0NE of the most often asked questions is: When is the right time to plant, the Autumn or the Spring? The answer to this question depends entirely on the material to be planted, the location it is to be planted in, and the time when the question is asked.

The Autumn is the better time to handle all plant material of unquestioned hardiness. Many rock plants especially do better if planted early in the Autumn. Most all bloom early in the Spring. Therefore, when late Spring planting is attempted, losses usually occur or there is an unsightly spot in the rockery or border caused by spoiled blossoms. In the Fall, weather and soil conditions, as a rule, are better than in the early Spring. A little covering of excelsior or clean dry straw is all the Winter protection required.

Here are a few planting suggestions:
Plant Alpine and Herbaceous Plants from September Ist to November 1 st. Roses from October 15 th to December 1 st. Peonies, German and Japanese Iris from September lst to frost. Oriental Poppies from August 15th to October 15th. Dutch Bulbs from October 1st until ground is frozen. Lilies immediately when received.

Always remember that the best time to transplant any hardy plant or rock plant is when it is dormant. Most all rock plants are dormant in our country early in September immediately after the hottest and driest days of the Summer are over. Transplant them just before they commence their new Fall growth. It is our practice to ship no plants or bulbs except at the season when they will give best results. If you lack experience, order early and leave the responsibility of shipping with us.

Every order in the Autumn is carefully examined, material and location carefully considered, and shipment is made only of such material as can be transplanted in that part of the country at that particular time, the balance is carried over by us and sent to you in the Spring. This work of examining is not left to employees; it is done by a responsible official of the company. It is part of our service to our customers.

Do not let the first light frost in the Fall stop your garden operations. Light frosts are a help rather than a hindrance.

The enviable reputation we enjoy is known to most gardeners. It is constantly strived for by giving faithful service and sending faultless quality.

## Chameleon Julips

Everyone knows the Cottage Tulip Picotee and is familiar with it habit of changing from white to pink and rose as the flower ages.

The bloom of Picotee is rather small and its stem weak. By crossing and careful selecting there finally has been created the Chameleon Tulips. In form and strength they may be compared with the Darwin Tulip. But the fascinating changing of color from day to day has been retained and improved upon. Chameleon Tulips are offered on page 21. Include some in your collections this year and observe white. Tulips change to pink and rose in a few days.

## Chinese Lantern Julips

## Especially Suited for Southern Gardens

Gorgeously colored globe-shaped Tulips which begin blooming when the Darwin Tulips are just about over. The flowers are of good size and richly colored in magnificent pastel shades of salmonpink, orange and peach, reflecting all the glorious shades of a sunset. When fully in bloom they resemble lighted Chinese lanterns. A point particularly in their favor is the splendid results they give in southern gardens where other Tulips often do not do well. They are offered in many choice varieties on page 15.

## Multiflower Julips

Bunch-Flowered Tulips as they are frequently called produce from 4 to 6 flowers on one stem. For cutting this type is most satisfactory because it requires only 6 stems to fill a vase to overflowing. In habit and form they resemble the Hybrid Cottage Tulip, many lovely shades are found amongst them. They multiply freely and last a long time under reasonable care, are listed on page. 20.

## New Siant Breeder Julips

Within the very near future we are afraid most of us will have to revise our idea about the size of Tulips. The Giant Breeders, when grown on reasonably good garden soil, will often reach a height of over 30 inches. The blooms are of enormous size carried boldly on stiff stems giving a most impressive and dignified effect in the garden. In our test garden they always create somewhat of a sensation. Their colors are rich but subdued, reminding one of rare old woods, old tapestries, and old gold. For pure dignity they are unequalled! Reve d'Or, Rayon d'Or, Dillenburg, Jessey, Thos. Stephenson, Augustus, are but a few. Golden Goblet was so popular along with the New Giant Breeders we could not fill all our orders last year.

## The New Ideal Darwin Julips

This strain or group of Darwin Tulips is the result of very skillful breeding. Through the reintroductions of the Wild Tulip blood, a new strain was developed with much greater strength than the old. fashioned Darwin Tulips possessed. The colors are-sparkling and brilliantly clear. The dull, uninteresting flat tones and shadings so prevalent in the old Darwin Tulips are completely removed in the "Ideal Darwins."

Furthermore, this group contains many new shades such as yellow and also a fine lot of pure white varieties-these colors heretofore have not been obtainable in Darwins.. ## Multiflowered Julips

Bunch-flowering or Multiflowered Tulips are a most interesting lot. Instead of producing the conventional single stem with one bloom on top the varieties offered under this heading all grow a strong main stem with from 3 to 6 branches, half way up the stem, each side shoot or branch carrying its own flower. The result is that 3 to 6 or sometimes 8 flowers are obtained from one bulb. All the
blooms are of good size, are gracefully spaced and as you can well imagine, produce an unusual effect and a great mass of color. The soil must be kept rich because if planted in poor ground they will not be as floriferous.

## Single Earrly Julips

Few, if any, of the spring-blooming flowers rival the Single Early Tulips for brilliancy of bloom or ease of culture. They are excellent subjects for formal beds on the lawn or for garder. borders. While they do not possess the same size of bloom and length of stem as the May-flowering Darwin, Breeder and Cottage varieties, they are used where earlier blooms are desired. Many of the varieties may be
forced in bloom in January, while all of them may be easily had in flower in pots late in February or early March.

Note: The letters A, B, and C following the varieties indicate their relative earliness of bloom, but, with few exceptions, most of the varieties bloom outdoors about the same time when planted in masses. The figures indicate the height in inches.

Culture: These Hyacinths should be planted from 6 to 10 inches apart, and covered with at least 4 inches of soil from the top of the bulb. For beds or borders close to the conservatory or dwelling, 6 inches will make a fine display; but where the beds are planted to be viewed from a distance, they may be planted 10 inches apart. Hyacinths planted alternately with Narcissi produce a most graceful effect, and for this combination 6 inches from bulb to bulb is also a very suitable distance. It is advisable to cover, after the bulbs have been planted, with leaves or some heavy material that will prevent them from freezing or being affected by early spring frosts after they have started. Hyacinths, as well as Narcissi, should be planted by November first in this latitude, as they are the better for early planting. Tulips may be planted up to December first, weather permitting.

Besides the Dutch Crocuses there are certain species that bloom very much earlier in the year, often before the snow has gone. The flowers of these wild sorts are smaller than those of the Dutch kinds but they are as vigorous, and free as the others. Given a sunny position in the rock garden or a sheltered position in grass where the sun may encourage them freely, they will surprise you by their hardy appearance in the face of cold and storms.
Crocus Imperati, pale lilac with buff jacket, often flowers in late February, and is closely followed by Crocus Sieberi, a fuller purer
mauve sort; it has as a companion the deep rich yellow Crocus Susianus, which is even more attractive in the bud stage with its dark, rich brown flowers on the exterior of the segments. Once planted, they will take care of themselves for many years. Then comes Crocus Tommasinianus, an exquisite vaselike form, in color varying from a pale mauve to quite a rich purple. This variation is one of its great attractions. These all increase as freely as do the Dutch varieties.

We call especial attention to the Yellow Calla, which is one of the grandest varieties in cultivation, and most valuable for house or conservatory decoration. Plant Callas indoors in the late fall of the year. In April or May dormant bulbs may be planted near the pool in a sunny spot where they will flower beautifully in August or September.
Alba Maculata.

*Clavatus.

They should be planted in the fall, 3 inches deep, about 18 bulbs to a square foot, in a sunny location or in half shade and in places where they can remain undisturbed for a number of years. The flowers will cross with one another and will seed themselves, forming natural colonies. All are 6 to 7 inches high, therefore, excellent in the rockery as well.

## Gremurus

A noble family of hardy plants, most delightful and desirable for stately and colorful groups in large plant borders and shrubberies. They are perfectly hardy, and when well established, produce dozens of giant flower spikes, like huge Hyacinths, attaining a height of from 6 to 10 fect, the flower spike (comprising several hundred flowers) being from 2 to 3 feet long. They thrive in any sunny, well-drained border. They should be planted in early fall only. These wonderful, gigantic flowering plants do not require a great
depth of soil, as the fleshy roots spread outwards. The plant disappears above ground after flowering and annuals may be planted close to them to fill the vacant space. A light mulching is advised as a winter protection.

Hyacinths, Lilies of the Valley, and other bulbs in Wayside Gardens Bulb Fiber in bowls without drainage, proves that this is one of the most charming and effective methods of growing bulbs. Those who have neither a large garden, nor the convenience of greenhouses, or frames, or who have difficulty in obtaining suitable soil find most of their troubles removed in adopting this madern method of growing bulbs in the house. It will be extensively adopted in the future when it is fully realized what excellent results may be obtained in this way.

The advantage of this system is that the bowls, having no drainage holes, can be placed anywhere about the house without fear of any mess or damage to furniture. Wayside Gardens Bulb Fiber is perfectly odorless and clean to handle; it is specially prepared for the purpose of growing a great variety of bulbs in the house. Leaves no dirt or stain. It can be used for several years.

Culture: Moisten the fiber to saturation, fill the bowl with the soaking wet fiber mixture up to the rim and plant the bulbs in the same manner as with ordinary soil. A little fiber should be shaken down into place after planting but should not be pressed down too tightly or the bulbs will. be forced upwards when root growth commences.

After planting, adopt either of the following plans:
The bowls may be placed in a cold frame, airy cellar or in a dark or moderately dark, airy, cool room. It will not be necessary to give a great deal of water; perhaps once every two weeks.

In the case of bowls placed in the cold frame there will not be much need to give any water. Where, however, the bulbs are not exposed to rain, the bowls should be examined twice a month, care being taken that the fiber mixture is kept uniformly damp. For the first weeks after planting, additional water should. be given sparingly, sufficient only to encourage root action. As soon as the bulbs are well rooted, water should be given more freely. If the mixture is allowed at any time to become dry, the flower buds may go blind. Should by any chance too much water be given, the bowls may be drained by tipping them on their sides.

When the bulbs have made a good top growth in the dark, the bowls should be placed in a sunny window where they will get the morning sun. They must have sufficient light and air to prevent the

foliage from becoming drawn. Never place bowls on top of radiator cover. A temperature of 55 to 60 degrees is sufficient to obtain good blooms; the bulbs resent too warm a temperature.

## DELPHINIUM - Larkspur

Fortunately they can be grown in every garden, but in warm, dry parts of the country they do not live long. Best results are obtained in our cooler regions, especially olong the Pacific and Atlantic coosts.
Culture. Delphiniums require a rich, generous and well drained soll. On soils of a light or medium nature dig in plenty of well-decayed manure. In those of a heavy nature it is desirable to fork up the subsoil and compost of two parts loam and one of equal proportions of decayed manure and sand. The plants are best grown in groups of three or six. Allow a distance of at least 18 inches to two feet between the plants. Planting may be done in autumn or early spring. Remove faded flowers, and on no account allow seeds to develop, then a second crop of flowers may be expected later on.

The taller and stronger growing species succeed admirably in grass in colonies in a moist partially shaded border. Gentians may, indeed, be regarded as the most beautiful of hardy perennials.
Culture. Gentions require no special care to grow them successfully. Grow in a rich, maist loam containing a fair amount of well-decayed cow manure. Best grown in masses as an edging to a partially shaded border or rock garden. It is advisable in all cases ta mix leaf mold freely with the soil before planting. Top dress with well-rotted manure in spring. See that the plants are well supplied with moisture in dry weather. Gentians do not like to have roots disturbed, so do not interfere with them once they are established. Plant in fall or spring, 6 to 8 inches apart.

## HELLEBORUS - Christmas Rose or Lenten Rose

There are two distinct types, one, Christmas Rose, flowering in late winter, and the other, Lenten Rose, in spring. Both are valuable for garden decoration because of their flowering during the dull period of the year.
Culture. Require to be grown in a cool, moist, shady position, such as under the shade of trees or among ferns. The ideal soil is a retentive loam, freely mixed with leaf mold and well-rotted manure. As Helleborus are impatient of disturbance at the roots it is advisable to select a position for them where they will not be required to be disturbed for many years. Planting may be done in fall or spring, 12 inches apart. Each autumn add a top dressing of leaf mold and wellrotted manure, and let it lie on the surface. In summer give plenty of water.

The Vera is also grown thus in large gardens. Where it is grown in quantity for flowers, plant two feet|apart each way. The best time to plant is in spring; fall planting is all right if plants can be well protected. After a few years the plants get straggly, then the shoots should be cut back moderately in March or April; in fact, this may be done annually. Plant in fall or spring.

The Creeping Jenny is an excellent carpeting plant to grow among hardy ferns or other low, wet places
Culture. The Creeping Jenny should be grawn as a carpeting plant on a shody, moist border. The other variety may be grown in shady, moist borders, or in bold groups in moist parts of the wild garden, or by the waterside. Plont in outumn or spring, in ordinary sail. 8 to 10 inches apart. Should be divided every third year.

Culture. To grow Phlox really well the soil should be well drained, deeply spaded, and enriched with rotted manure or bonemeal. Planting may be done in fall or spring in a sunny border. Set the plants 10 inches apart Lift and divide every three or four years or they will become crowded, which results in poor, small flowers. Never let the plants go to seed, never water overhead, always keep blooms and foliage dry, letting hose run slowly on the ground, this method of watering prevents mildew.

Cashmeriano, cortusoides, denticulata, sikkimensis and Moerheim Hybrids will succeed in good, loamy soll freely mixed with leaf heim Hybrids will succeed in good. loamy soll freely mixed with leaf loam freely mixed with leaf mold and peat. All require light shode. The latter would be suitable kinds to grow in a bog garden or on the edge of ponds. Japonica and sikkimensis also do well planted along the sides of damp, shady ditches. Most gardens contain a domp, shady spot, and this would be an ideal place for growing hardy. Primulas. Plant in early spring or early fall, 4 to 6 inches apart.

In drv weather give copious supplies of water. As soon as the first flowers hove faded, cut the flowering stems back to their base. Every third year divide and replant in early spring.

Should be watered freely in dry summer. McNabiana is best grown in stony soil in the rockery in full sun Plant early fall or spring, 8 inches apart.

## SCABIOSA - Scabious or Pincushion Flower

Culture. All will thrive in well drained, good, ordinary soil, which is not heavy or damp. Cold and damp is fatal to these plants. An ideal soil for them is a sandy loam. Plant in early autumn or early spring. The plants are best in groups of three or more. Plant about 8 inches apart. A full sunny position is essential.

## Caucasica

Culture. Ordinary sail and dry, sunny borders or dry sunny places in the rock garden will suit all. Spectabile, indeed, will also thrive in shade. For edging purposes simply plant a few inches apart, and in due course they will develop into a continuous mass of foliage. They will grow where little else will. thrive. Plant in outumn or spring, 4 to 8 inches apart.

Do not disturb when once planted. The old rosettes disappear ofter flowering but their place is taken by numerous young plants so thot they are never missed. The flowers are all in small panicles an short, fleshy stems; all flower in June and July.

Filipendula flore pleno, being small, should be grown in groups of three or six plants. Those grown in borders should be given copious supplies of water in dry weather. The other species may be grown in colonies in the garden or border. Plant in autumn or spring, 8 to 12 inches aport. Dipterocarpum should be carefully protected if planted in the fall.

Flowers are prized for cutting in lote summer and eorly outumn.
Culture. Any good, ordinary, well drained soil and o sunny position will suit Tritomos. Plont in spring only, 12 inches aport. A liberol mulching of decayed monure should be spreod around the base of the plants in eorly winter. During severe weother protect the plonts by a covering of strow or dry litter.

## CLIMBING ROSES

Climbing Roses require no pruning in the spring beyond the cutting out af very old or dead wood, and the shortening of the laterals and long canes to make the growth conform to the space to be covered; but a severe pruning in July, directly after they have finished flowering, is beneficial. Cutting away at that time all old flowering wood will encourage a vigorous growth, which will give an abundance of flowers the following season.

[^0]:    PLANTING: The table above shows the number of plants or bulbs required to fill a circular bed of the dimensions given. In planting, begin at outside rowwhere 6 inches apart, 3 inches from edge of bed; where 12 inches apart, 6 inches from cdge of bed. It is customary among professionals in planting a bed to set the plants or bulbs somewhat closer cogether in the two outer rows, giving more space between each plant or bulb toward the center of the bed. A square bed will take about the same number of plants. For an oval bed, add length and breadth and divide by two. For example, an oval 9 feet long by 7 feet wide will require the same number of plants as a circular bed 8 feet in diameter.
