

Hurrah! Coast Road Bill Is Approved

Governor Wm. D. Stephens has signed the measure which appropriates \$250,000 for the purpose of constructing military roads in ten of the coast counties. Included in these is the seventy-mile stretch of territory which will connect Carmel-by-the-Sea with San Simeon, in San Luis Obispo county.

It is intended that this appropriation shall be expended for surveys and other necessary preliminary work, and will be used in conjunction with federal and county funds to be provided.

Owing to the military establishments in and near Monterey, the local road will probably receive early attention.

Two Splendid Plays Are Selected For Production Next Month

The play committee of the Forest Theater Society has made the decision as to the plays to be presented next month. "A Thousand Years Ago," by Percy McKaye, is to be the annual production of 1917, with Maeterlinck's "Blue Bird" as the children's play.

Two new stars will rise; Marian Devendorf is to Turandot, the Princess of Pekin, in MacKaye's comedy; and Dana Newberry will play Tyltyl in the "Blue Bird."

Miss Devendorf has played small parts in minor plays here, but has been accomplishing more serious results in the Players' Club of San Francisco, where she has been working under the direction of Reginald Travers at the Little Theatre. Dana Newberry is known only in short pants in last summer's "Piper," and local entertainments this winter and spring. Former stars are in either cast, unselfishly taking smaller parts and helping where their talent and experience will be of the greatest advantage to the productions.

As the net proceeds of the four nights of July 4 to 7—two performances of each play—are to be given to the local Red Cross chapter, it is certain that interest in Carmel-by-the-Sea and the peninsula towns will be kept at fever heat. A ticket selling campaign is planned that should insure record breaking houses for every night. As there is now a record attendance of over \$1800 for four performances in 1913 the possibilities for the Red Cross Society securing a large sum are good. The expenses, it is promised, will be kept at the minimum, and there should be at least a thousand dollars added to the treasury of the Carmel Red Cross.

Both plays have been wisely selected for the purposes of this year. Both are comedies. "A Thousand

Years Ago" is a light and happy story of a fairyland China, with a Princess who loves a beggar, and a jovial mountebank who becomes Emperor of China for a day, and solves the problems of love's dilemma. There are Harlequin, Pantaloon, Scaramouche and PUNCHINELLO, the vagabond players from Italy, Chinese soldiers and maidens of the harem, and it all takes place before the great wall of Pekin, above which, on pikes, are the heads of the lovers who have failed to win the Princess, and the heads of her father, the Emperor's, enemies. It is all a page from the "Arabian Nights" made into poetry by the facile pen of Percy MacKaye.

"The Blue Bird" is familiar to all. It is the most wonderful fairy tale that has ever been staged, and the travels of Tyltyl and Mytil in search of the Blue Bird will be shown in nine scenes which portray the entire play. Interior stage productions have necessarily excluded some scenes which will be given at the Forest Theatre, notably the flight of the trees and the animals to retain the bird as against Tyltyl and his dog. The Land of Memory, Night's Caverns of the Mysteries, the Land of the Future, the Graveyard, all will be shown with their fairy transformations. There will be nearly a hundred children and grown-ups in the cast.

The organization of the costuming committee will be in charge of Mrs. J. W. Hand, and those willing to assist in sewing and cutting should notify her at once. Nearly all the costumes will be made here, thus economizing on expense. In both plays, group dances and interpretive dancing will be featured.

The casting of the characters for these splendid productions is rapidly being completed, and the first rehearsals are set for Saturday next.

Red Cross Week

THE WHITE HOUSE, May 25.— "Inasmuch as our thoughts as a nation are now turned in united purpose toward the performance to the utmost of the services and duties which we have assumed in the cause of liberty and justice;

"Inasmuch as but a small proportion of our people can have the opportunity to serve upon the actual field of battle, but all men, women and children alike may serve effectively by making it possible to care properly for those who do serve under arms at home and abroad;

"And inasmuch as the American Red Cross is the official recognized agency for voluntary effort in behalf of the armed forces of the nation and for the administration of relief;

"Therefore, by virtue of my authority as President of the United States, and as President of the American Red Cross, I, Woodrow Wilson, do hereby proclaim the week beginning June 18, 1917, as Red Cross Week, during which the people of the United States will be called upon to give generously and in a spirit of patriotic sacrifice for the support and maintenance of this work of national need. WOODROW WILSON."

Our Weekly Recipe

RICE AND CHEESE.

Ingredients—one ounce rice, one grated cheese, one ounce butter, two pint milk, seasoning, six ounces flour and a little made mustard. Method—Sprinkle the rice into a pan of boiling water and cook until the grain is soft but whole. Make a sauce of the butter, flour and milk, boiling well to cook the flour. Add the rice and two-thirds of the cheese to the sauce, season with salt and mustard and cayenne, and pour into a greased pie dish. Sprinkle the rest of the cheese on the top, and brown under a grill or with a salamander, or in a hot oven. Garnish with sippets of fried bread.

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its full cash value, and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.

Carmel Fighting Men Respond to the Call

Registration Day, on Tuesday, passed off tranquilly in Carmel. It was realized early in the day that a much larger number than was expected would register here. When Registrars Wm. E. Martin and Geo. F. Beardsley completed their labors at 9 p. m. the total number of men between the ages of 21 and 31 enrolled was found to be eighty-three.
