

TIMES CORRESPONDENT WRITES NEWSY LETTER

The March of the 2nd Canadian Mounted Rif.es Through Natal-Guarded Botha's Pass.

The following letter has been received from Trooper A. Haggerty, the Times correspondent with the 2nd Canadian Mounted Rifles. The letter was writen at Kitchener's Kopje, Natal, and is dated March 1st;

No doubt you were rather surprised on receipt of my letter from Capetowa, as amentioned that we were discumbarding then. Well, the fact is we had commenced to discumbark when we got orders to proceed to Durban without delay. We left Capetown about 10 p.m., February 13th, and after a delightful voyage of five days arrived at Durban about noon on February 18th. We were not allowed to go up town, but a few of us managed to get away, and after seeming a rickshaw we took a rich around the place for a couple of hours. Considerable comment was expressed by some of the inhabitants on the appearance of the Canadian troops.

While exercising the horses sevaral of the boys rode right into some of the refrashment bars without dismounting and I sasure you the unusual proceeding caused quite a little excitement.

After waiting at Durban for a few hours, exercising the horses, etc., we

After waiting at Durban for a few hours, exercising the horses, etc., we were rushed up to Newcastle, Natal. We nrived lin Newcastle on February 20th, after being two days on the train, and went finto camp about five miles from the town. We had not been in camp 24 hours when orders came for 150 of us to proceed to Botha's Pass, in the Transwal. Our troop was included in the 150, so we left camp at 5 p.m., February 21st, on our march to Botha's Pass. The reason we were sent there was that it was expected that 900 Boers were going to break through the lines, and Botha's Pass was rathering weak point. We had to march on foot, as our horses were too weak to fide after their long trip from

to march on foot, as our horses were too west it fide after their long trip from Halifax; so we left them behind in camp with the rest of the boys.

We started out in a terrible rain storm, and in a few minutes were wet through. We marched till 10 p.m. that through. We marched till 10 p.m. that might, and camped at a place called Bothn's Post, about 15 miles from where we started, and 10 miles from our destination. You will think this very slow marching, but we were going through ditches and climbing kopies, and the winds were in a fearful condition. We made down just as we were, without a tent or blankets. Each got a hard tack biscuit to cat when we got into camp, and we ate it with reliab. We were lungry enough to eat anything at that time.

We were awakened at 3 a.m. the fol lowing day, and resumed our march. The rain still came down in torrents, and we arrived is Botha's Pass about 9/a.m. arrived is Botha's Pass about 9 am, Mebruary 22nd, looking pretty tough when we got there. The British columns were out about 10 miles, driving the Poers into our lines, and 150 of us guarded the line for about that distance, touch you have heard how the Boers broke through, about two miles from us. by driving their cattle into one of the trenches, and while the men were engaged with shooting the cattle they rode around the treuch and escaped. I think about 160 prisoners were captured, but it was rather disappositing, as it was expected that the whole bunch would be faken.

We stopped at Botha's Pass four days

fell fighting his way to the relief of Ladysmith.

At Colenso we saw the grave where Lord Roberts's son was killed, and we crossed that treacherous old river-called Tugela, where the British met many reverses. It is a country where ten men could defend a position against one hundred. 'I interviewed several of the Boer prisoners captured at Botha's Pass, and they were old-timers that were at the battles of Dundee. Ehanslangte and seige of Ladysmith. They claimed that the Boers cannot held out much longer, as they are nearly out of animumition. But I guess they are hard customer to

But you would hardly think that there is a war going on out here now. You can march for days without seeing a Eoer, but at times when we are out scouting we see small parties of them on the sky line, but we seldom get near enough to get into a fight with them. Our total loss of horses from Halifax to Durban was eight, which is considered a veer good record. The horses are

to Durban was eight, which is considered a very good record. The horses are still a little shaky from the effects of their voyage, but they are pulling around first rate. All of the boys are in the best of health so far. A couple of our troopers have sprained ankles, but otherwise were are O. K.

I will now bring this letter to a conclusion, as I haven't anything more of any importance to tell you at present. The boys send their best wishes to all their friends in Victoria.



SYNOPSIS OF REGULATIONS

For Disposal of Minerals on Dominion Lands in Manitoba, the Northwest Territories, and the Yukon Terri-

COAL

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10.00 per acre for soft coal, and \$20.00 for anthracite. Not more than \$20 acres can be acquired by one individual, or company. Royalty at such rate as may from tipe to time be specified by Order in Council shall be collected on the gross output. QUARTZ.

Persons of eighteen years and over and joint stock companies holding Free Miner's Certificates may obtain entry for a mining

At least \$100,00 must be expended on the ciaim each year or paid to the Mining Recorder in . Heu thereof. When \$505,00 has been expended or paid the locator may, upon having a survey made and upon complying with other recuirements purchase the land at \$1.00 an acre.

Perovision may be granted by the Minister of the Interior to locate claims coutaining iron and mica, also copper, in the Yukon Territory, of an area not exceeding 160 acres.
