Coast Road Money Is Now Available

Recently the \$250,000 military highway appropriation, voted by the Legislature just before the end of the session, became available.

A considerable part of this money will be spent in surveying the Coast Road between Posts, in this county, and San Carpejo, in San Luis Obispo county.

It is believed that the federal government will make a substantial appropriation toward the cost of the construction work, by recommendation of the War Department.

Thus has occurred an important event toward the attainment of a project which is destined to accomplish more than any other agency to increase population and put to use idle land in a large stretch of territory now isolated.

In entertaining the many who were present, Mrs. Foster was her old self again. But what was most agreeable to her, as the result of this fine exhibit, was the knowledge that she was able to substantially help the men at the front, through the Red Cross.

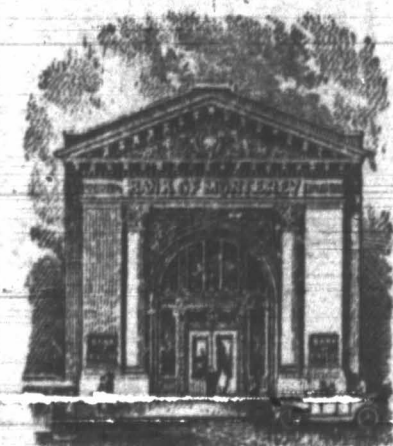

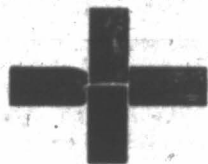

PINEAPPLE DELIGHT.

One cupful of chopped pineapple, one tablespoonful of gelatine, two tablespoonfuls of rice, three cupfuls of sugar, one cupful of whipping cream, two cupfuls of boiling water or of pineapple juice, a pinch of salt, a few preserved cherries. Boil the rice until very soft; then drain it. Dissolve the gelatine in the boiling water; then add the sugar and rice. Cool slightly and add the salt, the pineapple and the whipped cream. Cool and serve in dainty glasses with a cherry on the top of each.

BUTTERSCOTCH PIE.

One cupful brown sugar, one heaping tablespoonful butter, and one tablespoonful of flour. Mix like cake, then add yolks of two eggs, one tablespoonful vanilla, one cupful sour cream. Line your pie tin with rich pie crust, fill with above, and bake in a moderate oven. When done, cover with a meringue made of the whites of two eggs and two tablespoonfuls powdered sugar, and return to the oven to brown.
