics, commissaries, exchanges on the piers as well as at Naval Medical Center San Diego and Naval Hospital Camp Pendleton. According to Pierce, 51.5 percent of Navy personnel smoke or chew smokeless tobacco. That translates to 67,000 tobacco abusers in San Diego County, she said.

"With the help of a record breaking 300 volunteers recruited by Nichols and Thompson, 14,820 survival kits with information explaining the dangers of smoking and listing how to quit resources were handed out," Pierce said. "Another 5,225 viewed tobacco related videos." According to Pierce, "1993 was the biggest year ever and the San Diego chapter of the American Cancer Society won the California state award for military campaigns and will now be entered into national competition."

19-year-old victim of cystic fibrosis writes poignant letter beseeching organ donors

The following letter was received by the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery. It speaks for itself.

Dear Medical Professional:

I am writing this letter on behalf of the thousands of people who are currently on waiting lists hoping for a second chance at life through the miracle of organ climax to my lifelong struggle transplantations.

I am a 19-year-old college student who has hopes and dreams for the future just like everyone else. Unfortunately, I was born with the debilitating lung disease Cystic Fibrosis.

Throughout my 19-year life, I've worked tirelessly doing chest physical therapy three times per day, coughing for hours each day,

hoping to preserve my slowly deteriorating lungs as long as possible. I have now reached the point where I am on oxygen all the time, am basically homebound, and struggle to get around in my house.

Only a few years ago, this would have been the unfortunate with the disease. I have been told that my wait will be approximately one and a half years before my name comes to the top of the transplant list.

The most unfortunate part about this tragedy is that many of those lives could have been saved. Estimates show that only about 20 percent of organ donor candidates actually donate their organs.

Many families do not donate the organs of their loved ones at the time of their death simply because they have not discussed organ donation beforehand. In this stressful time, they often say "no" to organ donation without even considering the positive impacts it could have on the lives of others.

Professionals in the medical field may be the only people who can convince families to donate the organs of their loved ones while they are dealing with the tragedy of losing a loved one. This is a plea on behalf of all organ do-





Is Navy just reflection of society: Crime figures say yes

Editor's note: This is the first in a series of articles concerning violence and violent crime in the Pacific Fleet.

A drive-by shooting, a mugging, spouse abuse, date-rape, murder, child abuse - one might assume these to be entries in the morning police blotter in any number of metropolitan cities across the United States.

Instead, these crimes were included in morning report sheets at a U.S. Navy installation during one recent two-week period.

Violent crime is increasing in the Navy.

Rarely does a day go by in the Pacific theater in which a sailor, Marine or dependent family member is not involved in a violent crime. Unfortunately that involvement is usually as the victim.

The causes are numerous: rising crime in general, domestic disputes related to uncertain times, and proliferation of gun sales.

Commander in Chief of the U.S. Pacific Fleet, Admiral Robert J. Kelly, says it's up to the Navy to reverse the trend.

'As an institution, we have both the capability and obligation to reverse this egregious trend with some basic leadership principles," he said.

From January through September 1993, 637 violent crimes were reported in the Pacific Fleet. More than 200 of these crimes reportedly were committed by Navy personnel. In more than 400 of these cases, Navy personnel were the victims.

Navy leaders believe keeping people informed is the key to reducing the trend. Statistics indicate Navy personnel are less likely to be involved in violent crimes than the general population; however, violence within the Navy is on the rise. Violent crime occurring within the Navy community tends to be characterized by some common elements:

 Alcohol consumption, which leads to violent behavior and impaired judgment.

· Lone liberty, where the buddy system is ignored leaving an individual an easy target.

· Lack of attention, where commands fail to recognize signs of potential violence such as family abuse and victims' common

war world dramatically reshaped and fully prepared for new challenges. He has made an enormous contribution to the safety and well being of the nation. With respect to the underlying causes of the events of Tailhook '91, he understood the importance of addressing this issue and taking all necessary measures to permit the Navy to move on to a new era."

Echoing those sentiments was Secretary of the Navy John Dalton, who also spoke of Kelso's dedication to the resolution of Tailhook.

'The lessons of Tailhook have been hard ones," Dalton said, 'but they are lessons that the men and women of the Navy and the Marine Corps must not forget.

"It is important that we always treat our shipmates with dignity. It is also important that we put the bitterness of Tailhook behind us. The time for healing is now. I wish to make clear that, although I have questioned the leadership which permitted the excesses of Tailhook to take place, I have never questioned the personal integrity and honor of Frank Kelso.

"Admiral Kelso's intellect and leadership have set the Navy on the correct course to meet the challenges of the post cold war era. Since Tailhook '91, he has taken the lead in educating the Navy that sexual harassment will not be tolerated and in fostering an environment of mutual respect and genuine opportunity for women in the naval service."

Navy rushes to aid quake victims

Since the devastating Jan. 17 On Jan. 21, when the President

earthquake struck the greater Los requested 1,000 federal employees from L.A. area military commands be assigned to assist the Federal Emergency Management Agency, an estimated 400 civilian and active-duty Navy people, including 200 from the Long Beach naval shipyard, volunteered to help victims complete financial aid forms and provided administrative support.

Ray (DD 971) Wives' Club delivered \$450 in infant and women's health items to the homeless in Northridge, the quake's epicenter. USS David R. Ray crewmembers helped Red Cross personnel, offload relief supplies at Van Nuys airport, a major receiving and distribution point for relief supplies.

More than 100 people from Shore Intermediate Maintenance Activity San Diego spent a day of special liberty in Northridge, as part of a United Way community clean up effort to assist elderly residents with removal of debris from their properties. A can-do spirit was the rule of the day. "If you've got a quarter in your pocket, then you've got a screwdriver," said Petty Officer Monique Desverges, "and if you've got two hands, then you've got a wrench."

TAX TIPS

You've finished your tax return, signed it and mailed it to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Then the mail carrier brings you an interest statement from the savings account you opened last year or a wage statement from a part-time summer job. No ... don't put on dark glasses and go into hiding or start scanning the "most wanted" photos in the post office. The solution is just a form away.

Get Form 1040X, "Amended U.S. Individual Income Tax Return," and instructions from the IRS. Form 1040X is used to correct any previously filed Form 1040, 1040A or 1040EZ. It allows you to figure your correct income and tax.

In general, you should wait 10 weeks for your first return to be processed before sending in an amended return. However, if you owe additional tax, send the Form 1040X and your payment by April 15 to avoid late payment penalties or interest.

A Form 1040X claiming a refund can be filed within three years from the date the original return was due, or two years from the date the tax was paid, whichever is later.

In the case of math errors or missing schedules, you do not need to file an amended return. The processing computers will automatically correct match errors, and the IRS will request any missing attachments.




Los Angeles quake victims pick up pieces



The Defense Department regulation under which CHAMPUS operates is being amended to extend CHAMPUS-authorized provider status to kidney dialysis centers that are not hospital-based. Members of service families or providers of care who have had CHAMPUS claims denied for dialysis at free-standing centers should re-submit the denied claims to the appropriate CHAM-PUS claims processor.

PREVENT course offers college credit as well as lessons on life

What would you say to a class that can make you a better person, make your life easier and help you get your priorities straight? And what if it only took four eighthour days (duty time), you could get three hours of college credit for it and it looked great on a field. service record as well?

You might call it "Life 101" if it was offered as part of a college curriculum. The Navy calls it PREVENT and it's available to Naval Personnel. Smith was quick sailors right now.

"I especially recommend it for our younger sailors," said Smith. "It teaches individuals to be more responsible; and this will be very helpful in the long run."



The goal of this targeted grant program is to understand three specific ways in which the human immune defense system fails to

respond appropriately to infection with HIV and how to overcome these crucial deficiencies.

The Naval Institute is pleased to announce the first annual Colin L. Powell Joint Warfighting Essay Contest. must have joint application in terms of force structure, doctrine, operations, or organization for combat. Interoperability of hard-

In the words of the former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the competition seeks "those who are motivated to enter this contest not by a need to 'toe the policy line,' but who are devoted to the security of this great Nation."

Essays should be about combat readiness in a joint contest — persuasive discussions of tactics, strategy, weaponry, combat training, or other issues involving two or more services. Entries may be heavy in uni-service detail, but must nave joint application in terms of force structure, doctrine, operations, or organization for combat. Interoperability of hardware and procedures may be discussed within the context of combat readiness. Essays are welcome from military professionals and civilians alike.

The Naval Institute will award cash prizes of \$2,500, \$2,000, and \$1,000 to the authors of the three best essays entered. Maximum length is 3,000 words, but shorter opinion pieces or "professional notes" (typically 2,000-word technical arguments) may also be competitive.

NAVY'S FIRST AFRICAN-AMERICAN FLAG OFFICER

Samuel Gravely Jr. became the Navy's first African-American flag officer in 1971 rising to the rank of vice admiral. Gravely, a graduate of Virginia Union University, Richmond, Va., was commissioned in 1944 and served in both the reserves and the active naval forces,

first as an enlisted sailor then as an officer for more than 30 years. Gravely commanded four surface ships and a cruiser-destroyer group before assuming command of the 3rd Fleet in 1976.

Submit two complete copies. (If typed on a computer, please also submit an IBM-compatible disk and specify word-processing software used.)



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


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

Continued from page 3 observant of your surroundings; traveling in groups; avoiding rides with strangers; knowing safe hastations, hospitals, fire stations or 24 hour stores; avoiding ATM machines in dark areas at odd hours; keeping your vehicle doors locked while in transit; maintaining a cool head when settling family disputes; and probably most importantly, using alcohol moderately if you drink."

Observing these tips and understanding that the Navy's zero tolerance for violent behavior should help naval personnel avoid becoming statistics, either as victim or as suspect.

'We are experiencing a crisis related to the rise of violent crime," said Kelly. "I have heard this trend is merely a reflection of society. I would remind Navy people that we are an all volunteer force. Because each of you met the high moral and mental standards of achievement to be recruited, the argument that violence in the Navy is just a reflection of society is not valid. In that context, we are not a reflection of society. We are, and must continue to be, the standard society seeks to achieve.

"Americans depend on us to protect their freedoms and, in so doing, to exemplify honesty, integrity and leadership. Our goal, therefore, must be to eliminate violence at home and in our communities," Kelly added.

He said he believes there are two ways to achieve this goal. Leaders, from petty officers up, must convey the policy that violent behavior will not be tolerated in the Navy. "Violence in any form will be dealt with rapidly and, if warranted, result in actions to separate offenders from the service," Kelly said.

Kelly went on to say that it must be clearly understood that sailors and Marines who are perpetrators of violence are a discredit to their service, to the Department of the Navy and to the nation



they serve.

Second, sailors and Marines must all be more vigilant toward the indicators of violence to prevens in your area such as police vent becoming victims themselves. In most every case where Navy men and women were victims of violent crime, the act of violence could have been avoided Public Affairs Office.
