The Times herewith makes an announcement of the inase in its city and suburban delivery rate of from 75c to \$1.00 per month, and the advance of the mailing rate to country subscribers of from \$4.00 to \$6.00 per year. These advances are effective immediately to new subscribers. Present subscribers will be charged at the old rate to June 30th.

The Times regrets the necessity for this action, which is due entirely to the extraordinary increase in the cost of paper, technicentirely to the extraordinary increase in the cost of paper, technic-ally known as "newsprint." This newsprint up to two years ago was purchased by The Times for \$53.00 per ton f. o, b. the dock at Victoria. This price was advanced until about three weeks ago it was \$92.00 per ton. On May 22nd, however, The Times received notice of an immediate increase to \$120.00 per ton, f. o. b. the mill at Powell River. This price means that newsprint is costing us laid down in The Times Offlice, about 7½c. per lb., as compared with the former cost of approximately 3c. per lb. The pew rate on the Pacific Coast is higher than in any other part of Canada, the prevailing price in the East now being \$100.00 per ton.

prevailing price in the East now being \$100.00 per ton. The new conditions will mean an increase to The Times in the cost of paper alone of nearly one hundred dollars per day. Since receiving the announcement from the manufacturers the manage-ment of this paper has endeavored to adjust matters so that the additional financial burden would not fall on either the subscriber or advertiser, but it has not been found possible to make such an arrangement without facing ultimate disaster. The advance in newsprint is not the only factor that necessitates an advanced subscription rate. Other things that go into the production of a newspaper, such as ink, zinc, type, machinery, etc., are now costing as much as 100% more than either before or during the war, while wages have also been increased considerably. In a statement made to the London press on In a statement made to the London press on his return from Russia, Mr. Benjamin Turner, a member of the British Labor delegation which has just completed its investigations into condi-tions under Soviet rule, declares that the major-ity of the people of Moscow and Petrograd are supporters of the Bolshevik Government; the rural population, however, while not opposing the desting regime is described as not fully in agree existing regime, is described as not fully in agree-ment with communism. This very frank admis-of Great Britain. ion on the part of a prominent member of the British Labor Party may be taken to reflect the correct state of affairs in Russia as seen and understood by the workingmen's representatives. Indeed, Mr. Turner's conclusions are clearly explanatory of the secret of Soviet domination. Quite naturally in the industrialized areas of the former Empire little difficulty actually is experi-enced by the Lenine-Trotzky regime in imposing its terms and compelling compliance. The threat of armed force and the consequent dislocation of the commercial and social fabric in true Bolshevik planatory of the secret of Soviet domination. style is not to be trifled with. Nevertheless, it is interesting to learn from Mr. Turner that the rural areas are, to say the least, not too kindly dis-posed to Moscow rule. posed to Moscow rule. PRAISES APPLETON PRINTS IN NEW YORK

New York, June 12.—(By Canadian Press)—A Canadian collector has just shown New York what the critics de-clare to have been the most import-ant collection of prints of Hiroshige, the master of Japanese landscape art, ever seen here. He is Colonel H. Appleton, of Victoria, B. C., one of the leading art collectors of the Do-minion

Appleton, of Victoria, B. C., one of the leading art collectors of the Do-minion. Colonei Appleton's collection of Hiroshige prints was placed on exhi-bition recently at the Walpole gal-leries here. It attracted widespread attention in art circles and high prices were obtained at the sale held at the conclusion of the exhibition. The collection included many rare impressions of the famous Japanese artist's work, the most motable prob-ably being those of the 'Tede Helsho Hyakkai,'' or hundred views of Yedde Experts here have agreed that the United States. In addition to the Japanese prints Col. Appleton also exhibited an interesting group of Thibetan art, siks, bronzes and Korean objects, and old Viking silver. Col. Appleton spent the early years of his life in India and the Orient, and then settled in London, where his collection of Japanese prints was a noted one among cohnoisseurs. About the years age he went to Canada and his first collection was dispersed at 80theby's. Col. Appleton settled in Victoria and immediately began a col-lection of perfect prints of the great Japanese landscape artist, and the success of his efforts in this work is attested by the verdict given by New York art circles upon the collection shown here. Supporting their contentions with arlous arguments, the delegation resented the following memorandum o the Council:



 It is proposed that the Corporation of the City of Victoria shall purchase a site for a cemetery, and lay ft out and maintain it for cemetery purposes. The general plan and design shall be approved by the parties financially interested.
 Each church shall have the privilege of acquiring a section of its paying a portion of the purchase price commensurate with the area it takes.
 The title to each section shall be vested in the church of rit a section shall be vested in the church (or its nominee) which pays for it.
 Each church shall have the exclusive right of setting the price and terms of burial plots within its own section.

5. The maintenance of the whole

5. The maintenance of the whole cemetery shall devolve upon the city, and in order to provide funds for this purpose a certain percentage of the sale price of lots, say, not ex-ceeding 25 per cent, shall be set aside to create a sinking fund for the per-petual upkeep and maintenance. An-other percentage shall be set aside for general maintenance.
