PUBLIC ASSISTANCE REPORTS

1. References:

- a. Operational Directive No. 9, this headquarters, dated 24 January 1946, subject: "Japanese Army-Navy Supplies held for Relief Distribution".
- b. Operational Directive No. 35, this headquarters, dated 29 March 1946, subject: "Public Assistance".

2. Beginning with the August report period, the report required by paragraph 2c of Operational Directive No. 9 and those required by paragraphs 4d and 4e of Operational Directive No. 35 will no longer be required by this headquarters.

3. Prefectural welfare authorities have been directed to submit public assistance reports to the Japanese Welfare Ministry by the 15th of each month. The August report will be submitted by 15 September; those for subsequent months by the 15th of each month for the preceding month. The Japanese Government has been directed to consolidate these reports and submit a copy thereof to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and a copy to the Commanding General of the Eighth Army.

4. It is desired that appropriate steps be taken to insure that public assistance reports are properly completed and forwarded by the prefectural governments to the Japanese Welfare Ministry not later than the 15th of each month, with an information copy to the military government team of the prefecture.

5. The military government team in each prefecture, commencing with the report period for August 1946, will submit through channels to this headquarters by the 20th of September and by the same date monthly thereafter, a report containing the following information extracted from the public assistance report received from the prefectural government:


- a. Total number of persons receiving public assistance.
- b. Net amount of cash grants in yen.
- c. Total number of persons being cared for in institutions.
- d. Total cost of assistance in kind.

Collection, Classification and Disposition of Japanese
 Swords and Firearms

1. References:

- a. SCAP Radio, Cite ZAX 5207, dated 9 September 1945, subject, "Retention of Swords by Japanese". (Incl. #1).
- b. SCAP Radio, Cite ZAX 5981, dated 24 September 1945, subject, "Retention of Weapons by Japanese" (Incl 2).
- c. Letter, Headquarters Eighth Army, AG 474 (MG), dated 4 October 1945, subject, "Permits for Hunting Guns," (Incl 3) with Eighth Army Radio, Cite DX 71904 DE, dated 4 October 1945 as Appendix A to Inclosure #3.
- d. SCAP Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government, subject, "Instructions Concerning the Surrender of Arms by the Civilian Population of Japan," AG 388.3 (23 Oct 45) c/s (SCAPIN - 181), dated 23 October 1945. (Incl. #4).
- e. SCAP Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government, subject, "Retention of Swords Classified as Objects of Art in Civilian Hands", AG 386.3 (10 Jan 46) c/s (SCAPIN 574), dated 10 January 1946, (Incl. 5).
- f. Japanese Imperial Ordinance No. 300. dated 15 June 1946, subject, "Imperial Ordinance Prohibiting Possession of Firearms and Other Weapons," (Incl #6, with Art. 2, Ministry of Home Affairs Ordinance #28 as Appendix A).

2. The following instructions cover the collection, classification and disposition of all captured or surrendered Japanese Samurai or other type swords and/or firearms.

3. The collection and/or confiscation of swords and firearms from Japanese individuals is a function of the Japanese civil police as directed by the Imperial Japanese Government (See Incl #2). Prefectural military government teams will supervise this work within the area of their responsibility. Tactical troops formerly charged with the responsibility of such collections are hereby relieved of that mission and stocks of swords now in the custody of tactical troops will be turned over to the Japanese civil police. Receipts will be obtained in duplicate; one (1) copy will be forwarded to the local military government unit. When requested to do so, the local military government unit will furnish necessary liaison between the tactical troops and the Japanese government. If the Japanese are found to possess illegal swords or firearms, the Japanese police will be notified immediately. The occupation forces will not physically disarm any Japanese unless lives are endangered.

4. The Imperial Japanese Government will furnish a committee of expert sword appraisers who will inspect and classify all swords now in custody and to be surrendered. Operating under the policies set forth by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers (references 1a, 1b, 1c, and 1e above) this committee will select all swords of categories exempted by these policies and return them to their owners. The initiation of the inspection will be the responsibility of the local prefectural government which will contact the Home Ministry regarding the date on which the inspection will begin. The local military government units will exercise necessary surveillance to assure that no unnecessary delays are occasioned.

5. Each exempted sword and hunting gun will be accompanied by a certificate (Appendix A to reference 1f above) authorizing the owner to retain the weapon, the certificate being written in Japanese and English. These certificates will be made out in duplicate; the original to be given to the owner of the weapon, the duplicate to be placed on file with the prefectural government. A register will be kept by the prefectural authorities showing the certificate serial number and will be subject to inspection at any time. Military government units will report to this headquarters when the survey is completed within the area of their responsibility and the total number of swords and hunting guns authorized to be retained.

6. Certificates formerly issued by other agencies and now in possession of individuals who have retained swords and/or hunting guns will be replaced by the new form certificate. It is a function of the prefectural police to notify holders of the old certificates to submit them for replacement. Reexamination of the right of possession of weapons now authorized is not contemplated.

7. Swords remaining after the exempted swords have been returned and all firearms not authorized for retention will be shipped to the Tokyo Ordnance Supply Depot, Akabane Station, Tokyo for final disposition. The packing of these weapons and delivery to the appropriate US Army rail transportation office for rail shipment or to the Tokyo Ordnance Supply Depot by truck shipment is a responsibility of the Japanese civil police. Their work in this matter will be supervised and controlled by the local military government unit. Separate instructions for the disposing of this stock of swords and firearms will be furnished the Commanding Officer, Tokyo Ordnance Supply Depot.

8. Retention of hunting guns will be in accordance with authority granted by paragraph 2a, SCAP radio, cite ZAX 5981 (Incl 2) and letter, this headquarters, dated 8 November 1945, AG 474 (MG), subject: "Permit for Hunting Guns." (Incl 3).

9. Caches or stocks of Japanese government-issued swords and/or firearms discovered by tactical troops will be disposed of by shipping them to Tokyo Ordnance Supply Depot without having them appraised by the Japanese committee. Weapons other than government-issued weapons discovered by any unit will be reported to the local military government unit.

SWORDS WHICH ARE ISSUED BY THE GOVERNMENT AND THEREFORE ARE GOVERNMENT PROPERTY, WILL BE TURNED IN WITH OTHER WEAPONS OF WAR. UNQUOTE.

NOTE: Verbal interpretation of the above was made by the Chief of Staff, APPAC on 10 Sept 45 to the effect that retention of swords by ex-officers will be only those swords which are heirlooms. Government-issued swords which were purchased are not to come within the category of heirlooms and will be turned in with other weapons of war as directed in the 2d par of Memo of SCAP dated 7 Sept 45.

1. The Japanese police are issuing permits for the retention of hunting guns per radio DX 71904 DE, this headquarters, dated 24 Sept 45. (Appendix A hereto)

2. The permit to retain weapons is issued in duplicate upon forms as attached, the original being delivered to the licensee and the copy retained by the issuing authority.

3. The licensee shall have the permit with him at all times when carrying the weapon.

4. In addition to the above, each hunter is issued a hunting license, in Japanese, and a white arm band with the "HUNTER" printed thereon.

5. It is desired that you periodically check the issuance of permits as described in paragraphs 1 and 2, above, and report any irregularities or abuses to this headquarters.

PART IV. NO (REPEAT NO) OFFICER OR ENLISTED MAN SHALL TAKE SUCH WEAPONS FOR HIS OWN USE.

MEMORANDUM FOR: THE IMPERIAL JAPANESE GOVERNMENT

THROUGH : Central Liaison Office, Tokyo

SUBJECT : Instructions Concerning the Surrender of Arms
by the Civilian Population of Japan.

1. The following instructions supplement those issued by this headquarters in a Radiogram to the Imperial Japanese Government, above subject, dated 24 September 1945:

a. The Imperial Japanese Government shall surrender all firearms, swords, bayonets, daggers and other weapons, ammunition, explosives and components thereof collected from the civilian population to U.S. Army representatives in accordance with instructions issued by the Commanding Generals of the Sixth and Eighth Armies and the Commander of the Fifth Fleet, USN.

(1) The following exceptions will be allowed:

- (a) Firearms and knives required for hunting purposes, and swords considered objects of art.
- (b) Explosives required by legitimate business of industrial organizations.

(2) Individual licenses and permits covering the above exceptions will be issued by the Imperial Japanese Government and reported monthly, by list, to this headquarters, the Commanding Generals of the Sixth and Eighth Armies, the Commander of the Fifth Fleet, USN, or other appropriate Occupation Force Commanders.

(3) Individuals and organizations duly licensed to retain and use firearms and explosives, or components thereof, shall comply with such instructions as may be issued by the appropriate Occupation Force Commander in the area.

b. The Imperial Japanese Government shall take whatever action is necessary to comply with these instructions and prevent violations or deception in the issuance of licenses or permits. Initial collection of arms, ammunition and explosives and issuance of licenses for authorized retentions shall be completed by 1 December 1945. Such subsequent checks and inspections shall be conducted as are necessary to detect violations and evasions of these instructions.

2. The Imperial Japanese Government shall submit a complete report to this headquarters not later than 1 December 1945 and monthly thereafter, indicating the number of firearms and weapons and the amount of explosives or components thereof confiscated or licensed, by type and location, together with copies of instructions to prefectural Governors and Police Chiefs and proclamations issued to effectuate the instructions issued by this headquarters.

1. Reference is made to letter, GLO 1074 (1.3), dated 13 December 1945, subject as above.

2. This headquarters reaffirms the policy established in SCAP Radio ZAX 5981, to the Imperial Japanese Government, dated 24 September 1945. This policy permits swords to be retained provided they are actually objects of art and are in the hands of bona-fide civilians.

Imperial Ordinance
No. 300IMPERIAL ORDINANCE PROHIBITING POSSESSION
OF FIREARMS AND OTHER WEAPONS

Article 1. The possession of firearms, explosives, or swords (hereinafter called firearms or other weapons) shall be prohibited excepting the cases where they are possessed for legitimate duty purposes in accordance with the laws and ordinances, as well as any of the cases where, by virtue of the decisions by the Minister of Home Affairs, a special permission is obtained from the Prefectural Governor concerned (or from the Superintendent-General of the Metropolitan Area of Tokyo) regarding one of the following items: (See Article 2 Ministry of Home Affairs Ordinance No 28 listed as Appendix A.)

1. Those necessary for the extermination of harmful birds and beasts.
2. Those required by professional hunters for their business purposes.
3. Swords having value as objects of art.
4. Explosives required for industrial purposes.

The scope of the firearms or other weapons as specified in the preceding paragraph shall be determined by the Minister of Home Affairs. (See Article 1 Ministry of Home Affairs Ordinance No. 28 listed as Appendix A).

Article 2. Any person, who does not obtain permission or obtains it by fraudulent means in violation of the preceding Article and keeps firearms or other weapons, shall be liable to an imprisonment with or without hard labor not exceeding three years or to a fine not exceeding 5,000 yen. Firearms or other weapons in the possession of any person, except where they are confiscated through judicial means, shall be forfeited by administrative disposition no matter where their ownership lies.

Article 3. Besides what are determined by the present Ordinance, all matters necessary for prohibiting possession of firearms or other weapons shall be determined by the Minister of Home Affairs.

Supplementary Provisions:

The present Ordinance shall come into force as from June 15, 1946.

Any person (including his successor) who keeps firearms or other weapons at the time of enforcement of the present Ordinance and intends to keep them successively after enforcement thereof, shall apply for permission within two months according to the provisions of Article 1. Pending the disposal of permission or prohibition for the above application, the applicant is deemed as having obtained permission according to the same Article.

We hereby enact the Regulations for the Enforcement of the Ordinance Prohibiting Possession of Firearms and other Weapons as follows:

The Regulations for the Enforcement of the Ordinance Prohibiting Possession of Firearms and other Weapons.

Article 1. The scope of firearms and other weapons shall be determined in accordance with Art. 1, Para. 2 of the Ordinance Prohibiting Possession of Firearms and other Weapons (hereinafter called the Ordinance) as follows:

1. The "firearms" are the powder-charged firearms that have the function of firing a bullet.

2. The explosives are the low and high explosives, and priming materials manufactured at the Army and Navy for the combat purposes by order of the Army and Navy authorities.

a. Low explosives are such as tai joyaku (lamellar powder), chujoyaku (cordite), and Koyaku (propellant).

b. High explosives are such as Oshokuyaku (picric acid) chakatsuyaku (trinitrotoluol), myoayaku (tetranitromethylaniline), heineiyaku (trinitro-phenethol), onayaku (mixture of niclis acid and dinitro-naphthalen) angwayaku (mixture of ammonium nitrate, trimethylen trinitramine and nitro guanidine), shotoyaku (mixture of ammonium nitrate and trinitrotoluol), shouyaku (trimethylen trinitramine), entoyaku (mixture of potassium chlorate and dimitrotoluol), and otsuyaku (bursting explosives).

c. Priming materials are such as rifle cartridge, blank cartridge, cartridge, shell containing low or high explosives, submarine mine, military mine, detonator, shell fuse, primer, tube, bomb, hand grenade, incendiary bomb, signal bomb, smoke shell, and flare bomb.

3. The "swords" are such swords, dirks or daggers with blades longer than 5 sun, or spears, or halberds. (Sun is approximately 1.5 inches. The above 5 sun equals $7\frac{1}{2}$ inches)

Article 2. Any person who desires to obtain the permission as specified in each number of Para. 1, Article 1 of the Ordinance must apply to the Prefectural Governor of their dwelling places on depicting the following items by letter:

1. The domicile, address, profession, name (or the title, the address of the main office, and the name and address of the representatives in case of a juridical person) and the date of birth.

2. The grounds to retain such weapons.

3. The type and amount of the firearms and other weapons.

Appendix A to Incl 6 to OD No. 75, Hq Eighth Army, 25 August 1946.

Those who have come into possession of firearms and other weapons through inheritance or legacy must apply within ten days from the time when they became aware of the fact, in accordance with the preceding paragraphs.

Article 3. In the uses where the Prefectural Governor grants permission in accordance with the application mentioned in the preceding Article he must deliver a permit of the forms as set forth in enclosures.

Article 4. In cases where any person who possesses the firearms and other weapons on obtaining permission has fallen under one of the following items, he must give notice of this fact to the Prefectural Governor without delay.

However, when he has removed his residence to other prefecture, he must submit reports to the Prefectural Governors both of his old and new residences.

1. In case he has lost, or has been deprived of, his firearms and other weapons, or the location of the weapons has become unknown.
2. In the case of having damaged or lost the permit.
3. In case the domicile, name or address has been altered.

Article 5. Any person who keeps the firearms on obtaining permission must, if the grounds of the permission have been extinguished, or he desires to dispose of his weapons, apply to the Prefectural Governor to obtain an instruction.

Article 6. Any person who has discovered or picked up the firearms and other weapons must submit an immediate report to the nearest police station.

Article 7. In case there exists suspicion as to the possession of the firearms and other weapons without obtaining permission the Prefectural Governor may, at any time, make the officials concerned inspect or examine the places where the keeping of the firearms is suspected, or articles, or an accountant-book.

Article 8. In cases where any person who possesses the firearms on obtaining permission violates this Ordinance or these Regulations, or the Prefectural Governor deems it necessary from the standpoint of public peace, the Governor may revoke the permission.

Article 9. The Prefectural Governor can provide the items necessary for the enforcement of these Regulations.

Article 10. Any person who has violated the provisions of Art. 2, para. 2, and Arts. 4 to 6 inclusive, or has refused the inspection or examination as specified in Art. 7 shall be liable to an imprisonment with or without hard labor not exceeding three months or to a penalty not exceeding a hundred yen, or to detention or a fine.

Paragraph 1a of Inclosure 4 to Operational Directive 75, 25 August 1946, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

"1. The following instructions supplement those issued by this headquarters in a radio-gram to the Imperial Japanese Government, subject as above, 24 September 1945:

a. The Imperial Japanese Government shall surrender all firearms, swords, bayonets, daggers and other weapons, ammunition, explosives and components thereof collected from the civilian population to U. S. Army representatives in accordance with instructions issued by the Commanding General, Eighth Army, and the Commander, Naval Forces, Far East.

- (1) The following exceptions will be allowed:
 - (a) Firearms and knives required for hunting purposes, and swords considered objects of art.
 - (b) Explosives required by legitimate business of industrial organizations.
 - (c) Firearms of the matchlock type considered antiques and objects of art.
- (2) Individual licenses and permits covering the above exceptions will be issued by the Imperial Japanese Government and reported monthly,

Operational Directive 75, this headquarters, 25 August 1946, subject as above, as amended, is further amended:

1. Paragraph 4 to read:

"4. Classification and Registration.

a. Registration of and authorization for possession of exempted swords is a responsibility of the appropriate Public Safety Commission; control of unauthorized possession is the responsibility of the appropriate Public Safety Commission through the police.

b. The Japanese National Museum has appointed a committee of expert sword appraisers to appraise and classify swords owned by Japanese nationals and presented to the appropriate Public Safety Commission for registration. Operating under the policies set forth by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, this committee will select swords of categories exempted by references 1a, 1b, 1c and 1e. Upon recommendation of the committee the appropriate Public Safety Commission will authorize retention by the owner.

c. Investigation into the character and background of a prospective registrant of a sword or firearm is beyond the scope of the directives issued to the Japanese Government by this and higher headquarters. It is not intended that the character of a Japanese citizen be scrutinized before authority is granted for the possession and registration of exempted swords or firearms.

d. Authority was granted the Japanese Government to extend the deadline date for the registration of swords and firearms, as originally specified by reference 1f, to 1 June 1948. The extension was approved with the proviso that applications for registration made subsequent to the original deadline date must include a complete and concise explanation of reasons for the non-registration during the period prescribed by reference 1f. This proviso is still applicable to applications for registration where circumstances beyond the control of the owner prevented registration of weapons within the prescribed time limit. The acceptability of this explanation will be determined by the Public Safety Commission.

e. The Japanese Government is authorized to transfer ownership and registration of exempted swords and firearms to permit sale, gift, exchanging or inheritance of such articles."

Operational Directive No. 75/4 for 1946, Hq Eighth Army, 8 September 1949, cont'd.

2. Paragraph 5 to read:

"5. Each exempted sword and hunting gun will be accompanied by a certificate (Appendix A to reference 1f) authorizing the owner to retain the weapon, the certificate being written in Japanese and English. These certificates will be made out in duplicate; the original to be given to the owner of the weapon, the duplicate to be placed on file with the appropriate Public Safety Commission. A register, kept by the Public Safety Commission, showing the certificate serial number, will be subject to inspection at any time."

3. Paragraph 7 to read:

"7. Swords and firearms not authorized for retention will be shipped to the Tokyo Ordnance Center, Akabane Station, Tokyo for final disposition. The packing of these weapons and delivery to the Tokyo Ordnance Center by truck or by United States Army rail transportation is a responsibility of the Japanese civil police, under the surveillance of the civil affairs team for the area concerned."

4. Paragraph 8 is amended by adding:

"8..... Authority granted in reference 1b for the possession of firearms 'to destroy harmful birds and beasts' extends to urbanites and others. While there has been no change in the policy prohibiting organizations and conduct tending toward militaristic practices or military training, there is no objection to the operation of trap and skeet shooting, using clay pigeons."

5. By adding paragraphs 11 and 12:

"11. The use by theatrical companies and motion picture studios of genuine or simulated swords as theatrical stage properties and parts of costumes is approved. However, genuine swords must be registered. Simulated swords, spears, halberts and other bladed weapons of either light metals or of wood need not be licensed for retention when held as theatrical property.

"12. Whaling guns, harpoon guns and life-saving (breeches buoy) guns are included in the category of 'firearms' under the provision of reference 1f and will be registered and licensed in the same manner as hunting firearms."



IMPORT PROCEDURE

1. Reference:

SCAP Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government (SCAPIN 854) dated 3 April 1946 subject: "Board of Trade (Boeki Cho)" (inclosure 1).

76

2. Corps commanders and ~~commanding officers of military government~~ teams operating directly under this headquarters will implement the import program for Japan in accordance with SCAP directives, directives from this headquarters and instructions as set forth herein. Commanders concerned will be furnished all pertinent information on the import program by this headquarters. The import program will be coordinated with the agency appointed by the Imperial Japanese Government to receive cargo i.e. the Boeki Cho (Board of Trade) or its duly appointed representative.

3. Military government teams will take action as follows on import cargoes shipped aboard United States vessels:

a. The activities of the Boeki Cho will be coordinated with other interested agencies of Eighth Army or the United States Government to assure that the Boeki Cho (or its agent) receives proper notice of estimated time of arrival of ships and is prepared to act upon arrival of a ship.

b. Arrange for berthing of ships arriving in ports other than Tokyo, Yokohama and Kobe.

c. Upon the arrival of a ship in port, ascertain from ship's master if the vessel is sailing under East Coast, Gulf Coast or West Coast articles.

d. Supervise and facilitate the rapid discharge of cargo, furnishing this headquarters (Attn: Military Government Section) a 24-hour progress report via telephone by 1000 each morning to include tonnage discharged, tonnage remaining, number of hatches working and number of men working in each hatch. The fast turn around of ships will be given high priority.

e. Notify this headquarters (Attn: Military Government Section) immediately concerning:

OD No. 75, Hq Eighth Army, 3 September 1946 (Cont'd)

- (1) Time of arrival of ship in port.
- (2) Hour discharge of cargo is to begin.
- (3) Articles under which ship is sailing (East Coast, Gulf Coast or West Coast).
- (4) Any delay in the discharge of cargo as it occurs.
- (5) Date and hour ship is available for release to USA as obtained from the ship's log.
- (6) Sailing date of ship and destination.

f. Insure that the Japanese maintain crews in the long hatch on a 24 hour basis and sufficient crews in all other hatches to assure their being emptied at the same time or before the long hatch.

g. Inclement weather will be the only cause for stoppage of 24-hour working of the cargo.

h. Unless the number is otherwise specified, triplicate receipts in English signed by the authorized Japanese agency receiving the cargo, together with all other necessary papers, i.e. survey reports, statement of the ship's captain in cases of material shortages, ship's manifests, etc. will be obtained by the military government team in the area concerned and forwarded direct to this headquarters by the most expeditious means. Forms attached as inclosures 2 and 3 will be used for obtaining receipts from the Imperial Japanese Government for all shipments regardless of nationality of the vessels.

i. Added By OD 76/1

4. The provisions of paragraph 3 above do not apply to imports on SCAJAP vessels except as follows:

a. The military government team in the area concerned will obtain triplicate receipts in English signed by the Beiki Cho agent receiving the cargo within 7 days of completion of discharge.

b. These receipts will be forwarded direct to this headquarters by the most expeditious means.

c. Military government teams will render such assistance as may be practicable to further the discharge and storage of SCAJAP cargo.

6. The Imperial Japanese Government has been directed as follows:

a. Upon issuance of a SCAP directive to receive an import cargo, Beeki Cho will furnish its duly appointed representative to receive the cargo with authenticated papers. An original copy of these papers will be delivered to the military government team at the port involved.

b. Furnish the labor to physically discharge the ship when called upon to do so and to receive custody of the cargo at the ship's side.

c. Furnish adequate storage.

d. Insure protection from pilferage.

e. Make such distribution as directed by SCAP.

f. Account for all distribution and submit all receipts, import applications and shipping documents as required. The necessary papers required on import cargoes will be furnished to the military government team at the port involved within 7 days of the time of completion of discharge of the cargo.

SUBJECT : Board of Trade (Boeki Cho).

1. References are made to the following documents pertinent to the establishment of an agency by the Imperial Japanese Government which will represent that government in the performance of approved foreign trade functions:

- a. Paragraph 3d of Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government AG(091.31) ESS, dated 9 October 1945, which ordered the creation of an agency to be responsible for receiving, and for the distribution of, imports.
- b. Central Liaison Office No. 1176 (1.123) dated 18 December 1945.
- c. Imperial Ordinance No. 703 dated 14 December 1945.
- d. Imperial Ordinance No. 704 dated 14 December 1945.
- e. Foreign Trade Settlement Fund Law, Proceeding of the Diet No. XXVI (c) of 21 December 1945.

2. The Board of Trade, as indicated in C.L.O. 1176 (1.123) dated 18 December 1945, herein after referred to as Boeki Cho, is hereby recognized as the exclusive agency of the Imperial Japanese Government to handle all Japanese foreign trade transactions in accordance with the following:

- a. All of the transactions of Boeki Cho will be handled in accordance with, or in a manner consistent with, instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- b. All foreign trade will be handled by Boeki Cho on behalf of the Imperial Japanese Government, except as may be specifically authorized to the contrary by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- c. No other agency of the Imperial Japanese Government, no quasi-governmental or other organization or association, and no natural or legal person under the jurisdiction of the Imperial Japanese Government will perform any foreign trade functions except through Boeki Cho or as specifically authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- d. Boeki Cho will deliver or cause to be delivered all export

goods as instructed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. It will take delivery or cause delivery to be taken of import goods as instructed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Boeki Cho will deliver or cause to be delivered for export only goods to which full and complete title has been vested in Boeki Cho on behalf of the Imperial Japanese Government, unless otherwise specifically authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, and Boeki Cho will transfer title thereto as the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers may direct. Boeki Cho will take title on behalf of the Imperial Japanese Government to imported goods as directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

e. All commercial burdens, risks, claims and other responsibilities and liabilities as to foreign trade will be assumed by Boeki Cho.

f. All imports will be received "as is" and, except as approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Boeki Cho and the Imperial Japanese Government will assert no claims with respect to quality, quantity, condition or any other matter directly or indirectly affecting the receipt of such goods.

g. Boeki Cho and the Imperial Japanese Government will hold all other Governments and agencies and representatives thereof harmless from all loss, cost, damage or expense arising directly or indirectly out of any purchase, sale, disposition or other handling of export or import goods or arising in connection with any foreign trade transaction.

h. The appointment of all personnel of Boeki Cho of the rank of Chief of Bureau or higher, including Advisers and Counselors, will be subject to the approval of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Advice concerning personnel listed in the inclosure to your memorandum CIO No. 1176 (1.123) dated 18 December 1945 will be furnished at an early date.

3. Imperial Ordinance No. 703, dated 14 December 1945, which established Boeki Cho, and other laws, ordinances and regulations pertinent thereto will be amended to give effect to the following:

a. Boeki Cho will purchase export goods only as authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers by approval of an "Application to Prepare for Export" or an "Application to Deliver for Export" or by issuance of an export directive from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Boeki Cho will receive all import goods made available by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. It may allow others to perform acts connected with receipt of the goods, but title will first be vested in Boeki Cho on behalf of the Imperial Japanese Government, unless otherwise directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

c. Boeki Cho will handle, transfer, and receive all import and export goods in accordance with instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and authorizations and policies established by duly empowered agencies of the Imperial Japanese Government.

d. Boeki Cho will be empowered to perform all of the acts and do all that is necessary to give full effect to paragraphs 2d, e and f above.

e. Advisers will be appointed for one year terms.

f. Advisers will in general act as a body (Board of Advisers). They will act upon a vote of a majority of the advisers, and minutes of all meetings shall be kept. The President of Boeki Cho will request their advice on all important matters. On occasion, they will upon the President's request, individually or as members of committees, assist him in the discharge of operations functions.

4. Imperial Ordinance No. 704, dated 14 December 1945, which established the Committee for the Distribution of Imported Goods, and other laws, ordinances, and regulations pertinent thereto will be amended to give effect to the following:

a. The Committee for the Distribution of Imported Goods will advise and assist Boeki Cho and other duly empowered agencies of the Imperial Japanese Government in the distribution of imported goods, acting consistently with instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and policies of all duly empowered agencies of the Imperial Japanese Government.

b. Committee members may act individually or in groups to advise or assist the President of Boeki Cho.

5. The Foreign Trade Settlement Fund, created by Proceeding of the Diet, No. XXVI (c) of 21 December 1945 will be sufficient in amount to meet the obligations of Boeki Cho, and laws, ordinances and regulations will be amended to give effect to the following:

a. Any loans or appropriations deposited in the fund are to be reported to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. The fund will be available solely to Boeki Cho and will be expended upon order of Boeki Cho only to discharge financial obligations reasonably assumed in the performance of the acts mentioned in paragraphs 3a, b, c and d, above, except as may otherwise be specifically authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

c. All sums received by Boeki Cho arising directly or indirectly out of the sale or other disposition of imported goods will be deposited in the Foreign Trade Settlement Fund and will be available to Boeki Cho for the purposes defined above.

d. No loans for financing distribution of imports nor for processing or assembly of goods for export will be made out of the Foreign Trade Settlement Fund.

e. The Fund will not be used for any subsidy, direct or indirect, on any imported goods.

IMPORT PROCEDURE

1. Reference: SCAP Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government (SCAPIN 1967-A), 13 August 1946, subject: "Release of Imported Canned Foods for Distribution in Deficit Areas of Japan."

2. Operational Directive Number 76 this headquarters, 3 September 1946 is amended by adding the following to paragraph 3:

"1. Where a ship's cargo is noted to have sustained damage en route, two reports will be required:

- (1) Immediately upon completion of discharge and by the most expeditious means this headquarters (Attn: Military Government Section) will be furnished a dollar estimate of the damage sustained.
- (2) A detailed report in writing will be forwarded the same addressee listing the commodity, description of damage thereto, the number and size of the damaged packages, the percentage of damage to each package (or to the bulk cargo) and the disposition made of the damaged goods."

3. Operational Directive Number 76, this headquarters, 3 September 1946 is amended by deleting paragraph 5 and substituting therefor the following:

- 5 a Military government teams will exercise surveillance of storage and distribution of import cargoes to insure that the Japanese authorities guard and distribute the cargo as directed by SCAP to prevent loss through damage, pilferage or maldistribution.
- b(1) Imported canned foods constitute a considerable item of subsistence in the food releases

(3) Detailed instructions concerning the distribution have been issued to prefectural governors by the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry. These instructions require that each local food distribution point post a schedule in a prominent place, listing all items of canned foods received for distribution, the category under which they fall, the prices and substitution rate for rice of each item to be utilized as a staple food substitute. An inclusive list of the various food items in this program broken down into categories, with prices and substitution rates, is attached as inclosure 1.

(4) Boeki-Cho (Board of Trade) has appointed the following Japanese nationals in specific areas of Japan to sign receipts for designated import cargoes. Receipts signed by persons other than those herein listed will not be accepted unless accompanied by an official letter from Boeki-Cho so certifying the substitute:

SHIPMENT OF LIMITED AMOUNTS OF KOREAN OWNED PROPERTY IN JAPAN TO KOREA.

1. Reference SCAP Memorandum for Imperial Japanese Government, SCAPIN 927, dated 7 May 1946, as amended by SCAPIN 927/5, dated 13 July 1946, subject: "Repatriation", which provides for the shipment of an increased amount of Korean owned property in Japan to Korea.

2. General instructions contained herein will govern the shipment of Korean owned property from Japan to Korea by two categories of Koreans.

a. Category One comprises those Koreans who are now in Japan and are scheduled for repatriation.

b. Category Two comprises those Koreans who have been repatriated and are now in Korea.

3. Classes of Korean Owned Property That May Be Shipped.

a. For Category One Koreans, the property is of three classes, each differing in character and amounts as follows:

Class 1 -- Personnel baggage and household goods essential to the normal and comfortable living of the repatriate which, including that carried by hand, does not exceed a total weight of 500 pounds (226.8 Kg) per individual repatriate.

Class 2 -- Tools, light machinery and business equipment, not exceeding 4000 pounds (1814.4 Kg) in weight, owned outright by the repatriate on or prior to 2 September 1945, free and clear of all liens and encumbrances and used in the operation of their trade or individually operated business in Japan.

Class 3 -- Tools, light machinery and business equipment owned and held as indicated for Class 2 property but in excess of 4000 pounds (1814.4 Kg) in weight.

b. For Category Two Koreans there is but one class of property, that owned on or prior to 2 September 1945, free and clear of all encumbrances, by Koreans who have been repatriated and are now in Korea. This class consists of tools, light machinery and business equipment not exceeding 4000 pounds in weight.

O.D. No. 77, Hq Eighth Army, 4 Sep 46, contd.

4. Priorities in Shipment.

a. The shipment of Korean owned property covered herein will not be permitted to delay the Korean repatriation program. Priority will be given to prospective repatriates now in Japan (Category One Koreans) for all three classes of property. If the repatriation of the individual occurs subsequent to effective date of this directive but prior to processing of application, the completion of action on his property shipment may be accomplished by an appointed agent.

b. Approval of applications covering property falling within Classes 1 and 2 pertaining to Category One Koreans will be accomplished by local military government units. Those applications covering property falling within Class 3 pertaining to Category One Koreans will be forwarded through this headquarters to SCAP for approval.

c. Applications for shipment of the property allowed Category Two Koreans will be accepted only after the publication of a future directive covering this property.

5. Application Forms.

a. A copy of the application blank for shipment of personal baggage and household goods not exceeding 500 pounds in weight (Category One, Class 1) is attached as inclosure 1.

b. A copy of the application blank for shipment of tools, light machinery and business equipment not exceeding 4000 pounds in weight (Category One, Class 2) is attached as inclosure 2.

c. A copy of the application blank for shipment of tools, light machinery and business equipment over 4000 pounds (Category One, Class 3) is attached as inclosure 3.

d. A copy of the application blank for shipment of tools, light machinery and business equipment not exceeding 4000 pounds owned by Koreans who have been repatriated (Category Two) will be published with directive covering this category.

e. These blank forms may be obtained by Koreans from the local Japanese agency designated by the Japanese Government.

f. The applicants when being supplied with application blanks, will also be furnished a copy of each of the following:

Schedule A - Instructions for packing, crating and marking. (Inclosure 4).

Schedule B - Freight rates. (Inclosure 5).

Schedule C - General Instructions. (Inclosure 6).

6. Copies of Applications - Application blanks will be prepared by the Japanese Government in both English and Japanese. Four copies of each application in Class 1 and each application in Class 2 will be made out and submitted by the Prefectural Headquarters for processing to the military government unit in the prefecture in which the property is located. Seven copies will be submitted with each Class 3 application.

7. Processing Applications - Upon receipt of applications from the Prefectural Headquarters, military government units will effect the following:

a. Number the applications serially as approved, the number being placed in parentheses after the name of the prefecture; for example Iwate (3) would indicate the third application approved by the military government unit in Iwate prefecture.

b. Check the application for completeness and correctness; approve it when in proper form and the data thereon indicates eligibility of the property for shipment under this directive.

c. At the time the application is approved the military government unit approving it will assign a shipping number to the shipment covered by the application. This number will consist of four parts and will be assigned in the following manner:

(1) - The first part will consist of the number indicating the prefecture in Japan in which the shipment originates (See Inclosure 7 for numerical designations of Japanese Prefectures). For example all shipments originating in Kanagawa would be issued shipping numbers beginning with 88-Ibaraki with 55- etc.

(2) - The second part will consist of the letter indicating the intermediate breakdown point in Korea which the applicant has selected. The breakdown points, thirteen in number, are the points designated by the Korean Forwarding Company for handling these shipments in Korea. On filling out his application the applicant must select that breakdown point nearest to his home in Korea and enter his selection by its alphabetical designation on the space provided in the application. (See Inclosure 7 for alphabetical designations of Korean breakdown points). The letter chosen by the applicant will be the second part of the shipping number. For example 88-M would be the first two components of all shipping numbers originating in Kanagawa and choosing Seoul as the breakdown point in Korea. Similarly 88-A would indicate Kanagawa as the point of origin in Japan and Pusan as the breakdown point in Korea.

(3) - The third part of the shipping number would be the number issued serially in each prefecture in Japan for each breakdown point in Korea. For example: Kanagawa Prefecture would issue a number starting with 1 to each approved application for each breakdown point in Korea. 88-A-1, 88-A-2, 88-A-3 would indicate the first three applications approved at Kanagawa for the Pusan breakdown point "A". 88-M-1, 88-M-2, 88-M-3 would indicate the first three applications approved at Kanagawa for the Seoul breakdown point "M".

(4) - The final part of the shipping number would be the number indicating the number of pieces in the shipment. This number will be supplied by the applicant in the space provided on the application form. When assigning shipping numbers the number of pieces in the shipment will be written at the end under a slash, in this manner for example: /12,/4,/6.

Thus a complete shipping number 88-A-7-9 would indicate that the shipment was the seventh to originate in Kamagawa, for the Pusan breakdown point in Korea, and that there were nine pieces in the shipment. Each individual piece will be numbered consecutively by the shipper as, 1/9, 2/9 etc to 9/9.

When a shipping number is assigned to an application it appears 88-A-7-4. When the shipper marks his shipment the number would appear 88-A-7-1/4, 88-A-7-2/4, 88-A-7-3/4, 88-A-7-4/4, on the four individual pieces which comprise the shipment.

Each military government unit receiving applications will maintain a file of shipping numbers assigned.

d. Distribute copies of approved application as follows: One copy of Class 1 and Class 2 applications, four copies of Class 3 applications to Hq Eighth Army (Attention Military Government Section); three copies to local representative of the Imperial Japanese Government (one copy for the customs official, one for the prefectural office and one copy for the applicant).

8. Limitations on Applications

a. Final date on which Japanese agents will receive from Koreans applications for the shipment of personal property and household goods (Category One, Class 1) 12 October 1946.

b. Final date on which Japanese agents will receive from Koreans applications for shipment of tools, light machinery and business equipment not exceeding 4000 pounds in weight (Category One, Class 2) 12 October 1946.

c. Final date on which Japanese agents will receive from Koreans applications for shipment of machinery and business equipment in excess of 4000 pounds in weight (Category One, Class 3) 20 October 1946.

d. Final date on which applications will be received by this headquarters from US/PIK will be announced following publication of directive on processing of property belonging to Category Two Koreans.

e. Application for shipment of property to destinations in Korea north of 38 degrees north latitude will not be accepted until further notice.

f. Delivery of goods to the nearest freight agent on the designated date will be the responsibility of and at the expense of the applicant concerned. Date of delivery will be entered on application by designated agent of the Japanese Government.

9. Packing and Marking of Property - The applicant will be responsible for packing and marking his property at his own expense. Packing and marking will be accomplished as directed by Schedule A (Inclosure 4).

10. Transportation of Property.

a. The applicant will be responsible for delivering property to the railroad station designated to receive it.

b. The Japanese Government will be responsible for the transportation of property both by rail and water to the port of Pusan, Korea.

c. Supervision will be exercised by SC/JAP and TO, 8th Army.

d. The Commanding General, US/FIK using such agencies as are available to him will be responsible for the transportation of goods in Korea.

e. The designation of ports in Japan will be the responsibility of SC/JAP. Consideration will be given the selection of ports other than those used for repatriation and where storage and warehousing facilities are available.

f. The flow of shipments enroute to Korea will be regulated by the Japanese rail transportation officials, TO, 8th Army and SC/JAP. Flow of shipments in Korea will be regulated by CG, US/FIK.

11. Shipping Charges and Collection.

a. Shipping charges will be made in accordance with Schedule B - Approved Freight Rates (Inclosure 5), from point at which goods are received by Japanese agent to port of discharge in Korea. Charges will be collected by authorized Japanese agent receiving the goods for shipment and accounted for by him to the Japanese Ministry of Transportation. Charges will include transportation, handling and interim warehousing. Although rates have been approved by the Commanding General, Eighth Army after coordination with SC/JAP and the Japanese Ministry of Transportation, the Commanding General, Eighth Army will not be responsible for collection of or accounting for shipping charges.

b. All shipments are at the owners risk and no claims for damages will be received or entertained. The Japanese Ministry of Transportation is responsible that reasonable cargo security is observed.

c. The Korean Forwarding Company has been designated by the Commanding General, US/FIK as the agency to receive and transport all shipments covered herein from the port of Pusan to destinations in Korea. Charges for shipment from the port of Pusan to destination will be collected by Korean Forwarding Company at the point of delivery. The schedule of approximate charges for rail transportation, handling and storage is attached as Schedule B (Inclosure 5). These charges cover the transportation from Pusan to each of the thirteen breakdown points. The applicant will designate the breakdown point closest to final destination of property.

d. On receipt of property for shipment the Japanese freight agent will fill out the receipt on the application and will execute an invoice in Japanese. This invoice will contain the name and address of the applicant, the name and address of the consignee in Korea, the shipping number as indicated on the application, a list of contents of the package and weight of the package. A separate invoice will be accomplished for each package. Three copies of invoices will be delivered as rapidly as possible to the local military government unit. These invoices will be immediately forwarded to Headquarters Eighth Army Military Government.

e. Japanese port authorities will prepare a special ship's manifest in quadruplicate for all property loaded aboard ship. This manifest will contain the name of the ship, the expected time of arrival at Pusan, Korea, a list of the cargo by shipping numbers, and weight of each piece of cargo. Two copies of manifest will be sent by air courier to the Commanding General, USAFIK, attention Korean Forwarding Company, Seoul, Korea. One copy will be delivered by ship's captain to the Port Commander, Pusan, Korea. One copy will be received by a representative of the Korean Forwarding Company and returned to the Japanese Port Director.

12. Koreans Repatriated Subsequent to Effective Date of This Directive. - Repatriates who are scheduled to leave Japan subsequent to the effective date of this directive may designate by name and address an agent in Japan to be responsible for the further processing of the application, the identification of the property to be shipped, its packing and crating, its delivery to the nearest Japanese freight agent and the payment of shipping charges. The designation will be accomplished in writing on all copies of the application and must include a written acceptance by the agent. Such agent has all the rights and is subject to all the liabilities and penalties of the applicant.

13. Inspection - The Japanese agent of the local municipal office receiving applications will verify ownership prior to 2 September 1945 of property listed and will indicate on each application that this property does not include items prohibited from shipment by SCAP directives. Schedule C (General Instructions) lists restricted items. Inspection of all property accepted for shipment will be made by a designated agent of the Japanese Government.

14. Koreans Ineligible For Repatriation - Notwithstanding the implementation of the shipment of Korean owned property in Japan, Koreans who have registered as being desirous of repatriation and have refused to comply with plans of the Imperial Japanese Government for movement to reception centers have forfeited their privilege to repatriation and are not eligible for shipment of property under the provisions of this directive.

15. Responsibilities of the Imperial Japanese Government. - The Imperial Japanese Government will accomplish the following:

a. Establish a central agency to coordinate all phases of the shipment of Korean owned property in Japan with other Japanese governmental agencies and to maintain liaison with Headquarters Eighth Army.

b. Collect necessary statistics.

c. Print and issue applications, general instructions, shipping rates and packing instructions.

- d. Comply with provisions of Annex V (medical and sanitary procedures) of Memorandum to Imperial Japanese Government (SC/PIN 927, dated 7 May 1946.)
 - e. Inspect all property shipped.
 - f. Furnish security for shipments.
 - g. Receive payment for shipment to Pusan, Korea and maintain necessary accounts.
 - h. Prepare invoices and manifests.
 - i. Submit applications to local military government units for approval and designation of shipping numbers.
 - j. Deliver three copies of invoices to local military government units to be forwarded to Headquarters Eighth Army Military Government.
 - k. Ship property by rail to port designated by Transportation Officer, 8th Army.
 - l. Provide necessary warehouse space at port.
 - m. Transport supplies to Pusan Korea.
16. Publicity - The widest possible publicity will be given the provisions of this directive. The Imperial Japanese Government is responsible for publicizing in detail the shipping plan to all eligible Koreans. Publicity to be released by it on the plan will be submitted to the Commanding General, Eighth Army for approval prior to release. The completion of this program can be accomplished only if all Koreans eligible to benefit by it be promptly advised of its provisions and of the procedure necessary to be followed.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR PACKING, CRATING AND MARKING.

Schedule A.

PACKING -

1. Household effects and business equipment intended for shipment to destinations in Korea should be packed as securely as possible. The strongest available packing material should be used and care should be taken to see that the packing is carefully and thoroughly done. A carelessly packed shipment will involve not only the danger of loss to the shipper but the danger of damaging the shipment of others. Shippers should get the best advice available on the best materials and methods for packing goods of the kind, shape and weight which they wish to send. It should be remembered that all shipments will be handled many times, both here and in Korea.

2. Goods shall be packed in general accordance with the following instructions:

a. Household effects - Depending upon their kind, size and weight, household goods shall be packed in either wicker-baskets, trunks, bags, wooden boxes or crates or shall be wrapped in straw mats. All packages will be tied up securely with ropes. Wherever possible the package should be reinforced by an outer wrapping of straw matting and tied again with rope.

b. Business equipment - All light machinery or business equipment should be packed in wooden boxes or crates and tied securely with ropes. All boxes should be reinforced with an outer wrapping of straw matting and tied with rope.

MARKING -

1. Each package shall bear the name and address of sender and the name and address of the person to whom it is to be delivered in Korea. Those names and addresses shall be painted plainly on two sides of each package. If it is impossible to paint them on, then a piece of strong cloth bearing the names and addresses should be sewn on two sides of package.

2. Each package will in addition to the addresses be plainly marked with the shipping number of the package. This number will be painted in letters at least two inches high on two sides of the package. If it cannot be painted on, then strong cloth bearing the shipping number shall be sewn on two sides of the package.

3. Two tags, one for each end of the package, will bear (1)- the name and Japanese address of the shipper, (2)- the name and address in Korea to which the package is to be sent and (3)- the shipping number.

4. Each package will contain inside its inner wrappings a shipping list listing the contents and bearing the name and Japanese address of the shipper and the address in Korea to which the goods are to be delivered.

5. To help distinguish packages belonging to Korean repatriates a piece of red cloth shall be securely attached to both ~~sides~~ sides of each package.

1. Applications may be obtained from the local Japanese agency designated by the Japanese Government.
2. Applications for shipment of Class 1 and Class 2 property will be prepared in 4 copies. Application for shipment of Class 3 property will be prepared in 7 copies.
3. Applications will be approved by military government unit in the prefecture in which the shipment originates.
4. Each applicant will designate on his application one of the following breakdown points in Korea:

A - Iusan	D - Kwangju	G - Kunchon	J - Andong

The point selected will be the one closest to destination of the shipment. The letter opposite the point selected will appear as part of the shipping number to be assigned by the local military government unit when it approves the application and this shipping number must be painted or firmly fixed to each package. The shipping number will include a code number indicating the prefecture in which shipment originates, a letter designating the breakdown point in Korea, the serial designation of the shipment and the number of each package written over the total number of packages in the shipment. An example would be: 11-B-7-4/12. The figure 11 representing Tottori prefecture, B representing the breakdown point of Masan, Korea and 4 over 12 representing the fourth package of twelve packages the applicant is shipping.

5. Property will be packed, crated and marked as directed in Schedule A and transported to the nearest Japanese railway freight agent at the applicant's own expense and using his own facilities.
6. Railway freight agent will refuse to receive or ship goods not packed, crated and marked as directed in Schedule A.
7. The dates on which applications are to be accepted will be announced by the Japanese authorities. The date on which property will be accepted for shipment will be entered by the Japanese on the application prior to its approval.
8. Freight charges will be paid to agent in cash. Certificate at bottom of application is shipper's receipt and should be retained.
9. Charges paid to Japanese agent cover cost of transportation of goods to Iusan, Korea. The transportation and distribution of goods in Korea is a responsibility of CG, US/FIK. The Korean Forwarding Company has been designated by the Commanding General, US/FIK to handle transportation of property from the port of Iusan to destination in Korea. An estimate of the cost per ton of shipment in Korea to each breakdown point is furnished in Schedule B. The cost indicated does not include either shipment from breakdown point to destination or storage charges. The

Total charge for shipment in Korea will be paid by consignee in cash to the Korean Forwarding Company on delivery of property. Applicants on arrival in Korea will contact the agency of the Korean Forwarding Company nearest their home for information on this shipment.

10. No time of arrival in Korea can now be given but it is contemplated that the program for shipment of personal baggage of Koreans in Japan awaiting repatriation will be completed on or about December 15, 1946.
11. All shipments are made at the applicant's own risk and expense.
12. All statements and representations made in the application are material. 1. This directive pertains only to shipment of property of Category Two Koreans and supplements provisions of Operational Directive Number 77, this headquarters, 4 September 1946, as amended.

2. Applications for shipment of property of Category Two Koreans are now being accepted in Korea. Application forms will be similar to those used in Japan, and will be filled out in both English and Japanese.

3. Each applicant will also make out forms designating an agent in Japan to be responsible for packing and crating the property, and for delivery to the designated Japanese freight agent.

4. Applications for shipment of property and forms designating the responsible agent will be forwarded through this headquarters to local military government units in the area in which the property is located for delivery to responsible Japanese Prefectural authorities. Four copies of the forms designating the agent, four copies of Class 2 applications and seven copies of Class 3 applications will be forwarded for processing as follows:

a. Applications will be processed in accordance with paragraph 7 of Operational Directive Number 77.

b. Upon receipt of the forms designating the agent, the local Japanese officials will:

- (1) Locate the agent.
- (2) Get his signature in the space provided, indicating that the agent accepts the responsibility for packing, crating, and delivering the property to the nearest freight agent.

SHIPMENT OF LIMITED AMOUNTS OF KOREAN-OWNED PROPERTY
IN JAPAN TO KOREA

1. Reference is made to SCAP Memorandum (SCAPIN 1421), 26 December 1946, subject: "Repatriation of Japanese Nationals from Soviet and Soviet Controlled Territories, and of Koreans from Japan to Korea North of 38° North Latitude."

2. Instructions contained herein will govern the shipment of limited amounts of Korean-owned property from Japan to Korea by Koreans who are to be repatriated to areas in Korea north of 38° north latitude. Koreans not authorized for repatriation are not authorized to have property shipped.

3. Koreans in this category may ship only two classes of property, differing in character and amounts as follows:

Class 1 - Personal baggage and household goods essential to the normal and comfortable living of the repatriate, not to exceed 200 Kg per individual.

Class 2 - Tools, light machinery, and business equipment owned outright by the repatriate on or prior to 2 September 1945, free and clear of all liens and encumbrances, and used in the operation of their trade or individually-operated business in Japan, not to exceed 1,000 Kg in weight.

4. The shipment of Korean-owned property covered herein must be on the same ship which carries the repatriate to Korea. No person will be repatriated without his baggage, and no shipments of unaccompanied baggage will be permitted.

5. Application blanks for shipment of property may be obtained from local Japanese officials on or about 17 January 1947. Application blanks will be prepared by the Japanese Government in both English and Japanese. Four copies of each

application will be made out and submitted by the Prefectural headquarters for processing to the military government unit in the prefecture in which the property is located.

6. Processing of applications will be in accordance with paragraph 7, Operational Directive 77, with the following exception:

Ports of debarkation in Korea are Gzan and Kanko. In assignment of shipping numbers, the letter N will designate the port of Gzan, and the letter P will designate the port of Kanko.

7. Final date on which Japanese will receive applications from Koreans will be 1 February 1947. Final date on which baggage will be accepted for shipment will be 28 February 1947. The applicant will be responsible for packing and marking his property at his own expense, and for delivery of goods to the nearest freight agent on the designated date. Date of delivery will be entered on application by designated agent of the Japanese government.

8. Transportation of Property

a. The applicant will be responsible for delivering property to the railroad station designated to receive it.

b. The Japanese government will be responsible for transportation of property both by rail and water to designated ports in Korea, and for accomplishment of certificate of transfer to Soviet authorities at the port. One copy of certificate of transfer (see inclosure hereto) will be made part of the ship's log.

c. Further transportation arrangements after arrival in Korea must be made by the applicant.

9. Shipping Charges and Collection

a. Shipping charges will be made from point at which goods are received by Japanese agent to port of discharge in Korea.

b. Approved rates for rail shipment to port of embarkation are indicated in schedule "B" of inclosure 5 to Operational Directive 77.

c. Approved rates for water shipment from port of embarkation (Moji) to Genzan or Kanko are as follows:

d. Charges will be collected from the applicant by authorized Japanese agent receiving goods for shipment, and accounted for by him to the Japanese Ministry of Transportation.

e. All shipments are at the owner's risk, and no claims for damages will be received or entertained. The Japanese Ministry of Transportation is responsible that reasonable cargo security is observed.

10. Inspection

Inspection of property to be shipped will be in accordance with paragraph 13, Operational Directive 77.

11. Responsibilities of the Imperial Japanese Government

The Imperial Japanese Government will accomplish the following:

- a. Maintain agency indicated in paragraph 15 e of Operational Directive 77.
- b. Collect necessary statistics.
- c. Print and issue applications, general instructions, shipping rates, and packing instructions.
- d. Comply with provisions of Annex V (Medical and Sanitary Procedures) of Memorandum to the Imperial Japanese Government (SCAPIN 227), 7 May 1946.
- e. Inspect all property shipped.
- f. Furnish security for shipments.
- g. Receive payment for shipment to designated ports in Korea, and maintain necessary accounts.

- h. Have Japanese freight agent fill out receipt on application when property is delivered for shipment.
- i. Prepare invoices, manifests, and certificates of transfer.
- j. Ship property by rail to port of Moji for trans-shipment.
- k. Provide necessary warehouse space at port.
- l. Coordinate the arrival of repatriates at the Sasebo Repatriation Center with the arrival of their baggage at Moji.
- m. Insure that each repatriate is embarked on the same ship as his baggage and that no unaccompanied shipments of baggage are made.

12. The commanding general of each corps, and the commanding officers of the Chugoku and Shikoku Military Government Regions will exercise necessary supervision to insure compliance by the Japanese with provisions of this directive. In addition, the Commanding General, I Corps will exercise special supervision to insure that each repatriate is shipped on the same vessel as his baggage and that no unaccompanied shipments of baggage are made.

The Japanese government will include the list of these expenses in the total cost of shipment to be collected from the owner in Korea."

SHIPMENT OF LIMITED AMOUNTS OF RYUKYUAN
 OWNED PROPERTY IN JAPAN TO RYUKYU ISLANDS

1. This directive pertains only to shipment of property of Ryukyuan who have been repatriated, and supplements provisions of Operational Directive 77, this headquarters, subject: "Shipment of Limited Amounts of Korean Owned Property in Japan to Korea," 4 September 1946, as amended.

2. Applications for shipment of property of repatriated Ryukyuan are now being accepted in the Ryukyu Islands. Application forms will be similar to those used in Japan, and will be filled out in both English and Japanese.

3. Each applicant will also prepare forms designating an agent in Japan to be responsible for packing and crating the property and for its delivery to the designated Japanese freight agent.

4. Applications for shipment of property and forms designating the responsible agent will be forwarded through this headquarters to local military government units in the area in which the property is located for delivery to the responsible Japanese prefectural authorities. Four copies of the forms designating the agent, four copies of Class 2 applications and seven copies of Class 3 applications will be forwarded for processing as follows:

a. Applications for shipment of property will be processed in accordance with paragraph 7 of Operational Directive 77.

b. In assignment of shipping numbers, the letter "R" will designate property for Naze, Amami Oshima, and the letter "S" will designate property for Kubisaki, Okinawa.

c. Upon receipt of the forms designating the agent, the local Japanese authorities will:

- (1) Locate the agent.
- (2) Obtain his signature in the space provided on the form indicating that the agent accepts the responsibility for packing, crating, and delivering the property to the nearest freight agent.
- (3) Upon completion of (1) and (2) above, the Japanese authorities will deliver two copies of the completed forms to the local military government unit, which will retain one copy for its files, and will forward one copy direct to this headquarters. Two copies will be retained by the Japanese for their records.
- (4) In the event the Japanese authorities are unable to locate the agent, or if the agent refuses to accept the responsibility, the forms will be returned to the local military government unit with a complete written report as to why they were not completed. The forms with the report submitted by the Japanese will then be forwarded direct to this headquarters.

5. a. Delivery of goods to the nearest freight agent on the designated date will be the responsibility of and at the expense of the designated agent of the owner of the property. The agent will be reimbursed for expenses incurred upon application to the local Japanese Welfare authorities. The Japanese government will include the list of these expenses in the total cost of shipment to be collected from the owner in the Ryukyus.

b. Date of delivery will be entered on the application by the designated agent of the Japanese government.

6. a. On receipt of property for shipment, the Japanese freight agent will fill out the receipt on the application and will execute an invoice in Japanese. This invoice will contain the name and address of the applicant, the name and address of the consignee in the Ryukyus, the shipping number as indicated on the application, a list of contents of the package and weight of the package. A separate invoice will be accomplished for each package. Three copies of invoices will be delivered as soon as possible to the local military government unit. These invoices will be forwarded immediately to Headquarters Eighth Army, Military Government Section.

b. Japanese port authorities will prepare a special ship's manifest in quadruplicate for all property loaded aboard ship. This manifest will contain the name of the ship, the expected time of arrival at port of debarkation, a list of the

cargo by shipping numbers, and weight of each piece of cargo. Two copies of manifest will be sent to Headquarters, Military Government Ryukyus, APO 331, by the Military Government Officer at port of embarkation. One copy will be delivered by ship's captain to the Port Commander of the port of debarkation. One copy will be receipted by a representative of the Ryukyuan Military Government and returned to the Japanese Port Director.

7. a. Shipping charges will be paid by the Japanese government from the receiving point in Japan to port of discharge in Ryukyus, and will be in accordance with following schedule:

b. The total amount of such payments by the Japanese government will be debited to the Ryukyus government pending future settlement.

c. The Japanese government will forward a detailed report of all such charges to this headquarters for forwarding to the Ryukyus.

8. It is expected that many of the Ryukyuans will apply for the return of their small fishing craft which they left in Japan. Upon approval of such applications by SCAP, the following procedures will apply:

a. The Japanese government will be charged with delivery of the craft to Kagoshima.

b. The Japanese government will provide fuel, lubricants, water, minimum essential supplies, crews, and/or towing to Kagoshima if needed. Charges for these supplies and services will be included in the total costs for the shipment to be collected from the owner.

c. Boats will be turned over to and receipted for by Ryukyuan Military Government officers at Kagoshima in the following manner:

(1) When ten of these boats have arrived at Kagoshima, the Headquarters, Ryukyuan Military Government will be notified by radio. They will then send Ryukyuan crews to Kagoshima to sail the boats to their destination.

(2) Direct communication is authorized between the Kagoshima Military Government Team and Headquarters, Ryukyuan Military Government, to give notification of arrival of boats at Kagoshima, and for any further coordination necessary.

d. The Japanese government will furnish sufficient fuel, lubricants and water, to sail boats to destination. In the event of unforeseen delays, or in case of emergency, the Japanese

government may be called upon to furnish rations for the Ryukyans
crews. Costs for such fuel, lubricants, and rations will be in-
cluded in total charges for shipping to be collected from the

The Imperial Ordinance No. 109 Dated Jan. 4, 1947 about Removal and exclusion from public service of undesirable personnel in pursuance of the memorandum of SCAP.

Art. 1. Removable and exclusion from public service of undesirable personnel in pursuance of the Memorandum of SCAP 4 Jan. 1946 on the removal and exclusion of undesirable personnel from public office (including extensions of scope and criteria of screening as supplemented thereafter in the form of additional interpretation of the Memorandum:) shall be dealt with in accordance with the provision of this ordinance.

Art. 2 The term "public service" as used in this ordinance shall mean and include positions of members of Imperial Diet, personnel of the national government entity, assembly members and personnel of the local public organizations (including To, Do, Fu, Ken, Shi, Ku, Machi, Mura, and Choson Kumiai, and position of specific personnel of specific companies, associations, mass communication media and other organizations, and shall be classified into the principal public office and the ordinary public office.

The "principal public office" and the "ordinary public office" shall be defined at the Prime "inister".

Art. 6 Any person who falls under the Memorandum shall be disqualified from filing his candidacy for any elective position in the public service.

Any candidate for any elective position in the public service, when designated under the provisions of Art. 4, shall be deemed to have withdrawn his candidacy.

Art. 10 Any person who is a relative within the third degree by blood, marriage or adoption of any person who falls under the Memorandum shall be ineligible, for a period of ten years from the day of the designation, to succeed or to be appointed to any position or positions in the public service from which the latter has been removed as falling under the Memorandum (including position in connection with which a person be designated as falling under the Memorandum after ~~the~~ his retirement therefrom and any principal public office from which the latter has been barred specifically and further, to exercise any power or the latter.
