THE CANDIDATES WHO HAVE PASSED

VICTORIA'S PUPILS CARRIED OFF HONORS

Local High School Passed a Large Percentage of Those Writing on the Examinations.

The results of the teachers and High school examinations which were referred to in Saturday's Times are now given in detail.

It will be seen that Victoria High school has won an enviable position. In the junior grade division the local school has the honor of leading for the province in first and second places. Margaret A. Gladstone, with 1,243 out of a possible 1,500 marks, easily occupied first place, being 24 marks above the next competitor, Rena F. T. Chandler, also of Victoria, who has a very creditable showing with 1,144 marks. To Victoria belongs the honor as referred to on Saturday of having the leading place among the boys writing. Arthur B. Walter with 1,051 marks taking that position.

The general standing of the Victoria pupils is very high—few of the passers being near to the minimum required. With 52 writing the local school passed 30, in striking contrast is the Vancouver school, where 107 candidates entered, although only 47 passed.

CAMOSUN STRUCK OFF DIGBY ISLAND. GOING INTO NEW RAILWAY TERMINUS. Vessel Dragged Entire Length Over Unchartered Rock—Ship is Here For Repairs.

What Other People Think THE WHALING INDUSTRY. To the Editor:—In the Saturday evening Times there appeared an article on the whaling industry. The financial statement made therein was not authorized by me, and no shareholder has had access to the books of the company except the secretary and myself.

From injuries sustained through striking an uncharted rock near the entrance to Prince Rupert, the new Pacific terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, the steamship Camosun, of the Union Steamship line, Vancouver, is on the ways of the Victoria Machinery Depot.

Large numbers continue to patronize the excursions among the Gulf Islands by the steamer Iroquois. On Wednesday and Saturday the steamer landed at a number of the islands, and on Sunday a stop of two hours was made at Crofton.

The repairs to the steamer will require a month or more and will cost approximately ten or fifteen thousand dollars. The Camosun, when she met with her accident, was going into Katen Island. She had aboard Mr. Bacon, a Grand Trunk Pacific harbor engineer, and D. Hays, brother of Charles M. Hays, the president of the Grand Trunk railway.

The Esquimalt Waterworks Company have determined to forthwith carry out the work necessary to enable them to use Goldstream water for the supply of Victoria West and the Esquimalt peninsula. The construction of a balancing reservoir below the B. C. Electric Railway Company's power house is being commenced to-day, and the route of the pipe line is being finally located.

The Camosun is a steel steamer of large proportions, and in point of speed and comfort is one of the finest in the northern service. Her mishap places the Union Steamship Company at a temporary disadvantage in handling the northern business, and for a time they will have to make use of the Canadian Pacific route.

A very popular mistake with regard to the Parisians is that they do not work. The mistake is, of course, due to the fact that casual visitors to Paris see so many Parisians apparently loafing about the boulevards during business hours.
