Preparations are now practically complete for registering every male in this county liable for military duty in accordance with the recently conscription law.

Headquarters for enrollment in Carmelo voting precinct have been established at the Carmel-by-the-Sea City Hall. William E. Martin of Carmel Valley and George F. Beardsley of Carmel-by-the-Sea have been appointed registration officials.

Fourteen hours of the twenty-four on June 5th—from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m.—will be devoted to enrolling Uncle Sam's new army.

Many inquiries have been made relative to those who must register next Tuesday, June 5. The following requirements must be observed:

Every male person in the United States who has attained his twenty-first birthday and has not attained his thirty-first birthday, regardless of his citizenship, must register in his home precinct.

this time more than it ever needed before the comprehending support of the American people and all the facilities which could be placed at its disposal to perform its duties adequately and efficiently."

Sickness, absence, physical disability, or any other thing, except that the man is in the active military service of the United States, is ground for exemption. Active service includes only the national guardsmen who have been called into Federal service.

A severe penalty awaits those who do not register. After the day of registration any one may be called upon by a peace officer to show his registration certificate, and, upon failure to do so, may be taken into custody without warrant. The registrars will not be required to seek out or request those liable to conform with the law.

Those who will be absent from their home precincts on June 5 should register at the office of the County Clerk. Those who through physical disability, absence, or illness, will be unable to present themselves at their registration place on the day designated, must secure registration cards and have them in the hands of their precinct officials on June 5.

A Remarkable Tree

Not far from Carmel-by-the-Sea, in the Monterey National Forest, there grows the Bristlecone or Santa Lucia Fir. This tree is found nowhere in the world but in the Santa Lucia mountains. Its dense crown, shaped like an Indian club, and often ending in a point or spire, its deep, lustrous, green foliage and its drooping tasseled branches are so distinctive that the tree can be recognized at a long distance. It is the only true fir in this region, although white fir is found both to the north and the south. It has been planted as an ornamental tree in Europe and in this country, but owing to the low germinating power and transient vitality of the seed, propagation is difficult. The number of trees in existence is about 3000.

Fair and Square

Under the new military conscription law, a drafted man may not purchase exemption. Thus the disgraceful Civil War poster, "Substitute Wanted!" will not offend the very name of democracy in the present war. Furthermore, there are to be no bounties, no can any man buy himself out of the service. For these and many other reasons, the new army bill is a fair and square law.

J. Ogden Armour of the Illinois State Council of Defense, which is calling upon Congress to pass legislation placing the control of food products in the hands of Federal officials, is chief owner of one of the largest industries in this country to be affected by any such radical step.

Our Weekly Recipe

Prune and Nut Salad

Select the best prunes for this purpose. Cook in the usual way, letting the liquor evaporate during the end of the cooking. Drain and chill prunes. Remove pits. Cut prunes in five pieces. Mix prunes and nut meats, and sprinkle with salt and paprika. For half pound prunes and quarter pound shelled nut meats use one cup whipping cream. Whip cream until solid, season with half teaspoon each salt and paprika, add three tablespoons lemon juice slowly while beating. Mix two-thirds of the cream with the prunes and nuts. Arrange the heart leaves of lettuce on individual plates, pile some of the mixture in each and cover with remaining whipped cream. Lay a few pieces of prune on top of each portion.

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically A.L.L. the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

Unsecured Personal Property
The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions
Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments
Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.
