

Attitude of Church to Political Questions Dealt With by Rev. Dr. Campbell.

At the First Presbyterian church on Sunday evening, Dr. Campbell, gave no incertain sound as to the stand ministers of the Gospel should take in regard to political questions bearing on the morality of the community. IO FURTHER NEWS OF THE BRISTOL

THE MISSING MEN NOT YET REPORTED

Neither Nell Nor Tees Bring Any News of the Absent Ones - The Hesper's Voyage.

After touching at nearly all the northern ports of call the steamer Nell arrived from Kitimat and Port Simpson last night, bringing no further intelligence of the loss of the collier Bristol, or the fate of Pilot Roberts, Captain McIntrye, or of the other five members of the boat's crew of the ill-starred craft. The Nell left Port Simpson a week ago yesterday, so that if Pilot Roberts has struck out for that point after the Bristol sank, as believed by many, would have had plenty of time in which to have made the voyage. At no point along the coast was anything gleaned of the missing men. In fact those on the Nell had heard nothing of the wreck until after their arrival here last night.
