

Later I called for Mr. & Mrs. Wilson's and saw Prof. Wilson's. He showed me Cigol which was a very faint star at the time. He told me to look at it this last thing this evening while I did. It had recovered much of its brightness. This variable is very wonderful. Two bodies of different degrees of brightness revolve about each other.
