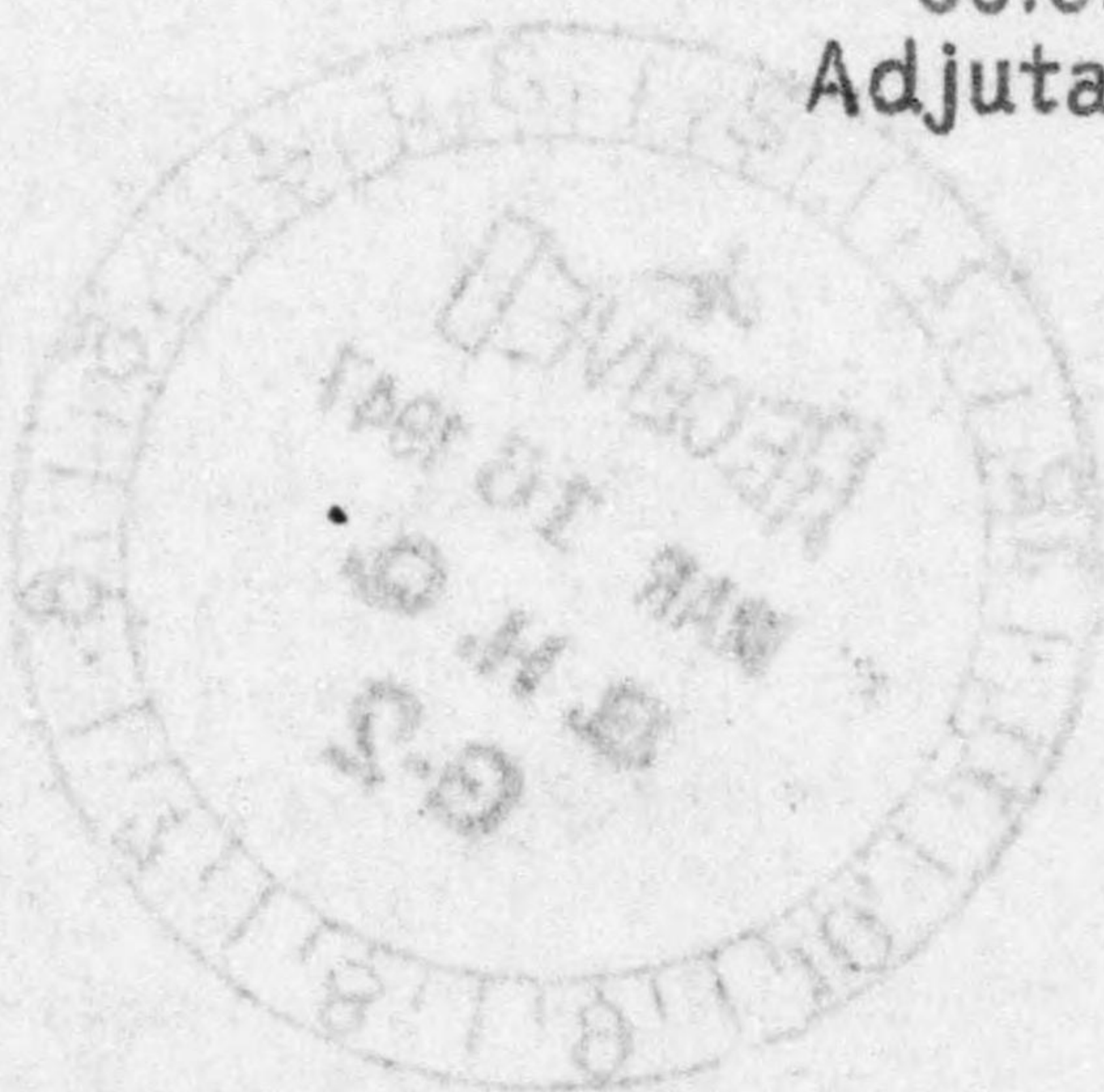

MEMORANDUM TO: Head of United Kingdom Liaison Mission in Japan.

SUBJECT : Radium Removed from Hong Kong.

1. Reference is made to memorandum to United Kingdom Liaison Mission in Japan, file AG 441.1(17 Jan 47)GPC/FP, 17 January 1947, subject: Radium from Hong Kong, from General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

2. With reference to paragraph 3 of reference memorandum, inclosed is a copy of the report received from the Japanese Government on the matter.

3. It is requested that the facts contained in the above report be investigated in Hong Kong. If the results of the inquiry indicate that said Radium is the property now in the custody of the Occupation Forces, it is requested that the British Government file a new claim, containing the following identifying information:

- a. Detailed description of the property, including type of radium, size of cells, markings, pure radium content, etc;
- b. Proof of ownership;
- c. Brief statement of condition, circumstances and terms whereby there was a loss of title.

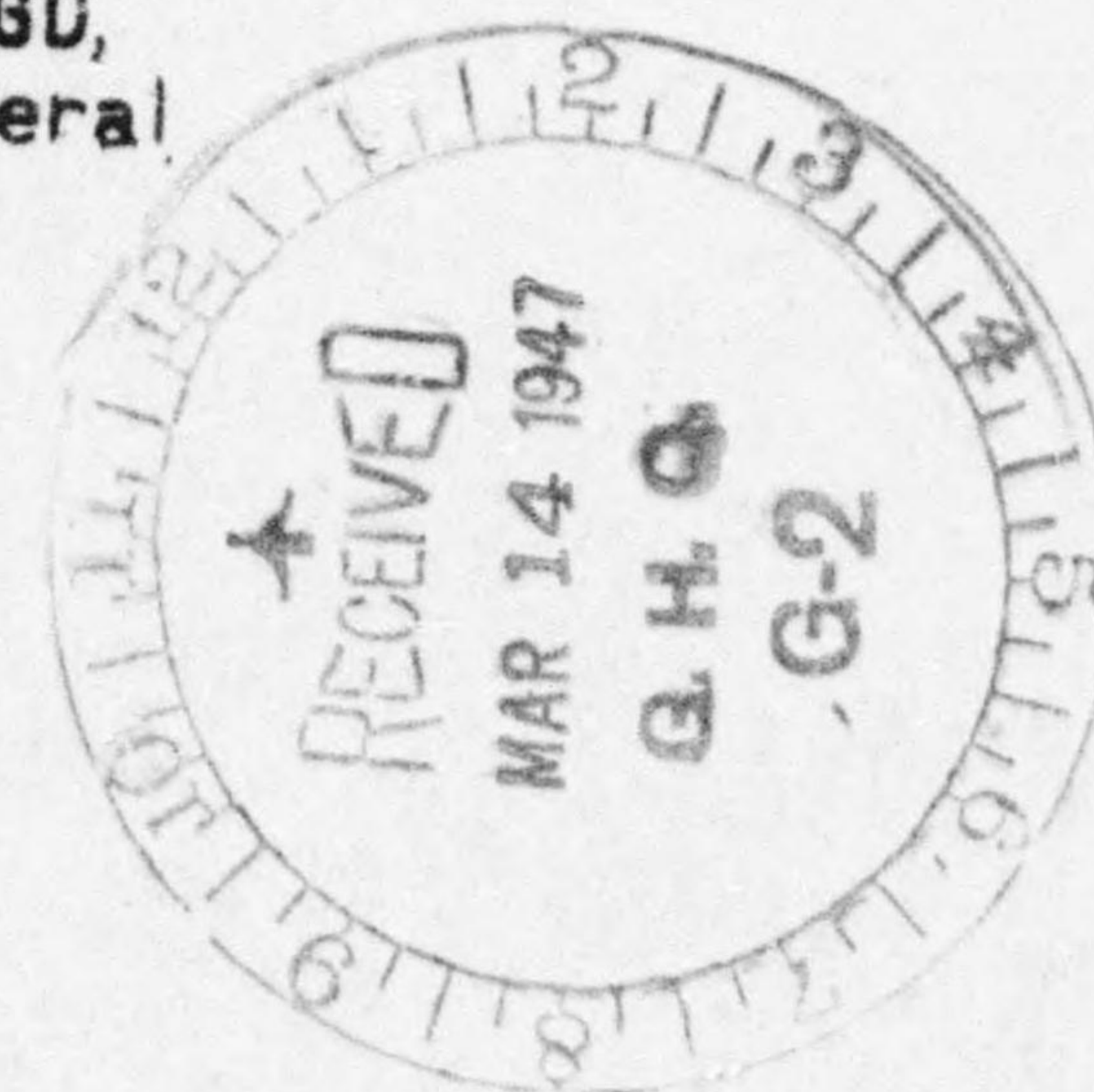

Subject: A petition concerning promotion for the returning of Japanese
remaining in the South-East Asia districts.

Dear Sir,

We desire that our brothers still remaining in the South-East Asia districts set foot on our country soil as fast as possible; and in the name of the Tokyo Imperial University's student body, we make a petition to you as follows.

It is said that since the end of the war the returning of our brothers in oversea land will require several years. But by your humanistic benevolences and generous decision in only one year most of them have returned to motherland swiftly and safely. We thank you for these warm deed above all. Nevertheless, about 104,000 in the South East Asia districts, these our brothers are still remaining in very hot and epidemic weather as labourers. Among them, there are students who went overseas half-way thru University studies. Probably, they are having passions to learning even now.

Guessing their bodily and spiritual pain under the unfamiliar climates and especially seeing their wives and childrens miserable condition fighting poverty and illness, we pray your sympathetic feeling to promote their returning.

Naturally we realize our position and duty as a defeated people; and we vow to perform our duties truly; and yet we have not the heart to see indifferently the pains of our brothers in oversea lands. We repeatedly pray to you that our brothers in oversea land can come back to our country the first half of this year. We shall have many delights, when our brothers will be able to step on our own motherland and hand in hand we shall be able to reconstruct Japan and exert ourselves to the peace of the world.

We, The Tokyo Imperial University's students, pray you heartily to seriously consider this matter.

We hereby attach the signatures of the students who sympathize for the brothers in oversea.

Sirs:

Appeal for an Early Repatriation of our Kinsmen

We beg to appeal to you that you would kindly make arrangements for an early repatriation of Japanese surrendered personnel in the southern Burma, by taking pity upon the miserable circumstances of their parents, wives and children.

One year and a half have already elapsed since the termination of the war and whereas large numbers of former officers & men are being repatriated from overseas territories, our husbands, brothers, fathers or sons, who were driven to war, have not yet been repatriated. Some papers report that repatriation in the southern areas will not be completed until the end of next year and we the family people are very anxious about them. No news in regard to the situation in which they are, the condition of health and other particulars being unavailable, the family people at home, including elder parents of over 60 years of age and young children, are spending most depressed days, disappointed at each radio news of arrival of repatriation ships. Helpless mothers feel heartbroken when she is asked by her children why their fathers do not come home yet, while on the other hand they have to struggle for the sustenance of their families.

The new constitution to bring about real democracy has been proclaimed, making a hopeful gleam shine upon the Japanese people, but the aged parents, helpless wives and innocent children are eagerly waiting for an early return of their sons, husbands or fathers, while being tortured by the rapid rise in the price of commodities which has almost wrecked their financial condition.

We entreat you that you would take pity upon us and make arrangements to get them repatriated as soon as possible.

SUBJECT: Cotton Fabrics for Siam

1. Attached are two (2) copies of a list of cotton fabric constructions identified by type, code number and quantity available, in square and linear yards, as submitted to the U. S. Commercial Company, Washington, D. C. This list represents the distribution, made at conferences held in Tokyo, of cotton woven fabrics produced in Japan from Japanese owned materials and from Commodity Credit Corporation raw cotton and allotted for procurement by the Government of Siam. The total quantity of 34,067,934 square yards compares with the allocation of 30,000,000 yards to Siam established by the Combined Textile Committee.

2. The basic inventory lists, showing the available supply of the fabrics from which these selections were made have been furnished to the Siamese Textile Purchasing Mission. Approximate prices for the major part of the supply have been made available and final prices will be established by the U. S. Commercial Company and incorporated in the sales contract. Sample swatches of the constructions selected by Siam are submitted herewith.

3. The U. S. Commercial Company will use the list of cotton fabric selections in drawing up a contract for the sale of these cotton fabrics to the Government of Siam. Finalizing of the sale, including terms for delivery and transfer of title, will be arranged by the U. S. Commercial Company, Washington, with the Government of Siam.

4. The attached list does not include certain gray fabrics available out of Commodity Credit Corporation cotton textile production to be finished in Japan which may be selected by the Government of Siam after reviewing the finished goods items already approved. Instructions for finishing should be submitted as soon as possible so that a finishing schedule may be prepared. Put-up and packing of these finished goods should be specified.

5. Pending receipt of formal instructions from the U. S. Commercial

Company, Washington, to arrange shipment of these cotton fabrics, the Japanese Government has been requested to earmark the same selections and arrange to concentrate these goods at a warehouse convenient to the shipping port. It is requested that prompt advice be given as to any preference in the shipping of these fabrics so that appropriate instructions may be given to the Japanese Board of Trade.

SUBJECT: Export Availability of Japanese Dyes

1. There are available for export from Japan 480,344 kilograms of synthetic dyestuffs. Particulars (name of the dye, net weight, unit value per kilogram) are listed on the enclosed sheet. All prices are f. o. b. Japanese port.

2. Because of the large number of different items, and the great variation in quantities available, no allocation among the prospective purchasers will be made until each prospective purchaser has indicated what dyes are desired. It is requested that this division be notified by 26 February 1947 of the interest of Siam in the purchase of any or all of these dyes. Immediately after that date an allocation, based on the total demand from all markets, and a firm offer will be made.

3. In the event that Siam requires samples of any of these dyes, it is requested that this division be advised by 10 February 1947 of the particular samples desired, listing the item number and the name of the dye for each sample desired.
