A proper selection of both flowering shrubs and flowering trees means an attractive, well organized display of both flowers and berries throughout the entire year.

Flowering Shrubs give you a changing landscape as you can get in no other way. By the proper selection, on a somewhat extensive planting, you can have something in bloom or berry the year 'round. While it is true that most of the shrubs bloom in the spring, yet others do bloom later, and these with the ones that hold their berries into the winter, prolong the season of outdoor interest. You will see that the blooming time of most of these plants is shown in the descriptions on following pages.


