RESUME ARMENTIERES BATTLE

CAPTURED GERMAN OFFICERS SAY ORDER WAS TO TAKE AMIENS TODAY AT ALL COSTS

 WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, April 12.—The battle around Armentieres was resumed with redoubled fury today. The enemy passed the Loise and Lawe rivers and are advancing beyond Steenwerck toward Balleuil (7 miles northwest of Armentieres and three miles beyond Steenwerck).
 The British have lost some ground in order to conform to the movement southward.
 This morning east of Flogsterdt there was a terrific German bombardment.

IRELAND TO HAVE PARLIAMENT

PLANS FOR SELF GOVERNMENT ARE ADOPTED BY IRISH CONVENTION IT IS REPORTED

(Special Service to Glendale Evening News)
 LONDON, April 12.—The plans for self government in Ireland were adopted in the Irish convention by a vote of 1200 to 142 today, it was officially reported.

The convention report provides for the establishment of a parliament for the whole of Ireland with full power to direct all internal legislation, administration and direct taxation.

Self government is to become a law immediately.
 The Ulsterites filed a dissenting minority report.

The convention report declared that body voted 54 to 17 that any conscription measure must be submitted to the proposed parliament before being enforced.

The parliament according to the report will consist of a Senate of 64 members and a House of Commons of 200 members. The Senate will be representative of Commerce, Industry, Labor, County Councils, Churches, Universities and of the Peasage.

The Nationalists have agreed to guarantee 40 per cent of the membership to the Unionists in the House of Commons.

The question of the ultimate control of the customs excise was postponed. Meanwhile this control will be in the hands of the Imperial parliament.

SUCCESSFUL FRENCH ATTACKS

OFFICIAL STATEMENT REPORTS PRISONERS TAKEN IN THURE SECTOR AND IN THE NOYON REGION

 PARIS, April 12.—In successful surprise attacks north of the Ailette river and west of Butte du Mesnil in the Thure sector, where American artillery is engaged, enemy prisoners were taken, the French official statement said.
 The French also took prisoners in the Noyon sector.

TRUSTEES' MEETING

BID OF MOULTON AND COMPANY FOR FIRE IMPROVEMENT BONDS IS ACCEPTED

The Board of Trustees met in regular session at the City Hall at 8:10 p. m., April 11, 1918. All members present at roll call.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and, on motion, a correction made in regard to the adoption of Resolution No. 1002, to show that on roll call Trustee Woodberry voted no.

The minutes of the adjourned meeting of April 9th were read and approved.

A petition was presented from Mrs. Minnette Sherman of 1526 Vine street and thirty-five other residents of that section, calling the attention of the Board to the fact that the remains of a building belonging to Mary Shaw at 1530 Vine street, partially destroyed by fire in the month of May, 1917, are left standing in a ruined condition and constitute a menace to the safety of adjoining houses and to the residents of the vicinity, and is otherwise offensive and detrimental to the interests of the entire neighborhood; the petitioners requested that the Board take the necessary steps at once to abate the described condition by causing the building to be torn down and removed or rehabilitated into a complete and decent house.

On motion of Trustee Woodberry, the communication was referred to the City Attorney to advise the Board as to its authority in the matter.

A communication was read from J. F. Lilly, representing the City in appraisal proceedings, submitting an agreement of sale in duplicate, covering a portion of Lot 2, Glendale Mountain View Tract, desired by the City in connection with the improvement of Verdugo Wash. The communication stated that an agreement had been arrived at with the representative of the property owner, fixing the sum of \$200.00 as fair compensation for the portion of the lot to be taken. On motion of Trustee Muhleman, the communication was ordered to be received and referred to the Committee of the Whole.

Another communication was received from J. F. Lilly, representative of the City in the matter of acquiring a certain strip of ground belonging to A. G. Walker, near the Brand boulevard bridge over the Verdugo Wash, in connection with the bridge to be erected at that point. The communication stated that an agreement had been arrived at for the exchange of a piece of ground belonging to the City for the piece belonging to Mr. Walker, the City to pay Mr. Walker the sum of \$500.00. Hartley Shaw, who had circulated a petition filed with the City Clerk on April 4, 1918, signed by electors residing in that portion of the City of Glendale formerly known as the City of Tropic, requesting that proceedings be taken for the formation of a municipal improvement district for the issuance of bonds, to be known as Municipal Improvement District No. 2 of the City of Glendale, for the acquisition and construction of works for distributing and supplying electricity to the inhabitants of such district, appeared before the Board and was sworn in by the president and testified that the signatures of the petition which he had circulated were made in his presence, that the signers were aware of the contents of the petition, and that they are residents of said district. The clerk, to whom the petition had been referred, was granted further time in which to check up the names on the petition with the great register.

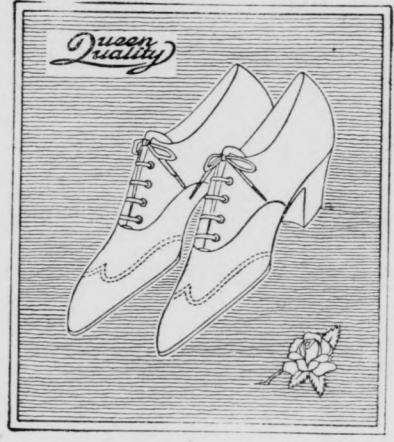

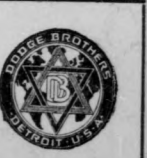
