Topp, and the water-works foreman, Mr. Thos. Preece, be requested to report to the council as to the most feasible plan of obtaining an increased supply of water from Elk

The large pipe would be of a permanent nature, and would give an increased fire protection in the district supplied by In either case it would be advisable to have the shores of the lakes cleaned, gravel dam built between Elk and Beaver lakes: this would allow the water to pass freely from lake to lake, but would at the same time prevent he accumulation of vegetable matter in Beaver lake from passing into Elk lake; this latter would necessitate the laying of a pipe from the cooler water, lessen the work of the filter beds, and do away with the boggy taste at present noticeable in the water. The clear water basin should also be roofed in, so as to protect the filtered water from the rays of the sun.

SCHEME OF HOME RULE FOR IRELAND

FORECASTS OF THE GOVERNMENT'S PROPOSALS

Chief Feature the Establishment of Council in Dublin With Limited

London, Aug. 28 .- The Daily Chronicle this morning, forecasting the government's proposed devolution scheme Ireland, says that legislative union will not be touched and that Irish representation at Westminster and the powers of the Imperial parliament will ot be changed.

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


