Berlin, Aug. 2.—The entry of King Victor Emmanuel into the city to-day, and his drive through the Unter den Linden, was advanced purposely hair an hour over the published time as a further precaution against possible disorder. Consequently the great crowds which were packed into place an hour before the police at the Brandenburg Gate, were assoniahed by the arrival at a brisk trot of a gorgeous cavalcade surrounding a six horse carriage in which sat Emperor William and a small man in a dark uniform.

On one side of the thoroughfare, cuirassiers, dragoons and lancers lined up, two deep, made a glittering barrier of color, while on the other side, the people's view was unmolested except by a extraordinary numbers of police, standing with their faces towards the spectators. The soldiers, of course, hurrahed because they were ordered to do so, but the cheers of the poople were spontaneous and really cordial. The show was over in a few seconds. Shouting and the successive crashing of bands played at intervals between the squadrons of cavalry marked the progress of the King and the Emperor down the avenue.

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

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



And Other Matters Discussed This Morning—The Forthcoming Ex-hibition at Capetown,

The regular meeting of the council of the board of trade was held this morn-ing. President McQuade occupied the chair, and there were present J. A. Mara, S. J. Pitts, Ald. Grahame, C. E. Todd, Ald. McCandless, D. R. Ker, J. G. Cox, G. H. Burnes, W. T. Oliver, C. H. Lugrin, R. Seabrook and the secretary, F. Elworthy.

Dear Si:—Our bourd of trustees acted upon the matter of a btenniship service between this city and Victoria. A committee has been appointed to take charge of the matter, and they will proceed to act at once and vigorously. The chairman of the committee will interview Mr. Oaks to-day. Our committee suggested that your shippers act together and act as a unit. The biggest article of freight to Victoria is wheat and feed, which is purchased from Tacoma dealers, but on account of the steamships are shipped from Seattle. Your people, of course, have the routing of this freight. If Mr. Oaks would understand that it would be routed by way of Tacoma and by a boat running from Tacoma, you would be able to worry him a great deal on this. We have opened correspondence with parties in San Francisco for a suitable steamship for this route; better, faster and more suitable than either of those new on the run, and it can make the round trip daily. We understand, of course, that you desire the steamer to stop at other Sound cities, and we have that end in view. On the other hand, we wish you to insist that whatever concessions you may receive, the steamer must make a daily trip to Tacoma.

LADIES' COLLEGE,

New Institution of Learning to Be Established Here in the Fall.
