## Visit to Japan by Rev. Takie Okumura

1. 1. A request has been received from Rev. Takie Okumura to visit Japan.

2. Rev. Okumura is a Japanese Christian missionary who has been a resident of Hawaii since August 1894. He has been active among the Japanese colony in Hawaii in religious and civil affairs. The purpose of his visit is to travel throughout Japan for four or five months with official sanction and with privileges of a member of the Occupation Forces to attempt to elicit from the Emperor a statement to the effect that there is no state religion, and that the Japanese should have as the basis of their religion "Respect of God as Supreme Ruler and Strict Observance of His Ways".

3. a. A directive has been issued to the Imperial Japanese Government in SCAPIN 448, 15 December 1945, to the effect that there is no longer a state religion in Japan.

b. In the capacity in which Rev. Okumura desires to be considered, he would be looked upon by the Japanese as a representative of the Occupation Forces. His activities in this capacity would be a contravention of Freedom of Religion.

c. It is believed that any attempt to coerce the Emperor into such a statement through any sources whatever would be highly dangerous to the entire Christian movement in Japan.

4. It is concluded that Rev. Okumura's request should be denied. CI&E Religions Division (Mr Bunce) concurs.

5. Recommend approval of draft letter which implements conclusions cited in paragraph 4 above.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of 4 March 1947 concerning a proposed visit to Japan.

Your interest and offer of assistance to the Japanese people is gratifying. However, due to the disruption of Japanese transportation and economy, the entry of missionaries into Japan is governed by a strict policy. This policy provides that only those organizations who maintained missionaries in Japan prior to the war are allowed to send missionaries here currently. This policy will undoubtedly continue in force for an indefinite period in the future.

It is regretted, therefore, that your request cannot be favorably considered at this time.

SUBJECT: Repatriation of 6 Natives of Saipan and Palau from  
Borneo via Japan

1. Netherlands East Indies, Batavia (AMCONSUL Batavia) radio 081645, April 1947, requests SCAP clearance to effect repatriation via Japan of 6 natives of Saipan and Palau. Requests early reply since last SCAP repatriation vessel leaving Batavia about 18 April.
2. Ourad ZX 42435/11 April 1947 requested CINCPAC and COMMARIANAS clearance for entry into that area and, if appropriate, distribution of the natives on shipping under control COMMARIANAS. Information copy of clearance radio to be furnished AMCONSUL Batavia which would constitute authority for embarkation of the 6 persons for repatriation via Japan.
3. a. CINCPACFLT radio 120401 Z April 1947, grants clearance for the 6 persons to enter ex-mandates, suggests those enroute Palau be transported via phosphate ships, and requests COMMARIANAS arrange intra-area transportation as required.  
b. AMCONSUL Batavia was information addressee on clearance radio as per our request, consequently his request is answered.  
c. CINCPACFLT requests that COMMARIANAS be advised date and port of entry his area. A sailing dispatch will issue upon departure of the persons from Japan informing interested agencies (COMMARIANAS, ISCOM Saipan, COM Western Carolines Sub-Area) name of ship, date departed Japan, expected date and port of arrival that area.
4. a. COMMARIANAS radio 130047 Z April 1947, requests our sailing dispatch be addressed to COM WEST CAROLINES SUB-AREA and ISCOM SAIPAN for information.  
b. Our sailing dispatch mentioned in paragraph 3 c above, will satisfy this request.
5. No further action necessary at this time on:
  - a. Netherlands East Indies, Batavia radio.
  - b. CINCPACFLT radio.
  - c. COMMARIANAS radio.

Japanese Scientific Groups have submitted plans for democratization of scientific research in Japan. Proper evaluation of these plans will require services of experts not available in this Headquarters. Informal information indicates National Academy of Sciences may be willing to sponsor the visit of a group of scientists to Japan. Request that an invitation be extended to National Academy on the following basis: Four or five scientists in the following field: Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Chemical Engineering, Electrical Engineering be sent to Japan for a period of approximately thirty days to work in and assist the Economic and Scientific Section of this Headquarters. These men should be qualified to organize and direct scientific research in the above fields. Men such as Drs. Frank B. Jewett, Ernest O. Lawrence, Roger Adams, D. W. Bronk are suggested. Payment for services to be by National Academy of Sciences, this Headquarters to make available billets and messing facilities on same basis as War Department civilian employees. Dependents and additional secretarial personnel may not accompany individuals. Office space and transportation to be furnished



in Japan as available, individuals to be subject to theater regulations the same as War Department civilian employees, the United States to bear cost of transportation San Francisco to Tokyo and return. Air priorities will be established upon request. Request names of individuals who may be selected be submitted to this Headquarters prior to issuance of invitation and that security screening be accomplished by the War Department.

1. 1. Request has been made by Joint Chiefs of Staff for views this Hqs on return of Charles Fred Wilkes for permanent residence with the Japanese National whom he married on 1 January 1947. (TAB: JCS Rqst).

2. a. Subject individual was employed by 71st Signal Battalion as a cryptographer prior to his marriage.

b. He was relieved of his duties and returned to the United States as a result of his marriage disqualifying him from further duty as a cryptographer.

c. Because the 201 file on subject person has been dispatched to St Louis, to be included in permanent records, no written information is available in this Hqs except a notation that he was discharged from his duties as cryptographer by reason of disqualification by marriage.

3. a. Signal Office (Lt Col Urban) states that Mr. Wilkes applied for permission to marry the Japanese National and, upon being denied permission, had married without authority.

b. It was further stated that he is in possession of highly classified information, by reason of his former duties, which would be placed in jeopardy by his return to Japan under existing circumstances.

4. Concluded entry of Mr. Wilkes should be denied.



1. I am submitting herewith a request in quadruplicate for travel orders to go to Shanghai and Peiping, China, for a period from 21 April to 5 May 1947, for the purpose of interrogating witnesses on behalf of the defendant, Toshio SHIRATORI.

2. The witnesses to be interviewed in Shanghai are two former German Foreign Office Representatives, namely, MARTIN FISCHER and ERNST WOERMANN.

3. The nature of the information sought relates to the activities of the defendant, SHIRATORI, during that period from September 1939 to September 1940 when the Tripartite Pact was formally concluded between Germany, Italy and Japan. FISCHER in particular was a close confidant of the German Foreign Minister, von Ribbentrop, and it is felt that he can afford valuable information desired.

4. The purpose of the visit to Peiping is to interrogate EUGEN OTT, formerly German Military Attache and later German Ambassador to Japan. During the process of the presentation of the Prosecution's case various purported communications from OTT to the German Foreign Office, which were obtained from Nurenburg, Germany, were introduced into evidence against the defendant, SHIRATORI. From information I have received from ex-Special Envoy, later German Ambassador to Japan, HEINRICH VON STAHRER, the said OTT can afford extremely valuable information in the way of explaining these so-called communications.

5. I might add that upon application to the Tribunal in Chambers, it was determined by President Webb of the Tribunal that the information required from OTT was of such importance as to warrant his being subpoenaed to testify before the Tribunal and subpoena for his presence was thereupon issued. However, there is grave doubt as to the authority of the Tribunal to compel anyone outside of Japan proper to appear before it and though the subpoena has been issued for quite some time, no return to my knowledge has been made on the same.

6. I wish to further call to your attention order executed by Sir William Francis Webb, President of the Tribunal, on the 26th day of November 1946, which states in part as follows:

"It is further ORDERED: That every facility and assistance be provided to counsel for the accused SHIRATORI to submit written interrogatories to or verbally interrogate each of the following named persons at the place where said person is now located and may be found or held:"

I further quote paragraph 5:

"5. Eugen OTT:


(a) The nationality of the witness is German.

(b) The address of the witness is Peiping, China; his last official position was Ambassador of Germany to Japan, in the Embassy at Tokyo."

7. I am further advised that the said OTT is soon to be repatriated to Germany and if not interviewed while in Peiping, I feel it will be necessary to go even to Germany for the purpose, due to the ultra-importance of his testimony as regards the defendant, SHIRATORI.

8. This likewise applies to Messrs FISCHER and WOERMANN.

9. I would appreciate if you would exercise every effort to expedite the approval of this request through proper channels.

**SUBJECT: Travel Documents for Japanese Nationals Traveling Abroad**

1. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers contemplates authorizing the travel of selected Japanese nationals to destinations outside the limits of Japan. It is desired that the Imperial Japanese Government, upon specific direction, issue travel documents in the nature of a passport to individuals whom it finds to be Japanese subjects.

2. In addition to procedures normally followed in the issuance of a passport, these documents shall be issued in conformance with the following instructions:

a. Travel documents shall be issued only to individuals specifically designated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Each document shall bear a statement to the effect that it is issued by the authority and under the instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, and shall contain a reference to this directive and to the directive specifically authorizing its issuance to the individual concerned.

c. Each document shall contain a statement of the purpose and period for which the travel has been approved as indicated in the directive authorizing the issuance of a travel document.

d. Wording shall not be used in these documents which directly, or indirectly, constitutes an address by the Imperial Japanese Government to foreign authorities.

1. 1. A request has been received by WAR (WFACD) from Pacific Overseas Airlines for use of Army Air Force facilities in connection with three weekly non-scheduled cargo and passenger flights between the U. S. and China.

2. These flights would be routed:

a. One flight per week via Alaska route stopping at Chitose Airfield in Hokkaido and Haneda Airfield.

b. Two flights per week via central route from Honolulu stopping at Haneda Airfield.

The flights would be on behalf of UNRRA and other contractors.

3. a. These flights, though frequent in nature, do not constitute regular scheduled operations through Japan as contemplated by Northwest Airlines and Pan American Airways. They fall into the same category as the charter flights between China and the U.S. recently authorized for Northwest Airlines by our radio ZX-37166.

b. FEAF (A-3 Operations) expresses the opinion that since the aforementioned charter flights for Northwest Airlines have been authorized, it would be discriminatory if we denied firmly the request of Pacific Overseas Airlines. However, with the great increase in civil air traffic which has come about in the last few months, the facilities at Haneda are already strained. With the contemplated commencement of scheduled flights by Northwest and Pan American, ramp space at Haneda will be definitely overloaded. It is believed desirable, therefore, to discourage such flights passing through Japan if possible. The technical details mentioned in the proposed radio concerning conditions at Chitose and routing of airways were furnished by FEAF.

4. It is concluded that the request of Pacific Overseas Airlines should not be denied here but that recommendation should be made to WAR (AFACD) that due to conditions cited, the flights through Japan are impractical, and a more southerly route should be used. Concurrences: FEAF (A-3 Operations, Lt Col Johnson), G-4 (Col Keating).

Reurad WCL 33947, 1 April 1947. There is no rpt no strong objection here to the round trip non-scheduled cargo flights described, however, reasons exist which would make such flights impractical. Chitose Air Field cannot rpt not bear sustained C-54 traffic and no rpt no regular or frequent civil air traffic is being planned to be routed through there. This would necessitate flight non-stop from Adak to Tokyo. After each flight either crew would have to be replaced or remain Haneda overnight. Facilities at Haneda Air Strip are too limited in both accommodations and ramp space to provide satisfactory billeting of replacement crews or overnight parking of aircraft.

With reference to the central route from Honolulu, the February PICAQ Conference in Melbourne approved an airway Wake to Tokyo. No rpt no airway Wake to Iwo Jima exists or is being planned. Secondary airway Iwo Jima to Okinawa exists. Primary airway Guam to Okinawa to Shanghai is currently in full use.

In view of aforementioned facts and lack of adequate facilities at Haneda for accommodating additional civil air traffic and because of existing customs requirements and restrictions for entering occupied areas, strongly recommend

all flights be routed Honolulu, Wake, Guam, Okinawa, Shanghai. Recommend use of Agana air strip on Guam to permit handling all civil air traffic on one field. Attention is invited to fact that all rpt all air traffic in the Far East Area, scheduled or non-scheduled, on or off airways, is required to file proper clearances; to conduct all over-water flights on instrument flight rules; to carry adequate safety equipment; and to send regular position reports as directed by base operations prior to flight. These measures are essential to safety during long over-water flights, particularly in areas of heavy air traffic or converging air routes.

In event it is decided to use routes through Haneda in spite of limitations described above, attention is invited to the fact that all rpt all passengers traveling on such flights will be required to secure JCS military permits for travel through Japan. In addition if crews or maintenance personnel are to remain for any length of time in Japan, permanent or semi-permanent JCS military permits will be required. Any personnel entering Japan will be subject to all regulations promulgated by SCAP.

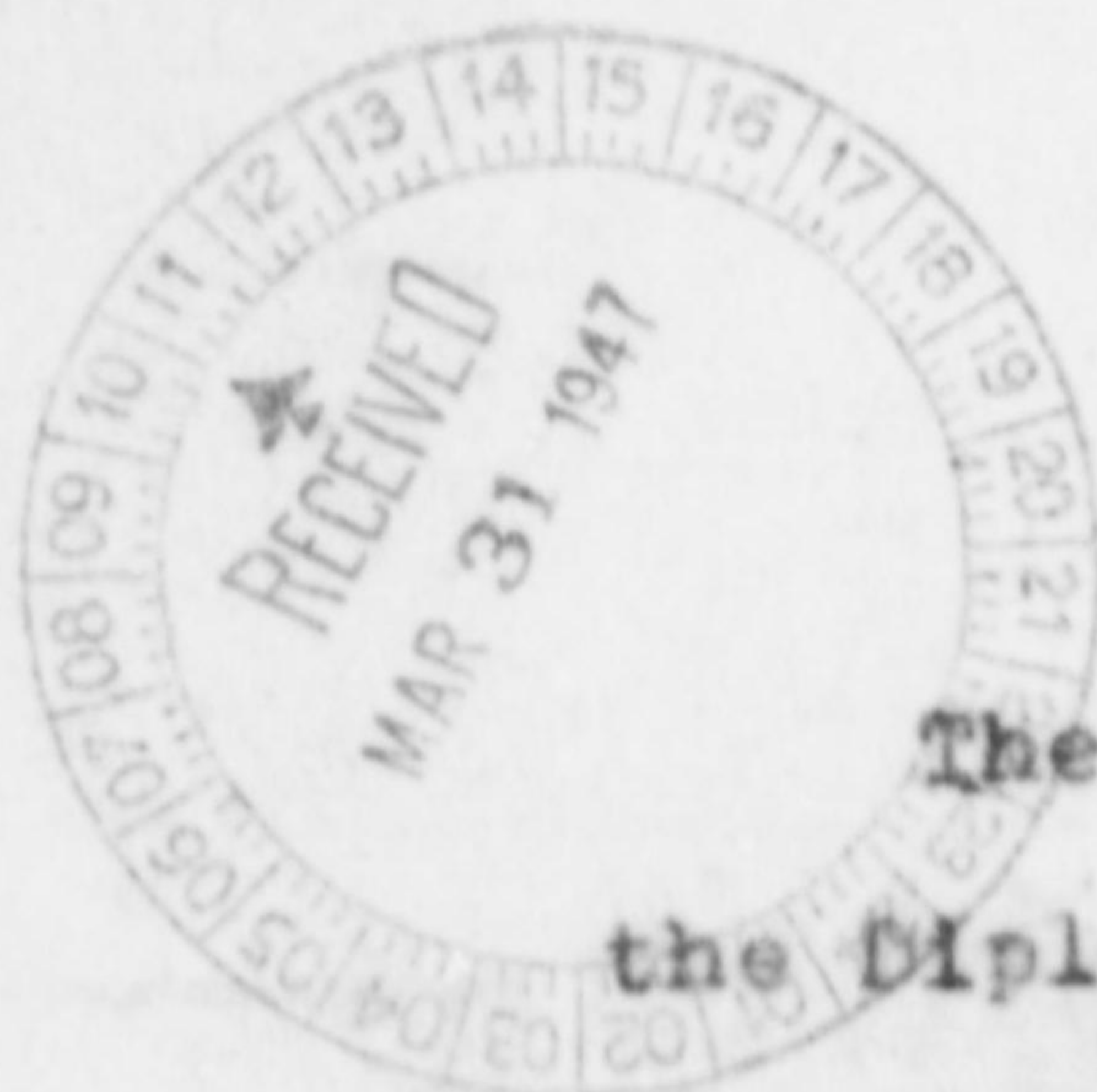
