OUR TERMS are strictly cash with order. Remittance should be made by Postoffice or Express Money Order, Bank Draft or Registered Letter. Amounts of less than $\$ 1$ may be sent in postage stamps.

If personal checks are sent they must be certified by your banker.
We do not ship seeds C.O.D. unless one-third of the amount of the purchase price accompanies the order. C. O. D. shipments cannot be made by freight.

Another easy method is to plant flve or slx seeds in a hill where they are to remain; after the piants have made three or four leaves pull out all but the strongest plant. CultureThrives best in a rather deep, rich loamy soil and, unlike most vegetables, succeeds well when cultivated on the same ground for successive years. The ground should be the prevlous autumn, and laid up in ridges during the winter to soften. As early $\ln$ the spring as the ground is in working order commence operations by levellng the ground with a rake and tread it firmly; sow thinly In rows, four pounds to the acre, and a quarter of an lnch deep and one foot apart; cover with fine soil and press down wlth the back of a spade or llght roller. When the young plants are strong enough, thin gradually, so that they stand 3 to 4 inches apart. Keep the surface of the ground open and free from weeds by frequent hoeing, taking care not to stir the soil too deeply or collect it about the growing bulb. As soon as the tops dle and fall, the bulbs should be gathered into windrows. If the weather is fine they will need no attention while curing; but if it $1 s$ not they will need to be stirred by simply moving them silghtly along the row. Cut off the tops when perfectly dry about half an lnch from the bulb and then after a few days of bright weather the Onions wlll be fit to store for winter.

A Few Saggestions About Sowing, Etc.-We give here a few general rules which will be helpful to beginners. The soil best suited to flowers is a light. rich loam, whlch should be as fine sand to llghten it. Sow the seed either broadcast or in rows, and cover in proportion to the size of the seeds-a good general ruie ls to cover two or three times the size of the seedand press the soll firmly. Small seeds cannot come up if covered too deep. Most of the flower seeds are so fine that they should be sown on top of the loose ground, covered very 11 ghtly the hand. Princlpal causes of fallure in ralsing flowers are due to too deep sowing and lack of water at the proper tims. As flower seeds in general are sown shallow, llght, but frequent sprinklings are all that is needed. The main object is to keep the soil around the seeds always molst, as alr and moisture are needed to lnsure good germination and to prevent the ground from getting a hard crust.

The letter "A" annexed to the name of varletles signifies Annual; "H. A." Hardy Annual: "B," Biennial: "P," Perennial. Annuals grow, bloom and die the first year from seed; Biennials bloom the second year from seed and then die though many if sown early in the spring. will flower the flist year;
Perennials usually bloom the second year from seed, and con-
tinue to grow and bioom for many years; some will aiso bioom the flrst year if sown early.

## How to Grow Sweet Peas


#### Abstract

The soil for Sweet Peas should be rich and deep. A good rich loam, with plenty of well rotted manure in it, is the ideal soil for raising good plants that will produce an abundance of fine blossoms. They should be in a poslton fully exposed to sunlight and air on both sides of the row.

Sweet Peas are among the seeds to be sown very early in the spring. They should go into the ground as soon as the soil can be worked, and should be planted six inches deep, being covered at first with only two inches of soll, the trench being filled as the plants grow. It is best to soak the seeds for several lhours before they are planted. If the plan of planting early is followed, and if the Sweet Peas are kept mulched with lawn clippings and watered abundantly, they are certain to give a crop of fine blossoms.
