Dr. W. Horace Day
FIRST CONGERGATIONAL

Scheme for Broader Religious Education Presented—Evangelism Training—Workers Needed.

In his sermon at the First Congregation Church yesterday, Dr. W. Horace Day, the pastor, spoke of "The Church and Education." He urged that education must be religious and that public education is not adequate. He said in part:

"We have always recognized that education includes training in morality, but many in the past generation believe morality could be developed without religion. Our best educators today are abandoning this idea, convinced that no community can be adequately developed in morals without instruction in religion, the religious sanction being absolutely essential.

"Our system of secular education, provided by the State, has so evidently been inadequate in the task of training young people in the moral qualities necessary for the using of the exceedingly rich and varied material resources of life that our great educational gatherings have constantly focused their attention upon this problem.

"The most effective means for achieving religious education can be used only through the church and the home. We cannot commit to our great public educational system the entire responsibility for education for it has separated itself from the vine of which it is a branch. The time has not come when the public school can resume specific religious instruction."

Declaring that home training is inadequate the speaker, said:

"There is no part of the educative process more vital than that done by the home. If American parents were ideal in moral character and in training, we might entrust to them a large part of the religious element essential to education, but American parents are all too frequently far below such standards. The new social order, with its complex, high-speed

industrial life, its tremendous passion for pleasure, and its desertion of many traditional customs, has militated against anything like effective home training. The public school staggers under the attempt to do what parents ought to do, in addition to what should be expected of the teacher.

"The church is responsible for the religious education of the nation, because modern home training is not adequately meeting the need.

"If the church is to go on, the educative process must not be confined to young people included in the primary, grammar school and high school ages. There must be what could be called the college and extension department, classes meeting on Sunday to do post-graduate work in special lines; other classes assembled in different neighborhoods for afternoon or evening sessions, devoted to the study of the Bible, of missions, of the religious problems in the realm of sociology and those in the realm of psychology."

The Forum.

In spite of the large attendance at the Y. M. C. A. rally last Sunday, the Forum had a crowded house with every seat taken. The session in spite of the spiritedness of the debates was one of the most harmonious in its history. Several amendments to the constitution were offered but were defeated after being debated.

The attempt to discharge the committee on constitutional revision failed. The committee will therefore recommend a few necessary amendments.

There will be a general discussion on Women's Suffrage next Sunday. Attorney W. R. Taylor will open the discussion with a speech against Women's Suffrage. This will be followed by a general discussion. The Equal Rights League will send a representative.

Temperance Sentiment Among Colored People of the United States is Growing.

Work Among Colored People

After a pleasant trip beginning with Texas in October, 1910, touching Tennessee, West Virginia, Maryland, Washington, D. C., Ohio, before the holidays, and Illinois Wisconsin, Nebraska, Wyoming, Washington, Oregon and California and with Arizona and New Mexico to visit before returning to Texas I believe I can safely say that the Negro race is taking in the scientific and religious objections to strong drink and is beginning to see that financially tippling does not pay. Fathers and mothers are awakening to the fact that the moderate use of liquor in the home is not always a safe example for their children, some of whom may be led to drunkenness beginning with moderate drinking.

The women are not slow in seeing that it is their special duty to protect the home through total abstinence and to organize the Woman's Christian Temperance Union as a means of educating public sentiment against the use and sale of intoxicating liquors. The Loyal Temperance Legions are being mothered by loving-hearted women—women who will dare to try to help save the youth of today from the ravages of rum, that there may be a physically, mentally and morally strong race tomorrow which will honor God with their being.

The California women are coming to the front for temperance and for purity in homes and in the government. The men are going to stand by them in their efforts.

The ministers in this state as in all others have freely given their pulpits for the temperance cause on Sundays at eleven o'clock and in the evening, giving the whole hour and generally with a

second offering for the temperance work without being asked. There are a very few instances in the United States where ministers refuse their pulpits on Sunday. It is most hopeful thus, for it shows that they recognize the divine right of woman to shield the home and to ask all others to assist her, and that they recognize that this reform is not of man but of God. Every city in this state but one has given its pulpits at the best services. And two in that city gave their best hours. San Francisco, Baptist Church, Dr. J. M. Riddle, pastor, gave the morning service on Easter Sunday, realizing that Christ, who rose for victory for the drunkard, who was cured, would be pleased to have a message in his behalf. The A. M. E. Church gave their evening service the same Sunday. We see more people on Sunday and the work receives right recognition at such times.

Praise God for these ministers who see that this is not our battle but God's, and we are not afraid of the multitude of liquor interests arrayed against us.

Fresno under the leadership of Rev. Price, A. M. E. pastor gave the best planned meetings of any place in the northern part of the state.

San Diego gave the best planned meetings of any city in the Southern part. Sunday evening, Rev. Harbut led by giving the evening service, and the Baptists followed Monday night with another crowded house.

Sunday afternoon, at Los Angeles, an interesting audience greeted the plea for the home in Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Rev. J. T. Hill, the pastor, encouraged and assisted the movement in every way.

Will Have A \$100,000 Building

As a result of a brilliant cam-
paign of seven days, the colored
citizens of this city by raising
about \$40,000 have secured a
\$100,000 Y. M. C. A. building.
By the terms of the agreement, Mr.
Rosewald of Chicago agreed to
contribute \$25,000 if the people
of this city would contribute \$75,-
000. The Central Y. M. C. A. of
this city agreed to contribute \$37,-
500 if the colored people would
contribute a similar amount. The
colored people have raised nearly
\$3,000 more than the amount re-
quired of them. In this they out-
stripped the white people who were
\$65,000 short at the end of the
same period. The men who had
charge of the campaign as well as
the citizens at large did themselves
proud and deserve congratulations.

The Unions After the Negro Again

At San Diego a hotel keeper
employing a large number of wait-
resses discharged them claiming
that he could not use them on ac-
count of the eight hour law. He
filled their places with colored
men. The unions immediately held
indignation meeting bitterly de-
nouncing the proprietor for em-
ploying negroes, and yet some of
the negroes belonged to the unions.
In spite of their recent pledges to
the contrary, the unions find it
very difficult to treat the negro
workmen as a man and brother.
If the unions ever succeed in land-
ing the colored brother safely with-
in their folds, his working days will
be over.

Education

There are people in the United States who say: "We have tried education as a solution for the race problem and failed, therefore" etc.

We cannot not too often insist that this is not true. We have never tried the experiment. We have begun the experiment—we have tried it here and there, but the United States has not today and never has had, a complete rational system of elementary education for its myriads of black and white children and this fact is perhaps the greatest arraignment of American democracy.

Educational facilities are not good throughout the north, while in the South they are on the whole, wretched.

The Birmingham Age-Herald said editorially in 1910: "About one-third of the children of school age in this state go to school, and two-thirds do not This puts Alabama on the Russian basis. . . . It is safe to say that one-half of the 700,000 children of today are not sent to school and are, therefore, growing up without a public school education. It is also safe to say that the school accommodations of this state are not ample enough to care for one-half of the State's children." Why in the face of such facts will people insist that education has failed.

Let us try education and try it on a national scale. Let us have federal aid to common school training, even if it delays our battle-our battleships and puts the annual army maneuvers out of business. A statement made a few years ago by the superintendent of education in the Southern States set forth these facts:

"Comparative statistics of undoubted authority show that of all sections of the United States the public schools of the South have the poorest houses and equipment, the most poorly paid teachers, the shortest school terms and

the most inadequate supervision. The average salary of teachers for the country at large is \$49 for men and \$40 for women, while the average salary for teachers in the Southern States is \$35.36 for men and \$30.47 for women. The average length of the public school term for the country at large is 145 days. The average length of the public school term for the north Atlantic States is 177.3 days; the average length of the public school term for the Southern States, including Tennessee, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Louisiana, Arkansas, Georgia, Texas Virginia and Florida is 99 days.

For every woman and child of its population the country at large is spending \$2.99 for the education of its children. The country at large is spending \$20.29 for every pupil enrolled in its public schools. The Southern States are spending only \$6.95. The country at large is spending for every child of school age in the United States an average of \$10.57; the Southern States are spending for every child of school age within their borders \$4.05

Twenty four per cent of the white population of the United States dwell in the Southern States that composed the Confederacy, while 64 per cent of all the white illiterates over 10 years of age are found in these states.—The Grissis.
