FOUR THOUSAND ARABS SAID TO BE DIRECTED AGAINST TRIPOLI

PETROGRAD, Dec. 20.—The Bourse Gazette hears from Odessa that a serious situation has arisen in Con-stantinople between the Porte and The Italian ambassador, Mar-Garroni, received from his government that 4000 Arabs under Turkish and German officers have been directed against Tripoli. ambassador has demanded explanation, threatening to break off Italy's relations with Turkey if a fully satisfactory answer is not given within a certain time limit.
