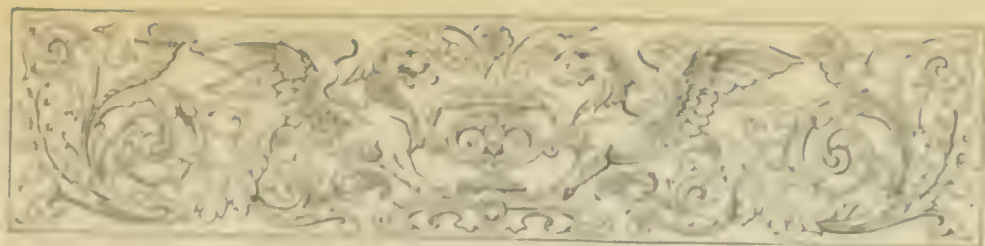

AMERICAN MEDALS: SILVER.

Many very rare and valuable; all in the finest possible condition. I particularly commend this series to collectors of REVOLUTIONARY, PRESIDENTIAL, CENTENNIAL, MASONIC and LA FAYETTE medals.

REVOLUTIONARY PERIOD.

- 71 Crowned female bust to right in high relief, with low cut
 corsage. CATHARINA MAGN. D. G. IMP. AVTOCR. EVSSOH.
 Rev. Neptune with trident stands on a conch-shell
 bearing the shields of Russia, Sweden, Denmark and
 Holland, between Mercurius and another figure. MARE
 LIBERVM MDCCLXXX in exergue. A superb medal by
Holtzhey. 31. Plate I.

This medal, unknown to most authorities on the subject, refers to the
 armed neutrality of the Northern powers between England and the United
 States. The following one, referring to the same subject, is much better
 known.

- 3-60 74 Mortuary medal of Baron Bentinck, who was wounded at the naval battle of Doggers-bank, fought by Holland against England, and who died Aug. 24, 1781. Funeral urn on altar, ship to right and naval trophy to left. Rev. Medallion of victory on capstan surmounted by the arms of Holland, a trophy in the rear. Very fine medal by *Holtzhey*. 28.
- 5.50 75 Female presenting a Liberty cap to Indian princess; the latter holds in her left arm a shield dotted with thirteen stars, her left foot rests upon a crouching lion, sun-burst above, etc. LIBERA SOROR. MDCCLXXXII. Rev. Unicorn breaking his horn against a rock. TYRANNIS VIRTUTE REPVLSA, and SUB GALLIAE AUSPICIIS in exergue. A superb medal, in proof condition. One of *Holtzhey's* best productions. Rare. 28. Plate I.
- 4.50 76 A warrior, representing Holland, clasping the hand of a female figure with shield inscribed "de Verenigde Staaten van Nord America," Cupid above with Liberty cap, England on the right, an olive branch in her hand. Rev. Shield of the States of Friesland over inscription in eight lines. 1782. Sharp, beautiful medal by *Calker*. 28.
- 2.40 77 Female figure with bunch of arrows and caduceus, a Liberty cap on staff to left, camp in the rear, etc. NEDERLAND VERKLAART (declares) AMERICA VRY *I. M. Lachman* in exergue. Rev. Dutch and American flags, bales of goods, etc. 1782. Sharp, beautiful impression. 21. Bushnell Sale, \$4.50.
- 5.50 78 Louis XVI, seated on a throne, points to an American shield hung by a female on a column surmounted by a Liberty cap. LIBERTAS AMERICANA. In exergue, MDCCLXXXIII. Rev. Pallas holding in her left hand the entwined shields of England, France, Holland and Spain. COMMUNI CONSENSU. Very rare and fine medal. 29. Plate I.
- 4.50 79 General Horatio Gates. Bust to left, by *Gatteaux*. Rev. General Burgoyne surrendering his sword to Gates at Saratoga. SALUS REGIONUM SEPTENTRIONAL; the date of surrender, Oct. 17, 1787, in exergue. Original; fine proof. 36.

PRESIDENTIAL MEDALS, ETC.; SILVER.

- 3.50 80 **George Washington.** Naked bust to right, by *Paquet*. BORN FEB. 22 1732. DIED DEC. 14 1799. Rev. Small profile bust of Washington on cabinet of medals. The large mint cabinet medal, 1860. Brilliant proof. 38.

- 70 81 Military bust to left, by *Bolen*. Rev. I HOPE THAT LIBERAL ALLOWANCES, etc., extract, in eleven lines, from Washington's letter to Hamilton. Dull, proof. 37.

Mr. Johnson, in his work on *Bolen's* medals, says that of these medals, but five in silver were struck, and that the dies are useless.

- 5- 83 Naked bust to right. Panels with infantry and cavalry on border. TO COMMEMORATE THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE. Rev. Facsimile of the signature of John Hancock. THERE! JOHN BELL CAN READ THAT NAME WITHOUT SPECTACLES, etc. Extremely fine, rare. 27.

- 5- 84 Naked bust to right. THE FATHER OF HIS COUNTRY, BORN FEB. 22, 1732. Rev. A monument. NATIONAL MONUMENT JULY 4 1848. Extremely fine. 25.

In I. F. Wood's sale, Part I, this medal sold at \$10. Common in white metal, but in silver extremely rare.

- 5- 85 Naked bust to right. 1775-1875. FIRST IN WAR AND IN PEACE LAST IN SECURING. Rev. An unfinished monument, with smooth surface, — A MONUMENT. *I. F. Wood's design*. Proof. 25.

- 0 86 Large naked bust to right. GENERAL WASHINGTON, 1776. Rev. Blank, with ornamented design on border. Proof; very rare. 24.

- 0 87 Military bust to right. GEORGE WASHINGTON OF VIRGINIA. Rev. Pyramid of fifteen cannon balls, sabres crossed below. GENL OF THE AMERICAN ARMIES 1775, etc. Very thick planchet. 21.

Dr. Gen. W. Massamora's re-entrick from the discarded dies. Twenty-one were struck in silver, and the dies destroyed. I paid him \$2.00 for this one.

- 0 88 Bust in torse to right in wreath of roses. Rev. View of Mount Vernon. WASHINGTON'S RESIDENCE. Proof; rare in silver. 22.

- I paid the late Mr. S. K. Harzfeld \$8 for this beautiful medallion. It is certainly the finest and one of the rarest of Mr. Wood's series, the day, die having broken after a few had been struck.
- 113 Small naked bust to right. TO AID "ST. JOHN'S GUILD." Rev. Bust of Martha, same as the last described. *Proof*. 17.
- 114 Busts of Washington and Franklin facing. *Base* between them. Rev. FAR SOBER FRATREM in wreath. Unc., very scarce. 16.

- 5- 115 Draped bust to right, WASHINGTON above. Rev. Head of Liberty to left. LIBERTAS AMERICANA. Very thick planchet. *Proof.* 16. Plate I.

GOLD COINS.

This part of my cabinet is intended to illustrate, as far as very limited means would allow, the gold coinages of ANCIENT GREECE and ROME, of ENGLAND, the Continental nations of EUROPE, REFORMATION COINS, early issues of the NATIONAL MINT, the CALIFORNIA and MORMON coinages, etc. How much, or rather how little I have achieved is left to the appreciation of collectors, but it is pleasant to know that others have of late years turned their attention to this, the most noble domain of numismatics, and that the day is not distant, when collections of gold coins exclusively will be formed here, as well as in England, France and Germany. Among the coins herewith offered will be found a number extremely rare and beautiful, heretofore highly valued by collectors; none, I think, are unworthy to figure in any cabinet.

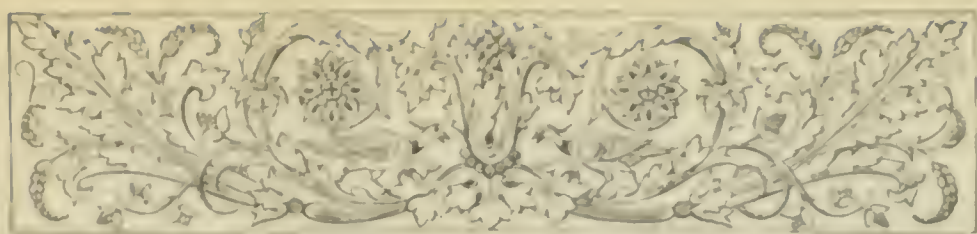

PLATINUM COINAGE OF RUSSIA.

The specific gravity of platinum is greater than that of any other metal or known substance, being 20, or 110 greater than that of gold. The experimental coinage in this metal made during the reign of Nicholas I was long since discontinued, and the VI and XII roubles especially, of which but a small number were coined, have become extremely rare.

The authenticity of this piece as a Colonial coin having been doubted here, collectors are referred to Mr. Hoffmann's work, "Monnaie Française," where the identical coin is described among the Colonial series. Recent researches in Paris have led to the discovery of documents which prove that this coin owes its origin to Law, Scotch financier and founder of the French India (Mississippi) Company. The State mints not being able to supply the demands of the Company for small silver, Law was authorized to have livres of 20 sols struck in private mints for circulation in the realm of the Company. The great Mississippi speculators could buy, but the coins have remained, and must hereafter be struck among French-American Colonial coins. See also 267.

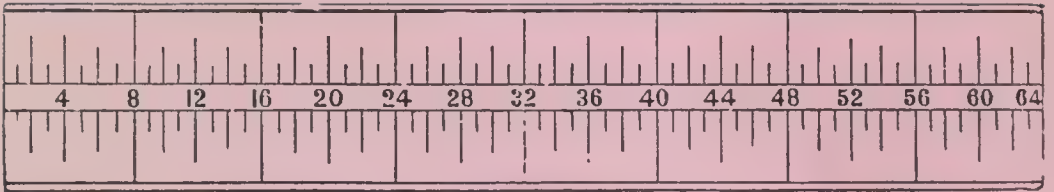
