

BY OVERLAND TELEGRAPH.

The following dispatches are from the Sacramento Union of Dec. 17th:

New York, Dec. 16th.—The papers this morning contain nothing new from Fredericksburg. The whole number of killed, wounded and missing in Franklin's grand division was 5,932.

Washington, Dec. 16.—The following dispatch was received by the President at 4 o'clock on Sunday morning, dated headquarters Army of the Potomac, Dec. 14th:

We have carried the first line of the enemy's works, opposite the town and 3 miles below, and hope to gain the crest of the hill to day.

The following dispatch dated Falmouth, Va., 8:45 this morning, has just been received:

It is raining fast. The river is rising rapidly. Our troops are all on this side of the river, and the pontoons are up.

During last night, Dec. 16, 1:30 P. M., the Army of the Potomac evacuated the positions on the opposite side of the river.

At 8 o'clock last night 400 rebel cavalry made a dash into Pooleville, Md., where only 25 Federals were stationed.

NEWBERNE, N. C., Dec. 10th.—The free labor movement which has been extensively, but quietly organized, in Eastern North Carolina, is understood now to be preparatory to the organization of the government of the State on a loyal basis.

CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—The reports concerning Banks' expedition are still contradictory. A dispatch from Boston says a Port Royal letter, dated Dec. 10, states that it passed there on the 8th, bound South.

New York, Dec. 16.—The Washington correspondent of the Commercial Advertiser, under date of the 15th, says:

If our army is crowned with victory before Fredericksburg, it will insure the appointment of Judge Holt as successor to Secretary Smith.

The Tribune has a special dispatch from Nashville, giving an account of the violation of a flag of truce on the Murfreesboro turnpike, by which 58 of the Fourth Michigan regiment were captured.

About 40,000 rebels are between Murfreesboro and Nashville. Forrest, with three regiments of cavalry left Manchester on Thursday last with the purpose of crossing the Cumberland river below Nashville, to cut the railroad.

A WASHINGTON correspondent of the New York Times says that reason exists for the belief that our European relations are at present in a more delicate condition than has been supposed.

Private letters from diplomats in Paris indicate a suspicion that a French armada, with fifty thousand men on board, and conveyed by the invincible iron clad frigate La Gloire, although ostensibly being organized for service against Mexico, will, under sealed orders to be opened when half way across the Atlantic, assume a more northerly direction, and finally appear off the mouth of the Mississippi under the pretext of asking a settlement of the act complained of against General Butler by the French Consul at New Orleans.

ARE LEGAL TENDER NOTES 'MONEY'?

The San Francisco Herald has the following:

Not long since the Supreme Court of this State decided that United States Treasury, or legal tender notes, were not payable for local taxes, and now the question arises whether they are legally payable for anything.

The important issue is before the Twelfth District Court, in the case of Jas. Lick vs. William Faulkner and other. The defendants are tenants of plaintiff, and lately tendered him 'green backs' in payment of rent due.

He refused to receive them, and now sues for the amount of the bill in coin. H. H. Haight, who argued the case for the plaintiff, contended that legal tender paper was in effect worthless for payment of any debts whatever, as the Constitution gave no authority for the issuance of any gold and silver coin.

Internal Revenue Notice.

THE UNDERSIGNED HAVING BEEN APPOINTED by the President of the United States Collector of Internal Revenue for the Fifth Collection District of the State of California, hereby gives notice that he has appointed G. D. FISKE Deputy Collector for Division No. 7, comprising the county of Yolo, who is prepared to issue licenses, and to receipt for all taxes and duties now due the Government, imposed by an Act entitled "An Act to provide Revenue to support the Government, and to pay Interest on the Public Debt," approved July 1st, 1862—from all persons residing in said Division.

All duties and taxes must be paid at the office of the Deputy Collector. Persons liable to pay a license will be required to take out the same within ten days from the date of an application, to be made through the Assistant Assessor, and all persons neglecting so to do, will be charged ten per cent additional on the amount thereof. Manufacturers, Auctioneers and Butchers will call forthwith, and pay the duties imposed monthly, within ten days from the 1st day of each month for the month preceeding. Up to statements returned through the Assessor, Distillers will pay duties tri-monthly, and Brewers monthly, within ten days from the 1st day of each month for the month preceeding, according to a form of statement which will be furnished from the Deputy Collector's office.

The attention of those interested is directed to the following provisions of the Revenue Law: "That if any person or persons shall exercise or carry on any business hereinafter mentioned, for the exercise or carrying on of which trade or business a license is required by this Act, without taking out such license as in that behalf required, he, she, or they shall, for every such offense respectively, forfeit a penalty equal to three times the sum of money or amount of duty imposed for such licenses." (Sec. 59)

"That for neglect or refusal to pay the duties on manufactured articles, provided by this Act, as aforesaid, the goods, wares and merchandise manufactured and unsold by such manufacturer shall be forfeited to the United States."
