



The Two Friends, a claim about nine miles from Slocan City between Springer and Lemon creeks, owned by N. C. Murphy and P. M. Schonburg, is truly a great mine. The owners have taken out between 50 and 60 tons of ore during the last month, and the following are assays which they claim to have obtained: Dry ore, 1374, 576, 271, and 238 ounces of silver per ton of ore. The galena ore runs from 68 to 79 per centlead. Another assay of 19,731½ ounces of silver per ton was obtained on a sample of cupriferous argentite which was deemed comparatively usless until shown to a local assayer, who was asked his opinion on it, whose curiosity being aroused, pursuaded Mr. Schonburg to have it assayed, telling him it was about two-thirds pure silver, with the above result.



When I had read thus far I settled down delightfully to read the rest of "The Expedition of Captain Flick and I was not disappointed. It is a rollicking tale with a delightfully mingled flavor of Jules Verne and Frank Stockton. Every one who remembers "The Mystery of the Hansom Cah" by the same author. Fergus Hune, will recognize how skilfully a denouement may be led up to, yet concealed. Captain Flick is not quite so mysterious as the famed murderer, being indeed rather snubbed by the aggrieved young men he inveigles into his wild goose expedition. The narrative abounds in plots, abductions, voicanos, which kill off objectionable people and throw the hero and heroine into safe shelter, intrigues and surprising situations. Such a book keeps one young. There is a quality of perpetual youth about it. When the world was young in story telling it delighted in such absurdities and wonderful achievements; and there are many hints that it has forsaken its middle age realism and once more in its dotage reads tales of wild adventure and mad granks.

Surely with such a multiplicity of books learning ought soon to march along the royal, road. I have received the lately published work of A. R. Hornbrook on "Concrete Geometry." It is a book for beginners, and aims throughout at making definitions and explanantions as intelligible as possible. It is a preparation for demonstrative geometry, and no one who has struggled into Euclid's works unprepared needs to be informed as to the necessity for such a book. The child is led by his own observation into mathematical consciousness, and hence gets definite and exact idea of form. All sorts of encetaining exercises are devised that the child may be insensibly learning while enjoying herself or himself. It is rather a novel idea that small people can begin Euclid, using the alphabet as a starting point. Much of the drudgery of geometry is thus done away, with.

A local interest attaches itself to the collection of short stories "Gemini and Lesser Lights," by Kim Bilir, spublished some time ago. I have but recently read it. A diverting feature of the book is that by means of local hits anent our water supply Victoria is linked to Constantinople as a basis of material. To my mind "Three Ones," "Olmez" and "Heir at Law" are the best stories in the collection, and enen of these is worthy to rank with many of the front file of magazine fiction. The style is simple and direct. While there is no attempt at elaboration the author possesses the art of the story-teller. It is a much more difficult thing to make a readable short story than a long one. Herein Kim Billir has been especially happy. One hopes that British Colum bia will be the next source of material for his tales. With its heterogenous population and a most effective mise-cu-scan wherever you look, and its wealth of miners' treasure-trove, there is surely a rich and varied field for lever pens.

Where She Can Vote Throughout the World and For What.

The countries of the world where wo-men already have some suffrage have an area of over 18,000,000 square niles, and their population is over 350,000,000. In Great Britain women vote for all elective officers except members of par-

In France women teachers elect wo-

men members on all boards of educa-tion.

In Sweden women vote for all elec-tiv officars except representatives. Also indirectly, for members of the house of

lords.

In Norway they have school suffrage.
In Ireland the women vote for the
harbor boards, poor law guardians, and
in Belfast for municipal officers.
In Russia women householders vote
for all elective officers and on all local

In Finland they vote for all elective

matters.

In Finland they vote for all elective officers.

In Austria-Hungary they vote, by proxy, for all elective officers.

In Crotia and Dalmatia they have the privilege of doing so at local elections in person.

In Italy widows vote for members of parliament.

In the Madras presidency and the Bombay presidency, Hindoostan, the women exercise the right of suffrage in all municipalities.

In all countries of Russian Asia they can do so wherever a Russian colony settles. The Russians are colonizing the whole of their vast Asian possessions, and carrying with them the "mir" or self-governming village, wherein women who are heads of households are permitted to vote.

Women have municipal suffrage in Cape Colony, which rules 1,000,000 square miles.

Municipal suffrage rules in New Zealand and at parliamentary elections.

Iceland, in the North Atlautic; the Isle of Man, between England and Ireland, and Pitcairn Island, in the South Pacific, have full women suffrage.

In the Dominion of Canada women have municipal suffrage in every province and also in the Northwest Territories. In Ontario they vote for all elective officers exceed in the election of members of the legislature and parliament.

In the United States 28 states have

In the United States 28 states have given women some form of suffrage.

School suffrage in various degrees is granted to women in Arisona, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Oregon, South Oakota, Texas, Vermon, Washington and Wisconsin.

In Arkansos and Missourt women vote, by petition, on liquor licenses in many cases.

In Delaware suffrage is exercised by women in several municipalities.

In Kansas they have equal suffrage with men in all municipal elections About 50,000 women voted in 1890.

In Montana they vote on all local taxation.

In New York they can and do vote at school elections. The question of the constitutionality of the law is still undecided. They also vote in many places in this state on local improvements, such as gas and electric street lighting, paving, sewerage and municipal bonds. In Utah women voted until disfranchised by the "Edmunds law," when

they promptly organized to demand its reneal.

In Pennsylvania a law was passed in 1800 under which women vote on all local improvements by signing or refusiou to sign petitions therefor.

In Wyoming women have voted on the same terms with men since 1870. The convention in 1880 to form a state constitution, unanimously inserted a provision securing them full suffrage. This constitution was ratified by the voters of an election by about three-fourthy majority. Congress refused to require the disfranchisement of women, and admitted the state July 10, 1890.—Omana Bee.
