

BOLSHEVIKI HOLD A CONFERENCE

Congress of Peoples of East at Irkutsk

Riga, Dec. 30.—(Associated Press).
—The Congress of People's of the East opened December 22 at Irkutsk with 100 delegates in attendance, says a radio dispatch from Moscow received here to-day.
This meeting has been characterized as the attraction of the Bolsheviki in opposition to the Washington conference on limitation of armaments and Far Eastern affairs.

A dispatch from Peking, November 13, said the Siberian Soviet Government was declared to be displeased over the fact that it was not represented at the Washington Conference and had invited the "weaker nations" to "an Asia conference" at Irkutsk. It was stated that representatives of Siam, Persia and India and the Philippings were on the way to Irkutsk. Emphasis was laid on importance of the gathering to Korea. The dispatch from Peking added that local delegations of Koreans and Chinese who were leaving for the assembly were declared in official circles to be representatives of obscure groups of malcontents.

MONTREAL HARBOR OFFICIALS RESIGN

New Government Will Appoint Harbor Commissioners

Montreal, Dec. 30.—As a corollary to the resignation of the Meighen Government and the selection of the new Cabinet by Hon. Mackenzle King, the resignation of Farquhar, Robertson and Briggen A. Labelle, members of the Montreal Harbor Commission, will early next week be forwarded to Hone-Ernest Lapointe, newly-appointed Minister of Marine. The Chairman of the Commission, W. G. Ross, had already resigned prior to his nomination as Conservative candidate in the St. Antoine Division of this city, for which seat he was defeated by Hon. Walter Mitchell. In connection with the new appointments to the Harbor Commission, the name of Dr. W. L. Macdougald is freely mentioned here. He holds many business positions, among them that of director of the Dominion Steel Corporation, and he is President of the Ogdensburg Coal and Towing Company.

CANNIBALISM

Natives in Far North Reported Starving

AMONG INDIANS

Edmonton, Dec. 30.—A constable of the Mounted Police will spend the beginning of 1922 in the howling wild-erness of the Barren Lands, because, it is reported that indians of the district have resorted to cannibalism this Winter.

Accompanied by an Indian guide and two husky drivers, with their teams, the constable has gone out from Fort Fitzgerald, 590 miles north of here, to carry white man's justice into the Barren Lands. His objective is approximately 400 miles north of Fitzgerald. He will be two months gone. They have taken their own supplies.

The constable's name was not
given in the letter which brought the
news from Fitzgerald to-day.

The Barren Lands are destitute of
any source of food except the herds
of caribou which trek across them
during a certain period in the Summer. Last Summer the caribou did
not come from the shores of the
Arctic Ocean as usual. The Winter's
food could not be laid up and the Indians are starving, it is reported.
They are said to have killed some
members of their tribe for food.

The habitat of these Indians is
about 500 miles from the nearest
railroad.

PLAYING GAMES FOR MUCH GOLD

Golfers Who Are Paid More **Than Cabinet Ministers**

One result of the present great boom in sports and games is that there is an increased demand for pro-fessional players and for competent instructors and "coaches." The youth who excels in any of the popular games of to-day has many chances of turning his provess into money and in fact, of making sport his liveli-hood.

hood.

In football there are many "plums" to be picked. A place in a first-class team means a salary of £450 a year, with bonuses of £2 for a win and £1 for a draw. Over and above this, a player of five years' standing with the same club becomes eligible for a "benefit," which may yield him anything from £600 to £1,200 in cash.

To become a football "pro." a player must first attract attention. He can do this only by playing good football—in spite of the tales of wire-pulling that are constantly being circulated. Representatives of the leading clubs are always on the lookout for promising material. Several are touring the country at the present time in search of likely recruits for their teams.

Cricket is not quite so profitable. Professionals are paid by the match, the sum varying according to the club. Young "pros," who are not members of the first eleven get from £2 los. to £3 a week, with £1 a week in the "off" season. Such players are usually able to supplement their wages by tips front aspiring amateurs, to whom they act as instructors at the nets.

Test Match players proceeding to Australia get £8 a week for out-of-pocket expenses. At home they receive £30 a match, reserve players getting £20.

Few games ofer better financial inducements than lawn tennis. Tenhis "professors," as they are called, are greatly in demand all the year round. A first-class "coach" can make from £1,600 Ao £1,500 a year at a fashionable seaside resort of the suburbs, with opportunities of making a few extra pounds a week from private pupils. Professional exhibition players also make large sums. One famous woman-player makes £5,000 a year in this way.

Golf is another game which offers big rewards to the skilful player. There are more financial romances in golf than in any other game. James Braid, who was a gardener at a pound or so a week, now makes as much as a Cabinet Minister, and a similar story could be told of many other well-known exponents of the game. The advantage of golf is that you are not compelled, unless by ill-health, to retire at a given age. Professional life of the golf expert is a long one.

A leading jockey gets a formal fee of £3 a mount and £5 for a winning mount; and he may ride four hundred horses in a season.—Tit-Bits.





STREET CAR PASSENGERS

Cars Will Stop at the Near Side Crossing on Paved and Unpaved Streets

BOARD and alight at the front end of the car only. Look both ways before stepping on to the roadway to board a car. Look both ways before stepping on to the roadway when alighting from a car. Have your EXACT fare ready. Hand transfers to conductor unfolded. Stand almost at the street intersection while waiting to board a car. While speed is necessary, please understand that it takes second place to safety. Our instructions to employees are that safety must be the first consideration under all circumstances.



This diagram shows the direction of all cars over the city loop and the proper place to stand while waiting to board any car on any route. The numbers in every instance refer to the destination sign numbers on the cars—1, Oak Bay; 3, Beacon Hill; 5, Gorge Park; 10, Mount Tolmie, etc., while the star or asterisk denotes the proper place to stand while waiting to board an approaching car. For instance, at the corner of Yates and Broad the numbers 11, 9, 5, 4, 3, 1 denote cars for the Willows, Uplands, Gorge, Esquimalt, Beacon Hill and Oak Bay may conveniently be boarded at this point while the arrow and line enclosing the numbers indicates in which direction the car will proceed. The same idea applies to all numbers shown on the diagram.





Trade Union Introspection

Secretary of the British General Federation Tells the Truth As He Sees It About Organized Labor

(From The London Spectator)

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Everything written by W. A. Appleton, secretary of the tieneral Federation of Trade Unions, is well worth reading, and his new book, "What We Want and Where We Are" is packed with good sense. We have no doubt that if he had been listened to years ago we should now hear little of unemployment. A short introduction has been provided by that stalwart labor leader Colonel John Ward, who writes with his usual plainness;

"In times of stress (he says) we are apt to do strange things and adopt stranger remedies in the sometimes vain hope of overcoming our difficulties. The trade union shovement has had its period of stress and strange remedies, but its recent afflictions have produced a finer crop of quacks than usual, and it is the more necessary that this great instrument for human betterment and industrial regeneration should begin to consult the less showy but more sober of its professors."

Tyranny of Phrases.

Mr. Appleton dees well to lead off for a dark. Appleton's assertion that onthing counts for so much as spiritual values," He deals faithfully with various fashionable nose while with the ties of work and guilds that they are building on discredited foundation. The trade guilds died, he says, of "super exclusiveness." Just as landless men attack land owners, so it was the excluded craftsman who attacked and brought about the downfall of the guilds. He expresses the confident opinion that unless revived suilds were to include every one engaged in or attached to the industry which they served they would be bound to fail again.

Workshop Control.

Turning to what is called "work shop control," he points 'out very require the demand for it is of political rather than industrial origin. The principle of workshop control, that is to say, control by the workers themselves, assumes a knowledge not merely of industrial processes, but of commercial management and international exchanges. Mr. Appleton says that he knows admirable workmen

Its rehabilitation and its satisation lie in freedom from control by other organizations, in the use of its funds for industrial instead of political purposes, in the logical development of the craft ideal, in the amalgamation of all similar trades, and in the federation of all amalgamations. The fight to recover freedom will be better, for those who have invaded the movement will not easily be driven out. If, however, the straight men who are trade unionists first and politicians afterwards will put their hearts into the work success is assured."


away?" Yes, Mummy, but once you forgot, was the astonishing reply.
