BANK OF ENGLAND.

The charter of the Bank of England is about to exmire, and the question of its renewal will probably tucome at no remote period, a subject of elaborate dis cussion. At a late inceting of the court of proprietors, a semi andual dividend of four per centum having been voted, in reply to a demand by a proprietor for in formation respecting the renewal of the charter, the governor of the bank stated that ministers had given him to understand, that if there should be time at this session, after the conclusion of the discussions on the reform bill, it was their intention to move for the apprintment of a select committee, to bequire into the subject of banking generally, in which committee the consideration of the bank charter must of course form a prominent feature. There is reason to presume there fore that the charter will not be renewed without mate rial modifications, and a curtailment of its, privileges. The charter of this bank has been prolonged from time first £1,200,000; it is stated to be now £14,580,300, Buston Antriot.
