Easier money conditions resulting from a general lowering of the inter-est rates is having the effect of releasing a large flow of capital to in-dustries for improvement purposes, or for resumption upon a scale more closely approaching normal, according to reports to the Federal Reserve Board.

Briefly, the financial prospects, as reflected in the attitude of banks in reports to Washington show a pur-pose to give "constructive" aid to business. This is being done without sacrificing any of the conservative methods of banking. It will mean an enlargement of bank accommodations, but will bring greater ease in the money market and thus speed up business and economic development.
