

ANSWERS TO SOME QUESTIONS.

All plants, shrubs, or trees offered in this catalogue can be planted with success in the spring.

The planting season varies; sometimes beginning as early as March 20, sometimes as late as April 6.

All spring planting should be completed by May 15.

For Fall Planting the best results are obtained with Herbaceous Perennials, from September 15 to November 1. They should be protected with a mulching of pine needles or some other like material.

If it is desired to plant Evergreens in the fall, they should be planted the last week in August or the first week in September. Here the percentage of loss on Evergreens planted in the fall has always been much larger than on the same stock planted in the spring.

All deciduous shrubs and trees, including all the fruits offered, can be planted in the fall as readily as in the spring. These are generally ripened enough to ship from October 20 to November 1; but occasionally these dates must be advanced. From the time they are ripe until the ground is frozen it is perfectly safe to plant; the later the better.

Azaleas, Hybrid Perpetual Roses, and Rhododendrons should be planted in the spring only.

Packing is charged at the cost of material used.

All packages delivered free at express or freight offices in Plymouth.

We do not pay either freight or express.

All plants at the risk of purchaser after they have been delivered to the public carrier.

The Nurseries are seven hours from New York, ninety minutes from Boston.

Particular attention is called to the large number of native American plants in this list; nuless noted "collected," they are nursery grown. The Herbaceous Plants are field grown; i. e., they are large specimens,

not pieces grown in pots and frames.

Correspondence is solicited with persons who contemplate planting in large quantities. On orders with satisfactory references, six to twelve months in advance of the shipment of stock, very considerable reduction can be made on prices by the hundred and thousand. Plants will also be grown to order at special rates when large numbers are wanted and sufficient advance notice is given.

Antumn delivery begins September 15, and spring delivery begins from March 20 to April 6. If you receive more than one list, please distribute to your friends. I will send lists to any address you may send me.
